Office of Superintendent of Streets

To His Worship the Mayor

*Sir*

Agreeably to your instructions received  
this morning, I have inspected Barrack Street and find that the  
Contractor John Mc Guire has finished the excavation of the street in strict  
accordance with the levels given by Mr William McCay based on our joint  
Report adopted by the City Council. The street having now a uniform  
level surface. There are some parts of the side wall in front of the dwell-  
ing houses which cannot be excavated to the exact level without involving  
the removal of the steps and platforms, which are erected temporary until  
the side wall is properly finished, then the Contractor promises to remove  
the few loads of earth now above the level. There is also a space of six  
feet on the West side of the street, so completely incumbered with the land  
slide of the Clark Hill that the Contractor cannot get under it to take  
out the few inches which the true levels require.

I trust the Council will not allow the interests of Mr. Blair to be sacrificed by any desire on the part of Mr. James to take the work off the Contractors hands before the contract has been fulfilled, and that Mr. Blair may have an opportunity of showing that neither the original contract nor the modification of it by the Council have been carried out. I now address you on the subject as I am informed by Mr. Blair that the Workmen have left and he imagines Mr. James intends to require no more to be done.

Halifax 20 December 1853.

Gentlemen

In Compliance with your request that I should give  
 you my ideas on the subject of establishing a City Prison at Rock Head Farm so  
 called. I now beg to submit the same for your consideration. I need scarcely  
 bring to your notice, for I am sure you are very well acquainted with the present  
 very inefficient state of our Bridewell, as well for the want of the necessary  
 accommodation for the prisoners, as for its total inapplicability, in its construction  
 and present state of repair, to adapt any system to be made use of for their im-  
 provement; and the situation is a deplorable, and does not offer sufficient  
 space for employing the prisoners to advantage; it is now matter of public safety,  
 how much we need an establishment, where offenders both old and young, might  
 be placed for confinement and reformation. The purchase of such an Establishment  
 by the City Authorities is a prominent charity, and in my judgment will commend  
 itself to all men of proper reflection. The property called Rock Head, owned by the Corpora-  
 tion consists of 40 acres of land, and is beautifull situated, at the west end of the  
 city, commanding a most extensive view of the whole of Bedford Basin, and  
 the surrounding Country, the object I had in view, in calling the attention of the City  
 Council to this matter, was that an application should be made to the Legislature  
 at its ensuing session, for an act, to enable the City to sell the lot of land and prop-  
 erty on which the present Bridewell stands, and appropriate the funds, towards  
 the erection of a stone building at Rock Head, to be called "the City Prison" as however  
 the present Establishment could not conveniently be offered for sale until after  
 the new buildings were ready for use, it would become necessary to borrow the  
 necessary funds for the erection in the meanwhile, authority for which loan, not  
 to exceed £2000 should likewise be asked for, in the contemplated application to  
 the Legislature. During the former occupancy of the Office to which I have now  
 the honor of being a second time elected. I deeply felt as I used to do the necessity  
 of an establishment for the confinement, employment and reformation of vagrants  
 and petty criminals who are at present sent to Bridewell, where corrupting and  
 corrupting each other by indiscriminate intercourse, they remain until the expi-  
 ration of their sentences and in most cases, when discharged, are sent again  
 in a few days or weeks at most to go through the same routine, many of these  
 criminals are young almost children in years and judgment left for the most  
 part without parents or friends to advise, they have become the victims of the  
 unprincipled, and designing and find themselves the inmates of Bridewell before  
 their minds are matured or their characters formed, The lasting uprooting of a  
 Bridewell sentence lets down every barrier between them and a life of infamy;  
 I assure you gentlemen it appears to me little cruelty referred to sentence these  
 poor

December 27. poor creatures, both male and female, to confinement in our present Establishment, and then turn them out, with the additional odium of having been a Picture and emblem in nine Cases out of ten for their reception, to friends to advise and protect, and no eye but God's to pity, while the like and vicious in almost every walk of life, are waiting to and ensnare and plunge them deeper into unwatchedness and Crime. Not only with the hope of reclaiming such and rescuing them from an early and perhaps ignominious death, but also for the Credit of the City, and the welfare of the City Society at large, I would suggest the propriety of a separate Establishment being made in the proposed City Prison for Criminals under twenty years of age when their education and morals should be cared for, and where they should be required to pursue some useful employment so that when discharged from imprisonment they should come out useful Members of Society, and qualified to earn an honest livelihood. The employment in the Prison besides that of cultivating the soil, should be simple, and easily learned, and more valuable in labor and materials and not requiring outlay for fixtures and tools. I will enumerate a few, which I think could be adopted in our proposed establishment by the trade of Carpenters, Shoe Cutters, Shoe Makers, Tailors, Weavers and Cabinet Makers; perhaps in one of these is better adapted for a Prison, such as we suppose, than Shoe making, it is simple and capable of division into several parts, some one of the parts of making a Shoe can be worked upon almost immediately after entering the Prison, by men, Women and Children; two days only are necessary to enable almost all prisoners to be profitably employed in making Shoes; the large proportion of the value of the manufactured article is in the labor, Open material, and the time of when known, always valuable to any one in ordinary circumstances who is willing to labor for himself or others. The demand is always large, and is not fluctuating to the same degree, as many other mechanical occupations, while employed at this business prisoners can be arranged so as to be easily supervised and supplied with work, kept in Silence and order and prevented from doing mischief by evil communications. It is therefore a good employment for a Prison and is as likely as any other to be useful to a discharged Convict., What is here said of Shoemaking, may with nearly the same be said of tailoring; so that if the employment of prisoners were confined to those two branches of business or even the first, more successful results would be obtained than are obtained with a great variety of employments frequently changed at ill selected, this information as to the most profitable employment of prisoners, I have principally gathered from reading numerous reports on the treatment and management of prisoners in Massachusetts and other States of the American Republic. As to the plan of the building and to the most advantageous manner of employing the labor of the prisoners, these are matters of detail which must be left for mature consideration, The urgent necessity for such an establishment as is now suggested, has so deeply impressed itself upon my mind, that I feel I should not faithfully discharging the duties of the high Office to which I have been appointed were I not strenuously to urge its claims upon your most favorable consideration, I have the honor to be

The Committee appointed by the Council to examine  
into the claims of Mr James Pollock late Overseer of Streets, was summoned  
several times, and had but two meetings, at the first meeting Present Mr.  
Scott, Evans, Colman, Wardell, Agent Chairman, Longard absent, the  
correspondence between the Hon. Mr McCully attorney at law and Your Worships  
was taken up and read.

The Chairman called the attention of the Committee  
to the City records as a means from which to ascertain the true position of Mr.  
Pollock relatively, as to his connection with the Corporation, and the public service  
during the years 1832 and 3, and after due examination it was ascertained.

Firstly, That Mr Pollock was duly elected an  
Overseer of Streets on the 15th day of October in 1832, the period by law  
directed.

Secondly, That he entered on the duties of the  
office of Overseer and was paid a quarters salary on the 1<sup>st</sup>  
of March 1833 by the City Treasurer on the authority of a check signed by  
His Worship the Mayor.

Thirdly, That on the twelfth day of April the  
Council resolved that James Evans and James Pollock be appointed  
temporary Superintendents of Streets for the same districts they had  
previously supervised, and to continue in Office until a Superintendent  
for the City shall be appointed.

Fourthly, The Chairman called your Committee's

in conformity with the advice and under the direction of His Worship the Mayor and Council to the effect following: "Resolved that the parties appointed to act as temporary Superintendant of the City, as by resolution this day passed be empowered and authorized to complete the same work uncompleted, under the direction and authority of His Worship the Mayor and that they be requested without delay to furnish His Worship the Mayor with a statement of said repairs, that unnecessary amount should be suspended."

A majority of your Committee refused to permit the Chairman to take cognizance of that resolution, on the ground that it had nothing to do with Mr. Pollock's Claims. The Chairman concurred in opinion with Mr. Alderman Scott thought it an essential point in the enquiry, inasmuch as the resolution not only temporarily appointed Messrs. Jones and Pollock Superintendants of Streets for the period existing between the abrogation of the Old Law and the appointment of one Sept. as decided by the Council under the New Law, but pointed out the duties of the temporary Sept. who were to be officially guided and directed by His Worship the Mayor; a copy of which resolution was ordered to be furnished both gentlemen appointed Mr. Jones and Mr. Pollock.

Fifthly. That an account from the Commissioner of Streets for Ward 5. showing the labour performed and expenditure made under Mr. Pollock's Superintendance up to May 5<sup>th</sup> which had been handed in for payment, was also not permitted to be inserted, although specially entered in the records of the City. Thus a dead lock having occurred in the progress of the investigation, the majority proposing nothing, the Committee adjourned to meet on another day, that day came. Your Chairman was in attendance but a quorum could not be obtained, at length on the 21<sup>st</sup> of the present month a quorum was obtained, present Mr. Scott, Coleman, Longard, Agent. When it was decided that the Extracts from the Records previously objected to might be transferred to the minutes of the Committee and be reported to the Council in their proper place, the Committee unanimously declining to express any opinion as to the merits of Mr. Pollock's claim anterior to the 6<sup>th</sup> May; conveying to the Council merely the particulars of Mr. Pollock's connection with the corporate body up to that period. All of which is respectfully submitted to Your Worship and the Council.
