May I enclose a Report of that portion
of the Fire Department under my command, for the year ending Dec 31. 1853.
for the information of the City Council.

The Union Fire Engine Company established
in 1808 is by law limited to eighty members Captain and Officers included. The
number of active members now on the list is Seventy nine, the number of
Inury Members is seventeen a majority of them continue to assist at fires
there are five Engines and eight hose carriages all in good order, except No 6
Engine, which cannot be relied upon. There are 2000 feet of hose in good
condition (much of it being nearly new) and 5000 feet ditto ordinary & fair

The City Tanks 15 in number are now and
must continue to be the only available sources for extinguishing fires in the
upper parts of the City, as owing to the great elevation of these localities. These
tanks furnish a very limited supply of water, several of the tanks are out of
repair and require immediate attention in the proper quarter. I would also
crave permission to suggest the necessity of having at least 3 additional tanks
say at the following sites, one is near that part of the Military Barracks
for the protection of much valuable in that quarter of the City, another a little
back of the Glebe House or St. Mary's Cathedral for the preservation of
the many costly buildings in that vicinity, the third and by far the
most essential should be situated at or near the corner of the Hill,

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Want of an adequate supply of Water jeopardises to an alarming extent surrounding property, and renders a Conflagration almost inevitable.

During the past year the Department has been called out 23 times of which 18 were actual fires and 5 were merely burning chimneys resulting in injury to property. It is a matter of congratulation and thankfulness that fire have been of infrequent occurrence during the past year, and that the amount of property consumed by the devouring element has amounted to trifling a sum in the aggregate. There is reason to suppose that that 3 of the fires during the past year were the acts of incendiaries viz. at Andrews Cope, Father May Street, and the House in George Street opposite St Paul's. Such cases are happily of extremely rare occurrence in this city. It will surprise many persons that the loss of property by fire during the past year in Halifax did not exceed £3,500 currency on which the insurance was probably less than £1800. When it is taken into consideration that Halifax is almost wholly a Wooden City, extending over an area of five miles in length by one mile and a half in breadth, and having a population of at least 25,000 souls who have insurance effected on Buildings and Merchandise to the extent of more than £1,000,000 it does appear almost miraculous that the losses by fire should have been so incredibly small; and this too, in the face of this City having a smaller organised Fire Department than any town of pretensions in the whole Civilized world.

It affords me great gratification to state that during the past year I have received the most cordial cooperation and support, whenever circumstances required from the Corporation, the Fire Wards, the Firemen, the Military, the Ordnance and Naval Department, as well as from a host of my fellow citizens, all of whom I hereby tender my hearty thanks for their strenuous exertions in the hour of danger, and on occasions when vast amounts of property were at stake.

I cannot conclude this very imperfect report without bearing cheerful testimony to the very able and efficient manner in which the Members of the Union Engine Company have strengthened my hands by the strict performance of the arduous and onerous duties which as volunteers they have imposed upon themselves.

nature of the Amendments which I have considered it my duty under
existing circumstances to introduce for the consideration of the Legislature
are as follows. First. That the City Clerk, Treasurer and Recorder,
shall be elected in the same manner as the Mayor Aldermen &c
are now elected. Second. That the right to vote shall be contingent
upon the payment of rates the year previous to the annual election.
Third. That the people shall not be restricted to persons who

That Petitioner erected a barn a certain portion
of which is an encroachment on the Street or reserve running between
Blocks H & I That Petitioner is informed that a writ is now
or about to be put into the hands of the Sheriff of the County to cause
the immediate removal of said Barn. That he has no disposition
whatever to induce such harsh proceedings and begs in the fullest
sense to acknowledge the right of Your Honors to deal with him in
this matter as you may think proper, and therefore prays that
agreeably to Chapter 64. Sec 11. page 186 of the Revised Statutes he
may be allowed to occupy his barn for the following reasons,

that the Construction of a Railway from the Harbour of Halifax to the Frontier of New Brunswick would be of incalculable advantage to the Province in particular, and also to the other British Provinces, But the Members of this Council do not consider that by law they have any power to pledge the funds or property of the City, or to consent that the Inhabitants and Citizens thereof shall be considered as Stockholders for any sum of money towards the construction of said Railway without their express consent, and that any act of the Legislature making or declaring Individuals or Corporations Shareholders or Stockholders in any Public Undertaking without their Consent would be unconstitutional. To which following Amendment is introduced.

1st Resolved that this Council affirm the principle embodied in the resolutions previously adopted by the Corporation, and consider that the interests of the City imperatively demand the immediate construction of the lines of Railway contemplated in the bills now before the Legislature in order to retain the business of the Western Counties, the Gulf Shore and Prince Edwards Island which otherwise it is to be feared will be diverted into other Channels, and they view with much satisfaction the proposition to reserve to the City Stock thereon to the extent of £10,000.

2nd Resolved that a Petition be drawn up and presented to the Legislature requesting that the City Council may be vested with the power under such regulations as may be deemed proper of engaging the said Railway Stock, Provided that the Summons be in the City of Halifax.
