All demands against the establishment have been paid up to 30<sup>th</sup> September 1842.

The number of Commitments during the above period have been of men 108 women 44, total 152

The Committee think it proper to state for the information of the City Council That the Keeper of the Bridewell has usually charged a fee of five Shillings from each person on their discharge. According to the Keepers return those fees have on an average of the last three years amounted to the sum of £17-19-3. This practice although of long duration is objectionable on many points, and not sanctioned by Law, The Committee therefore recommend it to be discontinued.

The Committee are of opinion that as a respectable Salary is allowed for the Office of under keeper, That person ought to be appointed by and be under the control of the City Council, both as regards his mode of living and payment of his salary.

Read the following report of the Committee relative to Mr. Black's demand against the City:

"The Committee appointed by the City Council to examine the Accounts of William A. Black Esquire against the City have to Report, That as the claim preferred is a large amount and was incurred by the Magistrates some years previous to the Act of Incorporation, the Committee deem it right that the Council Should be put in possession of the fullest information connected therewith, and with that view upon examination they find as

follows: That at a Special Session held on the 8<sup>th</sup> October 1831, present John Howe Jr. R. Fairbanks, J. Liddell H. Yeomans, M. Tobin and M. Richardson Esquires; - William Hague having made an offer in writing to sell to the Magistrates for the use and benefit of the Town, the Lot of Land purchased by him recently from the Ordinance for the sum of £600, the property of acceding to the offer was now taken into consideration, and after some discussion, it was Resolved that the Lot should be purchased at the sum proposed for the benefit of the Town all the Magistrates concurring but Mr. Fairbanks who opposed the measure. It was Resolved that the Commissioners of Town Property together with Mr. Tobin be a Committee to manage the purchase of the said Lot and to complete the same.

That a Bond bearing date 5<sup>th</sup> Nov 1831, was made by James Tobin and Michael Tobin to James Foreman Esquire, Master Rotatorum and others, In trust for the Inhabitants of Halifax by which it appears That Messrs. Tobins having agreed to advance the sum of £600 for and towards the purchase of the said Lot of Land, on repayment thereof being secured to them with Interest at Five pounds ten Shillings per Cent; and the Inhabitants of Halifax not being a Corporate Body capable by Law of taking or holding lands, nor of Mortgaging the same, it was agreed by the said Justices acting on behalf of the Public, that the said Lot of Land should be conveyed to Messrs. Tobin in fee for the consideration of £600, and that the Interest should be paid to them from the proceeds of the Public Property, and that on full payment to them of the Principal and Interest, they should convey the said Lot of Land unto such person or persons, or Body Corporate or Politic, as by the order or Resolution of said Justices in Special Session shall at any time hereafter be ordered or appointed, and that in the mean time the said Lot of Land shall be possessed and occupied in such manner and for such purposes as the said Justices shall direct. - That in pursuance of such agreement a Deed bearing date 5<sup>th</sup> Nov 1831 of said Lot of Land was made by Mr. Hague to Messrs. Tobin who by their said Bond agreed to convey the same upon repayment of Principal and Interest as above mentioned.

That at a Special Session held 10<sup>th</sup> May 1832, present S. Foreman C. R. J. Howe Jr. R. Fairbanks, S. Head H. Yeomans, J. Albro, M. Tobin, J. L. Starr, J. S. Morris, J. Howe Jr., S. Kidman Esquires. - It was Resolved that the Commissioners of Town Property and Mr. Tobin be authorized to erect a Two Story Building with a

pitch roof on the land purchased from Hague.

And at a Special Session held July 6<sup>th</sup> 1832, present J. Foreman C.R. J. Howe Esq. R. Fairbanks, S. Head, H. Geomans, J. Albro, M. Tobin, G. A. Russell, J. L. Starr, W. H. Roach, J. S. Morris, J. Howe Junior Esquires. It was Resolved, That the Commissioners of Town Property be hereby authorized to complete the Building, make the same three Stories high with a suitable roof to the same, and that they are hereby authorized to borrow on Interest upon the best Terms they can a sufficient sum to erect and complete said Building according to the original plan, and that the Resolution, relative to the Building, of 10<sup>th</sup> May be rescinded.

That in accordance with the last Resolution the sum of £665, was borrowed by the Commissioners of Town Property from William Black Esquire, who as they received the amount in five different sums, gave Notes therefor in their official capacity, a copy of which Notes is herewith annexed, - That on 30<sup>th</sup> November 1837, the Session directed an order to be drawn in favor of Mr. Black for the sum of £60-19-0 on account.

That at a General Session held on 6<sup>th</sup> December 1838, present, W. D. Sawers, C.R. J. Siddle, R. Freeman, J. Starr, C. W. Wallace, T. Heatshorne, W. A. Black, E. Gray, S. Quincy, C. Allison, W. Saltus Esquires, The subject of the demand of Mr. Black, amounting to £829-17-11 was taken up, when it was Resolved, That the same be brought to the Notice of the Grand Jury by the Custos, with a strong recommendation that they take means to secure the same.

That the Grand Jury in December Term 1838, made the following presentment, The Grand Jury have had under their consideration the claim of the Heirs of the late Samuel Black against the Town of Halifax for money borrowed from them by former Commissioners of Town Property to complete the range of Wooden Buildings near the Ordnance, amounting now with Interest to £829-17-11. The title Deeds of this property are (now) in the name of Mr. J. Tobin who advanced the purchase money and part of the Cost of the Building, and to whom it is also indebted in the sum of £4424-12-11 for Principal and Interest to this time. At present the rents of the Property are barely sufficient to pay the Interest to Mr. Tobin and insurance, and the debt upon it is therefore constantly accumulating. Under these circumstances it is desirable that the property should be sold, the jury being of opinion that it will sell for nearly as much as the whole debt it now owes, but in the present defective state of the Law, this object cannot be effected, nor can the Grand Jury assess the Town for any balance which may remain unpaid after a sale has been made, altho' they distinctly recognize the Debt as one
