Recorder's Office

Gentlemen.

It having been suggested that  
Sects c 55. 11 &c under which the Mayor of this City  
is to be sworn into Office admits of two constructions,  
1<sup>st</sup> That he may be sworn by the Governor alone, or  
in his absence by the Chief Justice and three Aldermen  
2<sup>nd</sup> That in either case the presence of three  
Aldermen is necessary whether the Oaths be -  
administered by the Governor or before the Chief Justice

Now the Governor not being absent if  
the first of these be adopted and found afterwards  
not to be the true construction serious liabilities it  
is said will inevitably occur.

If the second should be chosen it  
is alleged that three Aldermen did not attend  
yesterday. And now since the late resignations  
there are not three left in the Council to be present  
so that in either case would the Mayor be  
legally qualified.

On these points submitted to me I  
would observe that while from the punctuation  
of the clause referred to, as it appears in the  
Statute Book, I doubt not the Judicial  
construction would be that three aldermen  
should be present when the Mayor takes

The Oaths of Office. whether the same are —  
administered by the Governor or before the Chief  
Justice Yet even in this view of the Case  
I should still advise as I did yesterday

If there were no other considerations than  
mere expediency the Mayor Elect after approval  
by the Governor took the safest course in presenting  
himself to take the prescribed Oaths in presence  
of the Aldermen who did attend, and I cannot  
but think that the Citizens generally would  
support rather than impugn the action of their  
Officer under such peculiar circumstances.

I make these remarks, because I have  
been requested to answer the above proponed  
difficulties, but for myself I am decidedly  
of opinion that by the last proviso of the 16<sup>th</sup> Oct<sup>t</sup>  
"the outgoing mayor occupies the office and place  
in the City Council of the Mayor then elected" and  
is to all intents and purposes an Alderman until  
he signifies his desire to retire from the Council  
and he has "two days after the expiration of his  
Mayoralty to give notice of his resignation"

Therefore with all deference to the opinions  
of the Gentlemen who have suggested the doubts  
alluded to I reiterate my opinion and strongly  
recommend that the Mayor elect should to day  
without loss of time in the presence of the three  
Gentlemen the Ex-Mayor and the two Alderman  
who have not resigned appear before his Excellency  
the Governor and again tender to take the requisite  
oaths Should they be administered by the  
Governor I feel assured that a Court of Law  
would sustain all the proceedings and decide  
that the Mayor has been duly installed into  
Office

The City Council next proceed to select two persons for the Office of City Assessors for ensuing year, when Thos S. Tobin & George E. Morton Esquires having been proposed are duly elected to that office.

Read following report of Committee on Subject of Constabulary and regulations for City Conveyances:

The Committee appointed at the last meeting of the City Council to examine the Constabulary regulations, to ascertain if the services of the present Police can be rendered more efficient. Also to license and regulate the City Conveyances.

Beg leave to Report.

That they have examined the Rules adopted by the Council on 12 Oct 1841 which are still observed for the guidance of the City Constables and are of opinion that they are as explicit

and comprehensive as possible and fully sufficient for the proper Regulation of the present Police Force.

The Committee find on investigation that these rules are complied with so strictly as the number of the Constables employed, and the numerous duties which devolve upon them will allow.

Unless therefore the Council see fit to increase the number of Policemen, the Committee would recommend that the present regulations be continued, and that the Superintendent be directed to enforce their strict observance. Particularly the section having reference to the Constables visiting the respective Wards twice in each day with a view to prevent nuisances and incumbrances in the Streets.

The Committee would further direct the attention of the Superintendent to the frequent breaches of the Lord's Day Act which occur in the City to correct which it is desirable the vigilance of the Police should be exercised.

With regard to the City Conveyances the Committee find that at present it is not in the power of the Council to insist upon the Proprietors of these Vehicles to take out Licenses and therefore any Regulations formed for their direction would be ineffectual, but should the Council deem it expedient to bring these Conveyances under their Control the Committee would suggest the passage of a Bye Law for that purpose, which can be acted upon after receiving the sanction of the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

by which it appears he had a Balance in hand 29th  
September 1846 of £1.4.11 $\frac{1}{2}$  since which period an expenditure  
amounting to £6.8.10 $\frac{1}{2}$  has been made under the direction

To His Worship the Mayor  
the Aldermen & Common Council  
now in City Council convened

The Petition of Edward Young Assistant  
City Clerk

Respectfully Sheweth.

That since the Incorporation of the City  
he has performed the duties of said Office to the  
entire satisfaction, as he confidently hopes, of the  
various Gentlemen who have successively filled the  
Offices of Mayor, Aldermen & Councilmen

That by keeping a Set of Books for a  
Mercantile Firm he received about £50 per Annum,  
which with his Salary comfortably supported his family  
So great an amount of labour insured his health  
and obliged him in less than two years to relinquish  
this additional employment. Occasional writing was  
still performed which added something to his income

For the last two years, however, the duties of the  
Office, which have gradually increased, were as much  
as he was able to attend to indeed his health became  
so seriously impaired by close attention that last year  
he obtained from your Worshipful Body leave of absence  
to seek its restoration. The difficulty of getting his  
duties adequately performed in his absence induced  
his return at an earlier period than was anticipated  
and at a greater pecuniary sacrifice than if he  
had remained longer absent. For the payment of  
necessary expences in the recovery of his health and for  
a Substitute he expended about £25 thus reducing  
his income that year to £100.

That with the greatest economy he cannot  
support his family for a less sum than £150 per Annum  
and it is respectfully submitted that for the  
devotion of his best days to the service of the Public something  
more than a bare subsistence should be allowed

To preserve those dependant upon him  
from want in the event of his death he has  
(insured)

insured his life. The premium of which costs £11 a year. The deficiency of his Salary was last year about £50 and other years from £25 to £35.

In consequence of these deficiencies he was obliged last Spring to sell a House which brought about £30 rent; and now he has no other source of income beyond a few pounds per annum.

That the duties of the Office, have very considerably increased, and now press so heavily upon him; that notwithstanding the advantages which rapidity of execution and experience have given him in accomplishing a large amount of labour in a short time, he is unable to perform it all so soon as desired.

Besides the Mayors Court and the multifarious business in the Police Department, and that resulting from the meetings of the Council, the various Standing Committees of Streets, Commons, Cemetery, Public Property & others, have records kept of their proceedings, have considerable correspondence and make frequent reports which are performed by your Petitioner, thus adding materially to his duties.

That the resources of the City have largely increased. In the rents of City Property alone an advance of nearly £500 in those of 1841 has taken place. Several hundred pounds are also derived from other sources among which is £72 the tax upon Dogs the Registry of which imposed considerable labour upon the office.

This latter sum obtained so easily and with so little expence to the city would be ample sufficient for the advance your Petitioner respectfully solicits.

Should your Worshipfully Body be pleased to add a sum not less than £50 a year to his Salary he would pledge himself not only to perform his duties faithfully and to the best of his ability as heretofore but obtain occasional assistance in copying papers &c &c and have all the duties that legitimately belong to the Office even though there should be an increase in future, promptly and satisfactorily performed.
