Moved by Alderman Foster, seconded by Aderman Butler, that the same be referred to the Works Department for report. Motion passed Read petition of residents of Gottingen Street for an electric light on Gottingen Street north of North Street.

Moved by Alderman Mosher, seconded by Alderman Eden, that the same be referred to the Department of City Works for report. Motion, passed.

Moved by Alderman Foster, seconded by Alderman Eden, that the Department of City Works be requested to report on the advisability of placing an electric light at the corner of Uniacke and Gottingen Streets. Motion passed.

Read address of His Worship the Mayor on the occasion of his retiring from the Council.

To the Members of the City Council:

Gentlemen,—The time having arrived when by the order of events it becomes necessary for me to vacate the high position which the partiality of my fellow citizens has bestowed upon me, I feel that it would be proper for me in retiring, to take a glance at some points in civic matters which have undergone a change since I had the honor of

being elected Mayor of the City for the second time in April, 1895.

I am almost tempted at the outset to go a long way further back, to the date when I first took my seat in the City Council as an Alderman in May, 1875, Matthew H. Ritchey, Esq., being first magistrate, Henry Pryor Stipendiary and William Sutherland Recorder. The retrospect is indeed clouded with some sadness, but it is to progress and advancement in civic affairs to which I perfer to call your attention at the present moment. In the year mentioned, 1875, our total civic debt was a trifle under a million and a half of dollars. It now stands at \$3,157,516.67, which total includes as before the cost

of the water works and the public schools.

There is a great deal of looseness of thought and looseness of language in discussing this matter of civic debt. The increase of the debt is not necessarily an evil; it certainly does not of itself imply either waste or extravagence. It will be conceded at the outset that no community, possessing proper ambition and self respect, can be content to lag behind while the rest of the world is making progress, and it will be further admitted that improvement cannot be made without money. When public opinion becomes clamorous for any civic improvement, the first question to be asked by the Mayor and Aldermen, the representatives of the people, is, whether the proposed work or projec is really required; next what it will cost, and finally, and chiefly, whether the community can afford the expense. If these questions can be answered satisfactorily, there need be no hesitation about the matter. Nor does it affect the argument, as has been frequently shown, that all civic improvements are not of a kind that yield an immediate money re-The advantages to be derived from good streets and pavements, from sewers, fire protection, electric lighting and the like, though real and indeed in modern days indispensible, are yet in their nature not subjects for commercial valuation. The successive additions to our civic debt since 1875 are all detailed in our annual civic reports, and as these are public property, open to all who have any curiosity to be informed, I need not specifically refer to them. When I had the honor of taking my seat for the second time as Mayor in May, 1895, the total amount of our civic debt was, including schools, \$2,756,166.

During the years 1895 and 1896 the following sums were expended for the purposes mentioned. It is gratifying to know that in most cases the cost of the works enumerated was within the appropriation.

It gives me great satisfaction to be able to say that my intercourse with the members of the City Council during my late term of office has been of the most pleasant character. I feel bound to add that good conduct and assiduity in the discharge of their responsible duties, during the time alluded to, have been the rule with regard to

the numerous officials employed in the service of the City.

The Council now proceed to elect two Citizen Garden Commissioners in place of W. F. Pickering and Thomas M. Power whose terms of office expired in April last.

To fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of one Commissioner

the following gentlemen were nominated, viz: Michael Dwyer, H. D. Holloway, W. F. Pickering and Frank Power.

On the eighth vote being taken there appeared for Holloway 1, Pick-

ering 9, Power 5.

His Worship the Mayor declares W. F. Pickering elected a Commission of Halifax Common.

To fill the second vacancy the following were nominated. Thomas M. Power, Frank Power and Michael Conroy.

On the vote being taken there appeared for Thomas M. Power, 10,

Frank Power 3, M. Conroy 2.

His Worship the Mayor declares Thomas M. Power duly elected

a Commissioner of Halifax Common.

Moved by Alderman Mosher, seconded by Alderman Mitchell, that the Council adjourn. Motion passed.
