ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

CHIEF OF POLICE.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 6th, 1902.

HIS WORSHIP THE MAYOR, Chairman of Police Commission.

Sir,—I have the honor to submit herewith my ninth Annual Report as Chief of Police for the City of Halifax, and in doing so have to again congratulate the citizens upon the fact that Halifax, as is usual, is free of crime of any magnitude, and that the orderly condition for which our City has ever been noted still continues.

Since my last report there have been but two changes in the force -two privates resigned and their places were filled. No increase was made in the numerical strength of the force, and the difficulty of giving increased suburban service still exists. The best possible under the circumstances has been done, however, and, I think, with satisfactory results.

On several occasions during the year the general efficiency of the force, its capacity to preserve good order under exceptional circumstances and in the presence of unusual crowds, was satisfactorily tested, and it is, I think, pardonable in me to refer with pride to the public commendations freely bestowed—notably on the occasion of the visit of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales. I feel I would be wanting in justice to my men if I did not thus publicly say that they well deserved the praise they received. Their appearance and deportment was all that could be desired, not only on that and other extraordinary occasions, but generally, and they compare favorably with the men of other places which I have had the pleasure of visiting since my last report—a visit which was unfortunately interfered with by illness, but during which I had some opportunities of witnessing police operations. During the year the men, through the kindness of the City Council, received a very acceptable addition to their pay, for which they are duly grateful.

The new uniform has made quite an improvement in the appearance of the men, and has been found to be serviceable and comfortable.

While there has been no serious local crime, a somewhat noted case came within our jurisdiction, and was successfully dealt with by Detective Power. A murderer who for two years had evaded arrest was located here and held for indentification by Western officers. He has since been tried and is now under sentence of death.

The Detective's services have been, as usual, much in requisition both in and out of the City, with satisfactory results.

Fortunately for Halifax, fires are few and far between; but the police have always been ready to help the Fire Department in its operations, and the value of their services has been duly acknowledged.

The usual tables as to convictions, offences, &c., are appended. It will be seen that the number of convictions for the year ending 30th of April, 1902, was 3176, being 451 more than for the previons twelve months. The notable increases were for common assault, 74 : drunk on the street, 180; larceny, 82; loitering on street, 56; perjury, 26; violation of snow ordinance, 21; disorderly house, 26; these seven offences, out of a total of one hundred and four, showing an increase of 465 convictions.

The table of ages shows that, compared with 1901, there has been a gratifying decrease in the number of young persons before the Court. In 1901 the number under 25 years of age was 783; for the last twelve months it was 655.

The table of sexes shows that the increased convictions were to be credited entirely to males, the convictions in 1901 being 2261 and in 1902, 2703, thus accounting for all but nine of the total increase—451.

While it is not a necessity for me to notice anonymous oommunications, I take this public opportunity to refer to some I have received. Giving some of the writers credit for sincerity, I beg to assure them that there is no need for being distrustful as to their identity being revealed, unless absolutely in the interests of justice. No one can be more anxious than I am to have all laws and ordinances strictly obeyed and obedience enforced without unnecessary hardship to deserving citizens; but the unduly excited observer may not always be in a position to see the difference between failing to detect and not trying to detect. My anonymous friend will see that there is a difference, and will, I trust, understand that ten minutes.' confidential conversation would lead to more satisfactory results than a long letter, not always courteous, not altogether truthful (though that may have been unintentional), generally starting on defective premises, and, as a consequence, arriving at a wrong conclusion. will only add that whenever it can be shown that I have without full justification revealed to any one the source from which I received information my resignation of this high office may be asked for and will be immediately handed in. Any official who betrays an honest citizen's confidence should be dismissed from the City service.

I cannot conclude this report without thanking the gentlemen who have from time to time composed the Police Commission for their unvarying courtesy to me and for their attention to the important duties devolving on the Board; and under the painful circumstances attending the gentleman who has for the past three years been the head of the Commission, I may be pardoned for making particular mention of him. Mayor Hamilton devoted to Police affairs an amount of time and attention of which the average citizen can have no correct conception. He was always firm and exacting, but never to my knowledge, unfair to officer or man. Discipline, alike for the Chief and Private, can only be maintained by firmness, and is the easier maintained if their is also fairness. Mr. Hamilton not only had knowledge of these facts, but possessed the qualities, and made the two work together to the benefit of the force and the advantage of the citizens-not one of whom but must wish for him a speedy restoration to health.

REPORT OF FIRE DEPARIMENT.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 19th, 1902,

To His Worship the Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN,—The Board of Fire Commissioners beg to submit for the information of the Council and Citizens their annual report for the civic year 1901-2.

Your Board reporting for the year just closed are happy to be able to state that the losses by fire have, during the year, been the smallest in the history of the Department. There have been only two fires of any importance, viz: Crowell Bros'. and Stanhope's, Tower Road, the loss by fire being, in each case, but small, largely owing to the prompt action of those in charge of the fire apparatus, and the fireman assisting them.

The two Chemicals with the efficient staff have been able—by prompt attendance on the alarms being sounded—to prevent much damage and destruction to property of the citizens during the year.

The accompanying report of the Chief of the Department gives details which will, your Board hopes, be usful to the Council and may convince, not only the Council, but the citizens, and the Fire Underwriters, that the services of the Department are efficiently performed.

Your Board, during the past year, were under heavy expences owing to the amount of repairs required in the Engine Houses, and by the steamers. They found that the bad drainage of the Chemical Houses necessitated the removal of the closets from the basement to the upper storey. New brick piers under the building were also found to be necessary. It was further found to be necessary to remove partitions and enlarge the bedroom and to make a store-room and to fit up an office for the Chief—where he can now be found daily from 11.30 to 1 o'clock. They also arranged new ventilation in order to provide for the comfort and health of the men sleeping in the house.

The Queen Street Stable was found to be in an unsafe condition and it was found necessary to put in new sills, lay new floors, and build new stalls for the horses, which has been done.

The Quinpool Road Building was found to be so out of repair as to require new facias, conductors, spouts and doors, which were all provided and put up.

At the Central the men were without clothes closets, which have been provided by your Board, who also fitted up a work-shop and store-room and stocked them, so doing away with the laying in of small quantities of stock. Your Board also found it necessary to remove the old corroded pipes and improve the drainage of the stables. New caulked and planked floors were put in, and also a slide to obviate the necessity for the men climbing up and down two flights of stairs in case of fire alarms.

Your Board also had No. 4 Steamer thoroughly overhauled, and a new boiler put in No. 5. Many other repairs were also found necessary and were attended to.

Your Board found it necessary during the year to dispose of four horses which were unfit for duty and replace them with four new ones, which were distributed as required, all of which required a considerable outlay.

In conclusion, your Board are pleased to be able to state that they have had fewer complaints than in past years, and that the citizens generally seem satisfied with the efforts the Department.

The annual reports of the Chief of the Fire Department and the Electrician are herewith returned and hereto appended.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

CHIEF OF FIRE DEPARTMENT, FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 30TH. 1902.

To the Chairman and Members of the Board of Fire Commissioners :

GENTLEMEN,-In submitting to you my report of the Fire Department for the year ending April 30th, 1902, being my sixth annual report, I have much pleasure in being able to inform you that the department is in almost perfect working order. At first it was hard to enforce discipline; but all that has changed so much that through the year I had very few reports to make and none of a serious nature. The members of the department "call" as well as "permanent," with a few exceptions which I will report to the Board at their first meeting, have been very active in responding to the call of fire, and to their celerity is due the slight damage at so many of our fires. This may be said in a special manner of our chemical engines and the way they are handled. We had 71 calls for fire this year; 27 were bell alarms and 44 telephone or still alarms. The total loss was \$27,070.00; much of which was caused out of town where water was hard to get, such as Brine's, Longard Road: Stanhope's, Tower Road, and C. W. Anderson's barns and stable, Jubilee Road. These caused a loss of \$3,620.00. Crowell & Co's. hardware, \$19,000.00, and the Maritime Electric Co., \$2,050.00, were the heaviest losses for the year. We had three fires over \$100.00, but the loss did not reach \$1,000.00. J. F. Outhit's, Barrington Street, \$950.00; Mrs. Hutchins, Kempt Road, \$400.00; and Meagher's restaurant, Gottingen Street, \$650.00, made a loss of \$2,000.00 for these three fires, or a loss of \$26,670.00 for eight fires, leaving the loss on the other sixty-three fires \$400.00.

During the year Nos. 1, 4 and 5 steamers have been thoroughly overhauled and put in first-class condition. No. 5 had a new boiler put in which will make it good for some years. No. 2 is now in the repair shop getting a new boiler and overhauled. It will be out in a few weeks and will then be like No. 5—good for years. With the exception of No. 2 steamer, all the apparatus of the department is in good condition—which consists of five steam fire engines, two chemical engines, two ladder trucks and eight hose waggons.

The horses of the department, twenty-five in number, are good and serviceable, with the exception of two, and it will be advisable to part with these two and purchase new horses.

The houses of the department have received much attention from the Board this past year and are now in good condition. The only expense in this line for the coming year will be painting the outside of Quinpool Road, Isleville and West Street houses and raising the bell tower of West Street house.

We have about 7000 feet of reliable rubber hose. There are over 2000 feet which cannot be relied on when heavy steam pressure is used. Some of it is 11, some 12, and some 14 years in service. I will report on this at the first meeting of the new Fire Commission.

In my report of last year I had shown the great need existing in this department for better ladder equipment. The Board of Fire Commissioners sent me to Amherst to inspect a Seagrave Trussed Ladder there. My report was as it should be, very favorable, and I hope one such as I have recommended will be purchased, as this department is much in need of such.

It is over three years since I asked for Tappers to be placed in the houses of members of the "Call Force" and figured the cost to be less than \$300.00. I must say now, in order to assist the efficiency of the department such are necessary. The police were prompt in calling members of the department previous to they themselves coming under a dollar fine for non-attendance; but since they call each other first and often some of the best members of the department know nothing of a fire until it is too late to be useful. I will not lengthen this report by giving you the cause of fires, as I have so often done; but I will only give you one of the number where more rigid inspection is required. On January 29th

Box 6 called the department for a fire in Mr. Stewart's house, Quinpool Road. The house was new, and to all appearance well built and furnished. When we arrived the house was full of smoke. After an examination I ordered the plaster and laths torn off the side of the chimney in the parlor where a fire was in a grate, which had all appearance of having been built solidly. There we found a fire in full blast. The ends of the laths were right against the frame of the grate and were burning fast. I will therefore impress upon you at this time when it may be your duty to appoint an Inspector of Buildings to lay down for him the duties he should perform. I will append to this report a copy of my report to the Board of Fire Commissioners on this subject on July 24th, 1899.

The fire alarm has in general been very satisfactory this year; but there are weak parts in it which I reported to the Board, and which no doubt the Electrician will report on later.

Appended you will find list of fires and alarms and losses thereby for the past year.

I thank the Chairman and Fire Commissioners for the courtesies they have shown and assistance given to myself and the department the past year; also for the great interest in fitting and making the quarters for the men convenient and comfortable. I thank the Chief of Police for the splendid order they have maintained at our fires and the assistance given to the department.

REPORT OF ELECTRICIAN.

OFFICE OF CITY ELECTRICIAN,

HALIFAX, N. S., June 12th, 1902.

To the Chairman and Members of the Board of Fire Commissioners.

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit the following report re the Fire Alarm Telegraph system:

The expenditure for the year has been unusually small. Two miles of line wire have been purchased and placed in store. No extensions have been made, and there having been no bad storms, the expenditure, with the exception of the wire, has been for ordinary running expenses.

The Fire Alarm has given fairly good service during the year, having, with two exceptions, responded correctly to all calls. The exceptions were boxes 5 and 6. The failure in box 5 was caused by the trigger being bent, probably due to too violent a pull in attempting to send in the alarm; while the trouble with box 6 was caused by a defective outside lock.

The matter of outside box locks merits the consideration of your Board. The locks uow in use have so far given more trouble than any other part of the system and must continue so while the present type of lock is used. A sample lock without springs has been submitted for approval and is guaranteed by the makers to be free from the objectionable features of the old lock, and I would recommend its adoption.

The desirability of a change in Battery has been noticed in a previous report and I would again beg to refer to it.

The use of Storage Battery fore Fire Alarm purposes has long since passed the experimental stage and is acknowledged everywhere to be the best means for supplying power for Fire Alarm and
Police Telegraph system. The first cost is high, owing to the necessity of having suitable devices for controlling the circuit; but this is only first cost and after that is met there is only a slight yearly expense for maintenance.

In the case of our present Gravity Battery the yearly cost for maintenance under the most favorable circumstances is \$350.00. While the cost for maintenance of a Storage Battery for the same output would not exceed \$60.00 per year, including interest on first cost, there would be a yearly saving of \$250.00 by adopting the storage system. It is also less cumbersome, more reliable and better in every way than the old primary battery. As proof of this, one supply company alone has installed this system for Fire Alarm and Police Telegraph purposes in seventy-five cities and towns in the United States and Canada in the last few years.

I would also call your attention to the need of a new Automatic Repeater. The one now in use is thirty years old and is too small for present requirements. Next to the Battery it is the most important part of the system and should be up-to-date to insure best results.

I have made enquires as to the best means of protecting firemen from electric shocks while handling the hose branches at fires, and from what I can learn hose manufacturers have not as yet produced branches that are sufficiently insulated. It would, I believe, be a wise precaution to require all branch men to wear rubber gloves at fires until some better protection can be substituted.

CHARITIES COMMITTEE REPORT.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 30th, 1902.

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council:

GENTLEMEN,—On behalf of the Charities Committee, I have the honor to herewith submit for your information their Annual Report for the year ending April 30th, 1902.

On May 1st, 1901, the total number of inmates in the Poor's Asylum was 322, made up of 185 men, 129 women and 8 children. During the year there were 341 persons admitted, 24 born, 322 discharged, and 43 died. The number of inmates in the institution at this date is 322, consisting of 178 men, 136 women and 8 children.

The number supported during the whole or part of the year was 687. The largest number at one time was 387 on February 28th, 1902, and the smallest number 307 on June 21st, 1901. The daily average was 339.

There are at present under care 118 harmless insane, 58 men and 60 won.en. There were 4 women and 6 men transferred from the Nova Scotia Hospital to the wards set apart for the insane, and 7 women and 1 man admitted from the city.

The amount paid the Nova Scotia Hospital for the maintenance of insane chargeable to the city was \$3,620.38.

The expenditure for materials for wood yard was \$1,428.58 and the receipts \$3,275.63.

The price of coal advanced \$1.06 per ton over last year, which made an increase in the cost of that article of \$465.45. The amount paid for coal in 1900-01 was \$1,840.60, this year it was \$2,306.05.

The insurance on the main and outbuildings expired June 30th, 1901, and December, 1901, and was renewed at a cost of \$672.50. This amount was paid out of this year's appropriation, although the insurance is renewed for three years. Notwithstanding this fact and the advance in the prices of coal and other necessities, there is a balance to the credit of the Committee of \$2.99.

Coffins, as required, were delivered free of charge to the Infant's Home, Tower Road, the Home of the Guardian Angel and to persons in the city who were unable to pay. The number of coffins thus delivered was 27.

During the Session of the Local Assembly in 1901 an Act was passed compelling all municipalities, on receipt of notice from the Superintendent of the V. G. Hospital, to remove from out of that institution, and to provide and care for, all incurable patients chargeable to said municipality. As some of those patients would in all probability be suffering from cancer, consumption and diseases of a like character, and it having been brought to the notice of the Committee that a woman had died in the city from cancer without anybody to look after her or attend to her wants, the Committee felt it would be necessary to provide a place for such patients apart from the other inmates, and unanimously decided to convert the house on the Poor's Asylum grounds into an Annex to that Institution, thus giving more room in the main building. This was done. The house was entirely renovated, heated with hot water, two bath rooms put in and sufficient accommodation provided for thirty-two patients. It was formally opened on the 28th inst. I might further add that all work other than the hot water heating, plumbing and some of the plastering was done by the employees, with the help of some of the inmates.

The following is a statement of the receipts and expenditure, and shows that a larger amount has been collected this year than ever before :

In the number remaining April 30th, 1902, are including 118 harmless insane patients.

The female inmates have been employed as usual doing the housework, sawing, mending and knitting, while the males have done the whitewashing, sawing and splitting wood, and the other labouring work necessary in an institution of this kind.

The clothing, and nearly all the shoes for the inmates of this institution, as well as for those inmates of the Nova Scotia Hospital who are chargeable to the City of Halifax, are made by the inmates here.

The house on Robie Street, which you have had renovated for use as an Annex to this institution is completed, and now ready for occupancy. At present there are no patients there. All of the alterations were made, and the carpentering and painting done by the employees, assisted by some of the inmates. The heating and plumbing were done by contract.

The receipts for the sale of kindling and hard wood, are increas-. ing every year. The year just closed has been the most successful in that respect since the wood yard has been in operation.

My thanks are due to the many thoughtful and considerate friends who have contributed magazines and other books, for donations of flowers, fruit and confectionary, and also to those ladies and gentlemen who so kindly assisted at the several musical and literary entertainments during the year which gave so much pleasure to the inmates.

On behalf of myself and the other officials I beg you to accept our sincere thanks for the many kindnesses and courtesies extended by you to us during the year.

CITIZEN'S FREE LIBRARY.

HALIFAX, April 30th, 1902.

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council:

GENTLEMEN,—During the year just closed 594 new books were added to the Library, including magazines bound and books and pamphlets donated. A considerable number of books have been ordered through the English Agents of the Library; but as these have not arrived they cannot be included in this year's report, although they are chargeable to this year's appropriation. Full details of the books added will be found in the published Bulletins.

The number of cards issued to borrowers during the year was 3274. The increase would be much greater if we were in a position to supply the demand for books.

The total issue of books for home use during the year, of all classes, was 84,363, and for use in the Library, 11,811, making a total for the year just closed of 96,174, as compared with a total of 89,682 for the preceding year.

The largest issue of books on any one day was Saturday, Feb. 22nd, 923; and the smallest, September 17th, 110.

During the year the sum of \$107.26 was received for fines and books damaged; \$20.50 for catalogues sold and \$126.40 for bindary work done for the City.

276 overdue books were sent for and all returned except 2. 4 books were lost and paid for and 5 were ordered to be destroyed on account of having been in houses reported as infected with Smallpox. In this connection it may be stated that reports are received from the Secretary of the Health Board of all cases of Infectious disease in the City and every precaution is taken to prevent books going into houses where such cases exist or being placed in circulation until they have been thoroughly disinfected if they should be found there. A Formalin apparatus has been procured for this purpose.

The correspondence which has been carried on for some time past with Mr. Andrew Carnegie in relation to the erection in this city of a Free Library building has been brought to a satisfactory conclusion. As soon as a suitable site is selected the funds will be provided, and it is hoped that before another report is presented the work of construction will be well under way.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

· OFFICE OF CITY HEALTH BOARD.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 5th, 1902.

To the Chairman and Members of the City Health Board :

GENTLEMEN,—I respectfully submit for your information the following summary of work performed by this department for the civic year ending 30th April, 1902.

The Board during the past year held fifty-five meetings, at which a large number of sanitary improvements were ordered and subsequently carried out.

During the year forty-six notices were served for defective plumbing and drainage in houses, all of which have been attended to as recommended by the Inspector of Plumbing.

Notices were served for the removal of twenty-two outside privy vaults and nineteen were thus removed and proper W. C's. constructed in the houses. Thirty-two privies which were ordered to be removed last year, but for which an extension of time was given, were also removed during the year and proper closets constructed in the houses.

The correspondence for the year consists of sixty-eight letters received and five hundred and seven sent out. Of the latter number four hundred and thirty-nine were notices served ordering sanitary improvements and the removal of nuisances.

Complaints respecting the unsanitary condition of two hundred and twenty seven premises were received at this office, all of which were carefully investigated and dealt with as the circumstances in each case required.

During the year eight hundred and sixty-five permits were

issued for the removal of night-soil and one thousand six hundred and ninety-seven loads were thus removed.

On September 23rd, 1901, a case of small-pox developed in the City, traceable to two fishermen who arrived here on a coastingsteamer from Canso, N. S., and spent one night in a boarding house in the city. Subsequently torty-six cases occurred, with seven deaths. At the present date the disease is about stamped out, as there is only one light case in hospital and no houses in quarantine.

On September 26th, 1901, the Board ordered a compulsory general vaccination, and a notice was published in the papers stating that a station in the City Hall would be open an hour twice daily to vaccinate all persons free of charge, and one thousand five hundred and sixty-three were thus vaccinated. Seven hundred and forty-seven were also vaccinated by physicians appointed by the Board to visit the schools.

The number of cases of contagious diseases reported for the past year was sixty-two cases of diphtheria, eleven of scarlet fever and forty-six of small-pox; with twelve deaths from diphtheria and seven due to small-pox.

Twenty-five patients were admitted to the hospital for Infectious Diseases, viz: thirteen for diphtheria, seven for scarlet fever and five for measles, all of whom recovered.
