## 1.0 PRESENTATION

#### i) FACILITY EXCELLENCE AWARD

PESSENTATION C AWARD A presentation was made to the City at this time, by Mr. Bill Stanbrook of the Recreation Council on Disability in Nova Scotia. He formally presented the Facility Excellence Award, received by Ms. Carol Macomber of Parks & Rec. Dept., on behalf of the City. Singled out for special recognition in connection with the award, were such City facilities as the Findlay Community Centre, the Crichton Ave. Community Centre and the Albro Lake fishing dock area, all cited as commendable examples of good access and use for everyone.

Ald. McCluskey raised a point of concern about the inadequacy of wheelchair access at Northbrook School, requesting that this point be noted for future elections. Ald. Pye asked that the School Board be made aware of the general lack of satisfactory access provisions at City school generally, via front entrances.

## 2.1 CITY ADMINISTRATOR

#### 2.1.1 WYSE ROAD EXTENSION SIDEWALK

WYSE ROAD EXTENSION Mr. Burke has submitted a report on a right-of-way required from Maritime Tel & Tel, in order to proceed with construction of a walkway from Albro Lake Road to Farrell Road, along the Wyse Road Extension. It is <u>recommended</u> that the City accept a proposal from Maritime Tel & Tel, for use of their land,

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involving a six-month lease arrangement and investigation of possible future purchase of the land, with cost to be included in the 1992/93 capital budget estimates.

## 3.0 APPOINTMENT OF DEPUTY MAYOR

Deputy Mayor McCluskey thanked Council for their support, after which she was congratulated by Mayor Savage and by retiring Deputy Mayor MacFarlane. Ald. MacFarlane thanked Council for the opportunity to have served in this capacity during the past year, and he was commended by the Mayor for his service to the City.

## 4.0 APPOINTMENTS TO BOARDS & COMMITTEES

It was determined that this provision is not intended to be retroactive, but will begin with upcoming new appointments.

> The second point of clarification dealt with the requirement that <u>citizens appointed have to be Dartmouth residents</u>. It was established that this requirement will apply, except in situations involving specific organizational appointees. It will, however, be suggested to those organizations that in future, they try to recommend Dartmouth residents to represent them. Also, a one-year period of grace will be allowed for long-standing appointments to be completed, as in the case of Mr. Douglas, who has served for ten years as Chairman of the Industrial Commission.

> Following the resolution of these two issues, members were willing to proceed with appointments, taking into consideration all of the applications that have been received from citizens, in response to the City advertisement.

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In all instances where applications were received for specifically-named Boards or Committees, a vote was taken by secret ballot, including both the names of applicants, along with the names of existing citizen members still interested in continuing to serve. Nominations were also received from the floor, and the names of any nominees were included for purposes of the vote by secret ballot.

# CONCERNS OF COUNCIL MEMBERS OR QUESTIONS

ALD. MCCLUSKEY

4.0

Ald. McCluskey referred to the October report from the Fire Chief and expressed concern about the number of false alarms reported. The Mayor asked Ald. Hetherington to comment on the by-law resulting from the work of the committee appointed to look into alarm problems in both the Police and Fire Departments. He gave an update on the status of the by-law and there were further comments from the Solicitor on the efforts to achieve uniformity among local municipalities, in dealing with alarm systems and their control. It is hoped that the by-law can come to Council by next month, with or without agreement from the other municipal units.

Ald. McCluskey's other concern was about the Social Services caseload, and the fact that workers in the department are carrying up to 135 cases each, with the result that clients are waiting up to a week to be seen. Mr. Burke has asked Paul Greene for a report to be brought to Council on the Social Services situation.

Ald. Pye asked how soon the report would be available, and Mr. Burke said he hoped it would be ready for the next agenda.

ALD. WALTON Ald. Walton commended the manner in which Ald. Rodgers conducted the Waste-to-Energy information meeting held on November 13th, under what Ald. Walton described as less than hospitable circumstances.

ALD. MAY

Ald. May indicated concern about provocation at the information meeting, and tactics on the part of certain people attending, which interfered with the information process and intimidated citizens who had come to the meeting for that purpose.

ALD. SARTO On behalf of residents of Juniper Terrace, located at the back of the K-Mart Mall, Ald. Sarto requested that attention be given to unsightly garbage bins behind the IGA store at that location; request noted by Mr. Burke.

ALD. LEVANDIER Ald. Levandier asked if a presentation of the Waterfront Development Plan could be made by the consultants to downtown residents, a request previously made by him and Ald. May at the November 12th meeting. The Mayor said he would speak to Mr. Burke and Mr. Rath, to see if members of staff could make the presentation.

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Ald. Levandier felt the City should be taking a position on the proposed bridge fare increases, which he strongly objected to for a number of reasons.

ALD. HAWLEY & HETHERINGTON

Other members of Council with similar objections were Ald. Hetherington and Hawley. They were in favour of a motion, indicating the City's opposition to the increases, especially at this time, given the state of the economy. A motion to this effect, for communication to the PUB, was presented.

ALD. MACFARLANE

Ald. MacFarlane suggested that it would be timely to have a presentation from Bridge Commission representatives, so they could explain their rationale for proposing the increases in the first place. The Mayor said he felt they would be prepared to do that.

Deputy Chief Cole was asked for comment on a concern raised by Ald. MacFarlane about policing in the downtown and perceived problems referred to by Ald. MacFarlane.

Ald. MacFarlane asked if it would be possible to have an update presentation on the harbour clean-up, since there are growing concerns in the community about escalating costs associated with this project. The Mayor said there would be no problem with a presentation, as requested.

Deputy Chief Cole was asked for a report on speeding ALD. THOMPSON problems in the east end of Dartmouth and police surveillance efforts to deal with the problem, also indicating how many tickets are being given out for speeding.

ALD. HETHERINGTON Ald. Hetherington asked if any further information has been received on the extension of Highway 107, to relieve some of the Burnside traffic congestion. The Mayor gave an update on the status of the Environmental Assessment relating to this project. Ald. Hetherington requested that the Mayor write to the Province and try to get some definite information on the start of the extension, in view of the traffic situation in Burnside.

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Ald. Hetherington asked for information on the cost of street openings (for sewer projects) in Dartmouth, Bedford, Halifax City, and Halifax County. (This refers to the cost to residents for street openings.)

ALD. GREENOUGH

Ald. Greenough asked what became of the request to have the Metropolitan Authority look at the policy of tipping fees charged to residents who take garbage to the transfer station on their own, from their own properties.

Mr. MacEachern, who later assisted with the Waste-to-Energy presentation to Council, said the tipping fee is an integral part of the integrated waste management program, and it would be difficult to get into exemptions from charging the fee. Several members of Council then raised points of concern about the random dumping of garbage that is taking place at various locations, as a result of the tipping fee policy. They felt this problem is becoming worse as time goes on. The Mayor asked that members of Council identify all such problem areas to the City Engineer, for his information.

Ald. Greenough commended Mr. Burke for making parking arrangements for female staff members attending Council meetings.

ALD. RODGERS Ald. Rodgers thanked members of Council for their support in connection with his chairing of the information meeting at Dartmouth High on November 13th. He felt that if public meetings such as this are only serving as a forum for lobby groups, it may be preferable to disseminate information, for those who really want to receive it, in some better way. He suggested that alternate possibilities be considered.

#### DISCUSSION PAPER #6 - WASTE TO ENERGY INCINERATION

S<sup>-</sup> 'ING CRITERIA: WAJFE TO ENERGY INCINERATION

i)

Prior to the presentation of Discussion Paper #6, Waste to Energy Incineration, Mr. R. MacEachern, who was present with Mr. Brian Smith, addressed concerns previously referred to (page 4 of minutes) about tipping fees and problems associated with random dumping, noted by members of Council. Ald. Greenough and MacFarlane maintained that some provision should be made to exempt householders from the fee, when they come to the transfer station with garbage and refuse from their own properties. Ald. May suggested a change in the allowable weight limit, from 200 to 1,000 pounds, as a way of resolving the problem. The Mayor asked Ald. Rodgers and Ald. Levandier to take the issue up further with the Metropolitan Authority, in view of Council's concerns.

Mr. Brian Smith proceeded with the presentation to Council, first reviewing the background to the Integrated Waste Management Strategy, and going on to the subject of the siting criteria and related aspects of the incineration proposal. An exterior drawing of the facility itself was shown to Council, after which Mr. MacEachern explained in detail the interior workings of the facility and the processes involved in converting waste to power, through the combustion process. Environmental considerations were outlined, and protective measures, such as the continuous monitoring system, automatic shut-down, compliance with federal and provincial requirements, were explained.

In response to questions from Ald. Woods about the siting of the incinerator in an industrial park, Mr. MacEachern said it makes good sense to put it in such a location.

Ald. Woods pursued the point further, in relation to Burnside Park, indicating his objection to additional stacks for emission in the north end of Dartmouth, which already has the Tufts Cove generating plant located there. Ald. Pye also objected to a Burnside site for the incinerator, and Ald.Woodslater asked how input can be made on the proposed criteria, to address the objections made by him and Ald. Pye. Mr. MacEachern said there would be<sup>7n</sup>opportunity for input and representation during the environmental assessment process. The Mayor said it may be a good idea to set up a 'Watch Committee', such as the one formerly in existence, accessible to the public for their comments and concerns.

Questions from Ald. Rodgers about the refusal of building permits by a municipality opposed to a particular site, were discussed by him with the Solicitor. It was noted that while a building permit would have to be issued if there was compliance with zoning and other requirements, the municipality could still deny any sale of land that might be required for site purposes.

Other questions from Ald. Woods concerned the cost of the incinerator and air quality sampling and measurements (ie. existing levels, especially in areas where there are already emissions from plants). Further to the cost, the Mayor and Ald. Rodgers explained why accurate information cannot be provided for some time, especially since it will have to be based on site specific data.

The Mayor thanked Metropolitan Authority staff for their attendance and for making their presentation to Council.

## 1.0 CONCERNS OF COUNCIL MEMBERS OR QUESTIONS

ALD. MCCLUSKEY

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(A)

Ald. McCluskey received permission to present the following motion for Council's adoption:

WHEREAS municipal leaders and managers must be effective strategists if Dartmouth is to fulfil its mission and satisfy constituents in the years ahead;

AND WHEREAS strategic planning will develop the procedures and operations necessary for the long-range direction which Dartmouth must take;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Council make a commitment to the development of a strategic plan for Dartmouth.

Ald. McCluskey again brought up the problem of people who are not cleaning up after their dogs; Mr. Burke will take the matter up with the Police Dept.

Ald. McCluskey said she was pleased that additional workers have been provided in the Social Services Dept., to help with the heavy caseload.

ALD. SARTO

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Ald. Sarto asked for a follow-up on his concern about flashing lights that are not operating at present, at the Portland Street/Jersey Drive pedestrian crossing.

Ald. Sarto also requested that attention be given to bus shelters that are located in poorly-lighted areas; the Mayor agreed that this is a concern worth addressing.

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ALD. HETHERINGTON Ald. Hetherington requested a crosswalk and overhead crosswalk sign at High Street & Everette Street, where children are crossing back and forth to the tot lot, for their protection.

> Ald. Hetherington asked if Council could have a report from the Police Dept. on the actual number of parking tickets issued by them during the last twelve-month period, as compared with the twelve previous months. He felt there is considerable abuse of parking regulations being overlooked by police on duty, also, a revenue loss to the City.

- ALD. THOMPSON Ald. Thompson's question concerned the status of the proposed roadway extension from Baker Street, behind businesses on Portland Street. Mr. Burke provided information on the discussions that took place with interested business representatives, but there has been nothing further on the proposal recently. The Mayor suggested that Ald. Thompson might want to follow up on the matter himself, to determine just where it stands.
- ALD. MACFARLANE Ald. MacFarlane explained the cause of additional traffic and speeding on Chestnut Lane, as a result of the short left-turning cycle at the Portland/Gaston Road traffic lights; motorists are therefore choosing to turn left on Chestnut Lane instead. He asked to have the problem looked at by the Traffic Coordinator, for consideration of a timing adjustment in the lights; also, that extra police surveillance be provided on Chestnut Lane, to deal with the speeding problem.

Ald. MacFarlane's other concern was about the significant number of break & enter crimes throughout the City. The Mayor advised that he has asked for a report for the next Police Commission report on December 2nd.

ALD. WALTON Ald. Walton's first concern was about the abuse of handicapped parking designations in shopping malls, and the question of ticketing cars for this offence on private property. The Mayor will have this point checked out by the Solicitor.

> In response to Ald. Walton's second question, Mayor Savage said he had no further information at present on the future of Dartmouth Marine slips.

ALD. PYE Both points raised by Ald. Pye related to the additional Social Services workers: first, are the two workers enough, and secondly, is Council's approval required for the over-expenditure represented by their salaries. Mr. Burke said the present one-week time delay will be reduced considerably with the two additional workers, and the over-expenditure does not require Council approval, since there is no new service or expansion of service involved.

- The Mayor brought Council's attention to a 4,000-year-old brick, displayed on a stand and received from the High Commissioner for Pakistan, representing the wall being built there by young people. The brick was on display in the Council Chamber during the meeting.
  - 2.0 PRESENTATIONS
    - i) VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN Introductory remarks were made by Deputy Mayor McCluskey to the Violence Against Women presentation. She commented on the response to the work of the Task Force, especially the large number of people attending the public forum at the MicMac Mall Speaker's Corner.

Ms. Moira Legere, Chair of the Task Force, then addressed Council, bringing to the attention of members the fact sheets and questionnaire circulated with the agenda for this Council meeting. She commended the work of her Task Force members, and the overwhelming public response being received. She stressed the priority this issue should have in the Dartmouth community, and solicited the support of Council in setting this priority. Points that came out of the Council discussion with Ms. Legere were as follows:

 basic attitude changes are needed to address the problem of violence against women, and these changes have to start with children. The need for women to be treated with equality and dignity was singled out by Ms. Legere as the primary change required in addressing violence issues.

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- 2) it was suggested that a presentation be made by the Task Force to the School Board, in view of the importance of the school system in changing attitudes during formative years.
- 3) the need for stiffer penalties in the case of crimes involving abuse and violence, more of a deterrent than the judicial system is presently willing to provide with short sentences that can be served on weekends.
- 4) there should be some tangible expression of a community approach to violence and abuse, through specific awareness initiatives.
- 5) In addition to the problems of physical and: sexual abuse, the Task Force should also be looking at situations involving verbal and mental abuse, which can be equally damaging.

The approach the Task Force has taken was commended by Council several times, and the Mayor said they should take as long as necessary in completing their report for Council, in view of the public response and the large number of people wanting to be heard and participate in the informationgathering process. Police officers Poirier and Snow were acknowledged by the Mayor for their contribution to the work of the Task Force on behalf of the City Police Dept.

## HALIFAX HARBOUR CLEANUP INC. - MR. PAUL CALDA

Mr. Paul Calda, President of the Halifax Harbour Cleanup Inc., was present for the next item. He reviewed for Council the progress of the environmental assessment, required before the harbour cleanup project can proceed further. He advised that about three million dollars has been expended in consulting fess and expenses associated with the consulting assignments. The environmental report, in its final form, is due by the end of July, 1992, and ultimately, it will have to receive ministerial approval at both the Federal and Provincial levels. The goal for the start of design and construction is the end of 1993 or early in 1994.

Mr. Calda pointed out that estimates of cost for the project cannot be prepared until the environmental assessment is finished. If the decision is then made to proceed with the project, it could be completed within five years of the start of the design.

(Ald. Hetherington left the meeting at this point.)

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HALIFAX HARBOUR CLEANUP

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A general Council discussion period followed, during which Mr. Calda answered as many questions as he was able to, with information he now has available to him. The main concerns expressed were about the lengthy delay in getting the project started and the apparent lack of any progress, which is disturbing to the public who are continuing to pay additional amounts through their water bills, without seeing any evidence of a harbour cleanup for the costs being charged to them. It was felt that considerable effort should be made from this point to communicate better with the public and provide them with as much basic information as possible, in order to address some of their questions. Some concise statements of fact, inserted through newspaper advertsements, were suggested, also, a wider circulation of information sheets being put out now by Halifax Harbour Cleanup Inc.

Ald. Cunningham requested copies of previous reports and information material that has been previously circulated to Council in connection with this item.

Members of Council felt there should be some definite efforts made to expedite the project overall and the environmental assessment specifically. Ald. Woods questioned the extent of the delay that can be attributed to the Environmental Control Council itself, through the unrealistic requirements they have established. At his request, the Mayor agreed to write to the Council, asking what is taking so long to finish the assessment. Mr. Calda noted that the letter of concern forwarded by Mayor Savage to the Minister, has been taken into consideration by him and may result in some action.

Ald. Levandier asked that consideration again be given to a reduction in the surcharge for the harbour cleanup, reflected in the increased water charges, in the present difficult financial climate. Ald. May suggested that a longer term investment of the harbour cleanup fund be looked at, as well as a possible pooling of funds with the other metro municipalities, for investment purposes.

At the conclusion of the general discussion, Mr. Calda was thanked by the Mayor for his attendance and exchange of information with Council.
