The Petition of Mr Robert Graham dated 25 July 1833 praying to be relieved from the Public Water now conducted in a sewer through his premises to Brunswick Street having been submitted by the City Council to the Superintendent of Streets for report, the subject has received due consideration and the following report is respectfully submitted to His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen.

Report of Dept of  
Streets relative to  
Mr. Graham's  
Petition

It is true, as the Petition sets forth that the Public Water from Prince William Street and portions from Gottingen and Jonathan Streets is conducted through a sewer under Mr. Graham's premises toward Brunswick Street and its appearance to the Petitioner can hardly be doubted. But respecting the length of time the Public has enjoyed the privilege and the means by which it was obtained I cannot speak positively. It appears to be a parallel case to many others in the City where in the early settlement of localities mutual accommodation suggested the expediency of conducting Water in its natural course through private property, most of these accommodation drains though useful in carrying off street water are comparatively useless for the drainage of Cellars which I believe the case with the drain in question. Yet it cannot be stopped until provision is made for a Public Drain in Hartland Street from Prince William Street to Cornwallis Street. It appears that various attempts have been made to accomplish this object but have failed from the difficulty always experienced in every effort to raise half the funds by subscription, the number of persons willing to subscribe generally bear a small proportion of those who are ultimately benefited, hence the necessity for a more equitable system of raising the means for constructing Public drains.

The obstruction complained of is an excavation made across the North end of the old Blue Bell road at its junction with the Kemps road. This pit appears to have been made for the purpose of obtaining gravel to repair the roads in the vicinity and was reused for this purpose last season, the original height of the old road at this junction admits of the excavation to advantage the stones left in the pit are quite sufficient when levelled down to form an easy inclined plane from the surface of the old thoroughfare to that of the Kemps road and with a small amount
