## DARTMOUTH TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES

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# VOLUME 1941

### DATE

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Dartmouth, N. S., Monday, January 6, 1941

Town Council met this date at eight o'clock P. M. Present: Mayor Isnor, Councillors Publicover, Pettipas, MacIntosh and Ferguson; also Town Solicitor Moseley.

Minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

Report of the Chief of Police on the activities of the Police Department for the month of December was received and filed.

Town Engineer Allan reported, as annexed, on several methods of garbage collection, and recommended that an endeavour should be made with some reliable parties to perform this service as a private enterprise, at least for a year under the schedule of regulations provided by the Town. After some discussion, on motion of Crs. Pettipas and Ferguson, it was resolved that the Town Clerk call for tenders of those interested in the collection of garbage, and ascertain what service they would give and what protection they would expect from the Town.

LETTERS WERE READ FROM:

<u>William Matthews</u> tendering his resignation as Ferry Commissioner. On motion of Crs. Publicover and Pettipas his resignation was accepted.

<u>Halifax Shipyards</u> asking that three watchmen at their plant be sworn, and on motion of Crs. MacIntosh and Publicover, it was resolved:

> "That Walter Horne, Reuben Hume and J. J. Thompson be appointed extra constables in and for the Town of Dartmouth to be paid by Halifax Shipyards, Limited for any services they may perform and to hold office for a term on one year."

APPOINT TAX COLLECTOR

"Resolved that H. S. MacGlashen be appointed an extra constable in and for the Town of Dartmouth to hold office for a term of one year and also that he be appointed tax collector to hold office for a term of one year /and that the terms of his employment as such be the same as those of the former collector, J. M. Henneberry."

Angus L. Macdonald, R. K. Smith, Chairman of the National Harbours Board, and Premier McKenzie King.

Councillor Pettipas stated that he considered there was not sufficient fire protection as regards the building of the barracks or hutments in the north end of Dartmouth, and on motion of Crs. Pettipas and Ferguson the matter was referred to the Mayor, Town Engineer and the Fire Chief to interview Colonel Colwell re providing of fire protection.

In accordance with instructions from Council I herewith submit the following report regarding refuse collection:

The collection and disposal of ashes, cartons, papers, garbage and other kinds of refuse have become a very important question in the Town and should have prompt attention.

For some years the Town has maintained and supervised dumps for the disposal of refuse, but citizens have been expected to make their own arrangements for cartage. This has resulted in the accumulation of rubbish in cellars and back yards; cartage by numerous individuals using poor equipment and the disposal of refuse on vacant land and in gutters throughout the Town. The large increase in population during the last year, due to the war, has very much aggravated the condition. Newcomers are continually inquiring for information regarding refuse disposal. The present lack of system is creating untidyness among citizens, causing extra work for the street cleaners and extra expense in attempting to clean up unsightly conditions.

Collection of refuse has received considerable attention by Cities and Towns and a study of compiled data indicates a variety of methods of collection and that all have some unsatisfactory features. In some cities collection is made from the curb and citizens are required to have ash and garbage containers on the curb by certain hours. Other cities collect from the back yards and some from the cellars., Collection from the curb is the most frequently adopted method, since it saves a good deal of time for the collectors. The objection to this method is the unsightly appearance of the containers and cartons standing along the streets. Separation of refuse also varies. Some cities collect everything together, some separate ashes and some divide refuse into many different classes.

The City of Halifax, with an estimated population of 75,000 uses 6 trucks, working 9 hours addy. It takes a 6 day week to cover the City. Each truck has a driver and two helpers. On the same basis, estimating our population at 15,000, it will take one truck a week to cover the Town. Such a service would cost \$5,000. to \$6,000. per year, the citizens supplying the containers and placing them on the curb.

The time has come when the collection of refuse should be done in some systematic way. If the Town were divided into 6 sections and a weekly service established, citizens would soon become familiar with the schedule and have refuse in the location designated. Excuses for illegal dumping would be reduced to a minimum.

There are several methods of making the collection: 1. - By the Town by Town employees 2. - By contract

3. - By private enterprise, the householder paying for the

service. And Restort

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The latter method is being carried out in New Glasgow with satisfactory results. If this method is adopted it will be necessary to grant a franchise of some kind, as the collection will have to be carried out under definite regulations and it will be necessary to protect the operator against competition. The collection is made weekly and the operator supplies the containers. Customers are responsible for the cans left with them and are required to pay for damages done. There may be some hesitation to undertake to collect the charges, but this should not be more difficult than the weekly collection for delivered newspapers, for milk delivered daily, or similar services. If carefully managed the undertaking should be profitable.

If the Town undertakes to make the collection it will be necessary to purchase a suitable truck and unless it is decided to perform the service free of charge, the driver will have to collect from the householder, as collection from the Town Clerk's office would fall on the property owners and not on the tenant. A similar provision for **ed**lection of charges would have to be made if the service were performed by contract.

It is my opinion that an endeavour should be made to arrange with some reliable parties to perform this service as a private enterprise; at least for a year, under a schedule and regulations

provided by the Town. This would give an opportunity to study the effect of systematic collection on the general appearance of the Town and what changes should be made in the by-laws and regulations in order to enable the Police Department to check on illegal dumping, untidy premises, etc.

Every endeavour has been made to prevent dumping in unauthorized places. The results have been very unsatisfactory. The work involved in trying to keep the streets clean has been very much increased due to the accumulation of rubbish and cartons in backyards behind stores. High winds and hoodlums convey the rubbish into the streets. It is therefore imperative that the collection and disposal of refuse be brought under control and this can only be done by some authorized system.

#### RESOLUTION

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# DARTMOUTH TOWN COUNCIL RE CONSTRUCTION OF DOCKS.

WHEREAS the volume of traffic passing through the Port of Halifax has greatly increased during the past year, necessitating the use of lighters, barges and other small craft to load ships while lying in the stream,

AND WHEREAS congested traffic conditions were foreseen by the Dartmouth Town Council, the Board of Trade and many others,

AND WHEREAS it is of the utmost importance, primarily from the standpoint of a better war effort, and secondly with a view to the stimulation of business activity in the Town of Dartmouth and the Eastern Shore, that the water front on the Dartmouth side of the Harbour be immediately developed by the construction of additional docking facilities,

AND WHEREAS the Town of Dartmouth, and indeed the Maritime Provinces generally, are entitled to a much larger proportion of the capital expenditure for war purposes in order that they may participate in the war effort on a more equal basis with the rest of Canada,

AND WHEREAS this Council did by Resolution passed on October 21st, last, request that some consideration be given to the development of the Dartmouth water front,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Council place on record its DEMAND for docking facilities on the Dartmouth water front,

<u>AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED</u> that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to those persons in authority whose duty it is to order such development to proceed.

Town Council met this date at eight o'clock P. M. Present: Mayor Isnor, Councillors Publicover, Hart, Pettipas, MacIntosh, Hartlen and Ferguson; also Town Solicitor Moseley.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and on motion, approved.

Report of the Chief of Police on the activities of the <u>Police Department</u> for the month of February was received, and on motion adopted.

Town Engineer Allan reported on the proposed extension of the Murray Hill sub-division of <u>Mr. Donald Flick's</u> prop-HILL SUB-DIVIS- erty, that the cost of extending the water and sewer to the centre of lot #4 would be \$1160.00, and the Town would receive annually \$54.00 on three houses and also an assessment on frontage of 313 feet, amounting to \$783.00. Mr. Allan recommended approval of the extension. Report received, and on motion of Crs. MacIntosh and Ferguson, it was resolved that the report be adopted.

> The Town Engineer's report on the <u>Lahey sub-division</u>, Thistle Street, showed that six lots, Nos. 4, 5, 6, 18, 19 and 20 could be serviced by the Town, provided the owners agree to complete the street grade to grades to be established as a result of further information asked for. The cost of the water and sewer extension to the six lots in question is estimated at \$625.00 for water and \$675.00 for sewers, estimated annual water rates will be \$108.00, and there will be 440 feet of assessable frontage amounting to \$1,100.00. Referred to the Streets and Water and Sewer Committees with power to act.

The Streets and Public Property Committee reported in reference to the offer of <u>Samuel Jacobson</u> of \$1,000.00 for lot of land between Church Street and Park Avenue, belonging to the Town, that his offer bet not accepted. Report adopted.

Letter received and on motion of Crs. Pettipas and MacIntosh it was resolved that the Council make application to the Department of Municipal Affairs for such authority.

INCREASE IN SALARY <u>Maurice Bellefontaine</u>, caretaker of Mount Hermon Cemetery applying for an increase in salary from \$18.00 to \$20.00 per week. On motion of Crs. Hartlen and Publicover this matter was referred to the Cemetery Committee with power to act.

The Canadian National Institute for the Blind asking the Council to make them a grant of \$200.00 as they state their annual income is from Incorporated Towns and Cities and tag days and campaigns, and on motion of Crs. BILL

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1941

An Act Relating to the Town of Dartmouth,

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor and Assembly as follows:

1. (1) The Board of School Commissioners of the Town of Dartmouth shall be deemed to have had power to lease to the Canadian Red Gross Society a parcel of land owned by said Board situated on the north-cast corner of Queen and King Streets in the Town of Dartmouth, for the duration of the present war, at a rental of One Dollar per year, for the purpose of erecting thereon a building to be used as a canteen and recreation centre for members of the military, naval and air forces of His Majesty.

(2) The lands described in the prededing subsection hereof, and any building erected thereon by said Canadian Red Cross Society , and the contents thereof used in the operation of said canteen and recreation centre shall be exempt from assessment and rating for ordinary annual purposes of the Town of Dartmouth so long as the same are used solely as a canteen and recreation centre for members of the military, naval and air forces of His Majesty and for such similar object as may from time to time be approved by resolution of the Town Council of the said Town; provided that no goods shall at any time be sold therein other than to members of the said forces. This section shall not be taken to exempt said lands or said building or said Society from water and other special rates of the said Town. The exemption created hereby shall cease and determine sixty days after the signing of a treaty of peace by His Majesty or some authorized person on behalf of the Dominion of Canada, terminating the present war.

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2. (1) The Town of Dartmouth is authorised to include in its estimates for the year 1941 and to assess for, levy and collect a sum not exceeding \$350.00 to be contributed to the Canadian Red Cross Society.

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(3) The Town of Dartmouth is authorized to include in its estimates in any or every year and to assess for, levy and collect a sum not exceeding \$300.00 to be paid to the Halifax Visiting Dispensary.

(5) The Town of Dartmouth is authorized to include in its estimates in any or every year and to assess for, levy and collect a sum not exceeding \$1000.00 to be paid over to the Dartmouth Fire Department.

(4) Section 15 of Chapter 70 of the Acts of 1934 is repealed.

(5) This Section shall be read and construed and given effect as if it had been enacted on the 31st day of December A. D. 1940.

5. The Dartmouth Ferry Commission is authorised to contribute to the Canadian Red Cross Society the sum of \$200.00.

FURTHER RESOLVED: that the rates become due and payable August 15, 1941; that all rates not paid by then be subject to interest charges at 6% per annum, and that the water be turned off all premises where rates remain unpaid to September 15, 1941."

The Streets and Public Property Committee reported, as annexed, in reference to the garbage removal proposals, stating that Mr. H. L. Dares is willing to try the garbage collection, charge to householders to be  $10\varphi$  per week for two containers and  $5\varphi$  for each extra container, all charges to be collected by the contractor, and that the town be divided into six districts under the following regulations:

- 1. All garbage, ashes, tin cans, glass, etc. must be placed in suitable containers which are in good repair.
- 2. All newspapers, magazines or other papers must be securely tied up in bundles.
- 3. Trucks must be kept covered with a suitable tarpaulin.
- 4. The garbage collector to take all refuse to the authorized dumps and place materials in locations indicated by the man in charge of the dump.

On motion of Crs. MacIntosh and Ferguson, it was resolved that the report be adopted, subject to review at the end of the year for a financial consideration.

The Street Committee also recommended that piece of land owned by the town at the corner of Crichton Avenue and Ochterloney Street, and extending to the dam at the foot of Sullivan's pond to be used this year as a town dump in prepation for development into a suitable park, stating that a drain will be laid from the sluice in the dam to the culvert crossing Ochterloney Street, so as to permit lowering water into Sullivan's Pond when required. Report adopted.

GARBAGE REMOVAL

At this juncture Mayor Isnor called upon Deputy Mayor MacIntosh to take the chair as owing to another engagement he was obliged to leave the meeting.

The Public Property Committee reported recommending that the property #80 Upper Water Street, which was acquired by the town at Tax Sale a few years ago, was very unsatisfactory for the town to hold, and that tenders be called for the tearing down of the building and cleaning up of the lot or offer the property for sale with the proviso that the building be torn down. Report adopted.

The Committee reported further in regard to the unsanitary condition and state of repair of the property known as the "Merlebank" on Commercial Street. Referred to the Health Board.

<u>Alderney Chapter, I. O. D. E.</u> asking for permission to hold a Tag Day on Saturday, May 17th, proceeds to be used for war purposes. On motion of Crs. Hartlen and Ferguson request was granted.

<u>Maritime Provinces Association, Regina</u>, asking the town to contribute financially for a memorial tablet to be erected in the Chapel of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Regina. On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Publicover the matter was referred to the Finance Committee with power to act.

<u>Angus Myatt</u> asking that sewer mains be extended to service a dwelling which he is erecting on the old Crooks property, Pleasant Street, near the town boundary, and on motion of Crs. Hartlen and Publicover this matter was referred to the Water and Sewer Committee with power to act.

<u>H. H. Dares</u> offering the sum of \$100.00 for the purchase of a plot of land, Elmwood Avenue, belonging to the Town of Dartmouth, containing six lots. The Clerk was instructed to call for tenders for the sale of these lots to be dealt with by the Committee to report to Council. <u>H. L. Misener</u> asking that the town water and sewer mains be extended to service a dwelling he is erecting on lot #24 Crichton Avenue. Referred to the Water and Sewer Committee.

Dartmouth Coal and Supply Company, Limited, asking that Mr. Walter Purcell be appointed a sworn town weigher, and on motion of Crs. Ferguson and Publicover request was granted.

Gerald S. Clark asking that the concrete drinking trough in front of his residence, #97 Pleasant Street, be removed.

On motion of Crs. Hartlen and Ferguson it was resolved that the Town Engineer be instructed to remove the trough, it is not now required as a watering place for horses.

<u>Dartmouth School Board re-affirming</u> its conviction that the site selected for the proposed new school is the most desirable and asked that it be safeguarded for future school purposes. Letter received and filed.

Alfred R. Sharp, #78 Rose Street, complaining of surface water causing destruction to his property. Mr. Sharp was present at the meeting and was heard in connection therewith. ## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS this Council in and for the Town of Dartmouth in the Province of Nova Scotia, did in October, 1940, by formal Resolution request certain Ministers of the Crown, and the representatives of this Municipality who are sitting in the Parliament of Canada, to direct the proper officials to include the Dartmouth water-front of Halifax Harbour in the development programme of this great Atlantic sea port,

AND WHEREAS six precious months have now passed and no visible action has been taken to proceed with the construction of additional docking facilities along the Dartmouth water-front,

AND WHEREAS this Council was and is well informed upon the crying need for a modern public dock in the Town of Dartmouth entirely aside from and in addition to the present wharf spur of the Canadian National Railways,

AND WHEREAS recent Press dispatches indicate that greatly enlarged rail and docking facilities are to be constructed north of the City of Halifax and extending along the Narrows to Bedford Basin,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Council again place on record its demand for a fair, economically sound, and reasonable share of the development which is about to take place, in order that Dartmouth may have a more active part in the present war effort and the future development which is so necessary for the wellbeing of Canada and the British Empire,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Council, an authoritative body representing all of the citizens in the Town of Dartmouth, make an immediate demand upon the Minister of Public Works, and such other persons in authority asmay be necessary to start the immediate construction of a modern Pier at the foot of Beggs Street and upon the water lot which has been reserved for many years by the Federal Government for that very purpose, and that such construction proceed pending such further survey as may be necessary to determine other sites for additional wharfage docks.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Council call such public meetings as may be necessary to give further voice to this demand,

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be forwarded to those persons in authority whose official duty it is to hearken and to comply with the demand which it contains.

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Dartmouth, N. S., Thursday, April 17, 1941.

Letter was read from Mr. Harold Connolly, Minister of Industry and Publicity, asking that the Council do all in their power to invite visitors to Nova Scotia this summer. Letter received and the Council endorsed the action taken by the Minister of Industry and Publicity, and that a copy of the letter be forwarded to the Dartmouth Board of Trade.

The Clerk was instructed to have a notice sent to the people living in the house #80 Upper Water Street, owned by the Town, which is now being advertised to be torn down, to be out by June First next.

The Clerk was also instructed to write Dr. Payzant, asking for a report on the sanitary conditions at "Merlebank". "MERLEBANK" Meeting adjourned.

## RE: TOWN'S WATER SUPPLY

The special Committee, appointed to negotiate with Messrs. Dauphinee and Hennessey and also Mr. York in regard to the protection of the Town's water supply, reported as follows:

TOWN'S WATER SUPFLY "Your Committee has interviewed Mr. Henry York with a view to purchasing the whole or a part of the land on both sides of the Main Preston Road along the shore of the Lake and also a lot on the north side of the Lake. Your Committee has not been able to ascertain definitely how much land is owned by Mr. York and Mrs. Knox or what their respective interests are. Mr. York is willing to sell to the Town his interest in the lot to the north of the Lake and in the land lying between the Lake and the Main Road for the sum of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00). Your Committee estimates that this will contain a total of about fifty acres and believes that Mr. York has only a one-half interest in it.

Your Committee has also interviewed Messrs. Dauphinee and Hennessey who have purchased the timber. They state that they want Ten Thousand Dollars from the Town for the purchase of their rights in the timber. Their timber rights are limited to two years, and accordingly if the Town did not proceed to obtain title to the property there would be nothing to prevent the owners from selling the same timber again at the end of the two year period.

Your Committee submits these figures for your consideration and makes no recommendation concerning same. Your Committee however does recommend that the Council grant authority to your Committee to take such court action as it may deem necessary for the protection of the water supply, except proceedings for expropriation."

On motion of Councillors MacIntosh and Ferguson the report was adopted.

The report of the Chief of Police on the activities of the Police Department for the month of April was received and filed. The Chairman of the Public Property Committee reported recommending the acceptance of the tender of Roy Todd of Enfield of \$510.00 for the purchase of the property No. 80 Shore Road, on condition that he will spend \$1000.00 to put the building in repairs as specified in his tender. On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Hart this matter was referred to the Town Engineer for further information.

Town Engineer Allan reported in reference to the complaint of Alfred R. Sharp, #78 Rose Street, regarding the flooding of his cellar during a recent heavy rain storm, that he had made a preliminary investigation, and as the problem requires the taking care of a considerable quantity of water draining by a natural water course from Brightwood Golf Club hills to Sullivan's Pond, he requested further time to make a complete study of the matter to arrive at the cost involved. On motion of Crs. Ferguson and Hart report was adopted.

The joint Committee on Fire and Public Property reported recommending that fleet rate insurance for Legal Liability and Property Damage of \$5,000. to \$10,000. and \$1,000. Property Damage be placed on the following motor equipment:

## Whebby sub-division Victoria Road

A plan of the sub-division of the property on the eastern side of Victoria Road, north of Thistle Street, formerly owned by J. Lahey and now owned by William Whebby, having been approved by the Town Planning Board, I beg to report on the cost of water and sewer extension.

I am informed by Mr. Whebby's son Eric that it is intended to commence the construction of houses on lots numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 7, 9 and 10 this year and on the other lots numbers 5, 6, 11 and 12 next year.

If water and sewer facilities are to be supplied for these houses it will be necessary to extend the mains from the intersection of Thistle Street and Victoria Road a distance of 320 feet on Victoria Road and 280 feet on the first new street. Extension on Victoria Road

This should be regarded as a trunk main since it must be large enough to serve development on the whole area to the east of Victoria Road and between Thistle and School Streets. In order to carry the surface water as well as the house sewage that will finally develop a 21 inch sewer will be required. This together with the probable large amount of solid rock will make the cost of this section out of line with the returns from frontage assessment and water rates available at the present time, along Victoria Road, as shown by the following:

This comparison shows the revenue to be larger than the expenditures.

Whileas a portion of the cost of the sewer and water extension on Victoria Road should be regarded as provision for future development farther north along Victoria Road the follow-

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ing combined estimates of costs and revenue in relation to the proposed construction during this and next year is given:

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It is seen that as far as sewer costs are concerned the expenditures exceed the frontage returns by \$875.00. The water rates amounting to \$198.00 assuming interest and sinking funds at 8%, represent a capital outlay of \$2475. which exceeds the actual estimated outlay for water by \$975.00.

Houses built on these lots should obtain the same quantity and pressure of water as prevails on Thistle Street. The owner of property should enter into an agreement with the town to grade the new street to the satisfaction of the town.

#### Sewer Extension Pleasant Street

Mr. Eric Whebby has commenced the construction of three houses on lots purchased from Miss Jean O'Dell Leslie on Pleasant Street. Lieut. Arsenault, R. C. E. has also bought a lot on the same property for building purposes in the near future.

The trunk sewer built on Pleasant Street, from Old Ferry Road southerly, during the winter of 1937-38 ends at a point 60 feet northerly from the northern line of the Leslie property.

In order to supply sewerage facilities/ the new building construction the present sewer will require to be extended 230 feet or to a point 60 feet northerly from the northern line of Mr. C. H. Harvey's property.

A water main already extends along Pleasant Street. The extension of the sewer would be a great improvement aside from obviating the necessity of building cesspools for the proposed 4 houses, as it would help to carry off some of the heavy surface drainage reaching Pleasant Street from the hills extending up to Johnstone Avenue and the Radio Station.

The estimated cost of sewer construction is \$1380. and the frontage assessment 460 & \$2.50 \$1150.

This will mean that the properties on the east side of

Pleasant Street now connected by a private sewer with the main sewer will have to pay frontage.

I would strongly recommend this extension as I believe that further building along Pleasant Street should not take place without proper sewer facilities.

"RESOLVED, that in view of the increased cost of living effective October 1st, 1941, until further notice, all permanent full time employees of the Town of Dartmouth, regardless of basic salary or wage rates, be paid a wartime cost of living bonus of \$2.40 per week for married persons and \$1.50 per week for single persons; provided, however that in the case of an employee working less than the regular schedule of hours the bonus will be paid at the rate of 5¢ per hour for married persons and 3¢ per hour for single persons as the actual hours worked.

Be it further RESOLVED, that an unmarried person, widow or widower who maintains a self-contained domestic establishment and who actually supports therein one or more individuals dependent on him and connected with him by blood relationship, will be classed the same as a married person; a married person who does not maintain a self-contained domestic establishment and support therein one or more individuals dependent on him and connected with him by blood relationship will be classed as a single person."

Cr. Hartlen, Chairman of the Streets Committee, reported in reference to the question of <u>George H. Minutes of the last two meetings were read and on motion approved.

Lieutenant Cameron of the Pictou Highlanders being present at the meeting was granted a hearing. He stated that they were looking for a site for an open-air rink where the men could play hockey and hold winter sports and he favored the old Marks-Cross arena site on Wyse Road. On motion of Crs. MacIntosh and Hartlen it was resolved that as far as the Town of Dartmouth is concerned there is no objection to the Military Department using the old rink site for an open air rink.

DeYoung</u>, President of the Blue Bell Taxi Company, was present and applied for a license for two more five passenger automobiles for the year ending May 1/42, cheque for \$50.00 attached. The Provincial Command, Canadian Legion enclosing a brief prepared by the Dominion Executive Council, The Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, Ottawa, under date of October 21, 1941, to Right Honourable W. L. McKenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada, asking the Government to institute forthwith all necessary measures to place Canada on a "Total War" footing. On motion of Crs. Ferguson and Hartlen it was resolved that this Council go on record as endorsing the brief of the Canadian Legion of October 21, 1941 and a letter be sent to Prime Minister Honourable W. L. McKenzie King to that effect.

On motion of Crs. Hartlen and MacIntosh the following

resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved that in accordance with the wartime wages and cost of living bonus order (P. C. 8253) dated October 24th, 1941, effective for the first payroll period applying to services after November 15th, 1941 and until further notice all adult male employees, and all other employees employed full time or part time at basic wage rates equivalent to \$25.00 per week or more for full time work be paid independently of basic wage rates or salaries a wartime cost of living bonus of \$3.65 per week to wage earners working full time or \$15.82 per month to salaried employees;all male employees under 21 years of age and all female employees employed at basic wage rates or salaries of less than \$25.00 per week for full time work are to receive a bonus of <u>14.6%</u> of basic wage rates or salaries.

Further resolved that the bonus shall be payable only with respect to employment at basic wage rates, not including overtime. For any pay period during which an employee is employed and paid for less than the normal full time hours of work at basic wage rates, he shall be paid that proportion of his full time bonus which the number of hours he actually worked at basic wage rates is of the normal full time hours of work in that period.

Further resolved that this bonus does not apply to the Mayor, Solicitor, Auditors, Assessors or Revisors."

Fire Chief Patterson and Mr. William Harrison of the Fire Department were present at the meeting and spoke of the difficulty the Fire Department had in getting through traffic in going to fires and suggested a flickering light. They also reported that the roof of the fire tower is leaking. After some discussion, on motion of Crs. MacIntosh and Hartlen, the matter was referred to the Fire Committee to report on the matter of traffic and also on the roof of the tower.

On motion of Crs. Ferguson and MacIntosh it was resolved that the Police Committee take up with the Chief of Police the matter of cars parking too close to the corners of streets and also the enforcement of the Town by-laws in regard to cars drawing up to the curb during a fire alarm.
