The Committee of Public Accounts beg leave to inform the City Council, that they in examining the Book kept by this department perceive all the City accounts are not presented to them for examination and approval, but that many are sanctioned and paid without being submitted

If it be intended that this committee should keep a strict supervision of the City's financial affairs

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November 22<sup>nd</sup>

affairs, and the exact annual expenditure should be known. This intention is not accomplished by the present partial submission of accounts.

The Estimates for the Year's requirements, although sanctioned by this Committee, and nominally their estimate, is but the Draft of the City Clerk, on whose judgment the whole council depend for the accuracy of the statement annually exhibited, and upon which the Assessment for the ensuing year is made.

The whole City Revenue, by the present Act of Incorporation is one General Fund from which the various departments draw the sums required for disbursement.

The Committee would therefore recommend that in future the accounts of every department in the City, should be kept distinct, and exhibited to them, that a record may be made in their books, from which the exact sums drawn by each, how expended and for what purpose may be known and published, at the end of every fiscal year.

Should this System be adopted, the appropriations for each department, under its own name can be made in the estimate with correctness.

After having as named provided the amount deemed sufficient, this Council are of opinion that a contingent fund is necessary, let it be reserved for a contingency and not set aside, as has hitherto been the practice, and expended under the directions of the Street Commissioners.

If this Fund be not expended, at the end of the year the balance will be accounted for, and before the Institution of the ensuing year.

The Council will perceive, that the alterations suggested by the Committee, necessarily causes much additional labour to devolve upon them, but the effectual check this System will afford to inaccuracy or unauthorised expenditure, by any of the Departments, is what induces us to recommend it, as the only method we can at present devise, which will give satisfaction to those who wish a detailed, and distinct account, of the expenditure of the City Funds.

Read following report of the Committee  
of City Property relative to New Market

The City Council having been authorised by  
an Act of the Legislature passed last Session, to borrow the sum of  
\$4,000 to erect a Market House, directed the Committee of the City  
Property to advertise for designs and estimates. This Committee  
observing that the Act was passed with the proviso that the  
Market House be of Brick or Stone, would state that they consider  
the above sum too small, for such a stone or brick building  
as the City Council seem to have in contemplation, and would  
recommend that application be made to the Legislature for  
liberty to borrow \$2,000 in addition to the former sum. Presuming  
that this permission would be granted they advertised for designs  
and estimates directing the Architects that their estimates were  
not to exceed \$6,000. Four designs have been submitted to the  
Committee all within the latter amount signed Aara,  
Scotia, P.E.D. and Blank, and they have had several  
meetings to examine these designs. The last mentioned one  
has met their approval generally as delineated, with the exception  
of the Eastern elevation, where a different arrangement of the Steps  
on the basement story was agreed upon making five steps on that  
story and also an elongation of the windows of the first story to  
correspond with those on the second story. The architect was consult-  
ed about these alterations, and he informed the Committee  
that they might easily be made.

The design shows a building 68 x 110 feet  
The Committee having had a plan of the Ground prepared by  
M<sup>r</sup> Jacob Currie Supervisor of Streets, find that the ground upon which  
the present market stands measures 100 feet and the lane to the back  
16 feet. The Committee had contemplated taking 10 feet of this lane  
so as to enable them to have a building the size of the design 110 feet,  
but having taken the opinion of the Recorder in writing, and now  
laid on your table, they find that the City cannot encroach upon this  
lane without having an act from the Provincial Legislature. They  
also find that a line drawn from the back side of the Building leading  
down the the Market Wharf, to the property owned by M<sup>r</sup> McDonald on  
George Street, would give them 90 8 feet north of the line of the present  
Market house, and the Recorder's opinion is that the Commissioners  
of Street are the persons to whom application is to be made, if the  
Council wish to take any part of this ground, as the Committee  
as the Committee understand that the Council are desirous of  
advertising for tenders forthwith, they would recommend that  
this design be altered to 106 ft x 68 ft instead of 110 ft x 68 feet  
as in the Draft submitted estimated at \$5,500. in which

the

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November 22<sup>d</sup> The North and West front are of Free stone similar to the Bank of British North America, and East and South Fronts of double stone. Under the impression that the Commissioners of Streets would feel themselves warranted in allowing an ornamental stone building for the public use to be brought out 15 feet, particularly as it faces an open space, they would recommend that the building be 16x68 feet.

The Committee would suggest that tenders be taken separately.

1<sup>st</sup> The basement story and the base of the building to be double aged granite, and all above on the East West and North Fronts of Free stone similar to that of the Bank of British North America. The South Front to be rough pointed Free stone.

2<sup>nd</sup> The building to be double aged granite except the south front which is to be rough pointed granite.

3<sup>rd</sup> The basement story and base as in the first tender to be of Granite, and all above faced brick for East, West and North Front with Granite rustic cornices window sill, architraves, lintels, pillars, cornices and chimneys of double aged granite the south front good hard brick.

It now remains for this committee to exhibit what they estimate would be the expence of completing this building and the annual rent they consider that it would yield in contrast with the rent realised from the present building.

The lane referred to is of many years standing probably has been a thoroughfare since the first settlement I can remember it very long. I consider it to be a public street and therefore without an act of the Provincial Parliament I do not think it could be legally made obstructed.

As to the other question, the City stands in the same position as a private proprietor about to build, and therefore I recommend you to apply to the Commissioners of Streets to give you your correct line on George street, on whom will rest the responsibility of fixing the true line on such consideration of the facts and law as they feel bound to take, their duty in such cases is judicial and no doubt they will examine the utmost law, and you I think will be perfectly justified as official, when adopting the line they may approve.

That in the performance of the duty they called at the office of Impost and Excise with expectation of obtaining the necessary information but found, that with the exception of the manifests of vessels being placed on file, no Statistical record of this description is kept in that Department - from the Comptroller of Customs and Navigation Laws therefore the following returns of the Importation and Exportation of Flour and Meal were procured.

Believing this statement to be substantially correct Your Committee consider they are warranted in arriving at the conclusion that there 150,000 Barrels of Flour and Meal annually liable on Importation into this Port to a Tax of one penny per barrel for Weighing which amounts to the Gross sum of \$625.00 when it is kept in view that from the nature of our trade with Canada the Importation of Flour and Meal from that Quarter will still increase the probability is that the amount of income from this source to be enjoyed by the Weighing Officers will not be less than now stated. By the Act of the Assembly Cap 7. passed 28<sup>th</sup> March last Section 6 or 11 the Council can only interfere with the fees payable to those now in Office so as to regulate or to reduce them to an equivalent for the work performed by appointing one or more officers under which circumstances your Committee recommend the appointment of two additional Weighers of Flour and Meal for the City, by the adoption of which course it appears to your Committee the inconvenience at present experienced by the Mercantile Community will be obviated and the emoluments of the Officers better apportioned and equalized than they now are. The sentiments of your Committee accord with the generally received axiom of the Political economists of the present day, viz that a fair day's wages should be paid for a fair day's work, but they

Submit

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submit that it is not the wish of the City Council nor can they believe that it was the intention of the Legislature that such large incomes should be received by such Officers as either hold or might be appointed to these situations.

Your Committee recommend further that it be made a condition that the Officers appointed or to be appointed by the City Council under this Act shall open and keep an Office in some central part of the City whereby adopting a system of rotation one or more of them may be communicated with on all matters connected with their duties, and where a record of all their transactions under this Act ought to be kept -

Finally in connection with this subject which effects the interest of both Importers of Flour and Meal and the Consumers generally - as well as the duties which devolve upon the Officers. Your Committee recommend that further publicity be given to the Act of the Legislature by its insertion in ~~and~~ at least of the City news Papers

### Opinion

Look upon the Act 1850, as giving to the City  
Council the power of directing a new Road or alteration  
of an old one; and I do not think that an appraisement  
made under it would necessarily compel them to carry out  
such projected road, if they saw good cause to abandon it.

There is nothing expressed to that effect in  
Section 18 Act 1850 and I think that supersedes in a great  
measure, if not totally, the Act of 1834 (14 Vict 4. c. 19.) even  
under the older Act. I am not satisfied that the Petitioners  
would have been compelled to confirm the freeholders return,  
if the damages and expenses proved much greater than they  
had contemplated in opening their prospect, I should consider  
such a construction to be extreme and unreasonable as setting  
aside the general interest altogether.

The acts regulating the expenditure of Provincial  
fund in new lines and alterations of roads have generally left  
a discretion with the Government to adopt or reject them on the  
amount of the cost being ascertained; and although the  
act in question say nothing on this point, I should conceive  
it to be an implied authority.

The owners of land adjoining a proposed  
line of new Road could not, I think recover compensation for  
a damage which they would not in fact sustain, in case of the  
project being abandoned before the road was laid open.

As true the Act of 1830 is insufficiently as it does  
not give any power to the City Council in direct terms, except that  
of adjusting the appraisement of damages, but we must necessarily  
imply all other powers incidental to laying out the road, or  
else it would be a nullity.

All the powers held by the Petitioners and by the  
Commissioners of Streets are given to the City Council by act of 1849 Chaplo  
14. Sections 107 and 108 and the Commissioners of Streets are directed  
to make and open new Streets or highways where the same shall  
be authorized to be made.

I beg to acknowledge the honor you have
