# COMMON AND PUBLIC GARDENS REPORT.

# REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COMMON AND PUBLIC GARDENS.

### To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council.

HALIFAX, October 31st, 1889.

GENTLEMEN,-

The close of another year's work of the Common and Public Garden Commissioners calls for a report of the operations under their supervision during the past twelve months, and a recapitulation of some points in connection with the history of the various grounds constituting the "Public Gardens" and Common of Halifax may prove of interest, particularly for future reference.

And first, in regard to the Public Gardens which are uppermost in the public mind and admiration. They truly had "a small beginning," and in this wise. Some eighteen years ago there happened to be members of the then Common Commissioners several gentlemen who were enthusiastic amateur horticulturists, and on that plot which lies just to the east of the pond, (then a briar grown, weedy, boggy, sheet of water) a few flower beds were laid out roughly; the annuals which were planted there, were contributed by the gentlemen referred to, from their hothouses. The "idea" took with the public; they were an oasis in a desert, pleasing to the eye and appealing to the love of the beautiful. In a year or two a suggestion was made that the corresponding field to the west of the pond, low-lying, marshy and overgrown with brambles should be filled in and made to correspond with the eastern This was done; an immense amount of ground was part. "made" thereon and in a very short time it presented an aspect which corresponded with that which had been first laid out, and the surroundings of the pond were also improved and made more systematic.

Going back in the years it is found that first and last there has been a great deal of money and labor expended upon the Common and Public Gardens The first part of the former cleared was some forty or fifty acres for the use of the military in the North Eastern Corners. This was done by the Imperial Government and at an early period in the history of Halifax

### COMMON AND PUBLIC GARDENS REPORT.

The uncleared portion of the Common, more than three fourths of the whole, remained in a very rough state, chiefly bog and swamp, and for a large part of the year overflowed with water, until the town was incorporated in 1841. Shortly after that date a number of lots lying on the south side of Spring Garden Road were leased on long leases of 999 years, each lot being chargeable with a ground rent which was reserved for the general improvement of the common. About the same time another issue of lots on the North side of Spring Garden Road and on similar long leases was made to the Horticultural Society, and in 1848 some additional lots were leased to the same society for 33 years. The rent however charged to the Horticultural Society was only nominal.

In 1870, or thereabouts, the committee of management for the Common, at that time consisting of six aldermen, began the laying out of a Public Garden upon some rough ground immediately north of the lots under lease to the Horticultural Society and in 1874 by an act of the Provincial Legislature the city purchased the leases and improvements of the Horticultural Society for \$15,000 which is now part of the funded debt of the city. By the act of 1874 the management of the Common and Public Gardens was entrusted to ten commissioners, six of whom are members of the City Council and four citizens not members of the said Council but appointed by that body. The dividing fencing between the City Gardens and the Horticultural Society's (starting at where the old rink building stood) was then removed and the Public Gardens in there present limits came into existence.

Up to the passing of the act of 1874 the sole means at the disposal of the committee of Common were derived from the leased lots and the product of certain fields which had been cleared from time to time, the whole yearly income not exceeding at that time \$1200; but with this limited revenue an immense amount of good work was performed in the way of drainage, making roads, planting trees, etc. Since the purchase of the Horticultural Society's leases, in 1874, the Gardens have received an annual appropriation from the city of \$2000, which in 1888 was increased to \$3000. Occasional special grants have also been from time to time made for special purposes and the gardens have also the interest derived from the money received for lots commuted, amounting now to between \$300 and \$400 per annum.

### COMMON AND PUBLIC GARDENS REPORT.

Year by year, since the Gardens passed into the hands of the city, the grounds have been enlarged and beautified. In 1875 a propagating house, 8 by 19 feet, was erected at a cost of \$2000, and it is now found that the building is too small for the large number of valuable plants which have accumulated. Plans have been prepared and the work of erecting an additional building commenced. It will be located on the east side of the present one. The dimensious will be 40 by 20 and 16 feet in height, with a shed, 26 by 14, attached for storage purposes. When the conservatory is completed, which will be in a few weeks, the facilities in the propagating line will be everything that will be required for some years to come.

During the past summer most extensive improvements have been carried out. The cottage in the centre of the Gardens has been completely renovated; the band-stand and the entire fencing around the ground repainted, summer-house and drinking fountain erected and the drainage thoroughly overhauled.

The old rink building on Park Street, which, in its dilapidated condition, deteriorated from the beauty of the grounds, was torn down last spring, and in its place is being erected a well planned entrance building which will be an ornament to the street and gardens. The cost of the building and furnishing will be in the vicinity of \$3500. The frontage of the new building is 65 feet and depth 15 feet, not including the pavillion attached. Excavation is being made on the west side of the building for a pond 46 by 75 feet. There will be space in the centre for a handsome fountain which, perhaps, some of our public spirited citizens will feel like erecting. The grounds between the building and the pond are being graded and will be sodded as soon as the earth settles sufficiently. The deer will shortly be removed from their present location to the west side of the old green house on Sackville Street and the entire ground, from the entrance building to Spring Garden Road, graded and made ready for beautifying when the spring opens.

In all the improvements which have been made the work has been done by contract and in almost every case the greatest satisfaction given.

Besides the overseeing of the Gardens the commissioners have under their control the north common and the several

small parks throughout the city, all of which require more or less outlay.

The area of the Gardens is now seventeen and a half acres, all of which has been more or less improved and beautified.

The Superintendent, Mr. Richard Power, was appointed to that position in 1872, and has been mainly instrumental in bringing the Gardens to their present state of perfection,—the admiration of strangers and the delight of our citizens.

During the past year the various trees in the Gardens, some of which are of very rare and valuable kinds, have been neatly labelled with their appropriate names.

Appended will be found a financial statement for the past ten years which will give our citizens an idea as to where the money comes from to keep up "the Gardens" and how it is expended. The usual detailed statement for the year, prepared by the City Auditor, will appear among the auditor's accounts.

#### WATER DEPARTMENT.

During the year there were 10,095 lineal feet of distribution pipes laid, varying from 3 inches to 12 inches in diameter, and 5,766 lineal feet of service pipes to houses.

The 15 inch high and 24 inch low service mains leading to the city were cleaned late in the Autumn of 1888 by hydraulic scrapers in the usual way. The length was 42,900 feet (or over 8 miles) which was cleaned in this manner, at a total cost of \$22,59 and 4,125 feet of 3 inch pipes were cleaned by hand scrapers at a cost of \$90.09.

156 houses received water supply, 13 old service pipes were renewed, 4 domestic hydrants were put down and 15 fire hydrants, making the total number now in use 335.

Necessary repairs were effected to the dams and head works at the Chain Lakes costing \$397,74, and a new and permanent masonry sluice and bulk-head wall were provided at the north gate house Lower Chain Lake at a cost of \$1196,05.

The chief matters in connection with the department requiring the earnest attention of the City Council and the citizens generally are the following :—

1.—The control of the consumption and stoppage of the excessive waste of water within the city.

- 2.—The more general use of water meters.
- 3.—Improving the head works of the low service supply with the view to increasing the efficiency of that service.
- 4.—Rigidly guarding the high service supply so that it may not be altogether ruined by unjustifiable extensions into low service districts.

- 5.—Investigation into the best practicable means of increasing the efficiency of the high service supply with the special view to obviating the existing danger of exhausting the water from that source during any season of long continuous dry weather.
- 6.—The advisability of constructing a Low Service Distributing Reservoir in the neighbourhood of Camp Hill.

It seems unnecessary for me to enter into particulars respecting the unsatisfactory condition of the water service as I have already done so in previous reports to which I would respectfully refer.

#### SEWERS.

All the sewers constructed during the year were builtentirely of concrete blocks manufactured at the Poor House by pauper labour. The only sewer built by contract was that in Agricola St. The total length built was 2138 feet. The total cost was \$8,133,43, and the sewerage rates will amount to \$4,726,27.

ENGINEER'S REPORT

CITY

#### STREETS AND ROADS.

The work in this department has within recent years gradually been passing out of the immediate control of the Board of Works and into the hands of each ward commissioner for his own separate ward. There are six commissioners, each directing the affairs of his own ward, and the expenditure of the money without reference to the others, in fact, in precisely the same manner as if each ward were a separate municipality.

Having on previous occasions called special attention to desirable and possible improvements in this department, and to the very objectionable manner in which much of the work is done, I feel that it would perhaps be unbecoming in me to say more at present than that the whole system appears to need revision.

#### THE DRY DOCK.

Work on this undertaking has been carried on diligently and satisfactorily during the year. On some portions of the work gangs of men were employed both by day and night in order to hasten the completion as much as possible.

#### GENERAL.

There is a great deal of work which ought to be done in and in connection with this office, especially relating to the Water Department, which it would be hopeless for any one man occupying the position of Engineer and Superintendent to attempt, single handed to perform or to overtake.

It may be thought by some to be economy to save the salary of a properly qualified professional assistant or assistants in the Engineer's office, but in most other communities (some much smaller than this), they have come to the opposite conclusion. In the most advanced the engineer is empowered to employ such additional assistance to his permanent staff, from time to time, as he may deem advisable. The adoption of a similar course here ought to produce beneficial results, and would in my opinion be considerably more economical in the long run than the present system of "saving at the spigott and wasting at the bung-hole."
