the then Mayor M'Kemmen to ascertain whether in the event
of my erecting a Hay Scales on my property for the convenience
of the leather part of the City, there was any exclusive privilege
which would prevent Hay being weighed at it, and received
from him an assurance that there was none, in consequence
of which I entered into a contract at a very considerable
expence with parties in the United States to put up one of
the most approved construction, and when completed his
Majesty upon my application was good enough to direct
the Clerk of the Market to test its correctness which was done
and a most satisfactory Certificate under their hands was
handed to the City Council, but I believe no action was
taken thereon, and being now aware that many parties
who would gladly avail themselves of the convenience
