That in the opinion of this Convention, where the operation of public utilities as by the municipalities there should be a complete separation of the finances of the undertaking from these of the rest of the City, and that the bond issues for such utilities should be a first charge upon the property and revenues of such undertaking.

The plan of making the Union a federation of the Provincial Unions as well as of the cities and towns to watch legislation in relation to municipal affairs falling within the purview or scope of the Dominion Parliament was adopted.

Among other important matters discussed and acted upon by resolution were the following :--

Municipalities should be empowered to regulate matter of erection of poles and stringing of wires with anthority to require that such wires should be placed under ground.

Legislation respecting the rates to be charged by fire insurance companies.

That bills affecting municipalities should be sent to municipality affected before being acted upon.

Legislation respecting the maximum price for supplying light, heat and power and regulating the services to be given.

Legislation respecting railway crossings, the doing away with level crossings and to make companies pay cost of change.

Resolutions were also passed on a number of other important matters, and the Executive of the Union will ask for a conference with the Government at an early day for the purpose of presenting such resolutions and pressing the views of the Union.

Copies of the more important resolutions passed at the Convention as forwarded by the Secretary are attached hereto.

A stenographic report of the proceedings, together with copies of resolutions passed and of papers read, will appear in the October number of the Municipal Journal.

One of the important papers suggested the formation of a Department of the Bureau of Information to supply full particulars as to the money market from the standpoint of municipal securities.

At the closing session of the Convention, when the election of officers came up, one of your delegates was elected to the office of President of the Union for the coming year.

Mayor Lowther, of Amherst, who was in attendance at the Convention, was elected 1st Vice-President for Nova Scotia, and Alderman Johnson, of Halifax, 2nd Vice-President.

#### CITY SOLICITOR'S OFFICE, Nov. 11th, 1907.

#### Worship the Mayor :

Sir,—The answer to the question whether or not the City can legally pay Mr. W. Fidler for his work in preparing the plaus for the Morris Street Engine House and reperintending the construction of the building depends on whether or not that work is comprised within the scope of the duties of Mr. Fidler's office, for which he is paid by This is the part of the duties of Mr. Fidler's office. the City. If it is the payment cannot be made, but if not it can.

I have made enquiries as to Mr. Fidler's duties from the Chief of the Fire Depart-ment. He informs me that Mr. Fidler's position is that of engineer in charge of one of the chemical fire engines, and his duties are to keep the engine in good order and attend ber when required at fires. He has also, though without any official appointment, itended to some of the carpenter work required by the Department. These duties would clearly not comprise the making of plans and supervising construction.

The Chief also informs me that the work was done by Mr. Fidler in his spare time and without the neglect of his regular work,

It therefore appears clear to me that the work done was not within the scope of Mr. Fidler's employment, and that the payment can consequently be legally made to him.

## REPORT BOARD OF FIRE WARDS.

COMMITTEE ROOM, CITY HALL, Dec. 2nd, 1907.

#### His Worship the Mayor and City Council :

GENTLEMEN,—The Committee of Fire Wards met this afternoon Present— Aldermen Johnson (Chairman), Taylor and Archibald. Your Committee beg to report and recommend as follows :—

1. That the Board be authorized to call for tenders from the local dealers for forage for the Fire Department horses for the period between January 1st and October 31st, 1908.

2. That four tenders for forage for the month of December were received and the tender of J. S. Cashen was accepted in accordance with resolution passed by the Council October 17th.

3. The Board received a petition from the permanent drivers of the Department asking that their pay be increased to \$12 00 per week. Your Board recommend that the pay of the drivers of the chemical engines be fixed for next civic year at \$12.000 per week, and that the pay of all the other drivers be increased each \$1.00 per week.

4. In March last the Council decided to purchase the O'Donnell and Evans properties on Albemarle Street for the extension and improvement of Central Engine House and later legislative authority was obtained for the purpose and the properties were purchased. Mr. W. B. Fidler has recently gone carefully into this matter and reported to the Board the cost of making such improvements as are absolutely necessary at the Grafton Street House and at Central, and has also drawn plans for enlarging Central House. Mr. Fidler estimates the cost of improving Grafton Street House at \$1700 00, adding stable and hay loft and fitting up tower for hose drying at Central at \$6725.00a total of \$8,425 00, as against \$15,000.00 for extending the present Central Engine House to Albemarle Street. One or the other of these plans must be adopted, and your Board is of the opinion it would be in the interest of the Department and the most economical to extend the Central Engine House. The Grafton Street property would sell for about \$3,000.00, which would leave the difference between the two plans \$3,575.00, and provide the Department with a first-class up-to-date house, with more satisfactory arrangements and less expense than altering and maintaining two separate houses.

It is therefore recommended that the Committee on Works call for tenders for erecting an addition to the Central Engine House on Albemarle Street according to Mr. Fidler's plans; that the City Treasurer be authorized to issue sufficient debentures or stock to provide the necessary funds under the Acts of 1907, and that the Grafton Street Engine House be sold and the proceeds applied as directed by the City Charter.

5. Since the removal of the fire alarm bell from the engine house at the top of Gerrish Street complaints have constantly been made that the alarm bell on West Street house is inaudible. Mr. Fidler has reported that this trouble can be remedied for \$550.00, and the Board recommends that tenders be asked for raising the tower of this house according to Mr. Fidler's plans—the work to be paid for out of current account.

6. It is also recommended that tenders be invited for installing heating apparatus for Quinpool Road House. It is estimated the work will cost about \$700.00.

7. It is recommended that the Chairman and Chief purchase certain bed clothing, &c., required for various of the houses upon inspecting samples and receiving tenders.

8. Also that the Chairman and Chief be authorized to sell any of the Department horses that are unfit for fire duty and to purchase such other horses as may be required.

9. Also that prices be obtained and the Chairman authorized to purchase two 10 foot lengths of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch suction hose with couplings for No. 4 steamer.

10. The Chairman reported that he had received a cablegram from John Howard, Agent-General for Nova Scotia, stating that the Shand, Mason & Co., steam fire engine would be shipped from England on the S. S. "Corsican" on the 6th inst.

11. The following report of Chief Broderick is recommended for adoption :----

#### ALDERMAN JOHNSON'S ADDRESS ON ESTIMATES.

HALIFAX, N. S., December 31st, 1907.

#### To His Worship the Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN, — As Chairman of the Finance Committee 1 beg leave to lay before you the estimates for the year 1908-9 as recommended by the committee for adoption by the Council. The chief concern to the public is to note what the aggregate is and the difference over last year, and our duty is to explain how this increase came about. By referring to the end of the report you will notice that the increase over last years' cstimate is \$41,120.16. The increases of this year over last year under the various headings, are as follows :

This amount, after being adjusted by deducting certain items of income, is brought down to \$41,120.16.

The increase in the salaries of officials of the City will no doubt meet with the approval of at least all the broadminded men of the community, as the majority of these officials have served the City faithful for many years.

The Police Committee regret that, on account of the present Act, they were unable to report an increased appropriation. The present Act provides that a policemen shall start with \$400.00 and have an increase yearly of \$50.00 until he reaches the maximum. It is proposed that the law be changed during the present seesion, giving each policeman \$500.00 at the start and a yearly increase of \$100.00 until he reaches \$700.00; and that the superior officers have a corresponding increase. It is hoped that the Council will pass such an Act and that it take effect May 1st, an amount being borrowed to meet the additional cost, and said amount go into the next estimates

On account of the fire which occured at Rockhead Prison, considerable unforseen expenditure had to be met. There was a very small sale of broken stone during the year. At present there are about eight thousand bushels on hand for sale. After careful investigation, the Prison Committee recommended \$700 for repairs, but the Finance Committee cut it down to \$350.

The chief items of increase in the Department of Works is \$500. additional for cleaning paved streets, and \$1000 for teams and stables. By investing this \$1000 in additional teams, the ashes and garbage will be removed in a much more expeditious manner than in the past.

There is \$800 for additional lights. It was hoped that we would be able to provide for an every-night service during the coming year, but it was deemed advisable to adhere to the moonlight schedule. The committee would earnestly impress on the Board of Works the necessity of the electrician seeing that a better service is given in the coming year than in the past. A moonlight schedule should mean full moon; otherwise the streets in the business section of the City where the buildings are high are absolutely dark. It would be better if the Chief of Police had charge of this matter.

The item for preparing Official Plan, \$500 is cut out, as it is believed the plan will be completed under the present appropriation.

Last year the estimate for the Fire Department was \$41 600. This was quite an increase over previous years, and was to cover additional men and equipment. Part of this equipment has not yet been received, and a considerable unexpended balance will be available and should be used to put the Department in good condition by supplying many very necessary and inexpensive articles. The report of the Fire Wards, which will be presented to the Council to-day, will deal with that matter.

A new item appears under "Miscellaneous," viz., \$500 for advertising the City. On various occasions the City has been put to some annoyance by not having such a fund to make known its advantages to the outside world.

Under Probable Income there are a number of items. all based on actual experience. The chief increase is \$3500 from Liquor Licenses, and \$1500 from Hack, Truck and other licenses

One item, which created a great deal of feeling in the City, principally among the merchants who are our largest tax-payers, has been cut out, viz., Rent of Hatchways, \$2000. This was an objectionable tax and difficult to collect, as it is not a lien on the properties.

According to law, we can only expend \$140,000, after allowing for our probable income, for the Internal Government of the City. That is, salaries, police, prison, works, fire department, and miscellaneous. This amounts to \$139,757.36.

Under Extra Assessment there is an increase of \$13,046,45 for schools No just criticism can be made of this as the School Commissioners are simply doing their duty in putting the school buildings and equipment in proper condition This large increase was principally brought about by erecting St. Patrick's Girls' High School, and a large amount on the Joe Howe School, formerly known as Albro Street School.

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Another very large increase is \$8,453.29 for the Board of Health. This was brought about by the scourge of small-pox appearing in the City. There were about seventy cases, and as the people in the quarantined houses had to be fed and a large num ber of wachmen paid, the expenses soon ran up. According to the Charter, this must be assessed in one year. The Board of Health has unlimited power to spend money for such a purpose, and it would be a serious matter for the City if such expenditure should in any one year, reach a very large amount. The Charter should be amended so that, if it exceeds a reasonable amount, it should be spread over five years.

For many reasons, which it is unnecessary to state here, the City's share of the Provincial Exhibition deficit is a very large one, viz., \$7,191.77. Prior to 1901 such deficit was spread over a series of years. For instance, in our present estimate we are paying the sixth payment of the deficit of 190'1, although that deficit only amounted to \$4,343.94.

Your Committee thought it desirable to face the existing conditions and include the total amount of these extraordinary expenditures in the estimates rather than to divide them over a series of years.

The members of the Council will no doubt incur some criticism for the increase in the rate, particularly by the citizens who will not investigate the various items which have gone to increase the rate. One question for every citizen to ask himself is whether it would be more desirable to allow smallpox to become rampant in the City or to wipe it out at a cost of about \$8,000. Happily it has been stamped out, and there is no case in the City at present. There are a number of large items in these estimates which will not appear in that of next year, namely :

In other words, the Council for 1909-10 can expend over \$18,000 without increasing the rats ; that is, the citizens are called upon to pay about six cents on the rate for this purpose in order to wipe these amounts out in one year.

If it had not been for these extraordinary expenditures and the \$13,000 additiona for schools the rate would practically be the same for the incoming year as the present

one. On account of taking over the Cunard property by the Dominion Government and other reasons the City lost about \$230,000 assessable property. This is partly made up by the large amount of building that has gone on during the year, and our income will be increased on account of a new bank and various other companies coming into the City. If the existing conditions are the same every \$2812 will put our rate up a cent, so that \$41,120 would mean 14 2/3 cents. This will make the rate 1.94. It is expected the rate will be 1.92.

The additional cost of schools will put up the rste to 4.63, about 5 cents. The smallpox will mean 3 cents

The Exhibition deficit and other small items which will go off next year will mean 3.57.

The present City rate is 1.15, school rate 59, County rate 5. The City rate next year will be about 1.23, school rate 64, and County 5

I wish to impress on the citizens that about 7 cents of this is temporary, and goes off next year, but for that our City rate this year would be about 1.16.

It may be well to notice that \$100,000 of the 5 per cent. debt of the City was paid off last July, and that there is one more year left for subsidy to the Dry Dock.

For nineteen years we have been assessing the citizens \$5,000 a year and adding to the debt of the City \$5,000 a year. all on account of this Dry Dock.

In 1910-11 the City will be relieved of this annual charge of \$10,000.

A few years ago Halifax appeared as if it did not belong to anybody Its streets and sidewalks were in a dilapidated condition. Now every citizen feels considerable satisfaction that the City has been discovered, and that there has been a tremendous improvement in its streets, sidewalks, sewers, fire department, and in many other respects. It would be a God-send to this City and the province if we had a few optimistic men of the type of the late lamented J. Israel Tarte, whose wish would be to develop Canadian trade and make that trade go through Canadian ports. Then the Isthmus of Chignecto would be hardly wide enough to contain the lines of railway that would be coming into Nova Scotia, and we would no longer be the hermit province so far as communication with the rest of the Dominion is concerned. Then the harbor front of Halifax would be one magnificent wharf, and this City would reach its proper destiny.

There is a reference to this estimate reaching over half a million, but it has cost over half a million to run this City for many years. I hope to live to see the day when Halifax will be so increased in population that it will cost a million to run the City.

It is absurd to think that this City will ever become great until such time as the harbor front is properly equipped and until we have the C. P. R. and the Grand Trunk Pacific running here. On account of the manner in which the estimates of this City were made out for many years past the total cost of running the City never appears. It would be something like this for one year :---
