CITY PRISON REPORT.

Clerk of Works.

To His Worship the Mayor, Members of the Board of Control and City Council.

Gentlemen:—I herewith have the honor to submit my fifth annual Report of the City Prison for the civic year ending April 30th, A. D., 1916.

Since my last report there have been three changes in the Prison Staff, one of which was for Overseas Service, and the vacancies have been filled.

I have much pleasure in reporting that the administration of the Prison under Controller Geo. A. Harris, has been a source of great satisfaction to me.

I would also report progress in inprovements, while there still remain improvements to be completed in order to bring the prison to the level of modern reform prisons. But it is encouraging to know that more improvements are to be made in the near future.

There is also much need for a change in diet for Prisoners. An improved schedule has been submitted, also remission time for Prisoners. As I have been in touch with several institutions throughout Canada, acting in the same capacity as City Prison, Halifax, where a remission of five days per month is given, for good conduct, faithfulness, and industry, and is awarded under the Certificate of the Chief Warden of the Prison, legislation being obtained from the local Parliament, and for which is claimed a decided advance for good in Prison Reform.

CITY PRISON REPORT.

There is also need of more profitable labor being established at the Prison than stone breaking. I would say the City stone crusher could find employment for upwards of ten years upon City Prison property, and this would give additional land for cultivation and Prison labor could be more profitably farming than stone quarrying as farming is the ideal scheme of Prison Reform. I am also of the opinion that land that is infested with wire worm, will have to be fallowed, as it is the only speedy cure so far known. The loss sustained last year through these pests was upwards of four hundred dollars. I am informed by the Department of Agriculture that there are hundreds of thousands of dollars lost to vegetation every year throughout the Dominion of Canada from these insects. There will be a loss this year also: but I do not anticipate it to be as heavy as last year from this source at least.

There is still much need of the erection of a concrete wall surrounding the Prison yard, also a new gate house, as the present structure is inadequate.

The number of prisoners admitted during the year, has been four hundred and fifty-five as against five hundred and fifty-five last year, the daily average being 31.187 against 43.17 last year. The largest number at any one time during year, being fifty, July 22nd, 1915. Smallest number being twenty-three March 17th, 1916.

CITY HOME REPORT.

Halifax, N. S., May 1st, 1916.

His Worship the Mayor, Members of Board of Control and City Council.

Gentlemen:-I beg to submit the following report of Charities Department for the year 1915-16.

On May 1st, 1915 there were 326 inmates in the City Home, made up of 203 men, 120 women and 3 children.

During the year there were 349 persons admitted, 20 born, 253 discharged and 47 died, leaving in the Home at this date a total of 295, made up of 170 men, 118 women and 7 children.

The total number supported during the whole or part of year was 695. The largest number supported at any one time was 338 on March 10th, 1916, and the smallest number was 267 on Sept. 16th, 1915. The daily average was 300.

There are 89 harmless insane patients in the City Home; 40 men and 49 women and a daily average of 49.23 insane patients have been supported in the Nova Scotia Hospital during the year. The maintenance of some of these patients is paid in whole or part by their relatives. The amount paid the Nova Scotia Hospital for the maintenance of said patients was \$8960.35 as against \$9082.32 for the year previous.

The amount paid on woodyard expenses was \$2680.89 and the receipts were \$4191.89 leaving a profit to the credit of the woodyard of \$1511.00.

REPORT CITY ASSESSOR.

Office of City Assessor, August 20th, 1916.

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of Board of Control.

Gentlemen —I herewith beg to submit to you for consideration, the Annual Report of the Assessment Department, for the year 1915-16, together with tables showing the Assessment with increases number of Poll Taxes, number Companies taxed, number Assessments and Appeals made number Transfers which took place during the year.

It will be considered proper, that having had the privilege of visiting a number of cities and of studying their systems, I should offer some suggestions as to how any of them could be worked out to our advantage.

I am of the opinion that no methodical system could could work out satisfactorily, as what would apply to one City, would not be suitable for another. Moreover, in assessing property, I believe that the most important factor to be considered in arriving at a correct value, is one based on the earning power of a building, or in other words, value established on the rental basis.

There are cases however, when such a rule could not be applied, and it will devolve to the judgment of the Assessors. I have discussed this important point with all the Assessors, and all seem to be of the same opinion concerning it.

(1) That our City be divided into districts, with a district plan for each, showing the frontage and depth of every lot, besides the number of square feet in each area, similar to the plan attached.

(2) That all our buildings be assessed on the cubic foot basis. To do this, it would be necessary to have them measured up, and if it were done, let a card similar to that used in Buffalo be introduced. This would enable us to have a most complete description of every building and would be a valuable record.

(3) That the entire office system be changed, and the Card System introduced for the keeping of Real Estate, Business, Household and Poll Tax. That the Tax Roll be prepared and put up in alphabetical order.

(4) That all building permits issued by the City Engineer, be countersigned at our Office.

(5) That part of Section No. 380 of the City Charter be struck out. My reason for suggesting this is, that all land is now assessed at what we believe to be its actual value. In our valuations of the property one of the factors entering into consideration is, whether it is receiving any or very little from the City in the way of improvements. This being so, I cannot see why a further reduction should be made.

These changes, together with the proposed Business and Household Tax, would, I believe, give us a system easily applied and carried out.

Here another important subject is to be considered. How can the finances of our City be increased, and from what new sources of Revenue are they to be derived, if we are to lose that annually obtained from Liquor Licenses? In order to offset this the finding of one million and a half of extra assessment is necessary. This, I am sure, cannot be accomplished, for the Real Estate in the City, is in my judgment, pretty well up to its value: and while some readjustments may be made here and there, I cannot see how we can reasonably look for any increase from this, other than the new buildings erected. Again our exempted property is increasing each year. You will observe from our report that there is now \$16,496,500. I am sure that when the new terminals are taken over, and we were to include the Personal Assessment in those exempted properties, the exemption will easily result in \$20,000,000. This is very much out of proportion with any of the cities I visited, and the question must arise, how much longer can our City stand the pressure?

In all the cities mentioned, with the exception of Montreal, there is some special tax. Quebec, Buffalo, Boston, Newton, Brockton, Providence and St. John, collect a citizenship or Poll Tax, from all males over 21 years of age. If this were adopted in our City, it would give us probably a revenue of \$15,000.

In the Ontario and American Cities, and St. John, N. B. they have an Income Tax, and from this source a large reven ue is derived. I gave the matter very close attention, for the reason that it had often been discussed here. With us, we have felt that it was a difficult tax to assess and collect. Much to my surprise, I find that in the cities where it is in operation, they do not seem to have any trouble to assess and collect it, because they have the Law with them.

In our City, we have a large number of citizens who do not contribute anything directly, or else a very small amount to the City Treasury. How, then are we to reach them? As far as I can see, it can only be done by one of these two forms, backed up by legislation that would enable us to carry it out.

In submitting this report, I am fully aware of the interest your Board has taken in the matter, and how desirous you are of improving our System. For this reason I have secured reports from all the Cities I visited, with much valuable literature and forms used by them, which I trust will be of some service to us in bringing about a reform of the Assessment Laws.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE

Halifax, N. S., June 23rd, 1916.

To His Worship the Mayor, and Members of the Board of Control.

Gentlemen —I have the honor to submit herewith the annual report of the Chief of Police of the City of Halifax for civic year ending 30-5-16. Since the last report several changes have taken place, as follows:—

Chief J. A. Rudland was granted leave of absence from 1st March, 1916 until the end of the present war. He has received a temporary appointment as Captain in the 219th Overseas Highland Battalion.

> Privates Mitchell, W. O. Kellock, J. Mitchell, R. McInnes, J. R. Weston, J. M.

were also granted leave for the same period; the first four named, enlisted in the 85th N. S. Highlanders, the last named, in the 64th Overseas Battalion.

The vacancies caused by the foregoing were filled temporarily by appointing Deputy Chief of Police to be Acting Chief of Police, Sergeant Northover to be Acting Deputy Chief and Private Palmer, W. E., to be Acting Sergeant.

The men's places were also filled by temporary appointments.

All ranks in the department with the single exception of the chief were granted an increase in salaries to take effect on 1st May, 1916.

Two additional men were provided for in the estimates for 1916-17.

The two motor cycle men patrolled the outskirts during the summer months, both doing good work and covering many miles during the season.

Detective Hanrahan and Kennedy have performed their duties faithfully and well, as also has the City Marshall, Mr. C. W. Nickerson.

Annexed will be found tables of offences, &c. These show a total of 3045 offences committed by 2888 persons.

The number of cases of drunkenness is 1576, which is 124 less than last year.

Gentlemen —Herewith I beg leave to submit my 13th annual report for year ending April 30th, 1916.

There has been during the year 223 alarms of fire as follows:

There are at present in the Dept. 35 horses, 2 being purchased for \$570.00. One was sold for \$130.00. The condition of the horses now in service is satisfactory with the exception of two which are old and should be disposed of.

Accidents and Deaths.

July 19, 1915, Box 35, E. Groves Operator No. 1 Chemical. bad shock from electric wire, off duty for 7 days. Aug. 30, Box 17, Corn. Ryan, hoseman No. 3 Engine, overcome by smoke and hand cut., off duty 10 days. Dec. 8, Box 36, Capt. A. J. Churchill, No. 3 Engine, hand badly cut by glass, off duty 21 days, also John Brooks

Hoseman No. 4 Engine, head cut by falling glass, off duty 7 days.

Feb. 1, 1916, Box 52, Geo. Bishop, hoseman No. 2 Engine, hand cut, off duty 21 days. Michael Murphy, Operator No. 1 Chemical, died Sept. 14, 1915.

Sept. 10, Box 93, 3 members of the crew of the schooner "Hiawatha" loaded with gasoline and Paraffine Oil at Imperial Oil Co's. Wharf at Africville, Capt. Clarke, Seamen Coppin and Saunders were burned, all three dying from burn and shock.

Mar. 26, 1916, Box 14, 4 Italians and 3 Russians lost their lives at a fire in boarding shack at works of new terminals. None of their names could be found as no list of same was kept.

General Remarks.

The fires during the year necessitated the laying of 59000 ft. of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose, 7,700 ft. of 1 in. Chem. Hose, raising 2,750 ft. of ladders and the using of 2,419 gals. of chemical and 18 pecks of salt.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT.

Fines collected during the year amounted to \$366.00.

6 members of the Call Force and 7 members of the permanent force resigned all of whom volunteered for overseas service.

The total value of Real and Personal property in use by the Dept. including Fire Alarm system amounts to \$209,591

With regard to the members of the Department there is very little to be said. The Permanent force as heretofore have given every attention to their duty. There has also been a marked improvement in the call force. Fires and Drills have been well attended by the majority of the men.

Recommendations.

I would recommend the purchase of 1000 ft $2\frac{1}{2}''$ hose to take the place of condemned hose.

And that a Triple Combination Motor Fire Engine be purchased.

Recommendations made by me in previous reports and not yet carried out.

1. That 2 of the Call Engineers be made permanent.

2. That the gradual reduction of the Call Force and the substituting in their places of a small ratio of permanent Firemen.

3. Water barrels for feeding Fire Engines with fresh water while working from salt water.

4. Signs on wharves where fire hydrants are placed.

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the state

5. Night Lights before Fire Alarm Boxes and Fire Stations.

6. That some provisions be made for fighting fires on the water front.

7. That the routes of the horses used by the Dept. for street sprinkling be made very much shorter, and that the horses on the ladder trucks be not used for street sprinkling.

8. The alteration and addition to Central Engine House

9. That the Horton Truck be sold or stored.

In conclusion, I beg to return thanks to all the officials and those who have in any way rendered assistance to the Department during the year and especially to the chairman and members of the Board of Control for their uniform kindness and also for the courtesies extended, also to the Chief and members of his department and also to the Capts. and members of the Union Protection Company who have always given me every assistance possible while working at fires.

I would also respectfully solicit a continuance of your cooperation in assisting me to maintain that Discipline in the Department, which is most essential to its well being.
