When the City was first incorporated, and for several years thereafter, the Corporation consisted of the Mayor, six Aldermen. and twelve Common Councillors —the Mayor being elected by the Council. W. Caldwell was the first Mayor elected by the citizens. About the same time the office of Common Councillor was abolished, since which the Council has consisted of the Mayor and eighteen Aldermen.

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Report of Public Gardens Committee.

HALIFAX, March 5th, 1896.

To Chairman Public Gardens and Common :---

Sir,-I beg to hand you my official report of the work and improvements for the past year.

Gardens.—The Bandstand has been repaired and painted according to contract and makes a handsome appearance, admired by all who visit the gardens.

Fifty new iron and hardwood garden seats have been added to the ones we had in use the previous year and are a great acquisition to the gardens, being a great improvement on the old style. We will now be in a position to give seating room for 1000 persons.

The bare patch of ground by the tool house has been filled in and raised to an ornamental mound and will be planted the coming season with shrubs and vines.

The Grand Entrance Pavilion has been asphalted and is a great improvement on the loose gravel hitherto covering it.

The summer house has had two coats of paint which will keep it in good order for some time to come.

I had imported a collection of Foreign Water Lilies, which to our surprise are quite at home in our severe climate. They are the admiration of strangers and citizens generally, and will improve as they grow older.

Our concerts were not so successful as in the previous year, as there were no outside attractions to induce people to visit the city.

The Superintendent's residence, corner of South Park Street and Sackville, has been repaired and painted, which was included in last years contract for painting, &c.

The Green Houses have been repaired and painted. We are now using hard coal in the furnaces with better results than when using soft coal, being safer and giving a more uniform temperature, and I think, at a saving.

The trees surrounding the common have been attended to, pruned, manured, and given a general overhauling.

Mulgrave Park fence has been repaired and whitewashed. A new piece of fence has been erected, walks repaired and provided with some of the wooden seats originally in the Gardens.

Grafton Park.—We filled in 150 loads of earth and regraded the surface—it being very uneven—and resowed with lawn grass seed, provided seats, &c., also laid down the principal walk 12×200 in asphalt; this was much needed as it is a great thoroughfare from Spring Garden Road to the city, and is greatly appreciated.

The Esplanade.—We kept the Esplanade in as good repair as it was possible under the circumstances. We also placed a number of seats on the ground. This favored spot is destined to be a great resort to pleasure seekers.

In September last the Commissioners kindly gave me three weeks leave of absence. The time I devoted to visiting the Parks, Gardens, &c., in the United States, in order that I might introduce some novelties in our own gardens on my return. I was somewhat disappointed with the Public Garden in Boston. I may say it is nicely situated but unattractive to my eye, it may possibly look better in the spring with its season flowers. Its most attractive part is the main walk, bridge and pond. Its bedding of plants is a very expensive one. The principal beds are replanted four or five times during the season. First bulbs and pansies, next, hydranges, then roses, and after that, with tropical plants, palms, ferns, crotons, caladiums, aloes and begonias, and in October chrysanthemums. To supply this

style of gardening they have covered three acres with glass and erected two houses 40 feet high and 150×30 with a number of small houses running parallel between.

Beside this there are a number of cold frames and storage houses. All this necessitates a number of men to keep changing and growing plants.

I noticed that they do not keep their lawns, walks and verges in the trim order we keep ours. I think I have benefited by my trip, and our Gardens will get the benefit of the little I have picked up during my short absence. I need not say anything respecting Parks, Squares, &c., as I saw nothing of any importance to report upon.

Before concluding I must not forget to say that I was very much interested in the Arnold Arboretum with its exotic trees, plants and vines, it is a grand school for the rising Botanical student. Each plant is named, order, and class. It is certainly worth a visit from any of our citizens who may have the time to spare when visiting Boston.

Address of M. E. Keefe, Esq.

THE FOLLOWING ADDRESS FROM THE RETIRING MAYOR, M. E. KEEFE, ESQ., WAS SUBMITTED TO THE CITY COUNCIL AT A MEETING HELD ON 26TH APRIL, 1895.

To the Members of the City Council:

Gentlemen,-In retiring from office I have thought that it would not be amiss to say a few words in parting and take a retrospective glance at the work that has been perfected and the progress made in the nine years that I have had the honor of a seat in the Council, six as an Alderman for Ward Two and three as Mayor, and in that way give an account of my stewardship; and only as an Assistant do I lay claim to any credit in the various progressive steps that have been taken during that period by the City Council for the general good. When I came into the City Council nine years ago it was evident to me that while the intentions of those who had gone before were to place the City in a good sanitary condition, and at considerable expense a sewerage plan of the City had been prepared (in fact twelve hundred dollars was paid to the Assistants City Engineer Keating had executing the plans) it was to me apparent that we would be unable to do anything or the City at large with the law as it then stood, which required property owners to put down a cash deposit of \$1.25 per foot frontage ; as in a great many cases owners who were perfectly willing to pay their proportion were not in funds to do so, and in other cases where the owner was eager to have the work done his adjoining neighbour had made some temporary arrangement that satisfied him, and as a consequence he would not put up the deposit, and in that way we were handicapped and could not advance the work with this state of affairs. I looked about for a remedy, and at a meeting of the Council held March 22nd, 1887, I moved a resolution which was favorably entertained by the Council and passed, wherein it was proposed to give property owners ten years in which to pay their proportion of frontage rates. The Recorder was instructed to draft an Act for submission to the Legislature embodying this idea, which was done ; but when submitted to the Committee on Bills in the House it was not reported up. This having come to our notice I called the attention of the Council to it, and by unanimous consent I was allowed to call the matter up again and get a resolution passed on April 28th, 1887, again calling upon the House to pass the bill, which in compliance with our wishes, was done; but the bill was shorn of its money power to enable us to carry it out. The citizens by this time having been thoroughly aroused as to the necessity of proper sanitary provision joined with the Council at a subsequent meeting of the Legislature and pressed upon them the needs of the City in this respect, and an Act was passed placing ample funds at our disposal for some time. This, the citizens lost no time in taking advantage of, and as a consequence the Works Department has not been able as yet to overtake the demands made upon it. To illustrate the advantage that has been taken of this Act and how much it was needed previous to its passage, say from 74' to 87', we had but 41 sewers including the mains, total length 26,166 ft. while since its passage, to comply with the wishes of the people who have kept up an incessant clamor for sewerage facilities, we have built 132 sewers, total length, 62,184 ft., so that in the near future we shall have the City and suburbs placed in a good sanitary condition, which is something to be thankful for, and I have yet to hear of a tax-payer who disapproves of the money spent to forward this object.

Various improvements and extentions of the water service have taken place during this time, and it is gratifying to know that whilst we have been enabled to extend the water North, South, East and West, the revenue derived from this source has permitted us to make frequent reductions from the original rates and place at the disposal of the citizens a water supply equal to, if not superior, to that enjoyed in any other City.

In consequence of the great advances made in electrical service we have the City lighted by electricity, which, although costing a larger sum annually is a boon that no citizen would now forego for a corresponding reduction in his taxes.

The new City Hall has also been completed. The corner stone

was laid on the 21st June, 1887, the work was pushed forward and accomplished since, and we have now a Hall that does our City credit and that will compare favorably with the public buildings in cities of far more pretentions.

The present Poors' Asylum was erected and equipped at considerable cost to the City, but in that institution the Poor are generously cared for and the rules governing the asylum which were submitted 15th August, 1887, have with modifications that have occasionally been found necessary worked satisfactorily.

Various sums have been granted for the purpose of fostering exhibitions in the City from time to time, and my opinion is that as the spirit of the age is to encourage those shows, we must to hold our own in that respect without going beyond reasonable bounds in the expenditure do the same as others are doing.

Large sums have been and are being spent on schools, and whilst there are some who complain of this expenditure, I do not see how, if we desire to progress with the world, we can relax any of our educational expenses.

On account of the increase in the number of buildings and the large area over which they were spread, it has become a necessity to make changes in the Fire Department appropriation, as the time had gone by in which you could expect to have the apparatus brought to and worked at fires by hand, so steam fire engines had to be procured and horses and drivers attached to hose carriages. This has added largely to expenditure in that Department and there is every probability of its necessarily increasing by the addition of a wholly paid Department in the near future.

The vexed question of providing proper cemetery accomodation, in consequence of the Camp Hill and Holy Cross Cemeteries having reached their limit, has been overcome and all denominations are now provided for, and it is to be hoped the new cemeteries will be satisfactorily laid out.

To meet the demand for better roads and side-walks a large amount has been spent on this service in providing a steam-roller and stonecrusher, concrete sidewalks, paving, curbing and gutter stones. I would not advise the laying of much more of the concrete sidewalks, as in my opinion good ashphalt is the best for the residential part of the City, and when the Council is prepared to go on with it, I think ashphalt will be the best and cheapest material that can be used.

I have been disappointed in that the railway facilities the City has been striving for such a length of time have not materialized. The Council has done its part to obtain that end, as on reference to the Minutes of March 26th, 1890, it will be seen that by a resolution I' moved at that meeting the Council generously supported measures to have the work, with the widening of Lockman Street, pushed on ; but the Dominion Government did not co-operate with us, having decided on another course, which having long delayed we hope will be accomplished during the coming season; and it is to be earnestly hoped no patch-work measures will be adopted, but the terminus will be such as all can be proud of. To do this it will be necessary for the Government to place a good sum in the estimates for this year and clear out all the old buildings now occupied by the Marine and Fisheries Department and others; have a clear site and not let those old buildings stand in the way when a durable permanent work is to be accomplished. I have had some correspondence with the Railway Department on this subject, and I handed John Stairs, M. P., some time ago a plan of the proper extension. He mislaid it, or handed it to Sir Wm. Van Horne when here and I have been unable to get it back, nor has he apparently succeeded in tracing it.

We have made large additions to the books in the Library and this has been appreciated by the public, as is shown by the very large increase in the number of books issued, and our Local Government is about to grandly suppliment this boon to the City by the provision they are making in the contemplation of erecting a building for that and other purposes.

I am pleased to inform you that the measure taken by the Council to place the management and control of the Police Department in the hands of a commission has worked very satisfactorily. The Chief has been constant and faithful in attending to the duties assigned to him. The Sergeants and men have given every satisfaction. The Detective is ever on the alert when duty calls, and I think our force compares favorably with a corresponding number of any other city.

The Council will have to make some other provision apart from the Superanuation Fund for the retiring of some of the men now on the force who have given the City long and faithful service; the

amount available from the fund being of no service for some years yet. I would suggest that a certain amount be supplemented from the unexpended balances for a few years until the fund is strong enough to stand alone, as under existing circumstances it is not likely to be of any use to any man now on the force. I am sorry the men did not come forward earlier in the year with their petition in regard to salary, so that the question could have been dealt with and legislation secured if the Council had taken action in the matter. However, it may be kept in mind and something accomplished by next year.

It was my good fortune to be head of the Works Department to carry into effect the much needed improvement in the water service connected with the extension of the so called New Pipe Line. There was a doubt in the minds of some as to the value of this extension, and I am pleased to inform you that it has fully realized the expectations of the promotors of the measure, and I doubt if there is anyone to be found but who is satisfied that the work was performed.

This year a large extension is to be made to Willow Park and those living within that district will then enjoy the advantages long held in other portions of the city.

The visit of Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Countess of Aberdeen to our city last year was one of the most pleasing that has ever occurred in our city. Other Governor-Generals and their wives have visited us in the past, but none of them was able to enter into and hold the affection of us all as His Excellency the present Governor-General and the Countess of Aberdeen. They hold the minds and hearts of our people by the innate goodness of their own dispositions and having hearts and sentiments in touch with the people that make them beyond question rulers that we shall always thank God for having had. They were pleased with the attention shewn them and I feel sure that their visit was as fully appreciated by them as we were delighted with their presence amongst us and honored by their company.

The plans for the widening of Lockman Street together with an estimate of its probable cost are now before you, and you will observe, if our calculations prove correct (and the Department has taken considerable trouble to make them so) that this work will not cost

anything like the sum it was thought by some of our citizens it would and there is every likelihood if the work is carried out that the increased value to the property would justify an increased assessment on it so that the citizens as a whole while sharing in the advantages would not be called upon to pay anything additional in their taxes over and above what they are paying now. Knowing that the Council has had the matter under consideration for some time and will deal with it in a manner which they think will be in the best interests of the city, I will make no recommendation here other than that contained in the report from the Works Department.

Reports from the various departments will be submitted, which I hope will prove satisfactory.

I am in a position to say that the citizens have secured good and faithful service from the various civic officials on our staff, whom I have found diligent and attentive to the duties assigned them.

This gives a partial summary of the work that has been performed during my time, which you in your wisdom will continue as circumstances may call for.

I will now bid you an official good-bye, assuring you that I shall ever cherish kindly remembrance of my association with you.
