In the event of the above plan being carried into full operation, which it could not be, from the very nature of the case for several years the expenses in round numbers would be nearly as follows

1. Salary of Teachers	\$5000
2. Interest, Insurance &c for 8 new Schools (Four of the present public Schools being converted into District Schools)	400
3. Contingencies	300
4. Normal Institution (additional)	200
5. Teachers of Music & Drawing	300
6. School Books	300
Total	<u>\$6500</u>

How large this sum may appear, it is not nearly equal to the amount which the present defective mode costs. There are at present in Halifax about 70 teachers, and 20 schools and the income of the former and the rest of the latter together with Books so can scarcely be less than \$800. Thus with the present number of children in attendance, there will be a saving of \$200. and when this is added the education of 2000 more out of the 2000 children at present receiving no education, calculating at the same rate there will be a saving of not less than \$3000.

But the pecuniary saving is but one of the benefits to be derived from this general plan. There are others much more valuable. These are such as the following, a fair proportion of the population receiving a first rate education, an uniformity of system, a proper status assured to teachers due scope given to the professional qualifications of teachers in being provided with all the necessary materials such as school accommodation furniture, books &c the last comfort and advantage to teachers, from the certainty that their salaries will be regularly paid, the general result in the social and moral well-being of the community at large &c &c

But as already stated this scheme, even under the most favourable circumstances, cannot be fully carried out for a few years, and therefore, the Commissioners would propose and recommend that during the first two or three years, the expence shall not exceed the sum of \$3000 which sum shall be devoted to the establishment of 6 primary schools in the different wards of the City, one of which shall be erected into a Normal Institution as soon as means are available for the purpose, it being understood that in the event of the Legislature continuing the grant of \$100 to the City of Halifax and out of the Public Treasury the expence will be

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February 7 be thus far reduced

In the course of 4 or 5 years the advanced schools might be commenced in the most central localities which would in all probability add another £1000 to the assessment and run gradually till the whole plan is put into operation.

By this graduated scale the burden would fall lightly at first on the rate payers, the advantages becoming more and more apparent as the scheme advanced towards completion, and the Board of Education would have time afforded for procuring the most efficient teachers either from their own Normal Institution or elsewhere.

As to the particular mode of laying the assessment, the Commissioners would leave this matter entirely in the hands of the Municipal Authorities acting under the sanction of the Legislature. They would however beg to suggest that the money thus raised be granted entirely for secular education, subject to such regulations concerning religious matters as shall be deemed expedient by the City Board for harmonizing a school system and obtaining the acquiescence of the various Christian denominations in the community.

The Commissioners at a meeting held on the 7<sup>th</sup> instant having unanimously agreed to the foregoing proposal—

It was resolved to recommend the same to their fellow citizens, and with this view, to transmit a copy to the City Authorities earnestly soliciting their approbation and support; and that no time be lost, to petition the Legislature that the Civic Authorities be empowered to lay an assessment in the event of a majority of the rateable inhabitants approving of the scheme.

their consideration aided in their review by a scroll plan of the  
Northern section furnished by Alderman This, and now  
on file in the Records of the City, they are of opinion and recommend  
may do respectfully urge upon the City Council to include in the  
expedition for the ensuing year the sum of Three Hundred pounds  
to form a fund in addition to the rents now received out of which  
the contemplated improvements may be met as they proceed  
which will not only enable the Committee to early cut the work  
with expedition but in the end be a saving to the Citizens and a well  
spring of future benefit in a sanitary and recreative point of view  
in fact such a place of resort requires only improvement and ornaments  
suitable to the advanced state of society to become at once appreciated by  
the inhabitants of this like all other Cities of similar magnitude and  
to be without which has given occasion to many strangers to hazard  
remarks not by any means favourable to the good taste of the Citizens.

The objects claiming the early attention of the  
Committee are the formation of a Road from Rydes Bridge (so called)  
to run south so as to open a communication to the Roman Catholic  
Cemetery from the Centre and North end of the City, and to lay  
off the Eastern boundary of the Common in that quarter, with  
reference to this much desired improvement a Committee  
waited upon His Lordship the Right Reverend Bishop Walsh  
who a degree of liberality, worthy of the highest praise gave his  
assurance that the portion of the Road immediately in front of  
the Cemetery under his control would be completed by the  
Congregation for whose benefit that portion of the Common was originally  
granted, while some of the owners of property bordering thereon have  
promised small donations in furtherance of this work. Another  
Crop section of Road is required from Cornwallis Street to lead  
direct

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to the Cemetery at Camp Hill. Rows of Trees bordering upon the Road leading so as to afford some degree of protection from the severity of the weather have also to be planted. The land thoroughly drained and cleared of stones of which it is susceptible at comparatively trifling expense and thereby be made a source of great public convenience, the widening of the bridges, deepening of the drains, and still further leveling and improving the Road in every direction, will demand annually, the strictest supervision of the Committee for some time to come, who appeal with confidence to the Council for their approval and confirmation of what has been already accomplished.
