The Committee are still supplying the patients in Mount Hope Asylum chargeable to the city with clothing at a great saving to the city.

The change made some time ago by the Council in appointing the Charities Committee Justices under Section 41, Chap. 38 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, which gives them power to examine under oath the relatives or friends as to the liability to pay of insane persons committed to Mount Hope Asylum chargeable to the city, has been found to work very satisfactorily. Although some are unable to pay, there are others who pay from \$4.00 per month up to the full amount charged the city. A complete record with a history of each patient is kept by the officials of the Charities Committee.

Among the extra expenditure for the year was \$1100 for new boilers, fire hose and fire extinguishers. The verandahs on the south side of the building, for the use of the sick and aged have been found to be so beneficial that the committee decided to erect similar verandahs with wire screens on the north side for the benefit of insane patients.

During the year Superintendent Dow visited some of the Alushouses in the State of Massachusetts and on his return presented an elaborate report, which has been published. This report contained many valuable suggestions in reference to the care of the poor and insane. As a result of his recommendations, insane patients are now given a greater variety of food than that given to other inmates.

In my report a year ago I referred to the great injustice done the city by the law which gives a settlement to children born here whose mothers have no settlement in the city. An effort was again made during the last session of the Legislature to have the section repealed, but without success.

The books are all fully written up to date and audited. I beg to repeat what was said last year about the efficiency, fidelity to the interests of the city, and general good management of the institution by Superintendent and Mrs. Dow and Secretary Mulcahy.

To the Chairman and Members of Charities Committee:

GENTLEMEN.—I hereby submit for the information of His Worship the Mayor and City Council the ninth annual report of the Halifax Poor's Asylum.

At the beginning of the year there were 307 inmates in the institution; 163 men, 132 women and 12 children.

During the year there were 260 admitted, 34 born, 241 discharged and 41 died, leaving 319 in the institution on April 30th, 1895, an increase of 12 over same date last year. The smallest number in the institution at one time was 293 on July 1st, 1894, and the largest number was 386 on March 23rd, 1895.

The inmates have been employed at general house work and have made and repaired all the shoes and clothing for the inmates of this institution as well as for the inmates of Mount Hope Asylum chargeable to the City of Halifax.

A number of improvements have been made during the year both on the grounds and interior of the institution. The boilers for heating were renewed at a cost of nearly eleven hundred dollars.

To the kind friends who have donated Books, Papers, Magazines, Pictures, Flowers, etc., for the use of the sick, poor and other inmates, • I wish to extend my sincere thanks.

Appended you will find the name, age, birth place and religious persuasion, with the total number of days of each inmate from May 1st, 1894, to April 30th, 1895.

In conclusion, on behalf of myself, the matron and other officials I wish to return thanks to you for past counsel and courtesies.

Annual Report of Governor of City Prison.

HALIFAX, April 30th, 1895.

The Chairman and Members of City Prison Committee:

Gentlemen,—I have the honor to submit my annual report on the City Prison for the civic year ending this day.

The tables herewith are nine in number, and show,

1. The number of prisonsers, and offences for which, committed to prison during the year.

2. The estimated value of the labor performed during the year.

3. The average annual cost of maintenance of male and female prisoners.

4. The quantity and estimated value of articles and materials in prison at end of the year.

5. The number and estimated value of horses, carts, harness, &c.

6. The number and estimated value of working implements. hammers, bars, &c., for farm work.

7. The number and estimated value of implements in stone shed, and quantity of broken stone on hand.

8. Estimated value of materials, &c., in work shops.

9. Quantity and estimated value of farm produce raised and consumed.

In submitting this report I feel justified in saying that the general results of the year's operations have been more than usually satisfactory. Both within and without the prison, on the farm and in the stone shed, much more work has been done than in any former year and without extra expense. A new mowing machine, a new set of harness, and two new horses, have been provided without any extra grant of money.

Certain repairs and alterations have been made and carried out in hay lofts and stone sheds, materially adding to the working facilities, and increasing the comfort of men and horses.

The contractor's work on the fire escape is about done, and there is thus some safety for the inmates in case of fire occurring, but there still exists the great need of a better water supply, not only for fire but for domestic purposes. This want of water has been very severely felt during the past year; and I must be excused if I again forcibly impress this important matter on the committee, and through the committee on the city council. Last summer-in consequence of an unusually dry season, one team was constantly engaged hauling water, a work the difficulties of which were materially increased by bad roads. Not infrequently when the water reached the prison, it was scarcely fit for use, having been hauled such a distance under a boiling sun. The larger number of prisoners caused an increased demand, and the team had to be sent out on Sundays, which was not only very unseemly but is contrary to the printed rules. When you take into consideration the distance to be travelled by the team in going to and returning from the tank-the time consumed in filling the vessel in which the water is carriedand the other unavoidable diversion of mens' labor from the farm and stone shed caused by this mode of procuring water-it will be readily seen that there is no economy in the present system; and that therefore it should be changed for financial if not for prudential reasons

During the year just closed I have had much trouble—and expense and loss to the city has followed—in consequence of persons breaking the fences and gates and tramping over the grass fields. The people refuse to take the roads when requested, and set at defiance regulations necessary for the protection of the city's property, but which regulations will have to be enforced even though some may perhaps consider that they are being harshly dealt with. The city's cultivated ground has the same right to protection as private property, and trespassers should be allowed no more immunity by city officials than they would be allowed by private persons. It is to be hoped that the justness of this proposition will be admitted and acted upon, to the end that unpleasantness may be avoided.

Not a little damage to oats and other growing crops, with consequent loss to the city, has also been occasioned by stray horses and cattle getting into the grounds, not infrequently through the openings left by the before-mentioned trespassers. The necessity, therefore, for a strict enforcement of regulations, must be apparent to every reasonable person.

CITY PRISON REPORT.

Another rule which some persons have been in the habit of ignoring is the one which makes an order necessary before visiting the prison or prisoners. These persons come on the grounds where the prisoners are at work, and take up the attention of the keepers in talking, retard the work of the prisoners, and to a greater or less extent cause trouble. In future, the rules will be enforced with strict impartiality, on the grounds as well as in the house. In such an institution as this, any laxity in the enforcement of rules will inevitably be followed by lack of respect for authority, and must not be allowed. In the strict enforcement of all regulations I feel that I will have the support of the committee.

The health of the prisoners generally has been good, those who were constitutionally run down (and they were not a few) generally regaining their strength after a few days' rest. When they arrived they were unfit for anything, except to be an expense to the city, and some who were sent up for short terms did nothing but get fed and dosed with medicine: then their brief times were up; and they go out to come back later on and repeat the trick of being cured and fed in an institution the object of which is to prevent vagrancy and crime—objects which can never be attained by short terms of imprisonment.

As usual, the City Medical Officer, Dr. Trenaman, has been constant in his visits to the institution, and where necessary has given personal attention to the complaints of prisoners who had, or thought they had, something for the doctor to do for them.

With my own and Mrs. Murray's thanks to the committee for their unvarying kindness, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

HALIFAX, May 14, 1895.

D. MCPHERSON, Esq., Mayor of Halifax,

SIR,—I have the honor to submit my second annual report as Chief of Police for the City of Halifax, the period to be reported on being from the first May, 1894, to the 30th April, 1895; and it gives me pleasure to be able to-say that the conduct of the force during the year has been such as to warrant me in repeating the unreserved commendation contained in my first report.

The changes in the force during the past twelve months—all of which, with one exception, were impending at the commencement of the term—consisted of the retirement of two on account of illhealth : the resignation of five others for irregularity in conduct : and the filling of the vacancy caused by death of Policeman Thos. Mont, who was a good officer, and died after a short illness. These changes came into effect on the 15th May last, since which time the personnel of the force has remained unchanged, there having been no resignations and no dismissals. Violations of rules and orders have been few, and have been sufficiently met by the Commission under the regulations without resorting to harsh measures.

During the period herein reported on, three events have called for extra exertions and precautions by the police in consequence of unusual gatherings of people and the inevitable tendency to disorder on the part of the evil disposed. These events were,-the visit of His Excellency the Governor-General, the Provincial Exhibition, and the funeral of the late Premier of the Dominion, the Rt. Hon. Sir John Thompson ; but it must have been exceedingly gratifying to the citizens to know that nothing of an unpleasant nature occurred, notwithstanding the unusual crowds and the consequent excitement, and I do not think I am claiming too much credit for the police of the city when I attribute at least a portion of this satisfactory result to the officers and men from the faithful and intelligent manner in which they discharged their duties. His Excellency and His amiable Lady were graciously pleased to verbally and otherwise recognize my services; but I would not be doing justice to the officers and men under my charge if I did not thus officially thank them, and put on record the fact that but for their exertions the highly appreciated recognition from Lord and Lady Aberdeen would not have been rendered possible.

I append hereto the usual statistics, showing the number of persons (2,122) brought before the court : the nature of the offences with which they were charged ; their nationalities and alleged religions, their sexes and their ages. It will be seen that the number exceeds those of the previous twelve months by one hundred and fifteen (115) the respective numbers being two thousand and seventeen (2,017), and two thousand one hundred and twenty-two (2,122). Of this excess, forty-three (43) may be put in the catagory of "drunks," the respective figures being nine hundred and twenty-seven (927) and nine hundred and seventy (970). As a most determined and very largely successful effort has been made to prevent Sunday drunkeness, the increase is easily accounted for, as can be proven by a reference to the Monday morning docket, which is always much larger than that of any other day. Those who are in a position to know can testify that the results have been salutary, and it is not too much to expect that in the near future it will be impossible, on Sundays at least, to see a drunken man on the streets of Halifax.

Some comparisons under other heads may not be uninteresting. Thus, the assults the past twelve months exceeded those of the previous term by thirty-eight; arrests for larceny were six less; prosecutions for violation of Liquor License Act fourteen less; complaints for profane language forty-seven more: complaints for standing on corners and sidewalks sixty-one more; while the other offences, ninety in number, are not materially changed.

An analysis of the ages of the prisoners shows that there was a decrease in the number between eight and twelve years, the figures being 78 and 30; a decrease in those between twelve and sixteen, the figures being 115 and 88; a decrease in those between sixteen and twenty, the figures being 156 and 143; an increase in those between twenty and twenty-five, the figures being 382 and 412; a decrease in those between twenty five and thirty, the figures being 284 and 253; a decrease in those between thirty and forty, the figures being 330 and 264; and a decrease in the totals between fifty and eighty, the figures being 294 and 232.

Of the persons before the court, 1,841 were males and 281 females.

It would be unreasonable to expect that with such a large number of cases to deal with—and with comparatively few exceptions the charge being laid by the police—there would not have

been some complaints of over officiousness on the part of some of the men; but it is satisfactory to know that there has been very little, if any, good ground for such a complaint, but that, on the contrary, the responsible duties of the men have been performed with a due regard to the rights of the citizen. This point has been strongly impressed on the members of the force, and any well grounded complaint of a departure from instructions will be met by a proper penalty on the offender. It need scarcely be said that what has been impressed on the men as the correct line of conduct is not neglected by the officers of the force nor by myself. When an official, high or low, fails to recognize the fact that he is only the servant of the citizen, that official's usefulness is gone. At the same time, the citizen who thinks he owns the servant will very likely find out that he is mistaken.

During the year such assistance as has been required has been given the Inspector of Licenses in the enforcement of the License Act. When the "Screen Clause" which came into force on the 1st inst., is put into operation, there should be a large falling off in the sale of liquor to be "consumed on the premises," a consequent decrease in the amount consumed, and a large saving in the earnings of men, a very large majority of whom cannot afford to spend the money which they now spend behind the screens. Such a result would greatly lessen the work of the police, and cause a falling off in the number of applicants for relief by the various charitable organizations. When called upon the best exertions of the police will be given to the enforcement of the law.

The services of Detective Power during the year have been satisfactory, whether in the line of the regular duty of his office or when called upon for work outside the city. A detective is to a very great extent a preventive officer, but unless his duties are actively and intelligently performed the would-be doer of evil has not the wholesome dread of him which is necessary. In the present officer the city is faithfully and efficiently served.

The responsible duties of the Deputy-Chief have been discharged satisfactorily without partiality, and with due regard to the proper observance of the rules governing the force. The sergeants too have been active and watchful, and with men disposed to obey orders I am justified in congratulating the citizens upon the possession of a force which will not suffer by comparison with that of any other eity of similar population.

It must be remembered that the area of the city which has to be

traversed by the police night and day is very large—larger by far than any similar number of men have to patrol in any other place with which I am acquainted ; that there are no patrol waggons or alarm calls ; that there is a comparatively large floating population, naval, military and mercantile : and that therefore the number of policemen does not bear the proportion to actual population and work to be done that the force of other cities bears. Hence, the work of a policeman in Halifax is not quite so easy as might be imagined. In this connection it would be unfair to omit mention of the fact that the unruly element among the sailors and soldiers and it is not numerously represented—is in the main taken care of by the Naval and Military Police.

I cannot conclude this report without thanking the gentlemen-Ex-Mayor Keefe and Ald. Outhit and McFatridge-who have formed the Police Commission during the past two years for their uniform kindness to me and their ever cheerful aid to render effective the regulations. Feeling confident that I will find my relations with the new commissioners equally satisfactory. I respectfully submit this report, and remain,

Report of Citizens' Free Library Committee.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 27th, 1895.

To His Worship The Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN,—The Committee of the Citizens' Library beg to submit the following report for the Civic year about expiring :—

The number of patrons of the Library has steadily increased of late years as will be seen by the following figures :----

In 1888 the number of books issued was 9405; in 1891 the number was 17,333, the largest issue in one day being 125. In 1893-4 the total number issued was 52,286, and during the present year the number has further increased the actual issue being 57,960, and the largest issue for one day being 510.

A fair number of books have been purchased by your Committee during the year but after payment of the running expenses of the Library the balance of the appropriation for library purposes is far too small to enable your Committee to procure even a moderate equipment of current literature.

The large increase in patronage necessarily involves increase in the work devolving upon the Librarian who has requested that her salary be fixed at the sum paid to the late Librarian. Your Committee have to recognize the justice of her contention, that as the duties of the office are more onerous than formerly the salary paid ought to be at least equal to the amount given her predecessor and your Committee therefore recommend that that amount shall thereafter be paid the present Librarian out of the annual appropriation for Library purposes.

A large number of copies of the new catalogue still remain unsold, and your Committee recommend that the Librarian be empowered to sell copies at a reduced rate of ten cents each so that every patron of the Library may be enabled to purchase a copy. Nearly all the books procured for the Library are now ordered by your Committee direct from England and a considerable saving is thereby effected as the Library obtains the books free of duty.

Your Committee deeply regret that the civic appropriation for Library purposes is so lamentably inadequate. Toronto spends \$30,000 annually on its civic library, while the total appropriation by Halifax is only \$1600. Such a niggardly appropriation not only prevents the establishment of a first-class library but makes it impossible to meet even the moderate demands of the present patrons of the Library.

Report of Camp Hill Cemetery Committee.

To His Worship The Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN_, The Camp Hill Cemetery Committee beg to submit their report for the civic year ending 30th April, 1895.

The amount to credit of committee on 1st May, 1894, was \$156.69, to which was added \$450.00 transferred from deposit in Merchants' Bank, and \$74.00 received from lots sold making a total of \$680.69. The expenditure for the year was \$550,70, leaving a balance to credit of incoming committee of \$129.99.

Of the expenditure the sum of \$195.00 was for much needed sanitary improvements and conveniences which are greatly appreciated by the numerous visitors to the Cemetery.

The sum of \$35.00 was expended in necessary repairs to tool house, and procuring new seats.

The balance of expenditure was for cutting grass, cleaning walks, procuring new tools, etc.

Vouchers for all the expenditures have been filed with the City Auditor.

The amount to credit in the Merchants' Bank from operations of former years was, on 30th April, \$915.93.

As has been pointed out on previous occasions this sum will have to be drawn on from time to time for necessary expenditure in connection with the cemetery, as there will be very little, if any, revenue derived from the cemetery in the next five years, and in a short time there will be none whatever. Then will arise the problem how to provide an annual sum for maintenance.

The amount received by the Superintendent for burial fees (his only pay) is not sufficient to remunerate him for the labor of keeping private lots in order. Far too many are neglectful of the little care and attention required to make beautiful the homes of the dead; other lots have no living representatives. And thus there are evidences of neglect which are not infrequently unfavorably commented on by visitors. Regulations should be made compelling those who can to pay proper attention to their lots, and making provision for the fixing up and keeping in order those lots whose owners cannot be found, or whose circumstances will not allow them to do what should be done. There are many such very old and very poor, and something should be done to improve the appearance of such lots of which there are numbers.

Appended hereto will be found the Registrar's statement showing the number of interments for the years ending April, 1894, and April, 1895, respetively.

Report of Commissioners of Point Pleasant Park.

The Commissioners of Point Pleasant Park have the honor to submit to His Worship the Mayor and aldermen of the city of Halifax their annual report.

During the past year the funds at our disposal have been used in keeping roads and paths in good order and largely in underbrushing and cutting out dead wood and planting young trees. Of the latter we have set out during the past summer over 1500, these with young trees planted during the previous three years make a total of over 5000, all doing well.

We have now in nurseries,

- 1000 Maple about 3 feet.
 - 500 Elms " 4 "
- 1000 Norway Spruce from 18 in. to 2 feet. 500 Scoth Pine

About half of above we propose setting out in the summer of 1896. We purpose using for 6 years the extra appropriation of \$500 (under Chapter 43, Acts of 1895,) to erect near the gates a Lodge for the keeper, the house occupied by him at present being very unsuitable. We respectfully ask the City Council to pass a resolution appropriating that sum annually for six years towards the repayment of a loan to be used for the construction of said lodge.
