The report of the Water Committee re the request of the Civil Defence Committee for permission to use the Hawthorne Street pumping station was read recommending that this building be made available to the Civil Defence Committee for their work when same has been vacated by the Water Department. On motion of Crs. Chapman and Carter this report was received and adopted.

The report of the Town Engineer regarding the condition of various streets in the Town and outlining the work necessary on these streets with an estimate of costs was read; this information being forwarded for the guidance of Council. On motion of Crs. Noseworthy and Driscoll this report was referred to the Public Works Committee for further study and report.

Councillor Noseworthy, as Chairman of the 1952 Recreation Committee reported verbally regarding the petition from residents of the Notting Park area regarding the operation of the Notting Park Community Hall. On motion of Crs. Noseworthy and Guptill it was agreed that Town Council would meet with the ratepayers in the Notting Park Community area together with the directors of the Notting Park Community Club at which time the operation of this Community Club would be discussed; the date for this meeting would be set by Mayor Morris.

Report of the Public Works Committee was read. It was unanimously agreed that the report be taken up seratim.

On motion of Councillors Guptill and Driscoll Item # 1, which reads as follows, was approved:

"That the Town accept on receipt of satisfactory deed the sections of streets listed below and proceed at the earliest possible date with the construction work outlined in the aforementioned report of Town Engineer:

Forest Road - (Crichton Park Road to Lot 81) <u>Hillside Avenue</u> - (Crichton Avenue to Lakeview Avenue) <u>Lakeview Avenue</u> - (Hillside Avenue to Lot 30) <u>Murray Hill Drive</u> Slayter Street - (North of Cherry Drive)[¶]

¹ On motion of Councillors Chapman and Carter Item # 2, which reads as follows, was approved:

"That the Town does not consider the acceptance of View Street until the owners make suitable provisions for the control,of surface water."

On motion of Councillors Chapman and Guptill Item # 3, which reads as follows, was approved:

"That the Town does not consider the acceptance of Sinclair Street or other streets in the Wyndholme Subdivision until they have been graded to full width by the owner with adequate provisions on both sides of the right-of-way for support of private property and or the street."

On motion of Councillors Chapman and Harrison Items # . 4 and 5, which read as follows, were approved:

"That Town Council determine who is responsible for the construction of guard rails where required."

"That Town Council determine who is responsible for the control of surface waters which flood Town streets as a result of private developments, and that immediate action be taken to have these flood waters controlled by the responsible party."

January 19, 1953.

On motion of Councillors Chapman and Carter Item # 6, Was approved as amended and reads as follows:

"That no streets be accepted by the Town after January 31, 1953, until they have been graded to full width, gutters cut in correct positions and a minimum of 6" of base coarse material applied, or sufficient to assure that the street in question is capable of carrying normal traffic under winter and spring conditions. And where there is any doubt concerning the ability of the base to carry traffic, the Town shall defer the acceptance of such streets until such doubts are removed."

On motion of Councillors Carter and Driscoll Item # 7, was approved as amended and readswas:follows:

"That the owners of properties effected by any act of Council as a result of this report be advised without delay of the Town's intentions or requirements by advertisements."

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF LAND

WHEREAS by Section 21 of Chapter 3 of the Acts of 1941 "The Towns' Incorporation Act" it is enacted, among other things, in effect, that with the consent of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, a Town may sell and convey real or personal property no longer required for the use of the Town;

Expropriation His Worship the Mayor and Members of Town Council, Dartmouth, N. S. Gentlemen:

Attached hereto are the estimated expenditures and revenues for the year 1953 recommended by your Finance Committee.

In presenting these estimates for the Committee I should like to review briefly some of the items included in the budget.

1. GENERAL GOVERNMENT

The General Government budget of \$50,780. shows an increase of \$2,200. over 1952 due in part to automatic salary increases, an increase of \$2,000. in the amount provided for the reserve for uncollected taxes, also to the provision of *1,500. to provide for the revision of Town by-laws. It is recommended that the Solicitor and the Clerk be instructed to make the necessary arrangements for this revision.

2. SAFETY COMMITTEE

The combined Fire and Police Department estimates exclusive of the amount provided as payable to the Water Department for Fire Protection is \$88,190, an increase of \$10,230. over the preceding year. This is due to new men added last year and to wage increases granted by Council last year and effective January 1st of this year, and to a further increase recommended to be effective July 1st of this year. The Safety Committee asked for extra men for both departments and an additional \$100. per year across the board. Finance Committee could not agree to extra men for the Police Department, but agreed to the inclusion of \$1,000. to cover the cost of hiring? some specials for school safety work. Provision is made for one extra man in the Fire Department effective July 1st and for an additional \$100. effective July 1st for both departments. This brings the scale for senior constables and firemen to \$2500. per year effective July 1st.

Provision is made to increase the amount paid to the Water Department for fire protection service to \$53,000. due to improvements made in the water system and in anticipation of an order to that effect from the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities.

Provision is made under the capital expenditure from revenue account to provide a new car for the Police Department and to provide radio equipment for the Fire Department as recommended by the Chief, this to be installed in one Fire Department vehicle and at the Fire Station.

I would point out to Council that the expansion in these departments has been very rapid. The cost of administering them due to increased personnel and salary increases has more than doubled since 1947. It is my opinion that these Departments have reached the point where a levelling off period may be expected and that further expansion in the next few years should be examined very carefully.

3. PUBLIC WORKS

The estimates for the Public Works Department as ______ presented to the Finance Committee were broken down under two general headings:

Repairs and maintenance, including such items as street and sidewalk maintenance, snow removal, etc., on the one hand and construction of new streets on the other hand.

Under maintenance the Committee have asked for *83,000. and for new construction *30,000. Having in mind the excellent job done by this Committee last year with an estimate of \$75,000, which included new street construction, the Finance Committee have reduced the amount asked for maintenance to *70,000. in the full confidence that we may expect another year of efficient street maintenance.

Realizing the problems facing the Committee in the construction of new streets the Finance Committee recommend

-2-

that the amount asked for, \$30,000, be made available as a capital expenditure from revenue and charged accordingly to this account. This will make a total of \$100,000. available to the Public Works Committee for maintenance and construction.

Sanitation and Waste Removal budget also administered by the Public Works Committee was approved as submitted at \$39,900, an increase of \$5,000. over last year due to the necessity of providing for payment of emergency repairs to the incinerator. 4. EDUCATION

The School Board requirements have increased by approximately '25,000. exclusive of increases in debenture debt charges on account of schools. I notice that Council for the last two years reduced the amount asked for by the Board of. School Commissioners and they were able in both years to finish the year with a surplus. Accordingly the Committee recommend that the School Board estimates be reduced by '4,000. in the hope that they may be able to achieve the same happy result.

The estimate for the Vocational School Board is only '5,000. this year due to the fact that we have built up a reserve for this account and will only require '5,000. to meet the payment due this year. You may however look forward to a substantial increase in this item for 1954.

Provision for the Municipal School fund is unnecessary this year due to the fund being abolished, and incidentally that accounts to some extent for the increase asked for by the Board of School Commissioners since they have lost some grants by the abolishing of this fund.

5. <u>RECREATION AND COMMUNITY SERVICES</u> show an increase of 51,600. due very largely to an item of 51,500. for the development of play areas for children under 14 years. An additional amount of 54,000. is carried under the capital expenditure from revenue account for the benefit of the Park Commission to enable them to complete the work started last year in the park area,

5.

6. PUBLIC WELFARE

No change has been made in this budget as submitted by the Committee, which shows an increase of \$2,500 over last year. We would urge the Committee to give further consideration to the collection of hospital accounts, which are becoming an increasing burden on the Town. 7. DEBENTURE DEBT CHARGES

Debenture debt charges at \$281,000. show an increase over the previous year of \$51,000, indicating a very rapid retirement of our capital indebtedness. When you add to,this \$44,000. provided in this year's budget under capital expenditure from revenue you will note that there is provision in this year's budget for approximately \$325,000. for retirement of capital debt and provision for current capital projects.

Total estimated expenditures are 3885,544, an all time high. 8. REVENUES

Total estimated revenues for 1953 are \$351,118, also an all time high. Poll tax revenues are estimated at \$25,000, an increase of \$10,000, due to the increased rate for men from \$12.00 to \$15.00 and to the fact that a tax has been levied for the first time on women.

Items 2, 3, 4 and 5 show only minor increases.

Service Charges Recoverable show a slight drop due to the small amount of curb, gutter and sidewalk work done last year. Unless further work of this nature is undertaken we may look for this 'amount to drop still further in the next few years.

The grant from the Province of Nova Scotia at \$32,985. shows an increase of approximately ⁴9,000.

The grant from the Dominion of Canada is estimated at *35,000, the same as last year.

Debenture debt charges recoverable are up 512,000, due , largely to the larger amount recovered from the Water Department. You will notice a new item under unclassified revenue, Maritime Telegraph & Telephone Co. 77,114, which is in addition to the real estate tax levied on the Telephone Company and is based on a percentage of gross revenue of the Telephone Company. The item showing sale of Town-owned land at 544,000.

is made up as follows: 334,000. to be taken into revenue from the sale of lots 1, 2 and 3 recently offered for sale by the Town, to be used for street construction and park improvement. The additional 510,000. is the amount estimated from miscellaneous sales including Dartmouth Boys Club and various odd lots of Town land.

Our estimated revenues total \$351,118, leaving \$534,426 to be raised by tax levy. The net assessment at \$21,549,470 shows an increase of \$625,000.

Your Finance Committee recommend a rate of 32.48 per \$100. of assessment.

Sirs:

May we respectfully present some of the facts surrounding our petition for improvements to Crichton Pk Road and Clearview Crescent.

We request that Council consider the following facts in making their decision to improve Crichton Park Rd.

SAFETY: There are Sachildren on the street, which is about 400 yds. in length. This is a concentration of 1 child for every / g yds. A't certain times all children are outside, and the lack of boundaries to the street makes it a virtual play-ground in the midst of heavy traffic. There have been no accidents, but the possibility of a serious one is an ever present worry. It is granted that it is the parents' duty to keep children off the street, but it Τt is an impossibility if a child cannot be shown definite boundaries of a forbidden Curbs and gutters would lesson the ever present danger that some child will area. be hurt, maimed, or killed.

PROTECTION OF PRIVATE PROPERTY: 2.

Most lots on this hill have lost a good deal of soil from the fronts of the plots, because of water drainage along the frontages. To give an example; where four years ago one could walk on level ground from a certain lot to the centre of the street, it is now necessary to cross a duckboard walk which is two feet above the ground level. The front edge of the lawn of this property has receded two feet in the past two years. This is an example typical of general loss and damage to our properties, which would be prevented by installation of curb and gutter.

PROTECTION OF PUBLIC PROPERTY 3.

The example given above reveals deterioration to the town property in the loss of the gravel on the original street. The present condition of the surface, which is no less than atrocious to walk on, let alone drive on, would appear that all topping has been lost, and that the exposed surface is the road Base. It is not necessary to point out the value in dollars of this loss, nor the possible loss in dollars if the base of the street is ruined. We believe that immediate resurfacing of the street is a matter of great urgency and in the town's interest.

DEVELOPMENT OF PRIVATE PROPERTY <u>L</u>.

We believe it is considered a definite asset to any town to have the property owners develop the fronts of their lots to present a neat and pleasing appearance. The lots on Crichton Park Road cannot be developed. Water drainage tears away the edges of the lawns, there is no line for the owner' to work from as there would be with curbs and sidewalks, and the dusty condition of the street surface has caused painting expenses far sconer than normally necessary.

5. HEALTH

The serious feature of dust, especially in the summer and polio seasons, needs no presentation to Council, but their attention is drawn to the fact that repeated applications of temporary dust-layers is expensive, and this cost can be erased by putting a proper, firmly bound surface on the street.

VEHICLE TRAFFIC 6.

There is no more damaging force to cars than a rough road. The present surface of Crichton Park Road is very, very rough. Filling of potholes and some grading has been done, but lasts only until the next rainfall. If Council Members doubt our description of the road surface, we invite them to try and drive up Crichton Park Road at 20 and 25 miles per hour, without bouncing in their seats and experiencing steering difficulties because of rocks, ruts, holes, bumps, not to mention the flotsam deposited and strewn by the last rain.

GENERAL

Elline to It is not our purpose to criticize any individuals in the Town Departments, nor Council itself. We desire to call their attention to a street that is in disgraceful condition, is dangerous to lives, damaging to property, and generally presents an appearance far below the condition which the houses on it, and the people paying for it, deserve.

We earnestly and emphatically request the Mayor and Council of Dartmouth to take notice of this plea, and authorize that improvements to Crichton Park Road fun pro by improving the road surface, and by installation of curbs, gutters and sewers, be undertaken immediately. Respectfully submitted
