Mayor's Report for the Year 1905.

Dartmouth, N. S., January 29, 1906.

To the Ratepayers and Citizens :

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—By the resignation of Mayor Scarfe the duty of submitting a report on the town affairs for the past year devolves upon me, but before doing so, I would like to say that I regretted exceedingly the circumstances which led Mr. Scarfe to resign the office of Chief Magistrate of the town, and I know that I am voicing the sentiments of the entire community when I express a hope that he may be spared many more years of life, when he may enjoy a rest which he has so bountifully earned.

Any reference to his retirement would be incomplete if I did not publish the resolution passed by the Council in accepting his resignation. The resolution was as follows:-

Resolved, That the resignation of Mayor Scarfe be accepted.

Further Resolved, That the Town Council on learning of the resignation of their Mayor, Frederick Scarfe, Esq.. desire to place on record an expression of the great loss they have sustained. Mr. Scarfe has presided over the deliberations of the Council for a number of terms with a zeal and efficiency, and his untiring energy and uniform courtesy in the discharge of his official duties have challenged the respect and admiration of all. and now that illness has compelled him to retire from active public duty the Council desire to express their deep sympathy with him in the time of his affliction, and the hope that rest and quiet may speedily restore him to his usual good health, and that he may have many more useful and happy years.

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mayor Scarfe by the Town Clerk.

The past year has not been marked by any changes of unusual character. The business of the town has been conducted in a prompt energetic and business manner, and in all departments of the civic system there has been an undoubted effort made to secure for the town the best results from the money expended, and the result has been that at no time in the history of Dartmouth did the town stand in a better position. The various standing committees have been faithful in attending to duties assigned to them, and the assistance rendered the chair by the members of the Council has at all times been courteous and freely given, and thereby the municipal machinery has operated without friction, and to the benefit of the town. It is to be hoped that the pleasant relations between the Mayor and Councillors will continue in the future as in the past, as the moment one falls out of sympathy with the other, the interests of the ratepayers are liable to be considered of secondary importance as compared with personal aims and desires.

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The town happily has not been involved in much

litigation. The suit between the town and County over the liability of the town to contribute to County School fund is still pending a hearing before the Supreme Court of Canada. It was on the docket of appeals to be heard last November, but as it was the last case on docket is was not reached by the time the Court adjourned, and will not now be heard until the February term of the Court. The decision in the case is of vast importance to the town, and should it be decided adversely to the town, it will mean, that the rate of taxation will be much higher.

Early in the year the town introduced a bill before the Legislature to have the City of Halifax contribute to the County School fund the same as incorporated towns. At present the City does not contribute, and there does not appear to be any sound reason why it should not do so. The Legislation introduced did not pass, but from the impression made and the statement of the Attorney General, it is felt that if again asked for, the Government would consent to pass the enactment, or otherwise equalize the law, so as to make all rich communities contribute to the cost of education in poor and isolated districts throughout the County.

The long delayed north end extension will be made this year. After having been voted down by the ratepayers on several occasions, the citizens last fall authorized the expenditure of \$30,000 for the extension of water and sewer mains to Lyle street and the sum of \$33.000 for the laying of a new main in from York's Hill.

Both of these undertakings will be commenced as

soon as the Spring opens, and I feel that the North end extension will be followed by the building up of that part of the town, and the enhancement of the value of property. The laying of a new main will ensure a continual and uninterrupted supply of water, and will enable the town to supply water to manufacturing establishments at special rates, thus increasing the revenue and decreasing the cost of water to the house-holder!

The Park for the past year has been practically under the control of Councillor Regan, who has devoted a considerable part of his time to the supervision of the work and the improvements in progress. The most important expenditure during the year was the sum of \$100, paid for the placing of twelve lights along the circle about the field. These lights have been used during band concerts and illuminate the road splendidly, so that a person can be recognized by another anywhere on the walk. The band concerts held during the year were very successful and should be continued this year as the beauties of the Dartmouth Park are only half appreciated on the other side of the water.

In conclusion, ladies and gentlemen, I beg to thank you for the confidence reposed in me during my long term in the council. It has been my constant endeavor to perform the duties of my office faithfully, and to the best of my ability and according to law, and so long as I remain in office I shall invariably do my best to promote the interests of the ratepayers and the general good of the town.

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REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

In submitting the annual report of the Finance Committee it would be well for the ratepayers to understand that by legislation recently obtained, the town is enabled to charge interest on all overdue taxes at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ of one per cent per month It will be seen that at the end of the year there was \$4408 of uncollected taxes. This is much larger than in former years because the same effort was not made to collect the taxes, inasmuch as the town does not stand to lose by the taxes remaining unpaid.

It is gratifying to state that there were no lien law sales last year. All the taxes on real estate for the year 1903 were paid, and that there was no room for operation of the lien law.

The bonded debt has been reduced to the extent of \$2000 by the redemption of \$2000 of Ferry Debentures, as will be seen by report of Ferry Commission.

During the year the sinking fund established to meet the water and sewer debentures was increased to \$3262 and now amounts to \$27946—a larger sinking fund than any other town in the province.

The rate of taxation last year was \$1.34 on the hundred or one cent higher than the previous year. The increase was due to the increase in school rate. The rate for general town purposes stood the same. The school rate for the current year may also be higher. The suit between town and county remains unsettled and as it will not be argued until the February term of the Supreme Court of Canada, it is not probable that a decision will be given in time to make provision for payment, should the judgement be adverse to the town. At any rate whatever, the result of the suit, the rate for school purposes will probably be higher within the next two years.

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During the year the sum of \$500 was paid on account of the purchase of the Walker Property, and there remains due the bank a balance of \$1026.25. It would have been better for the town that a clear and distinct agreement had been made regarding the use of the dwelling house on the property by the former owner, as at present it appears that Mrs. Walker draws the rent of the property and the town has to keep it in repair. The property is a valuable one to the town, but the town's ownership is hampered by the rights given to Mrs. Walker during her lifetime. It would have been better to have bought the place outright.

Annual Report of Committee on Streets and Public Property.

STREETS.

The net amount expended for this service was \$4089.341 The committee originally estimated over \$4000. but the Counci. saw fit to reduce this estimate to \$3450., exclusive of the \$580. estimated for the Walker Property.

When the committee had expended the \$300. estimated for extension of Beresford Avenue (Toney Street) they found that an additional amount of \$120. would complete a temporary thoroughfare across the canal, which was done.

It will be remembered that last year's committee left \$510. worth of broken stone on hand for use during the past year. Of this \$300. worth remains unused at present. There is also on hand about \$40. worth of building stone.

Owing to the depth of snow last winter there was required an unexpected expenditure of \$350. on this account.

It will be seen that an amount of \$639.35 is apparently over-expended, which is offset by the following statement, explained above.

Clearing snow	
Extra on Beresford Avenue

It will be noticed that all this was done on a total expenditure of about \$1000. less than last year.

Finding the streets in the central part of the Town generally in a good condition, the committee directed their attention to the outlying portions of the Town. The work on Prince Albert Road (opposite Dartmouth Rolling Milis) begun by last year's committee, was finished at an expenditure of over \$400. The stone bridge at Crathorne's Mill, estimated to cost \$300. was completed in an excellent and permanent manner for \$197. (exclusive of iron fence), for which, as usual, great credit is due to our Supt. of Streets. Beresford Avenue (Toney St) is referred to elsewhere.

Other items of expenditure were, widening and improving Crichton Avenue, repairs to Johnston Avenue in P. A. Park, Erskine Street, Pipe House Road, macadamizing and curbing sidewalk on Wentworth Street, sidewalk and culvert Pleasant Street, and sidewalk on Windmill Road.

Hester Street and Henry Street. These streets were acquired by the Town by deed of dedication from the owners and were repaired and graded at a cost of \$111.; this was a long deferred work and its accomplishment was a great satisfaction to the ratepayers in this locality.

Walker property. Repairs required to the house on this property were effected at a cost of \$40. and the sum of \$570., included in the estimate, was, paid on account of the purchase money borrowed from the Union Bank.

PUBLIC PROPERTY.

The amount estimated for this service was \$310. inclusive of 150. for interior painting at the Town Hall, but no money was expended for this work; a contract was however entered into with James Lahey for painting and decorating the interior of Town Hall, but the work was not completed at the close of the year.

Engine House. It was found that this property required a larger amount for repairs than the amount estimated, which was \$110. Certain alternations were made for the better accommodation of the Axe and Ladder Company, the total cost of which, including other repairs was \$213.

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Lighting Streets. The amount estimated was \$2217. and the amount expended \$2176.73. There were five new lights put in during the past year, making a total now of nihety-four lights in all. An arrangement was made with the Electric Light Co, that the charge for lights over ninety would be reduced to \$15. per annum. The rates now paid are 65 lights at \$25., 25 lights at \$20, over that number \$15.

Watering Streets. The amount estimated was \$300. and the amount expended \$337.35.

Annual Report of Committee on Fire Apparatus.

The estimate for this service was \$1,036 and the expenditure \$795.59, leaving a balance unexpended of \$240.41.

There were fires and alarms in the town during the year, as per list annexed.

In accordance with legislation obtained in 1904, the Council provided in the estimates the sum of \$250 as the first instalment of the Firemen's Fund, which amount the law provides shall be assessed for ten years and paid over to that Fund, which is established for the relief of the families of deceased firemen in event of death or accident in the discharge of their duties.

An Eastman Deluge Set, one of the latest improvements, costing \$141, was purchased and added to the apparatus in charge of the Engine Co.

Your Committee are pleased to report that all the apparatus of the fire department, including the fire hydrants, which now number seventy-five, is in its usual state of efficiency.

ALARMS AND FIRES, 1905.

POOR.

Your Committee beg to report as follows ;--- The amount placed in the estimates for this account was \$1660. and the amount expended \$1382.75, including the County Poor Farm account to June 30th, 1905, as per details shown in statement.

On January 1, 1905, there were ten town patients, five male and five female, at the County Poor Farm, besides one patient classes as "harmless insane." During the year none were admitted or discharged, leaving the same number at the end of the year.

Besides the above patients at the Poor Farm there are seven old and infirm persons resident in the town, whose maintenance is a charge on the town. Considerable relief continues to'be given, mainly in the shape of fuel and food, to a number of other dependent persons.

LUNATICS.

The amount estimated for patients at the Nova Scotia Hospital was \$1110. and the amount expended for twelve months to June 30, 1905 less \$96.56 received for the maintenance of a patient, was \$798.42, as shown by the financial statement. There is a debt due this account of \$I31. for the maintenance of a patient which is a good asset.

On the first of January, 1905, there were at this institution at the expense of the Town, seven patients, five male and two females, during the year one died, one was discharged (male) and one admitted (female), leaving at the close of the six (three male and three female) patients.

The claim made by the authorities of the Nova Scotia

Hospital for the maintenance of a patient there for the past six years which your committee have disputed, still remains unsettled. Your committee have had several interviews with members of the Local Government but without success. If the Council decide to pay the claim it should be estimated for next year.

Annual Report of Committee on Police.

Your committee beg to report that the amount placed in the estimates for this service was \$1,700 and the amount expended \$1,677.06, leaving an unexpended balance of \$22.94.

The amount estimated for fines in the police court was \$100 and the amount received \$131. The amount estimated for licenses other than liquor was \$120, and the amount received \$195.

The matter of Pedlar's Licenses still remains in a very unsatisfactory condition. The committee, at the beginning of the year, went into the matter fully and had by-laws prepared under the advice of the Recorder, which were expected to meet all requirements, but since passing them the committee have found that in regard to some lines of business these by-laws cannot be enforced. The matter is still under the consideration of the committee, with the Recorder, and they hope that soon more satisfactory legislation may be obtained, in the meantime we are glad to be able to report that a much larger amount has been collected from this source than last year.

Thanks to the vigilance of our efficient police force the order of the community and the safety of property has been secured during the past year.

Annual Report of the Committee on Water and Sewerage.

During the year 1905 twenty-four water services were added to the system, viz: Dwellings 20, Public Hall 1, Sunday School Building 1, Church 1, Stable 1. Five leaky house services were repaired and also eight leaks in the water mains, seven of these were the ordinary leaky joint, the other was a broken main which occurred on Nov. 10th about 250 feet west of Timothy Graham's west line on the old road leading through by Jas. Whiteley's. To repair this break nine feet of the 12 inch main was taken out and replaced with new pipe.

One hydrant was placed on Church Street at the railway crossing, making 75 now in use.

The sewer outfall at Mader's boat shop having been placed in such an exposed position it was being damaged by the heavy seas during southerly storms; to prevent further injury it has been protected by a heavy crib work filled in with stone.

During the year the screens at the gate house have been cleaned thirty-three times, and the gate house and water mains were flushed out twice during the summer. This latter operation has a very beneficial effect on the quality of the water delivered to the Town, as considerable quantities of animal and vegetable matter attached to the inside surface of the pipes, etc., is thus loosened and carried away.

Application was made during the late autumn by the Marine and Fisheries Department to have a six inch water pipe laid from Pleasant Street to their property to supply their Dockyard, etc., with water; 600 feet of six inch pipe and 200 feet of four inch pipe was therefore purchased for this How many be purpose, but owing to the fact that the new street along which the pipe would be laid had not been deeded to the Town, it was thought not advisable to proceed with the work until this was done.

> A few small extensions were made to the sewer and water system as follows : Nine inch sewer and four inch water mains were laid on Church Street, from Water Street west 169 feet

> Six inch sewer and two inch water pipes were laid from Pine Street through properties of Daniel Fillis and Calvin Naugle, 237 feet to serve several properties fronting on Victoria Road. A written agreement was first entered into with the above named property owners granting permission to carry out the above work. The reason for crossing private properties with the sewer and water pipes is, that where they are now laid the trenching is all through earth while to have followed the street the sewer would require to be laid very deep and through solid rock which would have doubled the cost of the work several times over.

A nine inch sewer pipe was also laid on Dundas Street from Ochterlonev Street 242-feet north. which serves all the properties to the end of this street.

The remainder of the four inch water pipe (178 feet) on Prince Albert Road, at the Molasses Works, was taken up and six inch pipe laid in its place.

A three inch meter was put on the water service to the Rolling Mill and also a two inch meter on the water supply to the Molasses Works.

The hydrants throughout the town were examined and put in good repair in the fall before the cold weather set in. This has been our custom for many years.

The roof on the south side of the gate house was repaired and the north side shingled. There has also been an addition, 12 x 20 feet put on the north side of the gate house to store a boat in, and other supplies required there. A boat has also been purchased to be kept at the gate house for the purpose of going over and examing the condition of the shores and waters of the lakes whenever necessary.

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Preparations were made during last fall to clean out the water mains leading from the lake, and two scrapers were purchased, but owing to the lateness of the season the work was postponed until next spring, when it will be done.

During the year your council recommended to the ratepayers for their consideration the following extensions of the water and sewer system ;—

On the Windmill Road from the termination of the present main on Water Street as far as Lyle Street.

On the full length of Fairbanks Street and connecting streets. Estimated cost of above \$29.900.

Also the laying of an additional 16 inch main from the Upper Canal Bridge to the termination of the 20 inch pipe at York's Hill. Estimated cost \$33,673.

The above questions were discussed at a meeting of the ratepayers held October 31st last, and a poll was taken on the 4th of November at which the above projects received the approval of the ratepayers, and the Council was authorized to obtain the legislation to borrow a sum not exceeding \$30,000 for the Windmill Road extension, and a sum not exceeding \$33,000. for the additional 16 inch main.

Mr. Colin McNab, the owner of Lake Loon, having offered this lake to the Town, your Council had it bonded for three months but at the close of the year negotiations were not completed. Your Council are of the opinion that it is necessary, in order to provide for the future requirements of the water service, that this lake should become the property of the town. The question of the Town purchasing this property also obtained the approval of the ratepayers and the Council was authorized to obtain the authority of the Legislature to borrow the sum of \$4000. for this purpose.

Tables annexed to this report show the total length ofwater and sewer mains laid to date, with number and location of hydrants.

The amount expended for Water and Sewer extensions, house services, etc. during the past year was \$1629. as shown in detailed statement on another page. The amount due the Union Bank for work done this year and last now amounts to \$2198.71 and your committee recommend that steps be taken to fund this debt by the issue of debentures to the extent of \$2000. during the coming year. This would result in a saving of one per cent per year in interest. The sum of \$161 is due from ratepayers and others for work done and material supplied.

The revenue of the Maintenance Account was \$12,014.34 of which \$9135.61 was from water rates, and the expenditure \$9512.53 leaving a balance on hand of \$2501.81, the largest balance at the close of the year to the credit of this account to date.

Report of Health Officer.

DARTMOUTH, January 29, 1906.

Chairman Board of Health :

Sec.

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SIR,—I beg to report that the health of the Town for the last year, has been very satisfactory. There were nine cases of Diphtheria reported, with two deaths. A number of cases of Measles developed during the year, but this must be put down to a want of notification; people travel in and out of houses when they have not the least idea that the disease is in the house they are visiting.

In regard to the plumbing regulations, some steps should be taken. In one house where there were two cases of Diphtheria the plumbing was in a desperate condition. The outside vent had been removed altogether and the vent near the kitchen sink was closed up with a block of wood, this allowed a free draught of gas from the main sewer, into their living room, with the result as above.

I have suggested to the Board for a number of years, if it is not possible, to compel householders to make connections with the main sewer, we would then not have so many yards flooded with dirty wash water.

I beg to bring to your notice that the Sanitary Inspector is performing his duties very satisfactory.

Report of the Board of School Commissioners.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth,

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—The teaching staff of our schools consists of the Principal and Supervisor, and 23 teachers including the Kindergarten and Manual training departments. At the opening of the school year Miss Findlay Deputy Principal of the High School, was transferred to Grade VIII. department in place of Miss Kennedy resigned, and the entire work of the high School department was then placed in the hands of Principal Miller. By this arrangement the necessity of employing an additional teacher and the cost consequent thereto were avoided, without lessening the efficiency of either of these departments. The afternoons of each school day were left free to the principal to attend to the work of supervising.

Owing to the very large enrollment of pupils at Woodside School, your board decided to open a new department there and during the Summer vacation had a second room fitted up and furnished, so that now there are two departments including Grades from one to six being taught there. During the vacation the several school buildings were gone over and put in thorough repair which with painting cost over \$500.00. The expenditure for the year, as you will see by referring to the Treasurer's statement, considerably exceeds the amount of the estimates. This however is largely owing to the extra expense incurred in opening the new room at Woodside and in connection with the extensive repairs made to the school buildings, for which no sum was placed in the estimates. Owing to the resignations of several of the teachers on the staff and the temporary leave of absence granted to others, five new teachers are now included among those under engagement who were not with us last year, and there has been a good deal of changing about in the different departments, to meet the requirements thus occasioned. Beyond causing some temporary inconvenience, the schools have not seemed to suffer because of the retirement of teachers and the engagement of new ones, and the Board has without great difficulty been able to fill vacancies most satisfactorily. To meet the increasing attendance in some of the lower grades, further departments will need to be established shortly, to relieve the over filled rooms. Other provisions looking to a more sanitary arrangement of conveniences, other than as at present at "Central" and at "Greenvale" must receive the early attention of the incoming Board. At the meeting of the Board a Petition was sent in from the teachers requesting an increase in their salaries. Doubtless the time is not far distant when this matter also must receive its share of consideration. The suit of the Municipality of Halifax against the Town, is still pending awaiting the determination of an appeal before the Supreme Court at Ottawa. It will probably be argued during the coming February sittings of that Court when a final judgment will be looked for with interest.

The report of the Supervisor submitted herewith, will prove interesting reading and fully inform you regarding the attendance during the year and upon other matters concerning the internal work and condition of the schools.

Supervisor's Report.

To the Chairman of the Board of School Commissioners :

SIR,—I beg to report on the condition of the Dartmouth Schools as follows :

ATTENDANCE.

The number of pupils registered during the school year ended July, 1905, was 1279. The number for the previous year (1904) was 1182—an increase of 97 pupils in favor of the present year. Of this total-the boys numbered 627 and girls 652.

Of the total pupils registered, 65 were under 5 years; 1185 were between 5 and 15 years and 29 were over 15 years. The corresponding numbers for 1904 were 73, 1082, and 27.

REGULARITY.

During the school year ended July last, of the total registration of 1279; 61 pupils attended less than 20 days; 122 attended less than 50 days; 136 attended less than 100 days; 270 attended less than 150 days; 663 attended less than 200 days; and 27 attended over 200 days.

In 1904, the corresponding numbers were 28, 111, 120, 241, 662, and 20.

The number of teaching days this year was 204, the same as last year.

TOTAL DAY'S ATTENDANCE.

The total number of days attended by all the pupils for the year was '74,609.

For the previous year (1904) the total attendance was 164,491, an increase of 10,118 days in favor of the present

year.

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This respectable increase is the more gratifying from the fact that last winter was an exceptionally severe one on school attendance, the most severe for 15 years.

AVERAGE ATTENDANCE.

The average daily attendance was 856. For 1904, it was 806.3 an increase of 49.7.

KINDERGARTEN.

This department made good all round progress during the year. The registered pupils number 95.

The pupils of this department gave a demoustration of Kindergarten methods and work at the "woman's department," of the Provincial Exhibition in Halifax last September, which reflected great credit on the Dartmouth Schools.

Miss Corinne Roome received a certificate for one year's work.

Misses M. Kenney and Grace Pennington of Halifax, are students and assistants in the department this year.

MANUAL TRAINING.

This department opened with an enrollment of 114 pupils of whom 83 were boys and 31 girls.

In May, a special class was formed, with the approval of the Superintendent of Education and the Iuspector of Schools for Halifax County, composed of boys backward in the work of the public schools. Their ages varied from 13 to 15 years and they came from grades III, IV, and V.

These boys took a great interest in the work and the training will be valuable to them.

A course of Pyrography was introduced in February for the girls of grades VIII and IX. A complete out-fit was purchased and the work, in conjunction with the wood work, was entirely satisfactory.

The formal closing for the summer vacation was held in the D. B. C. A. Hall in June.

Addresses were made by Dr. McKay, Supt. of Education, members of the Board of School Commissioners, aldermen, clergymen and others. One hundred pupils of the M. T. dept. were present and about as many visitors.

There was an exhibit of the pupils' work consisting of about 500 models, many of which were greatly admired.

A musical and literary programme completed the entertainment.

Report of the Dartmouth Ferry Commission.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth :

At the close of the year it becomes my duty to submit to you a report of the ferry for the year.

I am pleased to report that the financial condition is better than it has been for some years, but still we feel that it will be necessary to change some of the rates in order to increase the receipts so that the commission will be able to place a sum away each year for depreciation of floating stock, and also a sinking fund should be established to help meet the payment of outstanding debentures.

During the year an act was procured from the legislature enabling the commission to borrow \$10,000 on debentures to erect station houses on both sides of the harbor, provided it met with the approval of the ratepayers.

We feel that a modern station house with proper entrance should be erected at once on the Dartmouth side, and one in Halifax as soon as satisfactory arrangements can be made with the city of Halifax regarding their dock, and if this cannot be done, means taken to procure a suitable landing elsewhere in the city.

During the year a boy was placed on the Halifax side to receive freight coming to Dartmouth and sign bills of lading for the same, and also to deliver freight going to Halifax. This relieves the captains of this responsibility.

Following this report is a comparative statement which has been prepared showing the differences in each service between the years 1904 and 1905. This statement shows an increase in receipts of \$100.89 and a decrease in the expenditure amounting to \$3321.03, making a total increase of profit of \$3421.92 over last year.

During the year the commission have been able to pay off the adverse balance at the bank of \$1565.15 carried over from last year, and have now to their credit \$307.87. This showing is caused by the reduction in the expense account.

The cost of coal consumed by the boats for the year was \$11,008.58 against \$12,205.44 last year, making a saving of \$1,197.86.

The steamers have undergone the usual repairs needed and are in a satisfactory condition.
