The representation of the undersigned respectfully sheweth. That several years ago the Provincial Legislature granted the sum of \$600 towards the establishment of a public Hospital in the City of Halifax on condition that the additional sum of \$900 were raised by a peperment for effecting that object. That no available measures having been taken for the fulfilment of that condition, and several circumstances having from time to time occurred shewing the indispenable necessity for such an institution, in the month of October last at the instance of several of the benevolent institutions in this City in conjunction with the Health Office for this port, and other persons desirous of effecting the object, a public meeting was called, at which a large number of the citizens attended and several resolutions were there passed favourable to the object, among which was the following "Resolved that a Committee be now appointed to solicit and obtain donations from the inhabitants of the City and other persons, according to the discretion of the Committee for the purpose already expressed and that the same committee make application in the usual manner to the Provincial Legislature during its next session to pass such enactment and regulations as may be requisite to effect the establishment of such public Hospital and for ensuring its effectual and beneficial support." That the Committee appointed under the foregoing resolution being now engaged in making the said collections with the prospect of obtaining the amount required consider that they are now in a position, and feel it to be proper to apply to the City Authorities to adopt such measures as they may deem expedient.

### Schools of the City of Halifax

1<sup>st</sup> At the time of holding the Municipal elections in each Ward, two fit and proper persons shall be elected to be School trustees by a majority of the rateable inhabitants of such Ward and the trustee first nominated shall go out of office at the ensuing election, and another shall be appointed in his place and soon in rotation. Such elections shall be conducted in the same manner as ordinary Municipal elections and the retiring trustee may be reelected with his own consent

2<sup>nd</sup> The school trustees of the City shall be a corporation under the name of the Board of School Trustees of the City of Halifax. The first meeting whereof shall be called in the \_\_\_\_\_ by the \_\_\_\_\_ within two weeks preceding the election (and it shall be the duty of such Board

1<sup>st</sup> To appoint annually a chairman, secretary and collectors (if required) and to pay to the secretary and collectors such salaries as may be necessary, and to appoint the times and places of their meetings manner of conducting and recording their proceedings and of keeping their accounts

2<sup>nd</sup> To prepare and lay before the Municipal Council as soon as possible after their appointment and thereafter annually, an estimate of the sums required for providing free schools for all the children of the City between of five and sixteen

Sixteen years. And it shall be the duty of the Council to provide such sum or sums in such manner as it may deem expedient, but the council shall have no power to reduce the amount of the estimate of the trustees, except with their consent given at a meeting on conference called for that purpose.

3<sup>rd</sup> To draw from the City Treasurer the sums provided as above and to expend the same for the benefit of the Schools, and to receive and pay to the teachers the sums appointed to them by the Commissioners of Schools.

4<sup>th</sup> To employ and contract with licensed teachers take possession of and as a corporation all school property of the City, or which may be acquired for school purposes determine the number sites kinds and grades of schools, build hire, furnish and repair school houses, prepare and forward to the Comr<sup>s</sup> semiannual returns according to the forms issued by the Superintendent call public meetings of the rateable inhabitants of the City if required, visit each school quarterly, and take charge of the School Libraries in accordance with the rules issued by the Governor in Council.

5<sup>th</sup> To prepare and publish in one of the City papers or otherwise, an annual report of their proceedings, and of the receipts and expenditures of School monies.

6<sup>th</sup> To encourage and support as public schools the existing public schools of the City, or such of them as may be willing to come under the provisions of this act, with their existing constitutions and arrangements, except in so far as the same may be modified and improved with the consent of their trustees and other managers.

3<sup>rd</sup> The provisions of this Act relating to the Provincial Normal School County Department, Superintendent of Education, Commissioners of Schools, School visitors of Schools, Inspectors of Schools and Teachers, shall apply to the City of Halifax in the same manner as to other districts.

Dear Sir

They have to enclose, for the information of the City Council, a rough sketch of a method of regulating the City Schools in conformity with the provisions of the School Bill now before the Legislature.

The details of this method have been borrowed with little change from the clauses relating to cities and incorporated towns in the School Act of Upper Canada. It places the Schools of the City under the management of a Board of Trustees elected by the rateable inhabitants, and subject only to the control exercised by the Superintendent of Education and the Comr<sup>r</sup> of Schools under the general provisions of the Bill.

Under the general provisions of the Bill the City will receive through the Commissioners of Schools its proportion of the Provincial grant say £600 and of the County Tax say £700 additional, these two sums are equal to the whole amount paid for the support of public schools of the City last year, by the people and the purse as returned in the Commissioners report.

The additional sums to be received by the City trustees to establish free schools, may be roughly estimated as follows. The present schools estimate about 1700 children at an annual expence of about £1400 to this we may add £700 to put the existing schools in an efficient state by furnishing apartments &c of under a free school system the number of children in the City Schools should immediately increase by one half, teachers would be required for about 850 children at a cost of say £1100 making a total of about £1800 exclusive of cost or rent of buildings which might be required. If the school attendance should be doubled, which it might easily be if the parents be disposed to take advantage of the benefits offered to them, of course the sum for additional children would amount to £2200 exclusive of buildings. All these estimates suppose a low rate of remuneration to teachers.

It is to be observed that the law will leave the amount to be raised entirely to the decision of the trustees who as representatives of the people, will be bound to consult the wishes of the constituency. It is also to be observed
