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OFFICE OF CITY AUDITOR,

HALIFAX, 8th July, 1890.

Sir :

In accordance with rule it becomes my duty to submit to Your Worship and the City Council a statement of the financial affairs of the City for the year ending 30th April, 1890.

The first item for consideration is the most important, and it is one that is always interesting, namely, the amount of the civic funded debt. By reference to the schedule published in the Annual Report of last year, page 223, it will be seen that the total funded liability of the City on 30th April, 1889, for general purposes, sewerage, water supply and public schools, was \$1,923,978.46. This total was divided as follows:

Though doubtless known to many members of the City Council, I may here remark that the interest of the debt due for the Water Department is and always has been paid out of the water rates and revenues, and the interest on school debentures, though paid at the office of the school commissioners is and always has been included in the estimates for

annual assessment by the City. Though the rate of interest has much declined of late years-most of the recent city loans having been effected at a trifle over four per cent. interest and some even less-there is still a large amount of the civic debt paying 5, 51 and 6 per cent. Under the consolidation act of 1880, all the loans that could be disturbed were replaced at a great saving of interest, but unfortunately in some of the borrowing acts the provision for renewal in three or five years was omitted and of course, in such cases, no action can be taken until the full time for payment expires. In this connection I may state that the oldest water debentures-those issued for the purchase and enlargement of the water works in 1861, and to run for 30 years-will fall due on 1st July, 1891. These debentures amount to \$284,000 Nova Scotia currency, and are mostly paying 6 per cent. interest. Following close upon these, other water debentures will mature in 1892, and for several successive years thereafter, so that, as I have hinted in a previous report. it will not be very long before the water debt, as a separate liability, will be extinguished by absorption into the general consolidated debt of the city. The interest, however, of the water debt will continue to be charged to the department and the revenues from it will be reserved for its exclusive use as heretofore. The conversion of so large a proportion of 6 and 51 per cent. debentures into something like 4 per cent. will make a very appreciable difference in the available revenue of the water department.

The loans effected during the civic year which closed on 30th April, 1890, were \$55,000 for City Hall and furnishing, taken at four per cent. interest, half per cent. premium, \$20,000 for sewerage and \$23,600 for amount due the provincial government, both of these last at a trifle over four per cent. These loans united amount to \$98,600, which makes the total funded debt of the city on 30th April, 1890, \$2,022,578.46. The smaller loans contracted during the year -\$3000 for the Carnival and \$5000 for the Public Gardens -are not included in the funded debt, as they are payable by instalments in the annual assessment, one loan extending over three years and the other over five.

It might not be uninteresting to note as an item of civic history that the first permanent loan for civic purposes, the

nucleus of our present large funded debt was effected in 1831, about ten years before the town of Halifax was incorporated, the amount being nine thousand pounds, or thirty-six thousand dollars, old Nova Scotia currency. With this money several streets running north and south, previously hilly, were cut down, and in others hollows were filled up, and most of the large stone sewers in the streets running east and west were constructed. The streets at that time were under the management of a board of special commissioners. It may excite surprise that so much work was done for comparatively so small an amount of money, but it must be remembered that in 1831 and for years afterwards the rate of wages for ordinary laboring men was from two shillings and sixpence to three shillings a day—that is to say, from 50 to 60 cents.

The amount assessed upon the citizens for all civic purposes except water supply in the year closing 30th April, 1890, was \$268,000, and the rate per centum was \$1.24. Of this assessment there remained uncollected on 30th April, 1890, a balance of \$51,195.76, including \$13,773 allowed for short collection. Of the previous year's assessment, that is to say, 1888-9, the balance uncollected at the same date including the allowance for short collection, was \$27,184.91. The assessment for 1887-88 was collected entirely, with the exception of about three hundred dollars. The amount of revenue from the water department during the year just named was \$63,824.

The General Assessment for the present civic year 1890-91 is \$290,000, and the rate per centum is \$1.33. The fact that the assessment of the present year exceeds that of last year by \$22,000 seems to require some explanation. It will be found on comparison of the estimates named that the estimates for 1890-91 include \$5000 first instalment of subsidy to the Graving Dock, an increase of \$6900 in the maintenance of the Public Schools, an addition of \$1000 to the appropriation for Parks and about \$4000 additional to the Interest account for various new loans. From the total of the present year's assessment but \$16,887 was deducted and charged to the unexpended balances whereas in the previous year's estimate the sum of \$21,246.63 was taken from that fund, making a difference in this item of \$4359. These sums added together will just about account for the increase in the assessment of the present year.

Some of the figures in the table of valuations hereto annexed may cause enquiry. Contrary to expectation, considering the great number of new buildings erected during the past year, the total valuation of real estate returned for 1890-91 is less than the amount returned for 1889-90. The difference is about \$251,000. The total valuation of property, personal and real, assessed in the present year does indeed exceed the valuation of the year just previous by about \$55,-000, there being a considerable increase both in private personal property and in the returns from banks and companies. Such increase, however, is often accidental or temporary, and is no test of progress. The true test, and indeed only trustworthy test, is the value of real estate; that is to say, providing always that valuations are made judiciously and upon a uniform system. The apparent falling off in the valuations of real estate for 1890-91 is explained in this way by the assessors. The large property of the Halifax Gas Company -about \$400,000-is not this year included in the real estate of ward one, but assessed as capital among banks and companies. Again, in ward six, the property of the Graving Dock, which has hitherto been assessed, is this year exempt, this being the first of the five years exemption under the act of 1881. The withdrawal of these two large assessable properties, one at the south end of the City and the other at the north, will account for the apparent decrease in valuation. As a matter of fact, the real estate of the City has increased considerably during the past year.

The revenue of the City, apart from taxes, during the civic year just closed, does not differ materially from that of former years. It may be noted as a not unpleasing feature of the civic revenues, that while the income from cabs, trucks, auction and exhibition licenses generally, comes up to the estimate and shows a tendency to increase, the returns of fines and fees from the police court and police office for the past two or three years, show a marked diminution as compared with previous returns. The detailed expenditures as well as receipts of the different departments will be found as usual among the accounts in the annual report. The following are the valuations as returned by the assessors
