strictly conformed to, by three or four inches, also  
parts of the Side Walls is of less thickness than  
Specified in the agreement, but where there is  
deficiency of thickness in the walls, the ends of the  
Flagstones upon the original Rock which is a  
sufficient support, altogether the Sewer is a good  
Substantial Job, and being in a rapid declivity  
towards the Harbour will answer all the requirements  
of a Sewer in that part of the City.

Report of Commission of the matter of the Contract made between Mr. Barnstead and the City Council of the City Prison.

Committee of City Prison met this day all present - Mr. Hline did not attend. Mr. Barnstead met the Committee and after some considerable discussion of the matter of the Contract made between Mr. Barnstead & Mr. Hline and the City Council. Mr. Barnstead signed a letter addressed to the Committee setting forth his proposals for a quittance of all obligations between himself as a contractor and the City Council - a copy of which letter is as follows,

Halifax December 20<sup>th</sup> 1856

Bentham a Committee on City Prison

Sir

As one of the Contractors for the Building of the City Prison at Rock head Farm - I have the liberty to intimate that from the delay on the part of the City Council and also in consequence of a dissolution of Partnership with Mr. Hline, none of the Contractors am not prepared to go on with the building.

and I have further to intice to the City Council that I will give a quittance to the City for all losses by delay under said ~~Contract~~ Contract. If the City Council will pay me as a remuneration for such delay and as a payment for my outlay as one of the Contractors such sum of money as the Contractors have actually expended in forwarding the now abandoned work.

This is intice solely on my own part as I do not know the mind of Mr. Hline nor share of such payment would be in proportion to my share in the Contract as a partner say one half.

The Committee requested Mr. Hline to give them his proposals or views respecting the Contract in writing - he has not complied - The Committee are therefore only able to give the substance of a personal interview with this gentleman. At a meeting of the Committee on the 5<sup>th</sup> December Mr. Hline there stated that he understood the Stone for the City Prison was to be had on Rockhead farm if the architect thought the stone suitable. Mr. Hline could not say he was prepared to go on with the work to be completed with the extension of one year or to Sept<sup>r</sup> 1858.

Mr. Hline stated that the
