Resolved that the sum of Two Hundred pounds be allowed the City Marshal annually for his services exclusive of any fees, and that the fees be received by him as usual and agreeably to law and be paid over to the City Treasurer monthly and that the Committee of Public Accounts be authorised to include the amount of said salary in the next years apportionment, which on being put is passed unanimously.

On Motion City Council most take up the opinion of His Honor the Recorder this day submitted relative to the Claim of Mr James Pollock against the City which is read,

The Office of Overseer of Streets is one mentioned in the first act under which the City was incorporated 1841. 11 Victoria Chap 53 Section 100. again in amending Act 1843. 6 Vic. Cap 28 Sec 17. In 1848. 11 Vic Cap 39 Sec 118. One or more Supervisors of Streets are to be annually appointed and the 11th Section of said Act mentions the Overseer. The Act of 1849. 10 Vic Cap 11. Sec 10. directs the annual election of one or more Supervisors of Streets. And the present Charter Act passed 31 March 1851. Section 53 includes one or more Supervisors of Streets among the Officers to be annually elected by the City Council on the 15th October yearly. The Act regulating Highway Labor in the City Revised Statutes Cap 65. Sec 6. mentions the Overseer. The precise Duties of these Officers have not been defined by these acts but in practice they have acted up to last year under the orders of the Commissioners of Streets in calling out the Statute labor by serving notices, and in superintending and executing the road work. Their salaries were at one time £80 a year each but were at last settled at £100 a year each. In October 15th 1832. the City Council elected Mr James Pollock as an overseer of Streets under the laws then in force. I am of opinion he was then elected to serve for one year at the salary of £100. The question then is whether any thing has taken place to annul or rescind the contract then entered into between the City as the employer and Mr Pollock as the employed. First. then does the Act of 1833 Cap 36 which has substituted Superintendents for Commissioners of Streets. vacate this contract. It was as I am aware the intention of the Council in procuring the passage of that act by the Legislature to dispense in future with the two Overseers of Streets and thereby save the amount of their salaries when the act should come into full operation; which saving is now effected. But the act in question makes no mention of Overseers, and the change it does make of placing Superintendents in room of Commissioners does not necessarily prevent the existence of the office of Overseer who might consistently with the terms of that law, act under the Superintendent, as they did before under the Commissioners. I need not therefore enquire what would be the effect if the Office of Overseer had been expressly abolished by law.
 2. Mr Pollock accepted and acted as temporary ^{Sub} Overseer under the New Act, as this office was not incompatible with that of Overseer. I do not see that he necessarily lost the other office thereby.

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3rd. After the present Superintendent was appointed, Mr Pollock no longer did any duty and indeed was absent from the City for some time on an employment in another part of the County. I do not think these circumstances impair his legal right to the salary for the remainder of the year for which he had been duly elected. Had he been called upon by the Superintendent or by the Council to perform any duties attached to the Office and refused to obey, that would be a breach of contract on his part and might amount to a forfeiture of compensation, but I do not find any facts in this case on which I could safely rely, to shew that he had broken his engagement. I therefore think it probable that it would be difficult to defend the action he has commenced with reasonable hopes of success. Although he has not during the summer of 1853 performed his usual duties, yet he was apparently excluded from doing so, by the new arrangements, and if a clause had been introduced into the act to terminate his employment in April 1853 he might have remonstrated against its passing on the ground that it would throw him suddenly out of employment in breach of an existing contract.

down 18 feet in width your Petitioner was informed by one of the Committee that
his tender was the only one agreeable to advertisement but that there was a
mistake in the Survey, and that the street had to be made 11 feet wide, And
Gentlemen, Your Petitioner had Confidence with the same Gentlemen of the Com-
mittee referred to, and came to a Conclusion to admit the difference of 3 feet

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Horses and Carts in hauling the earth, that Gentleman said he would assist me in any way that he could. Your Petitioner then proceeded to Mr. McDonalds of the House of Correction asked of him, that in case of getting the Contract of said Street would he purchase the Stones besaid he would and give £ per ton, and that he would try to get it if he could, and Your and Worshipful Gentleman but for these promises laid upon these grounds Your Petitioner had no hand or part in making the said bargain, that after the Contract having been signed the Hon. Gen. Collier sent his four horses and carts to haul the earth but were returned home and not allowed the earth to be deposited on the Common. Petitioner thereupon became quite at loss what to do, but then afterwards to Col. Savage R.E. asked of him would he want the earth he said he would, and that he would assist me in any way he could and grant me as near a place as he could possibly to land the earth, on the same day the Committee of the Common sent for Your Petitioner when about to give the earth to Col. Savage. Your Petitioner took another thought that it would be a pity and unfair to deprive the Corporation of the earth while the Commissioners required it for the improvement of the Common. Your Petitioner thereupon agreed to give them the earth for a Hundred pounds £. that every act purued previous to Your Petitioner for had he kept the earth with the assistance he could have obtained from other people that wanted it along with the stones. Your Petitioner in place of losing so much might have come out with profit and Cider to himself instead of meeting with such great loss. Your Petitioner beg leave to state to Your Hon. and Worshipful Gentleman that he kept a check of all the loads that went from Barrack Street as well as possible and as appears there were far exceeding 80,000 loads and according to general opinion of others with since that there was one fourth of 80,000 loads. Surface stone say 20,000 allowing 10 cwt to a load at £ per load would realize £375 with that and the assistance I should have had from Col. Savage in helping him to level the earth, together with the assistance I should have otherwise received from other persons in hauling the earth it would at least have brought Your Petitioner free from loss, the men, Horses all employed 180 days on the street, of the period 152 days Your Petitioner paid too man each 3/- a day for levelling the earth which amounted to £145.13/- that Your Petitioner had also to employ another extra man 28 days at 2/- per day amounting to £3.10/- these sums would have been saved had Your Petitioner not been overseer in the contract. Your Petitioner thought it hard to be obligated to level the earth which he never agreed for but prepared to do and the same was done. Your Petitioner had his limits to deposit the earth on the Common between the Old Bridge and Lyons Bridge Your Petitioner sent 2210 loads of earth round the Horticultural Gardens, the overseer telling Your Petitioner to keep a check saying he would make the ward pay for it. Your Petitioner gave a return of the same that there were also 10,000 loads deposited on the Common beyond the old bridge far beyond the limits of the contract, another thing came hard upon Your Petitioner by order of the overseer that after collecting a large sum of stones on the street which he said he would require when the street was finished, but afterwards said that he could not pass the street for in order the stones were removed to the Common, in this case it also became very hard there being 900 loads, Your Petitioner had to comply A Horse and Cart and two men for nearly two months in gathering and removing the said stones, and the Waterloo Tavern made good at his own expence for the benefit of the street which cost much trouble to do so with all its costs, Your Petitioner seeing that

The

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He was going much behind from the undertaking became much in despair yet however consulting a few friends explaining how situated, but whose advise was to Continue and Complete the Work, under an assurance and a hope that His Worship the Mayor and Hon. Gentlemen of the City Council would see Your Petitioner righted. Your Petitioner Continued and Completed the said Work by incessant labours and toils, with all his hired men with Carte and implements necessary to prosecute the said work, together with his own Continued labour with all possible economy. The Work was finished with great loss to Your Petitioner as stated in a former Petition it has been estimated that Your Petitioner in the transaction was only a Copartner and that he was paid for his labour. Your Petitioner most solemnly declares that to be an untruth, but that himself was the sole Contractor. He further declares that he sacrificed every shilling that he had industriously earned for the last twenty years, upon Barrack Street Contract, & had besides left much in debt, which your Petitioner can declare on oath if required, that he has thus become a very poor man both advanced in years, with a family and has no remedy but by application and relief from Your Hon. and Worshipful Body. Your Petitioner therefore most humbly solicits that You will be pleased to take his case into Your favorable Consideration, under all the circumstances and he humbly hopes and trusts thereby as a poor individual amongst many that You will at least grant him some portion of his loss. Should it be paid by instalments from one to five years to come whatever Your Hon. Body may think fit to grant and do for him in this case will be most duly appreciated by Your Petitioner and as in duty bound for the same will ever pray

The Committee to whom the account for Cost and charges in the suit City of Halifax v. John Willis due to the attorneys engaged therein, was referred having enquired into the matter recommend the account be paid. Some items in the Bill of Costs "Counsel fees" "Brief or argument" "Brief and copy in trial" Minutes of trial for Court on argument for instance seem to be of questionable shape and rather extravagant all the circumstances considered at Five pounds each, particularly as one of the parties interested was at the time holding a somewhat remunerative office in connection with the Corporate Body, but Your Committee ascertained in looking into the Act of Incorporation then in force that it did not recognise a principle included in the Concurred act now before us, in Section 46 vizt to take the Charge and Management of all legal business connected with the Affairs of the City and to act as Counsel and attorney for the City in any suits in the Provincial Courts to which the Corporation is a party. Your Committee also informed themselves that the Bill of Costs so rendered having been duly allowed by the Chief Justice and approved as accurate by the Notary was included subsequently in the demand for which Mr. John Willis' security was taken under the authority of a preceding Council. Your Committee consequently restrained their hand and sought the opinion of the present Recorder "whether having taken Willis' Bond for the payment of Debt and Cost in the suit City of Halifax v. John Willis the City had not made itself liable for the payment of the Bill rendered without reserving any privilege to alter or amend the same by deduction or otherwise." To which question His Honor the Recorder answered affirmatively.
