Mayor's Report for the Year 1903.

Dartmouth N. S. 23rd. January 1904.

To the Ratepayers of the Town:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—The closing of the second year of my duties as Mayor, calls for a report of the progress that has taken place during that period, and an outline of the prospects that are in view for the near future. The more prominent and extensive industries that were foreshadowed by my report for 1902 have failed in being realized on time, still we can find good reason for congratulation as regards the minor industries which have during the year been started and successfully operated; and the year 1903 will still take its place in the annals of the Town with those that mark real and substantial progress.

The Iron Rolling Mills which at the commencement of the year, was carrying on initial operations under adverse surroundings in Austenville, have procured the extensive grownds of the late Canal Company at Mott's Cove, erecting thereon a complete and efficient Plant with all modern improvements ; these have been in successful operation for several months, giving employment to a large staff of hands. Opposite to the Presbyterian Church the Dartmouth Machine and Forge Company have erected large modern buildings, fitted with up-to-date appliances for carrying on Forge Works on an extensive scale; On the west side of the Canal the Messrs. Webber Bros. have purchased a site whereon they are erecting buildings to manufacture, Steam Boilers and other structures of Plate Iron. In the same locality the Dominion Molasses Company have for some months been erecting an extensive Wharf and Warehouses for Refining and Warehousing Molasses which when completed will likewise

give employment to a considerable number of hands. On Upper Water Street the Messrs. Harrison have fitted up a large factory with improved and powerful machinery for preparing and grinding Barytes this is the first establishment of the kind in the Maritime Provinces devoted exclusively to this industry.

The Rope Works have made several additions to their plant by introducing more powerful and improved machines in several departments of their works; which requiring more power have necessitated the installation of an enlarged boiler.

Alderman Williams has set up a large Water Motor to drive the several labor saving machines he has introduced in his Ship-building Works. These with several minor industries will prove that the Town is very far from a state of stagnation.

RE STEEL SHIP-BUILDING.

Fully realizing the may great advantages that would accrue to the Town by the establishment and successful operation of an industry of this nature in the Port of Halifax your Conncil in April last delegated the Mayor to accompany the Halifax delegation to interview the leading Steel Shipbuilding Firms of the Province of Ontario, and endeavour to ascertain their views regarding a Dominion bonus for the promotion of the industry, and to arrange a joint action in any application to the Legislature. with that object, interviews were had with F. Nicholls Esq., Capt. T. B. Miller and others ; when it was found that our movements had been forestalled and that the Ontario Ship builders had already been in communication with the Government at Ottawa, and had represented to them that a bonus of \$3.00 per ton, would enable them to successfully carry on the industry, on the shores of the great lakes; and compete with Foreign establishments; that being committed to this declaration, they were not prepared at this present time to reconsider their action with a view of discussing the necessity of a \$5.00 bonus as required by the promoters of the Halifax undertaking, at the same time all parties were fully impressed with the unadvisability of the introduction of a conflicting and adverse proposition being made to the Government. Under these circumstances the whole joint Halifax delegation were constrained to give way and agreed to seek a partial aid on the lines that were already laid down viz : a bonus of \$3.00 per ton, trusting that the merits of their case would be sufficient to procure the additional assistance to \$5.00 in the near future. The delegates returned and reported to several joint meetings of the various bodies interested, subsequently the Mayor on behalf of the Town Council, and Mr. H. E. Hill representing the Dartmouth Board of Trade jointly with the Mayor of Halifax and the Chairman and representatives of the Halifax Board of Trade departed on the 9th, of May to Ottawa to press upon the Government the absolute necessity of assistance being given to any bona-fide Firm that would undertake the installation of a Steel Ship-building Plant and ensure the operation of the same on a scale commensurate with success on the Atlantic Sea Coast of the Dominion. The delegation was well and favorably received by the Government and several Members of the House, and their representations fully considered and discussed, and were encouraged to anticipate that their prayer would not only receive due consideration, but also that Government action would likely be taken in that direction. While in Ottawa advantage was taken to interview the Honorable the Minister of Railways and others to advocate the granting to the C. P. R. running powers over the lines of the I. C. R. from Montreal to Halifax to facilitate their transportation of Western Freight through, to a Dominion Port on the Atlantic Coast. I much regret that notwithstanding the very favorable reception the delegates were accorded, that no satisfactory action has up to the present time, been taken by any party looking to the fulfilment of our earnest aspirations. Before leaving this subject entirely I would refer to efforts that have been made towards securing the establishment of other industries within our Town; early in the spring negociations were entered into with the Messrs. Moir & Sons and preliminary arrangements were made by your council granting concessions in rebate of Taxes and a free supply of Water conditionally, and with the promoters of the Dominion Linen Mills Company offering similar concessions and in furtherance of these efforts an application was made to the Provincial Legislature at their last session and an act promulgated to obtain authority for the citizens to grant the said concessions, but in both cases the negociations failed to reach a successful issue.

One of the notable events of the year has been the visit paid us by the Members attending the 5th. Congress of the Imperial Chamber of Commerce of the Empire held in Montreal in August who were jointly entertained by the Government, the City of Halifax and ourselves, and I have no doubt that the several members of the party will after their ramble through the West and East of the broad Dominion return home with a more exalted idea of the extent and capabilities of Canada than would have been possible under any other circumstances.

We were likewise visited by a party of the Western Railway Agents to whom along with the Mayor and Corporation of Halifax and members of their Board of Trade we had the pleasure of pointing out the capacity and extent of the Harbor with its free and unencumbered entrance, the facilities of the port for handling any quantity of freight, that could be forwarded, and the accommodation for landing and transit of passengers or immigrants.

FINANCE.

The Auditors Report and Appended Statements are hereto annexed from which it will appear that they have carefully scrutinized the several entries and vouchers, and found them all correct and satisfactory. A list of vouchers for

all payments made by the Clerk as required by law will be found annexed. By the committee's report it will be seen that this department is in a reasonably satisfactory condition the expenditure for the various services of the Town having been kept within or close to the estimates ; except for the Schools," the Commissioners of which having exceeded their estimates \$716. Their large adverse balance at the Bank of \$716. is owing in part to the establishing and fitting up of the Manual Training Department where \$527. was expended in excess of the estimate, and the remainder was more than offset by an increased cost of fuel and interest; for details I would refer you to the Chairman's report. While on this subject I would call your attention to the tabulated statements of the Auditors Nos. 1, 2 and 3 which, while being an absolute statement of facts, yet do not state the whole truth, through omitting all reference to the Bank Accounts; for instance these three statements taken together as they appear show an aggregate of unexpended balances of \$3952." in hand ; whereas these services were at the close of the year overdrawn to the extent of \$6923. as shown by the Auditors statement. This is entirely owing to the system of accounting, easily understood by an expert, but very confusing to the ordinary comprehension. In view of showing the General Financial position of the Town at this date, I would here append a tabulated, comparative statement of some of the principal items with 1902 and 1901, the same comparison would remain about the same if extended still farther back.

While the amounts of uncollected assessed taxes at the end of the year is much larger than it should be and very considerably in excess of many other communities it still compares favorably with our own past. The per centage uncollected on the 31st. Dec., 1903 was 13.30, in 1902 it was $13\frac{2}{4}$ per cent, in 1901 16 per cent, in 1900 $15\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, in 1899, 12 per cent.

STREETS.

The Street Committee have not carried out any extensive works during the year, the new work being a couple of culverts, spreading some 500 tons of broken stone and laying 1,610. feet run of curbing and grading of sidewalks along with the ordinary repairs, such as cleaning gutters, rain water courses &c., at an expenditure of \$3481.

The watering of the streets was well attended to during the dry season and owing to the wet fall a saving of \$60. was effected. The lighting service has been satisfactorily performed by the Electric Light Company under their contract with the Town, your council increased the service by seven additional lamps placed in positions where they were much needed, raising the total to 83 lamps.

PUBLIC PROPERTY.

The Town Hall has been much improved by painting and decorating the Clerk's Office, and the installation of much required modern fittings and conveniences for the transaction of the business. I have much pleasure in endorsing the recommendation of the committee in their report that provision be made in the estimates of the ensuing year to complete the painting and decorating of the eastern section of the hall. While the committee in this section have overdrawn the amount at their disposal, the service as a whole has been kept well within the estimates showing on the whole an unexpended balance of \$343. In view of the importance of these service in conjunction with the services of Water Maintenance and Sewer and Water Construction the time has arrived when there should be established a department of works to control all the machanical works of the Town including the present Street and Public Property department as also the Water and Sewerage depatments, under one controlling head, especially as the same labor is more or less intermittently employed from time to aime in the various services; and as it is declared on the highest authority that a man cannot serve two masters, the result is that very often he serves none ; to the great detriment of the interests of the citizens. It would certainly create a very onerous and responsible department the members of which might be compensated by being relieved from other committee service. This consolidation would largely tend to improve these services which at present frequently suffer from two independent controlling authorities, resulting in our street service having been during the past year very unsatisfactorily performed. For details of these services see committee's report and items of expenditure.

CEMETERY.

Little has been done, beyond cleaning the paths and whitewashing the fences.

NEW CEMETERY.

If upwards of twenty years ago this was considered a burning question requiring the immediate action of your council (the legislature having passed an act in the spring of 1884 empowering the town to borrow \$3,000. for the service,) surely the time has fully arrived when this matter should be finally settled. In 1900 power was obtained from the legislature to authorize the borrowing of the amount of \$4,000. but even this amount has since been found insufficient for the purpose, and an application should be at once made to authorize the town to increase that amount to \$5,000.

The most suitable site offered ; taking into consideration its contiguity to the centre of population, the facility of approach from all parts of the town, and as far as known the nature of the soil, its entire isolation from all dwelling houses, is the plot of land to the east of the late Henry Elliot's homestead on School Street, and should the soil on the northern portion prove satisfactory, I would strongly recommend, to the incoming council and the citizens the purchase of this property.

TOWN PLAN.

This essential piece of work is no nearer completion than at the commencement of the year owing to the inertness of the committee and a disagreement with the surveyor (who does not reside in the province) as to its perfectness and the meaning and intention of the contract; and unfortunately the longer it continues in its present condition the more imperfect it becomes owing to the continual changes that are taking place in the ownership of real estate within the town.

POOR AND LUNATICS.

This department has had its normal claims on the public purse, the number of patients at the County Poor Farm and the Nova Scotia Hospital being 14 both at the commencement and at the close of the year, one patient having been discharged and one new patient admitted to each institution during this period. There are 5 infirm aged patients cared for within the town itself, and one boy at the Industrial School and one at the Deaf and Dumb Institution chargeable to the town, besides a number of individuals to whom fuel and food are more or less distributed during the winter months, their claims having been within the general average.

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PUBLIC HEALTH.

In conformity with the requirements of chapter 17 of the Acts of 1900, your Council, in February, re-appointed Dr. Thos. Milsom, Health Officer of the town, who has during the year with his usual promptness, attended to the various calls that from time to time occurred, these have mostly consisted of diphtheria, and where treated in their early stage, the results have been successful, and in general the disease has been confined to the premises in which the outbreak occurred, and all tendency to an epidemic controlled. The general health of the town has been and still continues in a very satisfactory condition.

WATER AND SEWERAGE.

The ordinary work of maintenance of this department has beer carefully attended to, and all parts of the service kept up to its usual efficient standard, few defects in the mains have developed during the year, the most serious being a length of the 12 inch conduit, destroyed by lightening, which was duly replaced, the quality of the supply and the cleaning of the screens of the intake house, have been carefully watched and attended ; resulting in a satisfactory supply. I must protest against the continuation of the practice of supplying water for manufactures, power, and other purposes, without any safeguards as to the quantity used, either by meter or otherwise, which will inevitably result, sooner or later, in our supply falling short of the demands, and entail considerable additional expense on the citizen.

It is with much regret that I have to refer to the failure of the citizens to authorize the Council to borrow funds for the extension of the water and sewerage to the north section of the town, when the scheme was submitted for their approval in Aug. last. I feel confident that the result must have been owing to some mis-conception, possibly arising from one or two causes, either the lack of a due appreciation of the requirements of the district to be supplied, or an undue fear of its result on the cost of water to the present consumers ; for I cannot suppose there is any desire on the part of any citizen to deprive his neighbour

of what he considers an essential adjunct to his own health and well being; and without which he does not desire to live in any place. With regard to the first reason, I need only refer to the several reports of our health officer, where this subject has been treated, supported by the experience of all residents of thedistrict. Regarding the second, undoubtedly for a considerable distance the public domain borders one side of the road, and therefore to that extent the town as a whole, are entitled to contribute, that is so far perfectly just ; then the present consumers have their rates reduced below actual cost, by supplies furnished the Nova Scotia Hospital, the Refinery and others, this advantage they would have to share with the increased number of users, and consequently this would also cause a slight raise in the rates, still the present users would not be called upon to contribute more than their just share of the expenditure ; most undoubtedly in a few cases the scheme will press unduly hard for a time on some of the owners of unimproved land; certainly this scheme is not an exception to the rule, "that no project for the good of any community can be devised that will not entail an undue hardship on some individual members," but making every allowance the defeat of the scheme presses with much greater force on a much greater number of the residents, and prevents the development and improvement of a large section of the town. I sincerely trust that when the scheme is again submitted to the citizens, they will see their way clear to authorize the issue of bonds for a sufficient amount to carry out and complete the work.

Referring to the large adverse balance in the construction account, shown in the Committees' report, I would draw attention to the bonds held by the town, awaiting a satisfactory offer for sale, to the amount of \$3,300, these when sold will be applied in reduction of this account. The adverse balance of \$419. in the maintenance account is less than half of 1902, and will be amply offset by water rates over due, for further details and particulars, see Committee's Report.

POLICE AND LICENSES.

The number of cases brought before the court this year has been under the general average and I have pleasure in stating that they were mostly of a petty nature, no serious charge having been preferred, the citizens have every reason to congratulate themselves on the general law abiding character of the town and the efficiency of the police force.

FIRE APPARATUS, ETC.

Referring to the report of the committee elsewhere, it will be seen that the greatest danger to the town was from fires raging in the woods outside the northern limits of the town, which for some days threatened to become very destructive, fortunately they were, with much exertion by the members of the department, kept under control. During the season nearly \$1000. has been spent for new hose, apparatus and supplies to ensure the undoubted efficiency of this essential department, see committee's report.

SCHOOLS.

The register of pupils has again suffered a decrease of 9 making a total decrease of 113 since 1899 and the percentage of attendance has likewise fallen off from 65 to 64 notwithstanding the most strenuous efforts of the board to secure a more regular attendance, there must be something surprisingly wrong in the community to cause this continual falling off in our schools. The only new feature introduced this year has been the inauguration of a Manual Training Department, the beneficial results to be derived from which, are as yet awaiting future development, for details see chairman's and supervisor's reports on another page.

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DARTMOUTH PARK.

There has been the usual routine work of cleaning up and grading the paths, and roads, repairing and limewhiting the fences, repairing fountain, planting trees, painting band stand, benches, etc., in which they expended \$219.30, chiefly for labor. A number of citizens having the interests of the rising generation at heart, organized during the summer for the purpose of holding a bazaar to raise additional funds for the purpose of grading and preparing a portion of the park for atheletic games and sports, resulting in the successful Casazo held in July, placing in the hands of the commission the net sum of \$371.10, of which they have this year spent \$159.81 in prosecuting the desired work. For details of expenditure see Treasurer's report.

THE FERRY.

This service has been efficiently run without any break in the regular schedule time, throughout the year, by the Commission, and free from any serious accident, the boats having been kept up to the full requirements of the Government Inspectors, and notwithstanding the large increase in the cost of coal and all other supplies, they are still running on the same tariff of rates as during the last year. For particulars see chairman's report and financial statements.

PUBLIC READING ROOM.

This admirable institution has been well attended to and looked after by its directing committee in the interest and for the benefit of the citizens in general; filling as it does a much felt want in the town it deserves a more generous support from the community at large, than has hitherto fallen to its lot.

In closing my report on the various services of the town during the past year, and the requirements that claim the careful attention of the incoming council, permit me to express the obligation I have been under to the several members of my council, His Honor the Recorder the Town Clerk and the other officials for their co-operation and assistance, not only in the faithful and prompt performance of their several duties, the industry and ability with which they have served the town, but also for the personal help they have invariably rendered me from time to time as opportunity occurred.

Thanking you for the honor and confidence you bestowed upon me in re-electing me for a second term as your Chief Magistrate. With sincere wishes for your continued welfare and prosperity and the advancement and well being of the town in general,

The sum of \$22166. was received from the assessment of real and personal property, per financial statement. From this sum should be deducted the taxes on the two bank agencies which both pay a fixed rate of \$150. each, which less discount amounts to \$292., leaving \$21874. which deducted from the net amount to collect as above, \$25232., leaves a balance uncollected of \$3358. or 13.30 per cent.

There were four properties sold this year under the Lien Law for real estate taxes due for the year 1901, two of which were allowed to be sold by the parties interested to get good titles.

During the year the Bonded Debt of the Town has been increased by the issue of \$3300 Water Debentures, authorized by the ratepayers at an election held on June 25, 1903, and which are now on hand held for a better premium than is offered. The Bonded Debt has been decreased by the Ferry Commission paying off \$2000. of Ferry Debentures. The Sinking Fund, established by law to meet the water and sewer debentures, amounts to \$23,133.20.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STREETS AND PUBLIC PROPERTY.

The estimates for this service was \$3815. including \$280. estimated to complete the Maple St. under drain, which work has been done. There is now a good and sufficient drain two feet square inside, leading from the north side of Tulip Street to a point on Myrtle Street about midway between Pine and Maple Streets, a distance of 680 feet.

Some of the most important pieces of work undertaken during the season was building a large culvert on the Old Ferry Road. A great quantity of water, of late years, having been diverted to this point making it necessary to deepen and enlarge the culvert, and also to deepen the outlet a distance of 175 feet.

Portland Street from Mrs. Roche's to the town line was thoroughly ditched and drained. 490 tons of stone were used along the flat at the end of the lake and extending about half way up the hill. Some grading was done on the Gaston Road.

Crichton Avenue was put in good repair with slag and ashes from the Rolling Mill. The drains were all cleaned and a good culvert built in the hollow just north of Lloy's farm. This road is now in a much better condition than it ever has been.

Dawson Street was well drained aud repaired and also the objectionable wet crossing at the foot of the street disposed of. A iarge amout of work was also done on Jameison Street,

The total amount expended was \$3526.24, less received for broken stone \$45.10, making the net expenditure \$3481.14, leaving a balance of \$333.86.

We have now on hand 21I2 lineal feet of curbing and also a roller for sidewalk purposes which cost \$52. 70.

STREET WATERING.

The appropriation for this service was \$300. The sum expended \$240.25, leaving a balance unexpended of \$59.75.

STREET LIGHTING.

\$1900. was estimated for this service and \$1840.94 expended, leaving an unexpended balance of \$59.06. There has been added during the year seven lights, making the total now in use eighty-three.

PUBLIC PROPERTY.

The amount estimated was \$710. Paid on Engine House \$197.40 which was carried over from last year being the balance of the contractor's bill for new additions built in 1902, and \$8.25 electric wiring. \$599.72 was paid for new counter, painting, furnishing, alterations, etc., at the Town Hall, making the total amount expended \$805.37, exceeding the estimate by \$95.37. Your Committee would recommend that the remainder of the interior of the Town Hall be renovated, painted and furnished during the coming year.

CEMETERY.

The sum estimated for this service was \$25. expended for cleaning paths and whitewashing fences, \$28.82, making the amount over-expended \$3.82.

The total amount estimated for the above several services was \$6770. of this \$6425.34 was expended, leaving an unexpended balance of \$344.66.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FIRE APPARATUS.

The estimate for this service was \$996. and the net expenditure \$992.29, including the cost of 250 feet of new hose *\$275., leaving a balance unexpended of \$3.71.

There were thirteen fires and alarms during the year, as follows:

Alarms and Fires 1903.

Feb. 23.—Alarm rung at 12.15 a. m. for small fire at Abe Brown's house, Canal St. Damage slight.

Feb. 28.—Alarm rung at 7.45 p. m. for assistance at Moir's fire in Halifax. Engine, two reels and ladder waggon went over and returned on last boat.

Feb. 28.—Alarm rung after apparatus had gone to Halifax for chimney on fire at D. Barry's Water St. No damage.

March 15.—Alarm rung at 5.30 a. m. for fire at Marine Railway on board Steam Tug A. C. Whitney. Badly gutted.

April 15.—Alarm rung at 10.40 a.m. for fire at James Stewart's house, Cole Harbor Road. Roof of house badly burned.

April 18.—Alarm rung at 12 noon for fire in small unused house on Mrs. Lawlor's farm. Badly gutted. Engine pumped water through 900 ft. of hose from hydrant.

May 25.—Alarm rung at 2.45 p. m. for forest fire at Tufts Cove. Apparatus could do no good on account of distance from water.

May 26.—Alarm rung at 4.45 p. m. for same forest fire which had extended to Albro's Lake, men and apparatus worked until 8.30.

May 27.-Alarm rung at 2 p. m. for the same forest fire

which had worked back again. Men and apparatus worked until six o'clock.

June 1.—Alarm rung at 2.10 p. m. for same forest fire which had worked down to Rope Works. Men and apparatus worked until 8.30 o'clock.

At each of above three fires nearly 2000 ft. of hose was used from engine.

Oct. 31.—Alarm rung at 5.25 p. m. for fire supposed to be at H. Watt's house, Ochterloney St. No fire.

Dec. 13.—Alarm rung at 8.30 p. m. for fire at A. Wisdom's house, Water St. Slight damage. Apparatus not needed.

Your committee would report that the runners now in use on the steam fire engine are not quite what is required and would recommend that they be improved or new ones obtained, also that suitable runners be obtained for the hose reels. Your committee consider these improvements are necessary to enable the fire department to get the apparatus to fires with more dispatch when the streets are encumbered with snow.

The council is seeking legislation at the present session of the Legislature to enable them to assess \$250. annually for a period of ten years in order to establish a special fund to be called "The Firemen's Insurance Fund" to provide for the payment out of said fund of such sums as the council shall deem proper to firemen or to wives and families of firemen in event of death or accident in discharge of their duties.

Your committee are pleased to report that all the apparatus of the fire department is in its usual state of efficiency and amply able to cope with any fires likely to arise in the town. Four new fire hydrants were placed in position by the Water Committee, making the total now seventy-three, and your committee consider the town well propected in this respect.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POOR.

Your committee beg to report as follows :

The amount placed in the estimates for this service was \$1325. and the net amount expended was \$1169.19, including the County Poor Farm Account to June 30th, 1903, as per details show in the financial statement.

On January 1st, 1903 there were eight patients, four male and four female at the Poor Farm. During the year one was admitted and one discharged leaving eight patients at the end of the year, besides one patient classed as 'harmless insane.'

Your committee visited this institution on several occasions during the past year and found the place clean and kept in excellent order and the patients as comfortable as could be expected. We are assured that they are supplied with a sufficiency of plain and substantial food of good quality. Supt. Henneberry and the matron, Mrs. Henneberry, appear to take great interest in looking after the welfare of the inmates.

The patient referred to as discharged last year was a two year old child who, with the consent of its mother, was adopted by a respectable family in another part of the province and its future well-being is assured.

Besides the above patients at the Poor Farm there are five old and infirm persons resident of the Town whose keep is an annual tax on the poor funds, and more or less relief in given in the shape of fuel and food to a number of other dependent persons in winter.

The amount estimated for patients at the Nova Scotia Hospital was \$1040. The amount expended for fifteen months to June 30th, 1903, \$1121.86, less \$189.30 amount received for maintenance of patients, leaving the net expenditure \$932.56, as per financial statement. There is a debt due this account of \$65. which is a good asset and will no doubt be paid this year. On January 1st, I903, there were at this institution six patients, five male and one female, one died, and on was admitted, leaving at the close of the year six patients, four male and two female, the smallest number on record chargeable to the Town.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POLICE AND LICENSES.

Your committee beg to report that the amount placed in the estimates for the Police Department was \$1630. expended \$1729.51, making an over-expenditure of \$99.51, which was caused principally by the cost of additional police protection at the north end of the Town last summer, (\$45.14) owing to the re-occurrence of a series of petty burglaries, also to fuel, light and other items exceeding the estimate.

Your committee have under consideration a change in the hours of No. 2 and No. 3 Policemen with a view to placing them each on day and night duty alternately, month and month about, and believe this will result in improvement in the service.

The amount estimated for fines in the Police Court was \$100. and the amount received \$137. The amount estimated for Licenses was \$280. and the amount received \$297.50.

Appended to this report are lists of the various licenses issued and a return showing that the number of cases dealt with by the Stipendiary Magistrate in the Police Court during the past year was 109.

ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WATER AND SEWERAGE.

During the past year the following extensions of the Water and Sewer system were made in response to petitions laid before the council asking for them, following out the policy heretofore in force, viz, to make these extensions when it can be shown that the revenue to be received therefron will meet the maintenance charges thereon :

On Beresford Avenue (Tony Street) from Prince Albert Road (Canal Street) the water and sewer mains were extended 250 feet, nine inch sewer pipe and eight inch water pipe were laid. Water pipe of this size was put on this street with the expectation that in the future the main would be extended across the canal to connect with the six inch main on Crichton Avenue, when this street is opened up; the small size of the main on Crichton Avenue not being able to give an efficient supply. This main is laid now as far as W. C. Boak's property and also supplies the Austenville district, so it was considered advisable to lay an eight inch main to give an additional supply to that section of the Town independently of the pipe line which goes around by way of the Upper Canal Bridge.

On Bolton Terrace (Paul Street) the water and sewer mains were laid from Prince Albert Road 259 feet, nine inch sewer pipe and four inch water pipe were used.

On Church Street a six inch water pipe was laid from Water Street westwardly 289 feet.

On Upper Water Street, in accordance with the recommendation of the Board of Health, to afford sewerage to a number of houses on this street where the water pipe had been laid for some years, a nine inch sewer pipe was laid from Geary Street northwardly 177 feet, thence across the railway track and along the public dock to the end of the outlet 110 feet.

On Maple Street a nine inch sewer was laid from Ochterlony Street northwardly 481 feet. The water pipe was put in on this street last year. This sewer was continued from the corner of Maple Street along Ochterlony Street westwarddly 442 feet and connects with the sewer opposite the east end of the Greenvale School grounds.

Contracts were entered into for the supply of water and drain pipe, casting and other material required, and the lowest tenders were accepted, as follows:

C. I. Water Pipe. Standard Drain Pipe Co., Londonderry at \$37.50 per ton.

Drain Pipe. Standard Drain Pipe Co., St. John's P. Q. 52c. per foot for nine inch pipe.

Castings. Douglass & Co., and Dartmouth Iron Foundry. Gate Valves. Canada Foundry Co.

All the work performed in laying these sewer and water mains was done in a manner wholly satisfactory to your committee and without an accident of any kind.

The following services were made :-House connections 17; Motors for one boat shop and one butcher shop. Rolling Mills 1; Scarfe's Mill 1. One catchpit was built.

The screens at the pipe house were carefully looked after this year and cleaned sixteen times, the pipe house was cleaned out twice and the intake and other mains throughout the Town flushed out. Leaks were discovered in the main pipes in nine different places and the necessary repairs made. On June 25th, the twelve inch main pipe on the old Preston Road near Kuhn's farm was broken by lightening and had to be replaced by a new length of pipe, this was the first time an accident of this kind has happend; it is a very unusual occurrence. Catchpits throughout the Town were all cleaned out whenever found necessary during the year. The valve in the pipe on Douglass' Wharf which supplies the water boats was found defective, it was removed and a new valve put in. House service pipes in seven different places were found defective and had to be renewed or repaired.

As has been customary before winter sets in all the fire hydrants (73) were examined and only five found to be defective, these were put in order; all the fire hydrants are now in excellent working condition. Five new fire hydrants were purchased from the Windsor Foundry Co., and four of these (Nos. 70 to 73) were put in position in locations as shown per table annexed to this report.

Eels continued to be troublesome in the pipes this year causing stoppages in house service pipes. These creatures were taken from the pipes in twenty-five cases, four less than last year. As it is quite an expense cutting the pipes to remove the eels, house owners are again urged not to permit leaky caps to exist on their premises as the eels, seeking an outlet in the fall of the year, are carried by the current of water to the taps, causing these stoppages and creating expense to the Town and inconvenience to house holders

Tables annexed to this report will show the total length and size of sewer and water pipes laid to date, also number and location of fire hydrants.

The amount expended for construction work during the past year was \$3878. as shown in the detailed statement on another page. The recsipts \$5540.30 of which \$400. was received from the Maintanence Account, being assessed annually on the water district and paid over to this account. \$4900 was received from the sale of \$5000. of water bonds authorized by the ratepayers in 1902 and sold during this year. This account shows an over-expenditure of \$3566.64 but this will be nearly all covered by the issue of \$3300. in bonds issued under the authority of the ratepayers at a meeting held in 1903. These bonds have not been sold but are now deposited in the town box at the Royal Bank awaiting a suitable offer from investors. The value of water and sewer pipe and other material on hand is as per list annexed.

The revenue for Maintenance Account was \$9995.86 of which \$8075.31 was from water rates, and the expenditure \$10415.19 per details shown on another page of this report. The deficit of \$419.33 which appears on this account will be easily met by the overdue water rates and interest on Sewer Rates.

Looking to the future requirements of the Town your Committee would recommend to the favorable consideration of the Council and ratepayers the purchase in the near future of additional sources of supply.

Your committee would also report that they think it would be highly advisable to provide for the laying of an additional 12 inch main in the near future from York's Hill to the Upper Canal Bridge. It must be borne in mind that the water supply of the town is dependent on one main pipe and should an accident occur to the present main our water supply would be shut off, perhaps for days. The additional main would also keep up the pressure at the higher levels of the Town. The supply of water is very weak at the highest localities and at times the supply is entirely cut off, when there is a heavy draught on the main in the lower portions of the Town.

SIR :—I beg to report that the Town is at present in a healthy condition. During the past year Diphtheria has occured in the following 3ts., Wentworth, Rose, Tulip, Hester, Boggs and Beech. The erection of a hospital for infectious diseases is greatly to be desired. In one house where five cases were under treatment one succumbed, owing to crowded surroundings. There are still a number of houses, not connected with the water system, this should receive immediate attention, irrespective of sewerage connections. These remarks will apply to the North end of the Town. In the centre of the Town many complaints have been made against house holders, whose properties are not connected with the sewerage system.

During the summer the water has at times, been very noticeable in a fishy sense.

The Health Inspectors should still be appreciated by the Board owing to their unassuming manner in bearing the vituperations of irate neighbours.

Report of Committee re County Rates, Adopted by the Council, December 26th, 1902.

The Committee to whom the letter received from County Clerk, dated Nov. 29th, 1902, stating that the City Council of Halifax has signified their desire for a re-arrangement of the County Assessment, was referred, reported that several conferences were held at the County Court House, at which representatives from the City, County and Dartmouth Councils were present, and after considerable discussion of the question at issue it were finally decided that the valuation upon which the proportion of the County estimates of which the City, County and Dartmouth would bear a part would be based on the following valuations :

Halifax \$21,000,000. Halifax would pay 21/26ths, of the County Estimate for Joint account each year.

Dartmouth \$1,650,000. Dartmouth would pay 1.65/26ths, of the County Estimate for joint account each year.

County \$3,350,000. County would pay 3.35/26ths, of the County Estimate for joint account each year.

A committee was appointed to prepare an agreement embodying the above arrangement, viz, F. W. Russell, representing Dartmouth, Alderman McIllreith, representing the City of Halifax, and Stipendiary McDougall representing the County. It was decided that the agreement would be for ten years commencing with 1903, subject, of course, to the approval of all the Councils of the various corporations.

For the purpose of comparison and reference we append a statement showing the valuations agreed upon by arbitration of 1886:

Report of the Board of School Commissioners.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :- The report of Supervisor G. J. Miller, submitted herewith, deals very fully with the management and condition of the schools for the past year. A small decrease will be noticed in the attendance of the pupils registered, but the average is fairly good considering the fluctuating population of the Town. The members of the Board have made monthly visits to the schools, pretty regularly throughout the year, and have become convinced that the character of the work done and the discipline maintained in the different departments are equal to the best known in any of the Public Schools in the Province. The staff consists at present of the Supervisor and 22 Teachers, including the teachers of the Kindergarten and Manual Training departments. Three teachers resigned during the year, namely : Misses E. G. Allen, Grace Moody and M. Currie, and temporarary leave of absence was granted to three others, namely : Misses S. Wisdom, M. McKenzie and B. McKay. To provide for these vacancies, the following appointments were made, namely : Misses K. McKay, Isabel Eaton, L. Crimp, Roy Saunders and A. E. Fultz. While changes on the teaching staff are not generally sought for or desired by the Board, yet it is worthy of note that thus far such have not to any great extent proved embarassing or tended to interfere with the work of the schools, as the supply of duly qualified teachers more than equals the demand and vacancies are easily filled. To the present Board belongs the honor of having launched and set agoing the long talked of Manual Training Department and made it a large feature in our school system. The expenditure connected with the fitting up of a room and providing benches, tools and other eqipment necessary to carry on the work in this line of study has increased the expenditure this year

considerably beyond the amount placed in the estimates and yet we believe the cost thus incurred to be fully warranted by the increased benefit accruing to so many youth of our Town, by the establishment of this practical branch of education. The Board were very fortunate in the engagement of Mr. H. W. Hewitt as teacher of this department. His high testimonials and qualifications for the position as well as the present indications shown by the large attendance of pupils and the excellent work being done afford proof, that the organization of this department was timely and in line with present educational demands. The number of pupils enrolled on December 31st, 1903, was 132, Boys, 94 : Girls, 38. The attendance if continued as at present will entitle the Roard to receive from the Provincial Government the full allowance provided for payment of teacher's salary. The Kindergarten with its usefulness in developing and training the embryonic senses of the very young children, has beyond doubt permanently established itself in our town and we predict that the Manual Training Department is destined likewise to become a fixed fact in our School System.

From the returns made by our truant officers at the close of the school year, it was apparent that there are many children of school age living in the town who do not attend school the requisite number of days provided by the so-called Truancy Act and others not at all. The Board have taken steps during the year by notifying parents and in other ways to have all the children at school. The result of such efforts have already shown an increased attendance of pupils and a greater interest manifested on the part of parents. The difficulties to effectually carry out the spirit of the Truancy Act are fully pointed out in the Supervisor's Report herewith and that of 1902. The Board are seeking to have the Act amended, and it is hoped that then those classes may be reached and dealt with who at present are neglecting educational privileges opon to them, and are likely to become a blot and menace to good citizenship. Early in the year a request was made by the Protestant Ministers of the Town to have a daily reading of the bible and some religious services introduced and made a part of the regular school exercises. As a large number of the pupils

belonged to Catholic families, whose parents conscientiously were opposed to such exercises, and as there was a general feeling among the residents of the town against making any change that would tend to interrupt the harmony and good understanding that had existed for so long in regard to school regulations, the Board declined to accede to the request, granting leave however to the teachers at their option, to hold religious service in their departments after the regular school hours.

Attention is called to that portion of the Supervisor's report, touching upon the need of a more practical course of study in our High School Department, suggesting branches that would largely benefit those intending to enter commercial life. The Halifax School Board have recently established a commercial course in the County Academy. Their example in this respect is well worth considering.

Supervisor's Report.

To the Chairman of the Board of School Commissioners :

SIR.-I beg to report as follows :-

ATTENDANCE.

The number of pupils registered during the year ended July 1903 was 1163. The number registered during the preceding year 1172—a decrease of 9.

Of this number 583 were boys and 580 girls.

For the previous year the boys numbered 584 and and girls 588.

Of the total number enrolled 74 were under 5 years, 1052 between 5 and 15 years, and 37 over 15 years.

For 1902 the corresponding number were 79, 1051, and 42.

The Compulsory School Act places 120 days attendance as the minimum during the school year, which consists of over 200 teaching days.

During 1903 out of the total registration, 64 pupils attended less than 20 days, 138 attended less than 50 days, 115 less than 100 days, 258 less than 150 days, 570 less than 200 days days and 20 attended over 200 days.

For 1902 the corresponding figures were 31, 102, 169. 307. 520 and 33.

The number of teaching days in the year was 203.

During the year the total day's attendance made by all the pupils was 151,662. The total attendance for 1902 was 55,297-a decrease of 3,635 days.

The average daily attendance was 744.7. The percentage of pupils daily present was slightly over 64.

For 1902 the average attendance was 761.4 and the percentage 65 nearly.

CCMPULSORY EDUCATION.

At the risk of being guilty of repetition I must again refer to the incompleteness of the Act to enforce attendance.

For some years I have been advocating the necessity of a Provincial Truant School, as the natural and logical sequence of the attendance Act.

I will not inflict upon you a repetition of the arguments in favor of such an institution—These will be found in my last report.

But there are indications which show plainly that there is to be a move in this direction in the near future.

Halifax, the center of Education for the Province is beginning to stir. The law which sends a truant to a penal institution to associate with criminals, is being criticized in the press; and a proper institution for truants, who are not, as yet, criminals, is being demanded. It is bound to come and the sooner the better.

Permit me therefore, to urge upon the authorities the advisability of consulting with the Halifax School Board, in order that, when the time comes, there may be an intelligent understanding of the subject and of the steps necessary to secure its accomplishment.

COMMERCIAL COURSE.

Another change which, I think, the times demand and which is being recognized in almost every educational centre, is the adaptation of the school course in the advanced grades, to the needs of business life.

It is claimed that the Academic Course discriminates in favor of professionl life and is of little advantage to those adopting a business career.

Already the claims of the mechanic, the miner—the farmer have made themselves heard and Mining, Mechanical and Agricultural Schools established for their benefit.

The rapid increase of business relations—the advances of traffic—the inventions of Science applied to commercial needs —the rapidity with which orders are dispatched—all these demand an increased staff of workers and an increase in skill and intelligence in those who are applicants for admission into the busy "mart" of commerce. With this demand of the time in which we live, we have to reckon.

Academies and High Schools everywhere are recognizing this and adopting "commercial courses" for those of their pupils who require them.

Business men claim that they pay the great bulk of the

money to support the schools. It is not strange, then, that they should desire to see some attention given to those subjects which have a direct bearing on business and its requirements.

The "binomial theorem" or the "pons asinorum" will not be much assistance to a boy when he hangs up his hat in the office, but a thorough drill in Arithmetic, Book-keeping, Letter-writing and Commercial Geography will, at least, give him that feeling of confidence which comes to every one who is familiar with his tools.

This confidence it is the duty of the school to give him.

I would earnestly urge upon the School Board the advisability of revising our course of study in the advanced grades along these lines.

Report of the Dartmouth Ferry Commisson.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN-——The close of the financial year devolves upon me the duty to report on the affairs of the Ferry for the past year, and lay before you a statement of the finances, together with its present condition and future prospects.

The boats have been regularly running throughout the year on the regular schedule time, all the necessary repairs and fittings having been performed from time to time, as circumstances permitted, when relieved from the service-they are in ordinary good repair, any defects having been immediately attended to, as soon as they became apparent. An opportunity was taken during the summer to paint the Chebucto, and fit a new hoisting winch on board. The Dartmouth likewise underwent some extensive reconstruction to the overhanging deck fore and aft. These operations, combined with other causes to make necessary the docking of both boats, largely augmenting the expense for general repairs. The floats, bridges and wharves, both in Halifax and Dartmouth, have been extensively repaired, and some much needed improvements made, -one account for repairs to the Halifax dock alone amounted to \$366. I much regret that the City of Halifax should permit its public wharf adjoining the south side of the ferry dock, to continue in its present state of dilapidation, an eye-sore to all parties entering the city from the eastern part of the Province.

Although the gross income from running the boats during the year amounted to \$55,696, being \$3,101 in excess of 1902, and \$8,089 in excess of 1900, still the expenses amounted to a total of \$54,426, being \$3,002 in excess of 1902, and \$6,819 in excess of 1900, and leaving a bare excess of income of \$1,270. towards meeting debentures of \$2000 due in November last, thus necessitating an increase of \$1,059, to the balance due the bank at the close of the year. This small excess of income, it must be remembered, has only been obtained by making no allowance for the inevitable depreciation of the capital invested, or any contribution towards a fund for the reconstruction of either hulls, machinery or boilers; which must sooner or later in time, give way.

As there is no prospect of the ferry being able for some time to do more than pay the maturing bonds for \$2000 each year, so long as the cost of coal continues at the present high rate, I would strongly advise the Commission to request the Town Council to apply for authority to issue Debentures for the \$7000 of bonds paid off during the past two years.

Your Commissioners have a very difficult task to accomplish, as notwithstanding the large increase in income of late years, the running expenses have kept fully up to the advance, the cost of coal alone has been this year \$2,600 more than in 1902, and no less than \$4,789 more than in 1900. Wages and all other items have advanced to a very appreciable extent, if not quite as much as fuel; It cantherefore be easily seen how impossible it is to propound any scheme that will be sufficiently elastic to meet such unforseen demands, even the present showing has only been attained by the practice of the most rigid economy consistent with perfect security and efficiency, and the non-introduction of several much desired improvements.
