The accompanying papers relative to an overflow of water on Mr Robert Morrow's premises situated on the south side of the Coburg Road near the N.W. Arm having been placed in my hands to report upon, I would state that the matter has already been reported upon by me on two previous occasions viz in July 1874 and May 1876.

Mr Morrow actually makes two distinct complaints; the first is to the effect that owing to certain improvements having been carried out on Oxford Street by the late Street Committee the surface drainage from a large area of country has been made to pass into a stone drain running through his property and that

of Mr Osgoode, and that the drain not being large enough overflows and destroys his grounds.

The second complaint is that owing to the ditch on the north side of Coburg road having been formed in made ground the water in the ditch filters away under the roadway into his premises causing serious damage.

With regard to the first complaint, not knowing in which way the water may have been regulated before the improvements in Oxford Street were made I am unable to say positively whether more than formerly now passes through the stone drain referred to or not, but judging from the appearance of the natural surface along side of the road, it is my opinion that the works of the City have not increased the volume of water which would naturally flow in that direction to any extent if at all. As a proof that this opinion is probably correct, Mr Osgoode through whose property the said stone drain passes before entering Mr Morrows has no complaint to make and is willing to let things remain as they are. This would also tend to show that the portion of the drain through Mr Osgoode's property had at the first been made amply large enough, while that through Mr Morrows' grounds was either badly built or too small, or that it has since become choked. I might add that the drain throughout (except the small portion crossing Oxford Street) is a private concern, and that it is built in low ground which is a natural water course.

If it is contemplated on the part of the City to remedy this overflowing complained of the most effective and permanent way to do so would be to construct a sewer in the centre of Coburg Road from Oxford St to or near the N.J. Arm and to divert the water into this sewer. The distance thus required to be built is about 1100 feet, and by the new sewerage scheme the sewer would be of brickwork egg-shaped 36 inches high by 24 inches wide and the cost would be about £3,300. The sewerage assessment on the properties would be £2,750.

A considerable saving could be effected by tapping the water from the stone drain at the west end of Mr Osgoode's property and building the sewer from that point to the arm, the cost in this case should not exceed £2,500. and permission would have to be obtained from Mr Osgoode to construct part of the work on his grounds. The remedy before proposed was to conduct the water from the south east corner of the intersection of Coburg Road and Oxford Street (or before it enters the stone drain referred to) to the north west corner of it from thence to conduct it along the North side of Coburg Road to the arm by means of deepening the side ditch. The expense was estimated at about £600. but the objections to this plan are that the street might then be considered dangerous to vehicles by reason of the deep side ditch, and that in the event of a sewer afterwards being required the whole of the work done would be thrown away.

With regard to Mr Morrows' second complaint there can be no doubt that a large quantity of water does filter away through the bottom of the north ditch on Coburg Road, but where it goes to must be largely a matter of conjecture. That some of it finds its way onto Mr Morrows' grounds is perhaps true because the natural fall of the land is in that direction.

The roadway in reality acts as a dam to keep the surface water to the north of Coburg Road

from flowing directly on Mr. Morrow's lands. This roadway is not water tight and Mr. Morrow claims that it should be made so. To accomplish this alone the cost should not exceed \$200. while by adopting the first proposal viz - to build the sewer this expenditure would be unnecessary as that would be a remedy for both complaints -

In accordance with your request I beg to submit a plan of the Market Wharf property shewing the actual positions of the wharves and buildings, the position of the original grant of the Market Wharf to Messrs Cochran, as nearly as it can be determined, and the encroachments upon the city. The plan also shews the positions of the vessels in the dock at noon November 3^d 1876.

The results of my investigations are as follows-

The grant of the Market wharf property was made in the year 1757 to Mr Thomas Cochran at which time there was an encroachment to the Northward of 14 feet as will be seen by reference to a plan also attached copied from the Crown Land Office. By comparing the plan attached to the agreement between the Proprietors and the City in 1859, with the plan of the premises as they now stand I find that the greatest encroachment then amounted to 15 feet whereas the wharf since that date has gone from 2¹/₂ to 3 feet still further to the north.

I am thoroughly of the opinion that the City did wrong in granting such large concessions to the Deamishes as was done by the agreement of 1839 but I presume the document is binding as it is mutually agreed to adhere to the North side of the Market Wharf as it then stood as the dividing line between the two properties, and the City by this agreement not only gave away a long strip of land and water about 15 feet in width, but also granted to the Deamishes sufficient water from the City property to dock two coasting vessels not exceeding over all 35 feet in width. The City has thus lost (at least I take it so) a valuable water lot 50 feet in width. The plan is from recent measurements taken by Mr Armstrong of this office, and I believe it to be perfectly correct as I have had frequent opportunities of checking it and it agrees perfectly with my own measurements.

The whole width taken up by the vessels docking at the Market Wharf is 41 feet and the encroachments of the wharf 3 feet. This throws the second vessel (the schooner Springfield) nine feet out on the passage reserved for the passage of boats to and from the city slip. The buildings marked A.A. on the plan have projecting cornices overhanging still farther on the city grounds some 14 or 15 inches. I think the plan is so clear that no further explanations can be necessary.

Report on the petition of the residents of John Street for Water Supply

The water pipes already extend a little more than half through John Street and a brick sewer is built about two and one half feet from and parallel with the present pipes.

To grant the prayer of the petitioners it will be necessary to extend the pipes to Garrick Street a distance of almost 290 feet. The estimated cost of laying a six inch pipe with one hydrant and stop cock, and eight domestic service pipes is \$1.100. The excavations being about half rock,

It is advisable in all such cases as this that a sewer should be provided to carry off the waste water and prevent nuisances on the street.

The proposed sewer for this street, by the new sewerage plan is of brickwork 18 inches high by 22 inches wide, and it is estimated to cost (if built by itself,) \$800. - or if built in connection with laying the water pipes the whole cost will be about \$1530. - The sewerage assessments will amount to about \$600. I know of no reason why the work should not be carried out, but it is quite late in the season now to think of building the sewer.

Report on the claims of Genl Sir W Grady Haley and Mr George Payne for alleged damages to their horses by reason of a hole in one of the Streets of the City.

Messrs MacDonald and Raby Solicitors for General Haley state that the accident to their client's horse occurred at about 11-30 O'clock p.m. on Wednesday the 25th October last on Queen Street almost directly opposite No 97.

On the morning of the 25th October the police reported at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Works a dangerous hole in Queen Street precisely in the locality above mentioned. This hole was filled in and made perfectly safe within a few hours after being reported by John Mac Donald one of the City Foremen. It was about two or three feet long, some 16 or 18 inches deep and about in the centre of the roadway. In my opinion the hole did not exist until it was made by either the General's horse or Mr Payne's horse stepping upon the spot, the surface of the roadway having been rendered soft by reason of the heavy rain storm of the previous day 24th and the ground beneath having been washed away by the action of the water from a burst in the lead service pipe leading to house No 95 Queen Street.

P Lynch Esq. Solicitor of Mr George Payne informs me that the accident to his client's horse occurred at about 11 O'clock p.m. about the middle of October last in Queen Street nearly opposite the residence of George Fraser Esq. This is evidently the same locality as that where the General's horse is said to have sustained injury and the two accidents must have occurred very close upon each other.
