November 6 and when required by the Superintendant, would enable him, at seasons of the year when labour abounds, to purchase such materials at a very much less price than has hitherto been done, as the shores of Bedford Basin and its vicinity abounds in material of superior quality, which may be broken in the winter season, at a low price and brought to the City upon the rails or by water. Excellent material can be obtained from other sources at an equally low rate if cash payments could be made. Your Committee feel that too much cannot be said on this important part of the subject as they have now before them the printed report of the Inland Navigation Company bearing date first August one thousand eight hundred and fifty five.

which reads as follows two boats per day each sixteen tons of the following articles. Brick, Granite, Breast stone, ballast, Gravel for the Streets. Land to be at six pence per ton. Your Committee cannot leave this part of the subject without suggesting the existing necessity of an outlay of a sum of money on two sites of City Property, one in the northern and southern division of the City, for the purpose of having a suitable place to land street material which must necessarily come in large quantities by water and which in some years, has cost the City one fourth the sum required to make two landings practicable for all Street material for many years to come.

Touching the immediate Superintendance of the Streets your Committee are of opinion that if the present law (authorising street expenditure) is to remain in force, that after the Street Service can be but inadequately performed under such law yet your Committee consider that it will require two Superintendants whose endeavours will at best prove futile and unable to accomplish the end so much desired.

Your Committee are of opinion that one Superintendant with the means which the contemplated change would in a great measure place at his command, will be better able to effectually carry on improvement than two will do, as their interest are separately and individually identified and should one be more astute than the other may be used derogatory to the common interest in Street improvements of the City.

Your Committee would recommend under the proposed alteration of the Statute labour law, one Superintendent of Streets and an overseer for each ward under him whose duty it shall be to attend to the improvements of his ward only, receiving his orders from the head Superintendent only who alone shall be held responsible to the Council for all matters connected with the Street Service. Your Committee have been brought to this conclusion from the fact that a large portion of the Superintendents time would

would be required in making the necessary preliminary to obtain Street materials...

Your Committee are of opinion that an additional two Shillings and six pence per day, will obtain the services of two practical men whose superintendence and labour combined together with other contemplated facilities will so effectually aid the Superintendent as to enable him very materially to improve the Streets of the City...

Your Committee would also suggest and recommend the adoption of a method of construction a handsome and substantial Sidewalks which the City needs but a trial to be universally adopted in the business portions of the City and which for cleanliness, durability, and appearance, will very favourably contrast with the unsanitary and costly method generally adopted, of laying down wooden Sidewalks requiring renewal in a few years and causing obstruction and inconvenience to the public...

The mode of which your committee recommend is as follows that communication is made to the City Council by two thirds of the owners or occupiers of property on any Street within the City for a side walk in such Street to be constructed of brick with a granite curb. Such parties offering to furnish the material, namely brick and granite without charge to the City, but the Superintendent need not accept any persons whose offer is not in accordance with their requirements of the use of said material.

To prevent injustice against this method of construction which at first sight may appear a costly one, Your Committee here furnish the cost of the two methods for forty superficial yards of a side walk twelve feet wide and thirty feet long.

The Committee feel satisfied that the public on considering the advantage to be derived will at once adopt the method as above suggested...

The undulating appearance of the Streets bearing north and south demand some attention, a good deal could be done to improve them, particularly at the crossings of the other Streets at right angles, without very materially affecting property, but to put in practice well defined principles which should have been carried out at an early stage of Street improvement, and cannot now be introduced to any extent with hopes of success or approval, except outside of the thickly built portions of the City, many of the Streets of the City running east and west required little

the than formation with good material to which alone if due regard had been paid, would have saved a large amount of labour that has been thrown away by an unnecessary roasting of earth, hauled a long distance to effect the worst of that effects raising the Streets above the required levels frequently fifteen and twenty inches above the side walls, distorting the Streets with miseries, causing inconvenience to the public and injury to private property. Expenditures of money in such a way is a diversion of the Street funds from its legitimate design. Such has been the case in all countries to a great extent but there can be no excuse for the continuance of such a system in the present age of improvement. The highest commodity to a street thirty feet wide has been by men of the greatest experience, considered to be a safe and suitable formation well suited for vehicles of all descriptions. Such height is at variance with sound mechanical principles, convenience, and safety to the public. Mr. Adam says that raising the roads to an inferior commodity has killed more horses in Britain than all other causes. To carry out practically that making with success, and which circumstances warrant, would require from six to ten hundred pounds per mile, your committee would recommend in addition to the present amount of street funds the annual expenditure of ten hundred pounds for the next for the next ten years. The present available Street funds are fifteen hundred pounds annually, which from an increase of population we may reasonably expect will amount to two thousand pounds, making in all three thousand pounds to be expended on the Streets of the City. Half of this sum could be applied in making substantial Lewis and Streets where most required for the public good. It should be borne in mind that a higher formed street of good material is much easier kept clean and in good repair, and that two horses can do the same amount of work with greater ease than three can do on Streets of bad formation. One of the first divisions of the City which require attention, is water Street, on account of the large amount of traffic which passes over it to other parts of the City, next in importance is some of the more public streets leading east and west, as their steep elevation requires a firm and smooth surface for the conveyance of heavy articles at an easier and cheaper rate to the more distant parts of the City.

On account of the large amount of country produce and travelling passing over land to and from Halifax, the principal freight roads east and west through wards five and six should be kept in a more efficient state of repair one hundred pounds in addition to the board funds required to be expended yearly one half of this sum (on timely application to the City and County Representatives) would not doubt be granted from the provincial treasury as the residents east and west.

would derive more than equal advantages with the citizens by the expenditure of the money on the roads which is travelled more by the residents of the several counties than by the citizens of Halifax. Your Committee by reason of many of the Streets of the City being obstructed and enclosed recommend that a committee be appointed whose duty it shall be by the advice of the Council to order the opening of streets which are or may be enclosed and to cause to be removed from the line of Streets any obstruction that may in any way effect the public interest and where Streets are located to place blocks of Granite to define the proper line of Streets which now are or may hereafter be laid out and established by law in the City of Halifax. Your Committee deem it their duty to give two illustrations of the consequences of misapplication of the street funds. From the market wharf to the foot of Chapel hill there has been nine hundred yards of stuff spread upon the street which was not required, at the expense of two hundred pounds and if removed, to admit the required improvement upon the street will cost the City a much larger sum. Over one hundred pounds in money and labour has been misapplied in the imperfect construction of a sewer in Morris Street and altho a part of the drain before being rebuilt has been lowered some places three feet, yet it is not in accordance with the design shown in the plan and is now defective in construction to what a degree of so much importance to the public should be. Your Committee in conclusion again remind the Council of the necessity that exists for the use of hard material for the surface of the Streets and would recommend the adoption of resolution now before the Council placing the labour of the Bridewell prisoners at the disposal of the Council and which your Committee should recommend to be confined to breaking stone that a proper size the whole of which should pass through a two inch screen. The abundance of good materials in City property at Rock head offers every facility for their labour which will provide good material for the Streets and also materially improve the land for cultivation as a large portion of it will only require the removal of the surface stones to make it available for that purpose all of which is respectfully submitted.







Dear Sir

Have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of to day relative to complaints of the water being shut off from the City during Saturday night and yesterday. In answer I beg to state that the water was not turned off but the deficient supply was occasioned solely by accidental causes. The deficiency was detected at an early hour yesterday morning by our superintendent who proceeded to the tanks and found that the storm on Saturday night had driven the snow in upon the entrance of the canal leading to the pipe house and packed it so tight, causing it with ice as to prevent the flow of the water into the pipes.

In obedience to a resolution passed at your last  
Meeting I have considered the question respecting the Health officers  
duties and how them referred to

1. The Quarantine act. Act 6. 1854 authorizes the Governor  
in Council to make quarantine orders and to inflict punishments  
of fine and imprisonment in their violation.

2. Chapter 34 authorizes the Governor in Council to make  
Sanitary orders for preventing infection, with penalties not to  
exceed £100 for each offence.

3. Section 2nd authorizes the Governor in Council to appoint  
persons at the several ports of this province, to act as health officers  
thereby and to prescribe the duties of such health officers.

4. Under the power of making quarantine and sanitary  
orders when exercised, I assume that regulations for the removal  
and care of infected persons might be lawfully made.

5. Section 9 gives certain powers to Boards of Health  
and health visitors &c, for removal of infected persons under  
certificate of two medical men.

6. That does not forbid the removal of sick persons infected nor prescribe any penalty for so doing. In the absence of any quarantine or Sanitary regulations made under these acts by the Governor in Council, the common law must be our guide.

No sick person could be removed at common law, without his own consent, express or implied, unless visited under very extraordinary circumstances.

But assuming no difficulty to be made by the patient or by his friends, the responsibility incurred by those who should remove a sick and infected person would be,

1<sup>st</sup>. The risk of being visited for a public nuisance, if such removal were plainly mischievous to the community at large and 2<sup>nd</sup>. the risk of an action of damages at the suit of any party injured thereby if such removal were detrimental to individuals and unjustifiable by necessity or very strong circumstances.

As the acts in question have not pointed out the duties of the health officer except in 3 section when his examination of vessels is mentioned, I conceive that unless he has some express written order from the Governor and Council to authorize his acts, he would be in regard to removing or authorizing the removal of sick and infected persons in very much the same condition as a private individual, wholly for I should say in a legal point of view.

That the power of the Governor in Council does extend to regulate the removal and care of all persons suffering under contagious and infectious diseases, whether in vessels or land, I am satisfied; but as it is a power confined by act of parliament when exercised in a particular way, I am of opinion,

1<sup>st</sup>. That no health officer would be justified in his acts of this nature under these laws unless the Governor and Council had previously prescribed his duties in that respect as contemplated in Section 2<sup>nd</sup>.

2<sup>nd</sup>. That no person would be bound to render obedience to the health officer in carrying out such duties, until the Governor and Council should pass the necessary regulations and publish them in the Gazette as directed.

The acts of the province in force on their subjects prior to 1831 were very fully worded and strict in their rules. I suppose as they were very long acts, the Gentlemen who revised the Laws for the new code in which brevity was particularly aimed at, intended that their provisions should be distinctly embodied in orders of Council afterwards, and for this reason, most of those clauses have been omitted in the Revised Statute Acts. Until however such orders of Council are passed there will be inevitable difficulties in guarding the interests of the public in matters connected with Quarantine &c.
