That in fulfillment of the mission to which I had the honor of being appointed by the unanimous vote of the City Council, I proceeded as their Delegate to the Convention which was held at Portland on the 31<sup>st</sup> of July last and the two following days; Before entering into an account of the business transacted at the Convention, I seize the present moment as the earliest opportunity offered me of expressing to the Representatives

Representatives of my fellow Citizens were in Council assembled the very courteous, kind and hospitable manner in which I as your Delegate together with the other members of the Delegation from the Purines had been treated by the members of the Committee who originated the measure and the other Citizens of Portland, and as Mayor, of the City I must not omit mentioning to my fellow Citizens similar courtesies and attentions which I received while in Boston from His Honor, Mayor Bigelow, Alderman Grant and other members of the Board of Aldermen and Common Council of that beautiful City.

After the meeting had been duly organized and an able address delivered by His Excellency Governor Hubbard, the President of the Convention, the Rev. Mr. Chittering was called upon by that Gentleman to ask the blessing of the Most High upon the work which we had in hand, the prayer was most appropriate, and the harmonious manner in which the business was conducted seemed as it were an answer to that prayer.

The Convention then proceeded to the appointment of a business Committee; pending the Report of that Committee, numerous Documents, Statistics, and memorials were presented by different gentlemen to the Convention and generally referred to the business Committee, who thus had laid before them a large field of information for their guidance. There were also read to the Convention by John A. Poor Esquire of Portland one of the originators of this movement whose arduous labours in arranging the business of the Convention were suitably acknowledged by the Convention before its close, a very large number of letters received from different influential persons in the United States and Canada among the number were letters from the President of the United States, Honorable Edward Everett and many others expressing a warm interest in the successful issue of the undertaking. After an animated and full discussion the report of the Business Committee contained in the following Resolutions was received and adopted.

Resolved that the spirit of the Age and the progress of the modern improvement, demand the most rapid and certain means of intercommunication between the people of the Old World and those of the New.

by the construction of a line of railway, leading from the great seat of population and business in the United States and Canada through Maine and the Province of New Brunswick to some convenient Port on the Atlantic Coast of Nova Scotia

Resolved as the firm and deliberate opinion of this Convention, that the time has arrived when the construction of such a line of railway shall be commenced, and that it shall be designated **The European and North American Railway**

Resolved that this great Railway, connected as it will be with Ocean Steam Navigation and the railway systems of the whole of Europe and America which traverse Empires, Kingdoms, Colonies, and States for the advantage of all, deserves to be regarded, not by the commercial world alone, but by the Statesman, the Sailor, and the Philanthropist, as one of the greatest links of that mighty Chain which is fast encircling the whole earth, strengthening the bands of brotherhood and Christian fellowship, multiplying the ties of lineage, and bidding fair to constitute of all mankind, but one great Commonwealth of Nations

Resolved that as a network of Railways now overspreads a great portion of the United States and Canada, and extends from the Far West to the valley of the Kennebec in one unbroken and continuous line, it is expected that the European and North American Railway should consist of an uninterrupted line of communication by land from the valley of the Kennebec Eastwardly through New Brunswick to the Eastern Coast of Nova Scotia from whence the Ocean may be crossed by Steam Ships to the Western Coast of Ireland as the shortest ferry across the Atlantic

Resolved, that as a means of communication for all time between the Nations of Europe, and the whole of North America, the Railway should be built in a durable and substantial manner

Resolved that by shortening the time of transit across the Atlantic Ocean by at least one third, the entire business trade between Europe and America will be eventually drawn over this line of railway.

Resolved That the through business which the proposed line of railway must command, independently of way of local traffic, will render it a most profitable undertaking and cause the commercial value of its stock to be equal to that of any Railway in the World

Resolved, That from the valley of the Kennebec in Maine to the Eastern terminus on the Atlantic Coast of Nova Scotia, the proposed line of Railway will traverse a Country abounding in natural resources and possessing all the elements of wealth and Commercial greatness in an unusual degree; that although now sparsely populated this line of Country under railway influence will soon become densely populated, and every species of industry will be called into existence among its inhabitants

Resolved That this railway demands for its completion the united and vigorous action of Citizens of the United States - of all British Subjects - and of all who desire to promote Agriculture, Commerce, and Manufactures and the progress of the Arts and Sciences in connection with the firm establishment of Peace and good will upon Earth.

Resolved That the State of Maine, and the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall be called upon to grant Concurrent Charters for the incorporation of Companies to construct the proposed Railway from the Valley of the Penobscot to the Eastern terminus in Nova Scotia

Resolved, That in addition to individual subscriptions for shares in the proposed Companies the aid of the public resources of Maine, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, shall be solicited to the extent of one half the cost of this line of Railway, that grants of the public lands near the line shall also be asked, and that the Province of Canada shall also be solicited to contribute towards the construction of a work of such great importance to its public and private interests

Resolved that a special appeal shall be made to the stockholders of all railroads between New York and London, for aid to this railway, which to them will be

much pecuniary advantage, by promoting an endless stream of travel and traffic

Resolved That application shall be made to the Governments of Great Britain and the United States respectively, for Conditional Contracts for transporting the European and North American Mail over this railway for a long period at remunerating rates.

Resolved That no subscriptions for Shares shall be asked, until Acts of Incorporation are first secured, and the necessary aids of Public Credit and of public lands are first obtained

Resolved That the Legislature of Maine now in Session, shall be called upon to grant a Charter forthwith for the incorporation of a Company to construct that portion of the line between the valley of the Penobscot and the eastern boundary of the State

Resolved That a Central Executive Committee of seven shall be chosen for carrying out the various measures indicated in the foregoing resolutions, and effecting such other objects as will best ensure the speedy commencement of the work

Resolved That in order to facilitate the progress of the work, the members of the Central Committee be requested to correspond with the local committees to be appointed along the proposed line

Resolved, That the proceedings of this Convention be carefully and authentically drawn up and published in convenient form for general circulation in Europe and America

To the fifth resolution, Hon. Mr. Johnston offered the following, by way of amendment.

Whereas several routes have been suggested for the proposed Railroad through the Province of Nova Scotia and it is desirable that the most certain information within the means of the Convention should be obtained before the particular line be selected in an adventure of such magnitude

Resolved, Therefore that a Committee be appointed of Gentlemen from the United States uninterested in any of the local considerations that affect the inhabitants the inhabitants of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and in the question indicated in the above Preamble, whose Office it shall be personally to inspect the different routes proposed for traversing Nova Scotia with the following objects concerning each especially in view

The distance and time of transit by each the physical advantages and disadvantages; the population resources, and nature of the Country, including the means of providing for the work, the probable and way passage and traffic and the amount of subscriptions from the inhabitants that might be justly relied on, and most particularly the general cost of raising the necessary funds within a reasonable period, and the time when the undertaking may be brought into effective operation by each route

And that the Committee report on these and other points of comparison which they may deem important as respects each line, to the Standing Committee, and such report finally to determine the route to be accepted as final, by Maine, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia

A proposition to have a committee appointed to survey a line of Road from Halifax to Digby thereby rendering it necessary to cross the Bay of Fundy by Steamer was negatived almost unanimously. It is due however to the advocates of the Bay route to say that after the very able and eloquent addresses made by them in favor of that line, finding the feeling of the Convention strongly exhibited in favour of the continuous land route, they retired from the Contest in a right manly and sensible manner and stated their determination to go heart and hand in favor of the Railway at all events.

The line thus agreed upon and adopted will I trust meet with the approval of the people of Nova Scotia, once establish this great trunk line and you will find that branches from it will extend throughout the Province such has been the case in other Countries and surely there is nothing to prevent the same occurrences here

The Public through the report of Major Robinson and Captain Henderson and other documents submitted to our Legislature on the subject of the Halifax and Quebec Railroad, it would appear that the local traffic on this line will be sufficient to pay the expenses of the Road and yield a profit of 5 per Cent on the Expenditure

The Call upon us is to raise our proportion of the means for the construction of about 124 miles of Rail Road over a Route in every way with but a slight exception favorable which at \$300 per mile being a liberal and fair allowance will amount to the sum of \$36,800. And what is the road contemplated to become. The Highway from the Old to the New World to make our City the terminus of the Atlantic Steamers and to render it the Emporium of the Canadas and the Greater Proportion of the Western Country. To speak of any other terminus than the Port of Halifax is perfectly beside the question, the able report of Major Robinson and Captain Henderson fully shows the impracticability of White Star being advantageously made so, and the experience of all nautical men engaged in the navigation of our Waters will prove that no Steamer can from the month of February to May in safety approach the Coast to the Eastward of Halifax

No sacrifice therefore on our part can be too great to insure the immediate building of this Road. The matter is so simple and plain to the practical eyes of the business world that the want of due diligence and cooperation on the part of the owners of Real Estate, Merchants, Mechanics, Capitalists and Traders to improve this opportunity will be looked upon hereafter as a sad mistake and render us guilty of culpable negligence

The Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Halifax, now in Common Council convened respectfully request to bring to the notice of your Excellency the accompanying Resolution, which was passed unanimously at a very large and influential meeting of the Citizens of Halifax, held on Saturday last in this City, to consider the subject of the proposed European and North American Railway. They would respectfully urge upon Your Excellency the importance of the subject, as one more worthy than any other in the present aspect of affairs in Nova Scotia to engage the attention and enlist the sympathies and exertions of the Government. The completion of the Great work contemplated by the Resolution will not only elevate this Province to the most conspicuous and important position on the Western Continent, by rendering it the direct channel of communication between our Parent Country and the United States on the most enlarged and magnificent scale; but the rich though now unproductive resources of our Province both Mineral and Agricultural will become developed and made available for the public good, its Commercial interests rapidly advanced, and its revenues materially aided and increased. They therefore cordially concur with the sentiments contained in the enclosed Resolution and doubting not that Your Excellency takes a deep interest in every project which has a tendency to advance the interest of the Province, they respectfully pray that Your Excellency would recommend to the Provincial Parliament to undertake the construction of that portion of this important work which is to pass through Nova Scotia in a line between Halifax and the frontier of New Brunswick.

And the Mayor and the City Council would earnestly press upon Your Excellency the propriety of calling together the Legislature at as early a period as practicable,
