Regularly called meeting of City Council held this date at 7:30 p.m.

MINUTES

Ald. Sanford and Ibsen moved the adoption of the April 29th, May 4th, 5th, and 17th minutes. Ald. Fredericks asked that page 7 of the May 4th minutes be corrected to read '. . . the North Woodside site' rather than 'the South Woodside site' in connection with the municipal home item. Referring to page 9 of the same minutes, Ald. Brownlow asked if employees have been offered the dependents' option as suggested; the City Clerk advised that the majority of married employees are taking this option. The motion, approving the minutes as corrected, carried.

MOTION: ALD. DAY

Having given notice of motion at a previous meeting, Ald. Day moved at this time that Council give full support by letter to the Minister of Education, recommending a change in designation for the Dartmouth Regional Vocational School to that of the Dartmouth Community College of Applied Arts & Technolocy; Ald. Ibsen seconded the motion. Ald. Day stated that the Vocational School Board is seeking Council's support for this change in designation to a Community College status and he commented on some of the reasons why both the City and the school itself would benefit from the type of expanded program possible, a point further emphasized by Ald. Greenough and Brownlow, who spoke in support of the motion. Ald. Greenough emphasized that in broadening the school program under a college concept, better use can be made of a school plant which is under-utilized at present. He stressed the importance of having Council's endorsation for this change before it is requested from the Province.

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Ald. Sanford questioned the type of courses that would be offered and asked if there would be any financial involvement on the part of the City. He said he would not want to see courses dropped which are presently being offered. Ald. Greenough clarified this point by noting that existing youth-oriented courses would continue to be offered as in the past, but programs could be broadened to take in other age levels. The degree of Federal participation was also questioned and Ald. Brennan asked if the college would have to compete with other colleges and universities for funding. The matter of tuition fees was brought up by Ald. Sanford; he asked if these would be on a user-pay basis. Ald. Cote said that while he would not be opposed to a name change as such, he agreed with the opinion of other members that Council should be provided with more information before coming to a decision on the change from vocational school to community college concept. Ald. Fredericks and Hart moved deferral for further information. Ald. Greenough suggested that Council might wish to have an on-site meeting when members of the Vocational School Board and Provincial representatives could be present to answer questions from the Council members. The motion to defer carried with Ald. Greenough, Smith, Day, Ibsen and Walker voting against. UNSIGHTLY PREMISES: Ald. Smith presented a copy of a petition forwarded to MAIN STREET

City Hall on April 15th, with regard to unsightly premises on Main Street. He said that no mention of these properties has been made in the Inspector's report and on his motion, seconded by Ald. Sanford, the petition was referred to staff for a report on the properties as soon as possible.

PORT COMMISSION LETTER: COASTAL TRADE

On motion of Ald. Sanford and Walker, Council received and filed a communication from the Halifax-Dartmouth Port Commission on the subject of 'Shipping & Coastal Trade in the Context of the Darling Report'.

NURSING HOME PROPOSIL:

A letter has been received from Mrs. Joseph, Exec. Director HILLCREST MANORS LTD. of the Hillcrest Manors Nursing Home in Truro, re the

progress with plans for a nursing home proposed for Dartmouth, with an inquiry as to availability of the City-owned property on Main Street, known as the Boys' Club property. This letter was referred to the new committee which will be dealing with the nursing home issue, on motion of Ald. Sanford and Day. Ald. Fredericks requested information from the Planning and Recreation Departments on any plans for the Main Street property.

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DATE FOR PUBLIC HEARINGS

At the request of the Planning Director and on motion of Ald. Ibsen and Smith, Council set June 29th as the date for public hearing of the following five rezoning applications, previously scheduled for other dates:

1) St. Peter's Convent - from P Zone to R-3 Zone

2) 72 Pinecrest Drive - from R-4 Zone to C-11. Zone.

3) Glen Manor Drive (MicMac Subdivision) - from R-1 Zone to R-4 Zone.

4) Manor Park Subdivision - Parcel 'C' from R-1 to TH-1 Zone

5) By-law C-289 - City of Dartmouth Zoning By-law.

RESOLUTION #76-25

Resolution #76-25, authorizing the execution of a deed to the property at 216 Main Street, being sold by the City to Ronald W. Coombs and Monica J. Cocmbs, was before Council and received approval on motion of Ald. Ibsen and Hart. A copy of the resolution is attached.

RESOLUTION #76-26

-26 On motion of Ald. Brownlow and Greenough, Council adopted Resolution #76-26 which declares that real property occupied for residential purposes within the City shall not be assessed an occupancy tax. A copy of the resolution is attached.

Ald. Ibsen and Day moved the adoption of the following six

Ald. Smith asked when action is to be taken against the owners of unsightly premises at 82 Hawthorne Street, 136 Prince Albert Road, 22 Erskine Street, 44/46/48 Chittick Ave., and on

Celtic Drive. The Solicitor advised that information on the properties referred to has been turned over to Mr. MacIntyre who is carrying out the prosecutions. He went on to explain why some of the prosecutions take longer than others and he pointed out that only the ones in progress and/or those which are unsuccessful are being included in the report to Council. If the successful prosecutions were noted, Council would have a truer picture of our progress in dealing with unsightly premises.

Ald. Fredericks asked again about 86 Everette Street, where a number of families are living in a duplex and Ald. Day requested particular attention to 17 Tulip Street, this building being more dangerous now that it is unoccupied. Ald. Hart questioned the status of legislation which would permit more effective action by the City against offending property owners, and Mr. Drury pointed out that this is enabling legislation only, requiring amendments to our by-laws before it can come into use. Mr. Earl Cooke was heard by Council on the matter of silt being stockpiled at the corner of Major Street and Lakecrest Drive by the TeePee Car Wash operation. He asked that attention be given to this situation and to other unsatisfactory properties in the area, about which he has been expressing concern. Ald. Brennan asked if it would be possible to add another column to the Building Inspection report, indicating action planned or being taken by the Legal Dept.; Mr. Drury agreed to take this suggestion under consideration. The motion to approve the monthly reports carried.

RESOLUTION #76-27

27 The Legal Dept. has prepared Resolution #76-27, based on recommendations from the Finance & Social Services Committee for the establishment of a committee to investigate the need for a nursing or special care home in Dartmouth and to consider by whom such services can best be provided. Council proceeded to adopt the resolution, on motion of Ald. Ibsen and Fredericks. Ald. Hart said she would like to see representation on the Committee from the Dartmouth Services Advisory Committee, but it was pointed out

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by the Mayor that this group has not yet been formally constituted. A copy of Resolution #76-27 is attached.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT Copies of the 1975 Financial Statement have been circulated; Council tabled the Statement on motion of Ald. Sanford and Greenough. The Mayor advised that a meeting with the Auditors to discuss the Statement will be scheduled in July.

SIGNING AUTHORITY On motion of Ald. Sanford and Greenough, Council authorized signing authority for Mr. Gregory Beranger, a recently-hired supervisor with the Social Services Dept. By the same motion, the name of Norah Dunbar is deleted as a signing officer, in view of the fact that she has been assigned to a new position in the Special Projects Division.

SHUBENACADIE CANAL

NAL Ald. Sanford and Day moved the adoption of a report from the Tourist Commission, requesting that Council pursue the restoration of the Shubenacadie Canal with all possible efforts. The Commission further indicates support for the action taken to date to have this project included in the agreement proposed for development under the Federal and Provincial Recreation & Conservation Program. The Mayor quoted from recent correspondence on the subject of the Canal restoration project, advising that a government press release is soon to be made in this connection.

Ald. Day then questioned the City's responsibility for any accidents which might occur in the area of the upper locks where children are playing and the City's liability in this situation was discussed at some length with the Solicitor. Mr. Drury stated that after offering whatever common-sense protection is considered advisable, the City can only provide insurance against possible accidents under these circumstances. Ald. Sanford made the point that it is impossible to provide protection around all of the City lakes and waterways. Ald. Brennan asked if the City could not exercise some jurisdiction to control the use of trail bikes in areas such as the one under discussion, and when Ald. Day had requested a report on safety in the locks area, the Mayor suggested

that Mr. Drury also consider the question raised by Ald. Brennan on the use of trail bikes. (During the inquiry period, Ald. Walker asked about the control of mini-bikes in our parks and walkways and the Mayor agreed that Mr. Drury's report should include consideration of this point as well.)

Ald. Greenough questioned the decision made to raise the level of the pond above the locks, suggesting that a permit should have first been obtained from the Dept. of the Environment. Mr. Moir said he has been assured by the City Engineer that the situation there is satisfactory. Ald. Walker noted that the Waverley Residents Assn. support the work which has been done in the Canal area to provide greater recreational use of the facility. The concern for safety of children playing around the locks, as expressed by Ald. Day, was shared by Ald. Greenough; both felt that a fence should be put up to keep children away from the edge of the locks. The motion on the floor carried.

JNDERGROUND CONDUIT: Council considered a report from the City Engineer on a proposal from Maritime Tel & Tel for installing underground conduit along the section of Portland Street from Bel Ayr Ave. to the City limits. The Company's three requirements from the City are stated in Mr. Fougere's report. Ald. Day and Granfield moved the adoption of the report, but Ald. Sanford suggested that item 1 should be amended to read 'When the contract has been awarded', replacing the present wording ('during the summer and fall of 1976'). He made an amendment to this effect, seconded by Ald. Day. The amendment carried and the amended motion carried.

NQUIRIES: LD. IBSEN Ald. Ibsen asked the permission of Council to have one of the flag poles on the City Hall plaza used during the summer months for the Provincial flag program to be carried out in conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce. The Mayor suggested that notice of motion be given by the Alderman to this effect.

In answer to Ald. Ibsen's second question, regarding taxes on property owned by Vera Gentles on Ochterloney Street, Mr. Moir

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advised that under the new assessment procedures, there is no authority for Council to grant tax rebates.

ALD. GRANFIELD

Ald. Granfield requested that a report from the Recreation Director on a site for possible acquisition in the Manor Park area, be dealt with by Council during the in camera portion of the meeting.

ALD. DAY

D. WALKER

Ald. Day asked about the status of a report requested by him on a proposal for laning the MicMac Rotary; Mr. Moir said he would check on this further.

Reference has already been made earlier in the minutes to Ald. Walker's question on the control of mini-bikes in park areas and walkways. He asked if it would not be possible to erect signs in specific places, prohibiting the use of mini-bikes and trail bikes; the inquiry was discussed with Mr. Drury. The City Administrator agreed to take the matter up with the Recreation Dept. with the idea of having signs erected in at least some areas.

Referring to the Maritime Tel & Tel request for permission to install underground conduit, Ald. Walker asked if similar installations are being negotiated with the N. S. Power Corp. Mr. Moir advised that it is the policy of the Corporation to contribute only the cost of installing overhead lines; additional cost for underground wiring would have to be borne by the municipality. Ald. Walker felt that the City should attempt to have this policy changed and asked to have the subject added as an item of business at a later point in the meeting.

ALD. FREDERICKS

Ald. Fredericks asked if a committee has met with the Y. representatives to discuss their tax problems. The Mayor said that a meeting was held and a letter is to be forwarded to Council by the Y. people as a result of that meeting.

Ald. Fredericks' second inquiry concerned the status of the trailer park by-law; Mr. Moir reported that this matter was discussed at a meeting of department heads and will be taken up

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further with the Solicitor. He noted that the main problem with the new by-law is in attempting to have existing trailer parks brought up to standard.

Ald. Fredericks asked that the telephone pole be removed from the corner of Arthur and Pleasant Streets where it is still standing out beyond the new curb installed on Arthur Street. Mr. Moir said he would bring this item to the attention of the Utility representatives.

ALD. SMITH

Ald. Smith brought up the matter of old cars around the property occupied by American Motors on Celtic Drive, suggesting that they should either be removed or a fence erected to keep them out of sight.

He asked if the City could get on with the street work in the vicinity of the Curley Drive duplexes so that the banks can be sodded after work on the curb has been completed.

Ald. Smith requested a report on the possibility of having funds from the library grant reallocated for the purpose of sidewalk installation along the section of Pleasant Street in front of the new general hospital. He indicated his intention to introduce a motion asking Council for a reallocation of funds for this use.

Ald. Smith asked that work be started on the installation of sidewalks on Sinclair Street, approved in last year's street construction program.

ALD. BRENNAN

Ald. Brennan requested that the City Engineer contact the owner of Dartmouth Machine Shop on Parker Street to discuss a drainage problem on that property.

He asked for a review by the Planning Dept. of the property 4 Tulip Street to determine if the owner is in compliance with the zoning by-law.

Ald. Brennan requested a report from the Building Inspector on the Starr Manufacturing plant on Prince Albert Road.

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ALD. BROWNLOW

ALD. HART

Ald. Brownlow asked if there is an on-going study of the need for traffic lights at various locations throughout the City and the moving of lights which may no longer be necessary at a particular intersection. Mr. Moir explained the continuous study which this aspect of traffic control receives, including the relocation of lights from intersections when they are no longer required.

Ald. Brownlow noted that there are traffic signs down in some areas of the City and in discussing this with Mr. Moir, it was suggested that any specific locations be brought to his attention

Ald. Brownlow asked for information on the staff study into the funding of capital projects.

Ald. Hart asked if anything could be done to bring about the Notting Park bus run more quickly (ie. through another approach being made to Mr. Dooks on the matter).

Ald. Hart inquired concerning negotiations with the I.W.C. representatives; Mr. Moir advised that he has information which Council will be receiving.

Ald. Hart asked if a Special Projects Officer has been assigned to work with Dartmouth Community Contact; Mr. Moir to check on this.

She went on to ask if a meeting has been arranged with the Province re additional funding for Dartmouth Community Contact; the Mayor indicated that an appointment is being made with the Minister.

ALD. GREENOUGH

ALD. WALKER

Ald. Greenough inquired about the feasibility of a crosswalk on Main Street in the area of MacDonalds. Mr. Moir advised that, the Traffic Division is looking at this further, but it is felt that a pedestrian crossing of Main Street here would be dangerous.

Ald. Walker asked that Caledonia Road be oiled to the end of the street in front of the two or three remaining houses where it has not been applied, and he questioned whether it would be possible to have a fence erected at the end of Caledonia Road, with a locked gate, to prevent access beyond this point.

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NOTICES OF MOTION: The following notices of motion were given for the next ALD. IBSEN meeting of Council:

> 1) Ald. Ibsen: to move that the flag pole to the left of centre on the City Hall Plaza be used for the purpose of flying Provincial flags during the summer months.

- 2) Ald. Granfield: introduction of a new by-law relating to deferral of taxes of citizens 65 years of age and over with incomes of less than \$15,000. per year.
 - 3) Ald. Greenough: that the Province be requested by City Council to establish a Motor Vehicle branch in Dartmouth to serve the needs of citizens.

4) Ald. Brennan: that the fair held on Natal Day be relocated from the present Lake Banook site to the Memorial Rink property.

Council passed all bills for payment on motion of Ald. Sanford and Day.

RENOVATIONS: CONFERENCE ROOM

On motion of Ald. Sanford and Walker, Council adopted a report from the City Administrator on renovations recommended to the Conference Room to permit relocation of the Building Inspection Dept. so that more space can be made available in the Planning Dept. This updated report is based on a proposal made to Council in October of 1975, which received approval at that time.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

Revised terms of reference for the proposed Dartmouth Community Services Advisory Committee have been provided and it was moved by Ald. Hart and Granfield that Council approve these terms of reference as presented. Speaking on the motion, Ald. Hart noted that any areas of conflict with the City Social Services Dept. have been removed under the new terms of reference. Ald. Brownlow agreed that they reflect the changes which Council and the Finance Committee wished to see made in this regard. He proposed that the composition of the Committee include representation from the high Schools and he moved in amendment that a representative from the two City high schools be added, replacing the Deputy City Clerk the now has a heavy schedule of meetings to attend. Before the amendment was voted on, Ald. Greenough moved referral of the new terms of reference to the Finance & Social Services Committee for recommendation to Council. The motion to refer was seconded by Ald. Day and it carried with Ald. Cote, Fredericks, and Hart voting against.

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UNDERGROUND POWER INSTALLATIONS

As indicated earlier by Ald. Walker, he proceeded to introduce a motion on the subject of a policy change request from the City to the N. S. Power Corp., whereby costs associated with the underground installation of power lines would be borne by the Corporation. He moved that a meeting be arranged with the Chairman of the Power Corp., through the Mayor and the City Administrator, to request that the Corporation bear the full cost of underground installations; the motion was seconded by Ald. Sanford. Ald. Fredericks questioned whether this type of additional cost might not ultimately be reflected in higher power costs to all citizens. The motion carried.

RESOLUTION #76-28 Resolution #76-28 (conveyance of lands from the Regional Authority to Thermo-Flo Corp. Ltd.) was presented, with a recommendation for its approval from the Solicitor. Council approved the resolution, a copy of which is attached, on motion of Ald. Sanford and Day.

CITY PROPERTY: 500 MAIN ST.

On motion of Ald. Brownlow and Brennan, Council adopted a recommendation from the Properties Committee that the building at 500 Main Street, formerly occupied by Eastern Fence Erectors, be demolished and the property sold by the City for residential use.

ITY PROPERTY: 5 DUNDEE LANE

A second recommendation from the Committee was also approved, on motion of Ald. Smith and Day, to have the furnace repaired in the City-owned building at 6 Dundee Lane, in order that this house can be rented. Although Council previously authorized the sale of this house by tender, only one bid was received in the amount of \$300., considered by the Committee to be inadequate.

On motion of Ald. Day and Ibsen, Council adjourned to meet as a Committee in camera. After reconvening in open Council, the action taken in camera was ratified on motion of Ald. Day and Granfield.

Meeting adjourned.

The Halifax-Dartmouth Regional Authority has requested the City Solicitor's Department to place before Council the matter of a conveyance by Quit Claim Deed of certain lands on the south side of the Old Cobequid Road in Lower Sackville to Thermo-Flo Corporation Limited.

This matter has already been considered by the Regional Authority and upon the advice of their solicitors, they have approved the proposed conveyance. ACQUISITION:

LANDS

STEED & EVANS

Negotiations have been carried on for acquisition of land required for the widening of Portland Street, designated as Parcel 16, owned by Gary and Joan Romkey. A purchase price of \$1,850. is recommended for the 1,234 sq. feet involved and this recommendation was adopted on motion of Ald. Smith and Ibsen.

A total settlement price of \$30,700. has been negotiated with Steed & Evans (Maritimes) Ltd. for land owned by them on Portland Street, designated as Parcels 50, 52, and 53. The Committee approved the acquisition of these lands, required for the Portland Street widening, on motion of Ald. Day and Ibsen. TY: As authorized by Council, an offer of \$150,000. has been

O'BRIEN PROPERTY: As authorized by Council, an offer of \$150,000. has been 50/52/54 ALDERNEY DR. submitted for the purchase of the O'Brien property on Alderney

> Drive; this offer has been rejected by the executors of the O'Brien estate. Tenders will now be invited by the trust company handling the estate and the City Clerk recommends, in a report to Council, that a tender of \$165,000. be submitted by the City for this property. Ald. Ibsen and Granfield moved the adoption of the recommendation which was amended by Ald. Sanford and Smith to read ". . . a tender of approximately \$165,000.", thereby giving the City some flexibility in making a bid, particularly if the purchase price recommended is made public. Some members, such as Ald. Greenough, questioned the reasons for attempting to acquire the O'Brien property at all, but the majority of the Aldermen favoured the submission of a tender in the area of the figure recommended. The amendment and the amended motion carried.

LANDS OF CLAYTON DEVELOPMENTS LTD.

A report from the City Clerk was considered on the outcome D. of negotiations for lands owned by Clayton Developments Ltd., as required for the Portland St. widening and improvements to Caldwell Road. Parcels 26, 27, 30 and 31 are the properties actually required, but acquisition of these lands isolates

Parcels 28 and 29 and Clayton Developments Ltd. are requesting that the City acquire these lots as well; further, that they be retained in public ownership and undeveloped except with the company's approval. A total acquisition cost of \$86,000. has been negotiated, the net cost to the City being \$45,122. with the Dept. of Highways cost-sharing for the portion of land outside the City boundaries. Ald. Day moved the adoption of the settlement recommended, but after looking at a detailed plan of the parcels of land involved, Ald. Fredericks suggested an alternate arrangement whereby a block of land could be acquired for the City by taking a portion of Caldwell Road. Some objection was also raised to the say which Clayton Developments Ltd. would have if Parcels 28 and 29 were to be developed, and on motion of Ald. Fredericks and Hart, the item was referred to the P.D.O. Committee for a report from the Planning Dept. on the use intended for these lands.

HAMPSON PROPERTY: 2 DOROTHEA DRIVE

On motion of Ald. Smith and Day, the Committee approved the acquisition of a parcel of land from property owned by John Hampson at 2 Dorothea Drive, for the negotiated price of \$1,000., this land being required in connection with the widening of Portland Street.

LANDS OF SOUTHERN BUILDERS LTD.

Acquisition of land owned by Southern Builders Ltd. on Portland Street, for the negotiated price of \$2,200., was also approved, on motion of Ald. Brownlow and Greenough; the parcel of land involved is 1,476 sq. ft. in size and is required for street widening purposes.

WILE PROPERTY: 8 MURIEL AVE. A purchase price of \$800. has been negotiated for a parcel of land from the Wile property, 8 Muriel Ave., subject as well to the relocation of an existing fence on the property and the relocation of a playhouse and shed. The Committee adopted the City Clerk's recommendation to this effect, on motion of Ald. Fredericks and Day.

VIEAU PROPERTY: MURIEL AVE. On motion of Ald. Fredericks and Ibsen, a report was adopted recommending a settlement negotiated for a portion of the property at 10 Muriel Ave., owned by Edna Vieau. This land (503 sq. ft.) would be acquired for street widening at a

ISLAND AREA

A report from the City Administrator was considered on the subject of recommended salaries for Department Heads & Asst. Department Heads, effective as of July 1, 1976; a copy of the report and salary list is attached. After several questions from the members had been answered by Mr. Moir, the Committee proceeded to approve the salary adjustments as recommended, on motion of Ald. Day **and** Tbsen.

Mr. Moir has prepared a report on the subject of land acquisition in the Navy Island area, recommending in conclusion that the purchase of the remaining properties under consideration be abandoned at this time in view of recent government announcements on the development of a container pier elsewhere. The Mayor advised the Committee of a meeting scheduled with the Development Minister to discuss the container pier question, and on motion of Ald. Smith and Fredericks, it was decided that the item should be deferred until the June 29th Council meeting when the Mayor will have further information. Ald. Sanford suggested that consideration should still be given to acquiring certain strategic properties as a means of preventing land speculation which could cut the City off from water access, and the Mayor agreed that it would be advisable to have Planning Dept. staff present when this subject is discussed on the 29th, with a plan to show the lands assembled by the City to date. The motion to defer carried.

RECREATIONAL LANDS: WARD 2

A report from the Recreation Director was presented on the proposed acquisition of land in the Manor Park Subidivision for future recreational development. A 5.86 acre land holding is being recommended, as indicated on the plan which accompanied Mr. Lynch's report, and Ald. Sanford moved, seconded by Ald. Day, that the City Administrator be authorized to commence negotiations for this parcel of land, owned at present by 7286 Holdings Ltd. in Halifax. Ald. Ibsen and Greenough

questioned the value of this property for recreational use, due to the low-lying portion which would have to be drained and filled before it would be useable. Ald. The motion on the floor carried.

Ald. Walker asked why department heads were not present for this meeting; the City Administrator said he would look into the matter.

REZONING: ST. PETER'S This meeting of Council constituted a public hearing CONVENT SITE

for the rezoning application received from the N. S. Housing Commission, to have the property known as the St. Peter's Convent site rezoned from Park & Institutional to R-3 Zone to permit the construction of a senior citizens complex. The appropriate amendment to By-law #74 was before Council, along with related correspondence on the rezoning request. It was moved by Ald. Ibsen and Cote and carried that leave be given to introduce the said amendment to By-law #74 and that it now be read a first time.

It was moved by Ald. Day and Ritchie that the amendment to By-law #74 be read a second time. Council heard Mr. Robert Hagel, legal advisor for the Housing Commission, during the debate on second reading. He outlined details of the development being proposed, referring to several features of the St. Peter's site which make it particularly attractive for use in developing a senior citizens complex. Ald. Day asked if objections were raised by area residents at the voluntary public meeting and Mr. Hagel noted that while the citizens present for the moeting had questions about the development, they did not raise objections to Ald. Ritchie questioned the adequacy of parking provisions, it. pointing out that there have been some problems with parking at the complex on Alderney Drive. Mr. L'Esperance explained the parking arrangements and indicated that there is ample room on the St. Peter's site for further expansion of parking facilities if they are required.

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Reporting to Council as Chairman of the voluntary public meeting, Ald. Greenough stated that the two main areas of concern discussed with residents pertained to 1) access and egress to and from the site, and 2) the number of units to be permitted in the development. He suggested that the Planning Dept. should work with the Housing Commission to insure that access and egress provisions are as reasonable as possible and further, that the size of the complex should be restricted to the 130 units being proposed at this time. Ald. Ibsen asked about the amenities to be provided in the building for recreational use, suggesting that they should include a lounge-type of accommodation for common use by the senior citizens - a facility lacking in the Alderney Drive complex. The Mayor said she felt that the recreational rooms in Alderney Manor are not large enough for the activities and events held there, particularly when senior citizens from the communityat-large are included. Other members of Council agreed that the points brought out by the Mayor and Ald. Ibsen should receive consideration in planning for the St. Peter's complex. Ald. Cote asked if adjacent properties would be adversely affected by the shade from this ten-storey development; Mr. Bayer did not consider that they would be, although residents could expect to receive somewhat less sun at certain times during the day when their properties are in shade from the building. The motion for second reading carried and unanimous consent was given by Council for third reading of the amendment.

It was moved by Ald. Day and Ibsen and carried that the said amendment to By-law #74 be read a third time and that the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to sign and seal the said amendment on behalf of the City.

REZONING: 72 PINE As recommended by the Planning, Development & Operations CREST DRIVE Committee, Council has also set this date for public hearing of a rezoning application for 72 Pine Crest Drive. The request from Green Gables Fine Foods Ltd. is to rezone the property in question

from R-4 to C-1-A Zone to permit conversion of the existing residence to a Green Gables convenience food store. Denial of the application is recommended by the Planning Dept. and opposition has been expressed by area residents through correspondence and verbally at this meeting. The appropriate amendment to By-law #74 has been prepared and was before Council for consideration.

It was moved by Ald. Day and Hart and carried that leave be given to introduce the said amendment to By-law #74 and that it now be read a first time.

It was moved by Ald. Ibsen and Cote that the amendment to By-law #74 be read a second time. Mr. Bob Pike of 66 Pine Crest Drive was heard by Council in opposition to the proposed zoning change, based on the reasons outlined by him in a letter to Council dated June 22nd, 1976. Ald. Hart noted that area residents have expressed their objection to the rezoning and that Ald. Sanford also wishes to indicate his opposition although he could not be present for the public hearing. Ald. Cote and Fredericks both spoke against the motion which was defeated when the vote on second reading was taken.

REZONING: PARCEL C MANOR PARK

L C Public hearing has been set for this date in connection with a rezoning application from Humford International Investments Ltd. to rezone Parcel C of the Manor Park development from R-1-4 to R-4 Zone in order to permit a development proposal for five separate buildings, comprising a total of 22 two-storey, side-by-side units. The Planning Dept. recommends that the application be granted, subject to the developer entering into an agreement and subsequent bond with the City to guarantee the project will be constructed as presented. The appropriate amendment to By-law #74 was before Council in this connection.

It was moved by Ald. Ibsen and Day and carried that leave be given to introduce the said amendment to By-law #74 and that it now be read a first time.

It was moved by Ald. Cote and Ritchie that the said amendment

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to By-law #74 be read a second time.

Mr. Peter McDonah, representing the applicants, informed Council on the type of development proposed, further details being provided also by the Planning Dept. as debate on second reading proceeded. Ald. Brownlow asked why so few of the area residents (four) would have been present for the voluntary public meeting held by the developer and Mr. McDonah responded to further questions as to the manner in which the meeting was advertised. He noted that notices of the meeting were circulated to home-owners in the area, but some residents later heard by Council felt that adequate notification had not been given prior to the meeting, particularly in the case of people who own property in Manor Park on which their houses have not yet been built. It was felt that owners in this situation have a right to expect protection for their investment when they have purchased sites in an area zoned for R-1 development. As Chairman of the voluntary public meeting, Ald. Brennan reported briefly to Council on it. He expressed concern over possible drainage problems which could occur as a result of the additional units being proposed and he discussed this point further with Mr. L'Esperance.

Ald. Fredericks suggested that from a planning point of view, the development would represent a good housing mix. He said that Council must recognize the need for various types of housing, even though it may seem desirable to have only R-1 development in any given area. Mrs. Colwell of 30 Somerset Street said she had not received notice of the meeting held by the developer and Mrs. Margaret Bragg spoke on behalf of a citizen group opposed to the zoning change. She stated that recreational facilities in the area are inadequate already and expressed concern about traffic and safety factors, over-crowding in the schools, and about the conditio of Oathill Lake which could be adversely affected further if develop ment densities are increased in Manor Park. Mr. Fred Waller of 88 Lorne Ave. contended that residents were not adequately notified

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of the public meeting on June 21st and he suggested that the development proposal either be much more seriously considered first or that it be rejected at this time. Ald. Granfield urged Council not to permit the zoning change requested, based on the fact that property owners in an R-1 Zone have a right to expect protection when they purchase homes there. When the vote was taken on second reading, the motion was defeated (Ald. Cote abstaining from voting).

PUBLIC HEARING: BY-LAW C-289

This meeting of Council was set for public hearing as required for proposed By-law C-289 which amends and consolidates By-law #74, the Zoning By-law. It was moved by Ald. Cote and Day and carried that leave be given to introduce the said By-law C-289 and that it now be read a first time.

It was moved by Ald. Cote and Day that By-law C-289 be read a second time. Mr. Drury explained the intent of the by-law, noting that any changes in policy which may be made will be brought forward as amendments at later dates. In response to questions from Ald. Fredericks and Kavanaugh concerning a) zoning on Waverley Road and Pleasant Street, and b) areas for the establishment of group homes (involving the definition of a family), the Solicitor pointed out that these are the type of policy changes to which he has referred in his comments on the by-law and future amendments to it. The motion for second reading carried and unanimous consent was given by Council for third reading.

It was moved by Ald. Granfield and Ibsen and carried that By-law C-289 be read a third time and that the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to sign and seal the said by-law on behalf of the City.

REZONING: GLEN MANOR DRIVE Council next proceeded with the public hearing for a rezoning application from MacCulloch & Co. Ltd. for five lots on Glen Manor Drive; the request is to rezone from existing R-1 to R-4 Zone to permit a development proposal comprised of 6 three-storey buildings as detailed in a presentation given by Mr. McRae on behalf of the

developers. The Planning Dept. recommends in favour of the rezoning and the necessary amendment to By-law #74 has been prepared and circulated.

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It was moved by Ald. Ibsen and Kavanaugh and carried that leave be given to introduce the said amendment to By-law #74 and that it now be read a first time.

It was moved by Ald. Ritchie and Hart that the amendment be read a second time.

Mr. C. A. Cantley appeared on behalf of a ditized group from the area objecting to the rezoning. Particular concern was expressed that traffic from the new development will further add to the present flow of traffic through the Crichton Park area, generated by the MicMac development as a whole. It was felt that existing traffic problems should be dealt with before any new development is permitted to take place on the MacCulloch land holdings. There was opposition to the idea of access to the project via Glen Manor Drive, also to the increased demands which the development would place on schools and other facilities. The need for a buffer zone to protect existing R-1 housing was stressed as well and the point was made in Mr. Cantley's presentation that the interchange originally proposed for Woodland Ave. at the intersection with MicMac Blvd. would have significantly improved the traffic situation in Crichton Park. There was general concurrence that the interchange should have been permitted by the Dept. of Highways and the suggestion was made that they should again be approached on this matter. Mr. Bayer pointed out, however, that the future of the highway secti in question is now likely to be influenced considerably by plans for future development of the Albro Lake lands owned by the Dept. of Public Works. The submission presented by Mr. Cantley was supported and signed by 500 area residents.

Mr. McHae then outlined the development proposal for Council's information, indicating alternate plans which have been considered in arriving at the final choice for the project. He said that the

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wishes of the residents with respect to a buffer zone have been taken into consideration and he went on to explain in considerable detail why the plans were drawn to permit access from both Glen Manor Drive and MicMac Blvd. He said the developers would be willing to retain the corner lot at the intersection of Crichton Ave. and Glen Manor Drive as an K-1 property if the residents so wished and stated that the developers would also be propared to make a proposal for cost-sharing in sidewalks on Glen Manor Dr. if the City is eligible to make application for funding under the Municipal Incentive grants program.

In response to questions from Council members on the overall traffic situation in the Crichton Park area, Mr. Bayer agreed that this is really a separate issue apart from the one of rezoning. He commented on the attempts which have been made to devise the best land use plan for the land-holding under discussion, taking into account the constraints of the total area available and the existing street patterns around it. Using a plan to show the MacCulloch holdings still available for development in the general MicMac area, Mr. Bayer noted that for the most part, these lands are zoned for R-4 development, a point recognized in rolation to the application before Council at this time. In other words, R-4 development in another form, using an alternate and lessacceptable plan, can proceed even if the request to rezone is denied by the City.

Ald. Kavanaugh suggested that there are areas of compromise which could be worked out by a citizen group with the developer, and said he would be prepared to propose a solution by this means in the form of a motion. Mr. Norman Ferguson, a Crichton Ave. resident, spoke in support of the position taken by the citizen group present for the hearing and Council also heard Mr. Brian Flemming, Solicitor representing the MacCulloch interests. He questioned the success to be achieved through negotiation between a representative group of citizens and the developers, suggesting

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that the residents would have different points of view even within their own group. Ald, Gote indicated that he would favour a plan with access only via MicMac Blvd. Since this would necessitate CMHC approval for any such revision in the development plan, Mr. McRae commented on discussions with CMHC in arriving at the proposal recommended to Council at the present time. At the conclusion of debate on second reading, Ald. Kavansugh and Granfield moved deferral of the matter until the July 6th Council meeting to see if the developers, a representative citizen group, and members of the Planning Dept. can work out some type of mutually-satisfactory solution based on points raised during the public hearing. The motion to defer carried with Ald. Hart, Brownlow, Ritchie and Brennan voting against.

At the request of Ald. Kavanaugh, Council agreed to deal with a report from Mr. Moir, recommending certain improvements in the Bell Lake area which would help to alleviate problems experienced by residents with noise, property damage, etc. being caused by young people since the start of the summer season. Ald. Kavanaugh and Day moved the adoption of Mr. Moir's report which recommends development of a beach area, an access road to it, and sections of fencing to prevent trespassing on the properties of home-owners

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in the area. Ald. Kavanaugh proceeded to inform Council of some of the situations which have occurred recently, causing problems that concern the residents affected, and he felt that if a curfew were established for our parks and school properties, citizens would have some protection from the kind of behaviour which we are presently not able to control adequately, especially during the late evening hours.

After Council had agreed to continue meeting beyond the hour of 11:00 p.m., on motion of Ald. Day and Ibsen, Ald. Fredericks spoke on the motion, referring to similar problems in bis ward in the Boundary Street and Gaston Road areas. He asked if it would be possible to have the Police Chief attend the next P.D.O. meeting to discuss the problems faced by his department in this connection. Ald. Hart did not feel that the beach development proposed will solve the problems at Bell Lake and she questioned the clearing out of underbrush in areas where erosion could result, to the detriment of the water quality in Bell Lake. She felt that a curfew might prove more effective in dealing with the kind of problems being discussed. On motion of Ald. Cote and Granfield, the matter was referred to the P.D.O. Committee for further consideration (Ald. Kavanaugh voting against).

ADDITIONAL SIGNING OFFICER

On motion of Ald. Brownlow and Day, Council approved the inclusion of the Deputy City Clerk, G. D. Brady, as an additional signing officer for the City, as recommended by the City Clerk-Treasurer.

Council adjourned to meet in camera on motion of Ald. Day and Ibsen and after reconvening in open meeting, approved the action taken in camera, as moved by Ald. Ibsen, seconded by Ald. Day.

LAND: CLAYTON DEVELOPMENTS LTD. The Planning, Development & Operations Committee has recommended approval of a report from the City Clerk on the proposed acquisition of lands from Clayton Developments Ltd., required for improvements to Portland Street and Caldwell Road. Ald. Day and Brownlow moved the adoption of the Committee's recommendation, but an amendment was introduced by Ald. Fredericks and Brennan, which would have deleted the condition negotiated with Clayton Developments Ltd. with regard to land use approval for Parcels 28 and 29. The amendment was defeated and the motion carried with Ald. Fredericks voting against. Ald. Fredericks and Kavanaugh then gave notice of reconsideration.

RECONSIDERATION

NAVY ISLAND LAND ACQUISITIONS A report from Mr. Moir on the subject of land acquisition in the Navy Island area was again before the Committee, having been deferred from the June 1st Council meeting. Copies of a letter from the Provincial Minister of Development were circulated, indicating that authorization is to be approved for extension of the DREE agreement covering land acquisition to December 31, 1976. The Mayor said it is the feeling of the Minister that we should continue with our present acquisition program in the Navy Island area and a motion to this effect was introduced by Ald. Fredericks, seconded by Ald. Day. Mr. Bayer presented a plan showing those properties already owned by the City and others under negotiation. The motion was put and carried.

Ald. Cote suggested that it would be in order for Council to respond in some public way to the recent container pier announcement and as a basis for this, he moved that staff prepare a report for consideration, outlining the reasons for the container pier decision in favour of Fairview Cove. Ald. Day seconded the motion and it carried.

DURLING PROPERTY: 95 LAKECREST DR. In a further report to Council on the Durling property at 95 Lakecrest Drive, required for street construction purposes,

Mr. Moir has advised that Mr. Durling now wishes to sell his property for \$26,500., as previously requested by him. MINUTES

The minutes of the May 18th and June 1st meetings were approved by Council on motion of Ald. Greenough and Walker. A motion on the subject of changing the name of the Dartmouth Regional Vocational School, introduced by Ald. Day, was withdrawn at this time.

REZONING: GLEN MANOR DRIVE

The Glen Manor Drive rezoning application was again before Council, having been deferred in-second reading from the June 29th meeting for further discussion among the parties involved, in an attempt to resolve the issues about which concern has been expressed by area residents. A report on the outcome of these discussions has been prepared by the Planning Director and the adoption of his recommendations was moved by Ald. Ibsen and Brownlow. The report recommends in summary a reinitiation of the overall traffic study for the MicMac area and deferral of the final decision on rezoning for two weeks to permit an opportunity for resolving the Glen Manor Drive access question, still outstanding as a contentious issue after the meeting with citizen representatives, other major points having been successfully resolved as outlined by Mr. Bayer. He proceeded to explain details of the new proposal negotiated, which provides for the remention of an R-1 buffer zone between the existing R-1 homes and the new R-4 development. Ald. Brownlow said that in view of Mr. Bayer's recommendation on a traffic study for the Mic-Mac Subdivision, he would withdraw a notice of motion to this effect, which was to have been introduced at a later point in the meeting.

Questions from other members of Council pertained mainly to the traffic situation and to alternate solutions that might be considered for resolving the Glen Manor access issue. Ald. Brennan asked if the developer would be willing to delay work on the three southerly apartment buildings for the two-week period while the question of access is being negotiated and Mr. McRae said he would He requested, however, be willing to do so for that period of time. that the portion of land known as the Drummond property be approved at this time for rezoning to R-4, taking into account the thirtyday appeal period involved, so that construction of the building affected will not be unduly delayed. Mr. Bayer indicated the Drummond property on the plan before Council, explaining further the request being made by Mr. McRae for approval of the area designated. Ald. Cote felt that the entire rezoning application should be dealt with again in two weeks time, leaving all options open for negotiation until then. No amendment to the rezoning plan was introduced and the motion on the floor carried.

LETTER: CIVIC HOLIDAY

A letter from the Dartmouth Chamber of Commerce was before Council, requesting reconsideration of Council's action in declaring July 14th a civic holiday in recognition of the Queen's visit to The Chamber has stated that considerable hardship will Dartmouth. be placed on firms which must stay open on the holiday, particularly in view of the fact that a civic holiday has not been declared by the City of Halifax. The Mayor expressed concern that controversy has arisen over this issue just prior to the Queen's visit, and pointed out that since July 14th is not a statutory holiday, firms will not be required to pay overtime and may stay open if they wish to do so. Ald. Kavanaugh and Smith moved that the action taken by Council on May 4th in delcaring July 14th a civic holiday be rescinded

at this time. Most members of Council who spoke on the motion were not in favour of rescinding their original decision, particularly at this late date. Ald. Walker noted that he was opposed to the holiday when it was approved by Council.

Mr. N. Crawford was heard on behalf of the Chamber and indicated why the holiday will be costly for firms with union contracts. He said that merchants in the downtown area were not contacted as to the possibility of giving employees time off from work to see the Queen, which could have been arranged without the necessity for a civic holiday. When the motion to rescind was put, it was defeated with Ald. Walker, Brennan, Smith and Kavanaugh voting in favour. DTH Ald. Fredericks requested that a letter from the Dartmouth

Fire Fighters Assn. on the handling of dangerous materials be included in the next P.DO. agenda for consideration. The Mayor suggested that this matter should also be brought up at the Regional Council meeting scheduled for July 8th.

MOTION: ALD. IBSEN

Notice of motion having been duly given at the June Council meeting, Ald. Ibsen now moved that the flagpole to the left of centre at the City Hall Plaza be used for the purpose of flying Provincial flags during the summer months. The motion was seconded by Ald. Walker and debate proceeded. Ald. Granfield felt that the flags presently being flown on the Plaza should not be taken down to accommodate the Provincial flag proposal and said he would favour a suggestion from the I.O.D.E. that the Tourist Bureau be considered as a location for this purpose. Copies of a letter from the Central Committee for Dartmouth I.O.D.E. Chapters, objecting to the Union Jack being taken down from the City Hall Plaza flag staff, have been circulated in connection with Ald. Ibsen's notice of motion. Ald. Kavanaugh seconded an amendment introduced by Ald. Granfield to the effect that Provincial flags be flown at the Tourist Bureau rather than at the City Hall Plaza. Ald. Fredericks and Brownlow were in favour of the amendment, and the Mayor suggested that consideration might be given to flying all ten Provincial

flags from holders across the front of the Tourist Bureau. Both she and Ald. Brennan referred to flagpoles available near the ferry terminal building. After further discussion, the matter was referred to staff, on motion of Ald. Sanford and Fredericks, for report on the most suitable location for the Provincial flags, with a cost estimate to be included.

STREET PATTERN: FARVIEW FARMS

Council agreed to deal next with the Farview Farms item for which residents were present at the meeting. In a report to Council, dated June 2/76, the Planning Director has set out three staff recommendations, indicating that the Citizens' Committee concurs with two of these - namely, the opening of Clydesdale to Spring Ave. and the elimination of left-hand turns off Portland Street onto Jersey Drive. The Committee proposes the disallowing of right-hand turns off Spring Ave. onto Clydesdale, a point with which the Planning Dept. staff disagrees. In addition to the above, the City Staff Review Group recommends:

- reconfirmation of their recommendation expressed to City Council in the City Clerk's report of July 3/75, that Landrace Crescent be constructed as originally laid out in the approved subdivision plan to complete its connection with Clifford Drive and Cathy Cross Dr.
- 2) that the actual construction of the Landrace Crescent connector be carried out following the completion of the Portland Street widening, and
- 3) that City Council insure that the specifications for tender of the reconstruction of Portland Street include very definite instructions prohibiting the use of any local residential street in the area from being used as detours during construction.

Ald. Sanford and Ritchie moved the adoption of the staff recommendations. Ald. Brennan asked about the possibility of additional traffic being generated through the subdivision if connections are made at Clydesdale Ave. and Landrace Cres. as proposed. Mr. Bayer said it is the feeling of his department that an abnormal traffic flow would not be generated. Mr. J. C. Morrison of 12 Landrace Crescent was heard on behalf of a group of residents who wish to see the Farview Farms subdivision connected with Spring Ave. and Cathy Cross Drive, as recommended by staff. He did not

feel that through traffic would become a problem in the subdivision and suggested that the present situation is unsafe with only one entrance and exit route via the Jersey Drive connection to Portland Street. Reference was made in Mr. Bayer's verbal presentation to the fact that both the Fire Chief and the Police Chief concur that the subdivision should have other entrance points for use by emergency vehicles and, in the case of the Cathy Dross connection, for fire-fighting purposes (the two hydrants on either side of the brook being on different water systems).

Mr. A. Farmer, Chairman of the Citizens' Committee which met with City staff on this issue, also made a presentation at this time, based on his written submission circulated with the agenda. While residents represented by the Committee are in agreement with the opening of Clydesdale Ave. to Spring Ave., they oppose the Landrace/Cathy Cross connection except for use as a pedestrian walkway and to accommodate emergency vehicles if required. Concurrence has not been indicated with a staff recommendation that right-hand turns be permitted off Spring Ave. onto Clydesdale, the position of the Committee being that through traffic from Spring Ave. will tend to use Clydesdale as a short-cut to the Jersey Drive exit onto Portland Street. Ald. Granfield and Ritchie considered this to be a valid arguement, but Ald. Brownlow and Walker indicated support for the staff recommendation after discussing the point further with Mr. Bayer.

In view of the fact that particular concern was expressed by Mr. Farmer about right-turning traffic during the hours between 7:00 and 9:00 a.m., Ald. Kavanaugh moved in amendment, seconded by Ald. Fredericks, that traffic not be permitted to make right-hand turns off Spring Ave. onto Clydesdale Ave. from 7:00 to 9:00 a.m. only. Ald. Greenough spoke in favour of the amendment, but Ald. Sanford suggested that all traffic be brought out to the controlled access point at Spring Ave. and Portland Street and Jersey Drive closed at Portland Street. He also raised questions as to whether

the original plan of subdivision for Farview Farms can be altered without further action on the part of Council. Mr. Bayer noted that both Clydesdale Ave. and Landrace Cres. will have to be terminated in cul-de-sacs, in keeping with subdivision regulations when there is to be no connection with other streets. The amendment on the floor carried with Ald. Brennan and Sanford voting against.

A second amendment was then introduced by Ald. Kavanaugh, seconded by Ald. Hart, to the effect that the Landrace/Cathy Cross connection be constructed in such a manner (in consultation with the Fire Chief and the Police Chief) as to be used only for a walkway and for emergency vehicles. This amendment also carried with Ald. Brownlow, Sanford and Walker voting against. The amended motion carried with Ald. Sanford and Walker voting against.

BY-LAW C-297

By-law C-297 has been prepared in keeping with a notice of motion given by Ald. Granfield, relating to the deferral of taxes of citizens 65 years of age and over, with incomes of less than \$15,000. per year. It was moved by Ald. Granfield and Cote and carried that leave be given to introduce the said By-law C-297 and that it now be read a first time.

It was moved by Ald. Cote and Ritchie that By-law C-297 be read a second time. During the debate on second reading, Ald. Granfield commented on the assistance he would hope to see provided for senior citizens through his tax deferral proposal, supported also by Ald. Ritchie. Ald. Kavanaugh suggested and then moved in amendment that section 2. (1) (d) of the proposed by-law be changed to read 'gross income' rather than 'net income'. The amendment was seconded by Ald. Ibsen and it carried with Ald. Sanford voting against.

Ald. Kavanaugh also felt that section 3. (1) should be amended to include the payment of interest, instead of the present wording which reads 'without interest'. He made an amendment to this effect, seconded by Ald. Fredericks; the amendment carried by a vote of 7 to

In a third amendment, moved by Ald. Brennan and Kavanaugh, Council requested that section 2. (1) (c) of the by-law be redrafted to provide for joint ownership in the case of couples who qualify for tax deferral. The amendment carried.

On motion of Ald. Granfield and Hart, further consideration of the by-law was deferred until the next meeting of Council to incorporate amendments approved at this time.

Based on his previous notice of motion, Ald. Brennan moved that the fair held on Natal Day be relocated from the present Lake Banook site to the Memorial Rink property; Ald. Cote seconded the motion. A report from the Natal Day Committee, recommending against moving the Bill Lynch show from the Lake Banook location, was before Council in connection with Ald. Brennan's resolution, along with a letter objecting to such a move on behalf of the Senobe Aquatic Club. Ald. Brennan explained the reasons why he would favour a move for the fair, away from Lake Banook and the adjacent residential properties in the area, but his motion did not receive the general support of Council. (During the debate, Council agreed to continue meeting beyond the hour of 11:00 p.m., on motion of Ald. Hart and Fredericks.)

Members who spoke against the motion tended to feel that the fair should not be relocated this year when plans for Natal Day are nearing completion. Ald. Brennan suggested that community organizations could operate their booths at the Kink site, in conjunction with the fair, as they are presently doing at the Lake Banook location. When the motion was put, it was defeated with

Ald. Brennan voting in favour.

A tender was called by means of advertisements in the local newspapers for the services of a supplier with tank truck to deliver water to residents of the city having dry wells during the summer months.

A set of specifications describing the type of vehicle and equipment we felt a supplier should provide in order to deliver water. The supplier must provide a telephone answering service and must be prepared to deliver water as required seven days a week during daylight hours. The supplier must obtain his water from the Lake Lamont pumping station and the tank and accessories must be cleaned and disinfected on a regular basis at least weekly and shall be subject to approval of and inspection by a public health inspector.

Deliveries will be made only on instructions from the city engineer or his representative and a contract must be signed by the person receiving water. One condition covers the provision of a suitable container for the storage of at least a three day supply of water on the users premises. Another condition states that the water delivered must be boiled prior to use for human consumption as a safety precaution. The contract also covers payment which is based on our regular water charges of \$ 3.33 per month plus .55 per 1,000 gallons of water delivered.

We make this recommendation because Mr. Davis is presently providing similar service, service would be available immediately and the next low bidder could not provide service until 15 days after tender was awarded, Mr. Davis is using a thousand gallon tank which we feel would be an advantage over the 600 gallon tank offered by the next low bidder and the price offered by Mr. Davis is best for all quantities up to 200 deliveries per month and we feel based on past experience the number of deliveries should be less than 200 per month.

The engineering estimate for providing the delivery service was \$ 23.50 per delivery which included labour and equipment costs.

REZONING: GLEN MANOR DR.

The Glen Manor Drive rezoning application was again before

City Council, July 20/76.

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Council, having been deferred in second reading for negotiation with the residents group and the developers, in an attempt to reach a compromise solution in the various points at issue. Mr. Bayer reported to Council on the compromise proposal worked out, whereby traffic from the Kings arm development would exit onto MicMac Blvd. only, in accordance with the internal parking and street plan presented at this time. All parties concerned have given verbal concurrence with the revised plot plan and accordingly, it is recommended that the revised rezoning application be approved.

Mr. McKae, representing the developers, said he would be prepared to make application to have the R-4 property fronting on Crichton Ave. rezoned to R-1, subject to the appeal period under the Planning Act having expired, and based on this assurance from the developers, Council proceeded to approve the revised rezoning description (map B-14) as an amendment to second reading, moved by Ald. Kavanaugh and seconded by Ald. Smith. (Ald. Brennan and Walker voting against the amendment.) Questions from Ald. Brownlow and Smith were discussed with Mr. Bayer, after which the amended motion for second reading was put and carried.

Unanimous consent was given by Council for third reading of the amendment to By-law #74.

It was moved by .ld. Day and Smith and carried that the said amendment to By-law #74 be read a third time and that the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to sign and seal the amendment on behalf of the City.

ETTER: ALD. REDERICKS Ald. Fredericks has directed a letter to Council, requesting that funds allocated in the Capital Budget for recreational development in the Gaston Road area be released from the stipulation under which they were approved, the amount involved being \$60,000. Approval by Council at budget time was conditional on Provincial participation in the development. Ald. Fredericks and Walker moved the approval of this request, but on motion of Ald. Kavanaugh and Cote, the matter was referred to the P.D.O. Committee for consideration.

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DEWALKS: PLEASANT ST.

In a second letter to Council, Ald. Fredericks requests that if funds are available from the \$500,000. allocated for street construction (ie. as a result of tenders coming in lower than anticipated for contracts), an amount of \$6,000. be approved for a sidewalk on Pleasant Street in front of the new Dartmouth General He moved that a portion of any surplus in street con-Hospital. struction funds be allocated for this purpose; the motion was seconded by Ald. Day. A motion of referral to the P.D.O. Committee, presented by Ald. Hart and Brownlow, was defeated. Ald. Kavanaugh was in favour of referring the matter to the Hospital Commission, suggesting that sidewalk in front of the hospital building should be the responsibility of the Commission. When the vote was taken, the motion on the floor carried with Ald. Brennan, Hart, and Brownlow voting against.

On motion of Ald. Ibsen and Day, Council referred a request from the Dartmouth YM/YWCA for tax exemption, to the Finance & Social Services Committee for consideration.

A letter has been received, requesting a donation from the City to the Italian Earthquake Relief Fund; the letter was received and filed on motion of Ald. Smith and Day.

BELL Ald. Ibsen and Day moved that a letter from a resident of CH AREA 86 Dorothea Drive, on the subject of the proposed Bell Lake beach

development, be received and filed. Council decided, however, to refer the letter to the Lakes Advisory Board for consideration when the Board deals with this item, and a motion to this effect was moved by Ald. Kavanaugh, seconded by Ald. Walker; the motion carried.

COMMENDATIONS ROM COMMITTEE

OXIC GAS XPOSURE

ONS Council took the following action on recommendations from EE the P.D.O. Committee:

1) <u>Toxic gas exposure</u>: Having dealt with a letter from the Dartmouth Fire Fighters Assn. on the subject of toxic gas exposure, the Committee recommends that Council proceed, through all of the various avenues available, to insure the proper labelling of toxic

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materials and, as a folkow-up, that City Council develop a policy as to how these materials are to be stored and transported in the City. The effectiveness of the recommendation in dealing with the overall problem of handling dangerous materials, was questioned by some members of Council who felt that additional information is required from the Fire Chief before deciding on the best approach to take from the City's point of view. Reference was made to the Federal regulations which are supposed to cover situations where hazardous materials are being transported and handled, and on motion of Ald. Ibsen and Day, Fire Chief Findlay was asked to submit a report for the next Council meeting, explaining the regulations in further detail and commenting on their adequacy or lack of it.

)IRECTOR'S REPORT 2) <u>Planning Dept. report</u>: The Planning Dept. report for the month of June received approval, as recommended by Committee, on motion of Ald. Day and Ibsen.

ERMIT TO BUILD: 3) Permit to build, 23 Farrell Street: On motion of Ald.
23 FARRELL ST.
Fredericks and Day, Council approved an application for permit to build a three-storey apartment building at 23 Farrell Street.
_____Approval has been recommended by Committee subject to compliance with departmental requirements.

UILDING APPLICATION: 4) Building application, 537 Pleasant St.: Ald. Kavanaugh 37 PLEASANT ST. and Ibsen moved the adoption of a recommendation from Committee against granting approval for a 3300 sq. ft. addition to an existing building at 537 Pleasant Street, to be used for a lounge, plus first-storey renovations for a restaurant. Ald. Fredericks asked the Planning Director to explain the reasons why denial of the application has been recommended by his department and Mr. Bayer proceeded to outline the parking and traffic problems associated with the proposal, as noted in the comments submitted by the Traffic Authority. After hearing this verbal report, the vote was taken and the motion carried.

ERMIT TO BUILD: EDFORD INSTITUTE 5) Permit to build, Bedford Institute: As recommended by Committee

Jity Council, July 20/76.

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Council approved an application for permit to build a 60,000 sq. ft. addition to the Bedford Institute, as submitted by Sigma Construction Ltd.; the motion was moved by /ld. Brownlow and seconded by Ald. Ibsen.

(EZONING REQUESTS 6) <u>Rezoning requests</u>: On motion of Ald. Walker and Ibsen, Council set August 24th as the date for public hearing of the three following applications for rezoning:

- 1) G.M.N. Construction Ltd., Portland St.
- 2) European Masonery Ltd., 33 Lakecrest Dr.
- 3) 597 Portland Street

ROGRESS REPORTS: 7) Progress reports, Planning Dept.: Progress reports from TANNING DEPT. the Planning Dept. on several projects underway have been referred to Council by the P.D.O. Committee with the recommendation that they be received and filed. The reports dealt with:

- a) the Lake Charles Recreational Study received and filed on motion of Ald. Ibsen and Smith.
- b) the 107 By-pass Environmental Study received and filed on motion of .ld. Brownlow and Day.
- c) the NIP and RR.P Program received and filed on motion of Ald. Day and Ibsen.
- d) the Quarry Study received and filed on motion of Ald. Ibsen and Smith. Ald. Kavanaugh suggested that the quarry study should be speeded up, taking into account the fact that the quarry permit renewal for Steed & Evans comes up again in September. On his motion, seconded by Ald. Day, Council requested that the date for completion of the quarry study be advanced in order to have the results of the study available before dealing with the quarry permit application.

OLICE ESCORT SERVICE 8) Police Escort Service: Based on an inquiry from Ald. Walker and a motion subsequently adopted, the P.D.O. Committee has recommended to Council, as a policy for the use of police vehicles, that they return to normal patrol immediately after providing escort service to a particular location; vehicles would remain on patrol duty until required to pick up the City Council member from this location. Ald. Kavanaugh said he would be willing to move the adoption of this recommendation from Committee, but the Mayor indicated that the policy recommended is the one being followed in the use of police vehicles at the present time. Ald. Walker asked Chief Smith if this policy is being adhered to and he replied that to his knowledge, the policy

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recommended is being carried out. Ald. Walker commented on the specific instance in which a police car was reported to have been parked for some time in front of the Halifax Forum on the evening of July 12th, and on his motion, seconded by Ald. Hart, the Police Chief was requested to provide a report on the police car in question, indicating whether or not it was off duty from approx. 7:50 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. (Ald. Day and Ibsen voting against the motion).

The Mayor reported to Council on her use of a police car to attend a function at the Forum on the evening of July 12th, providing details as to the time of her arrival and departure from that location. Ald. Ritchie said he felt that the Mayor should be able to make use of police vehicles when representing the City, Darticularl when it is necessary to attend a number of functions taking place during one evening or afternoon.

'ORMAT: COUNCIL AGENDAS

At an earlier point in the meeting, Ald. Walker questioned the inclusion of letters from members of Council under the agenda heading 'Original Communications'. The Mayor agreed that it may be advisable to accept only letters other than those from Council members under this heading. She pointed out that items to be brought before Council by the Aldermen can be introduced in the regular way by giving notice of motion.

Ald. Brownlow also expressed concern when he was unable to present motions for which notice has been duly given by him. The Mayor explained that the agenda being dealt with at this time is a continuation of the July 6th meeting, when the notices of motion were first given, and she requested that in future, the format of the agenda be set out accordingly, rather than showing the second meeting in the month as a separate and new agenda.

MNITARY FACILITIES: On motion of Ali. Fredericks and Day, Council adopted a report NORTH STAR ROWING CLUB
 from the City Administrator, recommending that permission be granted to North Star Rowing Club to construct an 18' addition to the building used by them on the Oakwood property and to install sanitary facilitie at the Club's own cost.

UNCHASE: INFLATABLE BOAT

Another report from Mr. Moir was considered, recommending the purchase of an inflatable boat and motor, through the N. S. Sailing Assn., for use by the City Fire Dept. in conjunction with rescue and recovery operations. The cost involved is \$2,092.50 and on motion of Ald. Day and Brownlow, Council gave first approval to this overexpenditure. The Fire Chief was present to answer questions from the Council members on this item and to explain the need which his Department has for the boat.

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SETTLEMENT: .OT 43 CELTIC DR.

The City Administrator has reported to Council on a settlement R. negotiated for Lot 43, Celtic Drive, an item which was previously dealt with in December of 1975 when expropriation proceedings were authorized. A settlement price of \$3,000. has now been recommended, acceptance having been indicated by the owners, and Council agreed to adopt this recommendation on motion of Ald. Smith and Ibsen.

UGUST MEETING

Since Dartmouth Natal Day falls on August 4th, Council decided to change the date of the first Council meeting to August 10th, on motion of Ald. Day and Ritchie. Ald. Walker asked if it would not be possible to hold the P.D.O. meeting on Wednesday or Thursday evening of that same week so that items referred to Committee are not delayed. The Mayor said that staff could consider the suggestion and decide on the scheduling of the meeting.

OTICES OF MOTION: The following notices of motion were given for the next regular LD. HART Council meeting:

- 1) <u>Ald. Hart -</u> a) will introduce a motion to permit an application by the C.A.M.R. for an occupancy permit for a Group Home for the mentally retarded within an R-2 zoned area.
- b) to move that the Planning Dept. be instructed to do a study with regard to R-4 zoning, considering such factors as the rezoning of R-4 areas, stricter controls with regard to density, open green spaces and parking.
- 2) <u>Ald. Walker</u> that the City Administrator be instructed to conduct a study into the feasibility of hiring a fulltime Traffic Engineer in the City of Dartmouth.
- 3) <u>Ald. Ritchie</u> that the Solicitor draft a by-law for the City, placing a curfew on children of a certain age, with provision for fines to be paid by parents whose children are in violation of the curfew regulations.

NTION: ALD. KAVANAUGH

With the permission of Council, Ald. Kavanaugh proceeded to introduce a motion at this time, requesting from the Planning and School Administration staff, an updated forecast on projected school enrollments for the next five to ten-year period, with particular emphasis on the high school population, together with an assessment of available classroom space which might be utilized for a reallocation of high school students in other school buildings rather than having to provide a third high school. No committment would be made by Council on the appointment of an architect or the selection of a school site until the report has been made available. The motion was seconded by Ald. Smith who indicated his support for it. Ald. Fredericks suggested that information of this kind could be secured by Ald. Kavanaugh or any members of Council without delaying plans for the high school as stipulated in the motion. When the motion was put, it carried with Ald. Ibsen and Fredericks voting against.

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NQUIRIES: LD. FREDERICKS Inquiries made by Ald. Fredericks concerned:

- 1) the possibility of having the Unsightly Premises By-law enforced in connection with the portion of the Bonnie Brae trailer park which is still unoccupied.
- 2) unsightly premises at 49 Chadwick Street (duplex).
- 3) repairs required in the section of sidewalk across from the new hospital building on Pleasant St., where a deep cut has been made in the sidewalk by water washing through the area.
- 4) progress with a report requested from the Planning Dept. on zoning (Waverley Road and Pleasant St.).
- 5) any information available on the Shubenacadie Canal project; the Mayor advised that she has written a letter concerning this subject, naming Mr. Bayer as the City's representative in these discussions.
- 6) the scheduling of a meeting to deal with the Auditors' Report; the Mayor said it is planned that a meeting will be arranged for this purpose after Natal Day.

The following inquiries were made by Ald. Kavanaugh:

- 1) concerning the report requested on the future of the Boys' Club property on Main Street.
- 2) asked what could be done about a ditch between Skeena Street and Kelly Drive which has become a breeding

area for mosquitoes and in general, a problem to residents living on these two streets; he requested that the situation be looked into further and recommendations made to Council as to what should be done to correct it.

- 3) questioned the status of the pound contract; Mr. Moir advised that it is in effect, having been awarded at the figure approved in the budget.
- 4) asked when the new bus routes will become effective; Mr. Moir said he has been advised by Mr. Dooks that it will probably be by the end of July or early in August.
- Ald. Smith inquired about:
- 1) the closure of Penhorn Lake to public swimming; Mr. Moir agreed to check on this further.
- 2) the obligation which developers have to provide public washroom facilities in shopping centres; he made specific reference to the MicMac shopping centre and questioned whether regulations are being complied with there.
- 3) the drainage and flooding problem at 6, 8, and 10 Myrtle St.
- 4) An unsightly building (double house) at the corner of Hawthorne and Portland Streets. He also asked why the street has been torn up for some time at that corner. Mr. Moir explained why work has been delayed there.

Brennan said he had made an inquiry some time ago on curfew regulations and he asked to have a report on the subject prior to the next meeting; he said he would like a report from the Solicitor as well, along with an expression of opinion from the Police Chief and the Solicitor with regard to the juvenile work programs currently underway in Boston.

He asked about the status of the Interim Waterfront Development program; this inquiry was directed to the City Administrator.

Ald. Brennan asked to have a report from Planning Dept. staff and from the Traffic Authority on the north/south urban arterial, Victoria Road through to Portland Street.

Another inquiry from Ald. Brennan concerned the use of a Dawson Street property recently rezoned to commercial but not in compliance at present with the original use intended.

Ald. Hart questioned the cost of the Queen's visit to the City and asked where funds were allocated from for this purpose. She also asked about the meeting which was to have been arranged

In camera portion of the regularly called City Council meeting held this date at 7:30 p.m.

Council met in camera as Committee-of-the-Whole to deal with additional items of business.

On the basis of Council's recent decision to continue

its policy of acquiring land in the Navy Island area, Mr. Moir has completed negotiations with four property owners, recommending the following settlements in his report:

- 1) A purchase price of \$38,000. is recommended for the property at 625 Windmill Road, owned by Mrs. Edna Meaden.
- 2) Property owned by Mr. Frank Martin is recommended for acquisition at the negotiated price of \$20,000.
- 3) A purchase price of \$55,000. is recommended for the third property, owned by Mrs. Alice Bouchard.
- 4) Property owned by Mr. David Jones is recommended for purchase by the City at a negotiated price of \$18,000.

The Committee approved the adoption of Mr. Moir's report as presented, on motion of Ald. Day and Ritchie. Ald. Fredericks suggested that consideration should be given to acquiring Jack's Island in this area. The City Administrator agreed to explore the possibility further if the property comes on the market for sale.

On motion of Ald. Smith and Ibsen, the Committee approved the purchase of 15 Windmill Road, owned by the Rev. John Pitt, for the sum of \$30,000. He has indicated that he would like to rent the property from the City until such time as he can arrange for other living accommodation. Mr. Moir's report has recommended approval of the settlement negotiated.

In a report to Council, Mr. Moir has outlined the negotiations carried on for lands at Lake Major, owned by Mr. George Turner; the recommendation is that approx. ##1 acres be acquired at a negotiated price of \$900. per acre. Funds are provided in the 1976 Capital Budget for the acquisition of watershed lands. The Committee adopted this report on motion of Ald. Walker and Smith.

Dartmouth, based on his driving record as provided by the Registry of Motor Vehicles. Ald. Kavanaugh and Ritchie moved the adoption of the recommendation, but Ald. Walker suggested that Mr. Bernard be given a three-month probationary permit rather that denying a permit altogether. Most other members of Council supported the recommendation of the Police Chief and the motion carried (Ald. Hart and Walker voting against).

RECONSIDERATION: CLAYTON DEVELOP-MENTS LTD.

Notice of reconsideration has been given by Ald. Fredericks in connection with a report adopted by Council recommending a settlement negotiated with Clayton Developments Ltd. for lands owned by Clayton Developments Ltd., required for improvements to Portland Street and Caldwell Road. Ald. Fredericks stated his objection to the land use stipulation placed by the company on Parcels 28 and 29, moving that Council's action be reconsidered at this time. The motion was seconded by Ald. Kavanaugh and it carried with Ald. Walker voting against. An amendment was then proposed by Ald. Fredericks and Kavanaugh, which would eliminate the land use condition from the settlement with Clayton Developments Ltd. Mr. Cohoon explained further the intent of the condition and Mr. Moir suggested that it might be possible for the City Clerk to negotiate the type of land uses which could be permitted. Ald. Smith was in favour of this suggestion and moved deferral for further negotiation with Clayton Developments Ltd. along the lines proposed. The motion to defer was seconded by Ald. Ibsen and it carried.

On motion of Ald. Day and Kavanaugh, the Committee adjourned to reconvene in open Council.
