SIR.—At the last meeting of the City Council statements were made which might convey the inference that I am ignoring the Works Committee in directing the construction of the foundations of the new building at the City yard. In justice to myself, I ask permission to submit the following report :--

It was stated that 1500 feet of good crossing stone had been supplied to the contractor by the City Engineer and laid in the trenches without consulting the Works Committee and that they were needed to lay crossings in the North end. That these stanes were worth fifty cents a foot.

In reply to these statements I beg to say :---

The City Charter places upon the City Engineer the responsibility for the mode and manner of constructing the public works of the City. I have never shirk d the responibility since it became law, nor have I ever tried to evade it by trying to shift the

Asponsibility to the shoulders of the Works Committee or any other body or man unless it was voluntarily taken from me. Every working day I have to decide the mode and manner of constructing the public works and it must be clearly evident to any practical man that it would be impossible for me to consult some other City authority every time a question arises without seriously delaying and increasing the cost of the work. Why then should I act the coward when faced with a more serious problem? Failure to tackle the more important questions would very properly earn the condemnation of every man worthy of the name. It would relieve me of much criticism and abuse, but at a cost which I do not care to pay. I should be very glad indeed to be relieved of such responsibility, but while the law stands one contracts must be made in accordance with it.

My specification for the construction of the new building in the City Yard provided This provision compelled bidders to ascertain for themselves at what depth hard bottom would be found, and estimate accordingly. Mr. Marshall states that he estimated for a depth of ten feet, and his tender was \$24,000.00. Mr. Low did not assume the responsibility, but put in a tender of \$13,216.00 for a depth of four feet only, and \$7.50 per cubic yard for all concrete foundation below that depth. Mr. Low's tender was accepted by the Council. and the contract made. There is no hard bottom, in my interpretation of the phrase, even at ten feet, and the acceptance of Mr. Low's tender forced me to make a change or allow Mr. Low to carry out his contract, go to hard bottom, and let the City pay for the extra work from \$11,000 00 up if Mr. Marshall's figures can be taken as a basis for calculation. I believe that the change I have made in the mode of constructing the foundation will save for the City the greater part of that sum. The soil is of peaty formation, and below a depth of six feet is full of water at present. Hard bottom can only be reached by excavating and pumping out the water at great expense, or by driving piles. There is no permanent level of ground water in Halifax, and therefore no guarantee that the piles would always be in water. If not, they would rot, and consequently their adoption would add a large useless expenditure, as the building, with its narrow wall, would go down as soon as the piles began to decay. The change adopted is what is known as a spread foundation—that is a wide platform or footing to support the narrow, superimposed weight, and is frequently used, especially by railway and bridge engineers in Nova Scotia. Miles of railway have been built on this principle over the muskegs of Nova Scotia, and are carrying our heaviest locomotives and trains. Bridge piers, carrying heavy steel spans, have been successfully built on foundations constructed on similar principles. The foundation proposed would not be suitable for a brick or stone building, with its weakness of joints, but our specification requires the contractor to reinforce the concrete walls and piers with expanded metal and steel bars, which ensures a monolithic structure. There is thus not the same danger of serious injury by settlement as results where brick or stone is used in the construction.

On the site of the new building there was a quantity of stone stored. About onethird was old crossing stones which had been removed to the yard by the Paving Company and the Tram Company from the streets recently paved. There were some freestone flags some of which were good and some useless that had been removed from sidewalks. All the remainder was refuse stone and concrete of no use except for filling in stone walls which is work that we do very little of I decided to use the granite in the bottom of the footing to save the greater expense of removing it to some other part of the yard and because it was cheaper than the concrete which otherwise would have to fill the space now occupied by the stone in the bottom of the trench. We could not use the shorter stone alone as the bond would not be sufficient to carry the weight. I estimate that the crossing stones were of no value to the tity, for the following reasons : Our specifications for crossings reject any stone less than three feet in length because long experience has shown that it is very difficult to keep a shorter stone in place under heavy traffic, the passage of the street rollers, the action of frost, settlement of trenches and other destructive agencies. The crossing stones in quostion were amongst the oldest in the City. There was not a single new stone amongst them. These stones hecome very hard under the action of the elements, and are worn smooth from the traffic over them. Wher they are smooth they are dangerous for horses, especially when wet, and City would be liable for any loss or damages resulting if they laid

crossing stones which the street officials knew were dangerous when they laid them. We have avoided this liability by condemning all such stones whenever they were taken up and redressing them to a roughened surface before using them again. They are much harder to cut and more flinty than new stone and consequently not so good as new stone when they are redressed. We have therefore after redressing used them principally for gutters where they would not be under horses' feet. They cannot be used for gutters without redressing as gutters must have true joints and surface. We have paid our stone cutter forty cents per foot for redressing them and he cannot make wages at that price and does not redress them when he can get work on any other stone. To use the stone in question for crossings we should have to employ a team and two men at least to truck them from the building site to some other part of the yard then after redressing they must be trucked to the street where they are to be laid, while we get new stone delivered on the street for fifty cents a foot. Add to the cost of redressing the cost of two truckages, the sharpening of the stone cutters' tools and the labor assisting him t handle the stone and comparing the total with the cost of new stone not only is no margin left as a value for the old block of stone but it is probable that that the average cost of these old stones when redressed and relaid would be greater than the cost of new stone. The old crossings and refuse stone laid in the bottom of the trench take the place of 60½ yards of concrete for which the City would have to pay \$453.75. The cost of putting the stone in the trenches is about the same as the cost of trucking away the refuse stone and concrete would have been and this latter expense must have been incurred if the larger stone were not used. Therefore the saving to the City on the work already done is \$450.00.

Granting for the sake of argument, that these crossing stones were worth fifty cents a foot on the street, the value of crossing stones in the trenches was 3324.60, less about \$50.00 for moving them twice, or \$274.00. I measured them the morning after the meeting of Council at a quarter past six before any concrete had been put in. Concrete would have cost \$453 75, a saving of \$179.75 on that portion of the work already done, and the City would have had to pay also for the removal of the refuse stone and concrete.

The freestone flags I instructed Mr. Low's foreman not to use, not because of their value—for it is only the larger and sound stones that have any value—but because I did not think they were strong enough.

Regarding the last statement, namely, that the crossing stones used were needed to lay crossings in the North end, I beg to say that the use of these stones in the bottom of the trenches has not prevented the laying of one single crossing in the North end. The yard is filled up with scores of similar stones, which, if they were to be used at the same rate as in the past, would supply the demand for the next twenty years. Crossings are laid when and where they are ordered by the Council or the Works Committee, if the money is available. Permanent work is not ordered by the Engineer. If the Council or the Works Committee order the laying of the old crossing stones without re-dressing, it is my duty to carry out their instructions, but if it is referred to me for report I will never recommend the laying in the North end of stones which seventeen years' experience has compelled me to condemn in the South end.

As my decision has been questioned, I have notified the contractor not to lay any more stone until I receive instructions from the Works Committee how to proceed.

PARK NORTH WEST ARM.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 26th, 1908.

His Worship Mayor Crosby.

DEAR SIR,—Allow me to express my cordial thanks to yourself and the members of the City Council who were good enough to visit my property on the North West Arm yesterday, in connection with the proposal made respecting the erection of a tower in commemoration of the 150th Anniversary of the first establishment of representative government in Nova Scotia.

As an old resident in Nova Scotia and a taxpayer in Halifax for nearly half a century, I feel deeply interested in the proposal. My reasons for such I have already communicated to your Worship, and they are made known in a general way to the public through the press.

Those who think as I do are of opinion that the present year should not be allowed to pass without taking steps to erect an ornamental edifice, imperial in its character, which would embody all the great historical associations of Halifax and Nova Scotia from the first Assembly of representatives of the people within the over-sea Empire, in 1758.

There can be no time so opportune as the present for moving in the matter. Last year would have been too soon, and next year would be twelve months too late. No place could be more fitting for the erection of a commorative monument than in the City where the first Assembly in the outer Empire was held. The structure should increase the attractions of the extreme beauty of its situation, and it would add to the many interests of Halifax with its ocean trade and its magnificent commercial greatness of the future.

Prosperous sons of Nova Scotia are to be found in the United Kingdon, in

many parts of the Dominion, in Australia and New Zealand, in India, South Airica, the United States and elsewhere. Many of them retain deep interest in the province they hail from, and would rejoice to have an opportunity of contributing to such a purpose as is now proposed. I feel quite satisfied that through this means a large portion of the cost of the monument could easily be raised. For various reasons, however, it devolves upon the City of Halifax to take the initiative, and on that account I rejoice to know that your Worship has called a meeting of the Council to consider the proposal.

For myself I would merely say that circumstances have placed in my possession an ideal site for the proposed monument, with land adjacent thereto, which may be used for a public park. As an earnest of my sincerity 1 offer both to the City free of charge. I will only add that I shall feel rewarded by the acceptance of the gift, and should any member of the Council desire information on any point (or any modification of the proposal) I shall esteem it a favor if the Council will appoint a committee with whom I may confer.

SANDFORD FLEMING.

G., has most generously offered to present to the City of Halifax a portion of his property known as the Dingle, on the western side of the North West Arm, and has coupled with such offer an expression of his desire that the City should erect a monumental tower on a part of the lands so presented, commemorative of the establishment of representative institutions in the Province of Nova Scotia and of the growth of the Empire;

And whereas. The City of Halifax, while desiring to express its warmest appreciation of the great generosity of Sir Sandford in making this offer, and its thorough sympathy with the aims and wishes of Sir Sandford in desiring to commemorate the events referred to, does not wish without further consideration, to commit itself to the very considerable expense necessarily involved in the construction of such a monument;

And whereas. The events of which such monument would be commemorative are rather of a provincial and national character than peculiar to the City as such;

And whereas, The City is already under a considerable expense in the maintenance of its Public Gardens, Point Pleasant Park, and other public parks;

And whereas, It may be possible that the aims and wishes of Sir Sandford, in the erection of such a monument, may be equally if not better, attained in some other way;

Therefore Resolved. That this Council appoint a Committee to confer with Sir Sandford respecting the proposed gift and to report to the Council the conditions and terms of Sir Sandford's proposed gift, and a detailed statement of what the cost would be to the City of accepting the same, together with their recommendations thereon. Moved by Alderman Whitman, seconded by Alderman Hoben.

The resolution being put is passed unanimously.

Moved by Alderman Hubley, seconded by Alderman Thompson, that a committee consisting of Aldermen Whitman, Shaffuer, Bligh, McManus, Hoben, Kelly, Thompson and Edwards be appointed in compliance with the foregoing resolution.

Moved in amendment by Alderman Hoben, seconded by Alderman Hebb, that the Committee to confer with Sir Sandford Fleming consist of Aldermen Whitman, Chisholm, Hoben, MacKenzie, Bligh and Campbell.

Aldermen Chisholm and MacKenzie requested to be excused from serving as members of this committee.

The Council declined to accede to their request.

REPORT BOARD OF FIRE WARDS.

COMMITTEE ROOM, CITY HALL, July 8th, 1908.

To His Worship the Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN.—The Board of Fire Wards met on the evening of the 6th inst. Present—Aldermen Hubley (Chairman), Whitman, Thompson. McManus, Hebb and Edwards. The Committee beg to report as follows :--

1. The Board considered its former report of June 1st. sent back by the Council. in re Callmen John Lomas and Wm. McDonald. The Chief informed the Board that Mr. McDonald had since resigned from the Department.

Mr. Lomas, Chief Broderick, and Callmen Morrow and Wm. Broderick were heard.

In regard to Mr. Lomas the Board adheres to its original recommendation that Mr. Lomas be requested to resign ; that he be given until July 13th to do so, and failing to do so his pay be stopped from that date.

2. The following report from the Chief and Chief Engineer is submitted for the information of the Council :--

HALIFAX, N. S., July 6th, 1908.

To the Chairman and Board of Fire Commissioners :

GENTLEMEN,-In compliance with your instructions, I beg leave to make the following report on the condition of the Hose in the Fire Department.

That all the hose in the Fire Department is being tested with the following results : That 26 lengths or 1,300 feet burst.

That 10 lengths or 500 feet after being repaired, stood the pressure at 175 lbs., and is now in service.

That 10 lengths or 500 feet burst at a pressure of from 40 to 60 lbs. 14 years in service.

That 8 lengths or 400 feet burst at a pressure of from 60 to 140 lbs. 10 years in service.

That 6 lengths or 300 feet burst at a pressure of from 75 to 145 lbs. 8 years in service.

That 1 length or 50 feet burst at a pressure of 125 lbs. 2 years in service. All Maltese Cross Hose

That 1 length of Canadian Para Hose burst at a pressure of 135 lbs. 2 years in service. Both lengths, after being repaired, stood the pressure of 175 lbs.

Respecting the two lengths of new hose burst during the test, it is recommended that the City demand that they be replaced by the agents.

3. The 2,000 feet of different brands of hose recently contracted for is now nearly all in the City, and the Board has decided to subject the whole 2.000 feet to a pressure of 300 lbs. per square inch in the presence of the Chairman, the Chief, and the different agents, if they care to be present.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

4. That tenders be asked for two suits of uniform and thirty-two pairs of pants for the Permanent Force.

5. That the two outside horses on the engine "Alexandra" and the two horses in the West Street House change places—Alderman Thompson dissenting

6. That specifications be prepared and tenders asked for a two-horse sleigh to take the place of the turret wagon in winter.

7. That the four chemical holders and the three lantern holders be nickel-plated at a cost of about \$20 00, and that nine suits of oil clothes and two rubber coats be purchased to replace those worn out

8. That Daniel Ryan, Cornelius Rýan, William Bishop and John O'Brien be appointed supernumeraries.

9. That Patrick Sheehan, supernumerary on No. 3 engine, be appointed engineer, vice John Moir, resigned.

10. That the Committee on Works be requested to repair the sidewalk in front of Central Engine House, Brunswick Street, as it has become dangerous.

11. That a manure box be placed at the back of the Central Engine House.

12. That if funds will permit, cleaning closets and feed bins be placed in the Morris Street and Bedford Row houses, the gutter in front of the Bedford Row Engine House raised, and the sidewalk in front of the Morris Street House repaired.

13. That the arrow gun be given in charge of the Union Protection Company and used by them.

14. That two sets of rubber horse shoes be purchased from the Canadian Rubber Co. for experiment on the paved streets.

15. The Board duly considered the message from His Worship the Mayor, covering petition from the Veteran Firemen's Association in re occupancy by them of the Spring Garden Road Fire Station.

It is recommended that the Chief be given the use of the small room at the northwest corner on the upper floor of said building as an apartment for his driver in order to facilitate the Chief's getting to fires in the night time expeditiously, and that communication between the Veteran Firemen's apartments and the Chief's be closed, and a doorway cut in the upper hall.

16. The Board invited tenders for a new boiler for No. 1 engine. Mr. N. Evans wrote, declining to tender, being too busy. T. Hogan & Co offered to build the boiler for \$741.00 and to pay \$50.00 for the old boiler and tubes

It is recommended that the tender of T. Hogan & Co to construct the new boiler for \$741.00 be accepted, the old boiler and tubes to remain the property of the City.

17. It is recommended that tappers be placed in the houses of Callmen Maltus and Weston.

18. Chief Engineer Edward Condon was reported by the Chairman for being under the influence of liquor June 4th, and that he had since taken the pledge.

It is recommended that Mr. Condon be fined seven days' pay.

19. On April 18th last, Ex-Chairman Johnson received from the Nova Scotia Board of Fire Underwriters the following letter :--

It is suggested that such a test be made more to demonstrate the following points :

1. The least number of men required to handle and raise the ladder.

2. What is the shortest time the said number of men can raise it in ?

3. How will the ladder act under conditions as near as possible like those required during regular fire work, such as operating a stream of water from an engine through a line of hose, with the ladder extended?

Trusting you will be able to arrange for such a test to our mutual satisfaction, and that you will kindly advise me previous to same, I remain.

GENTLEMEN, —At a meeting of the Committee on Works held this day a Minute-of-Council re lease Stayner's wharf in connection with Messrs. F. W. Bissett & Co.'s letter was read.

The following is the history of the matter as far as the records of this Department show :--

At a meeting held March 5th, 1908, Messrs A B. Crosby & Co., under date Feb. 29th, 1908, notified this Committee that they would quit and deliver up the property at the end of March, 1908. This notice was accepted at a meeting March 26th, 1908. Geo. C. Cook, by letter March 12th, 1908, offered \$480 per year if City kept property in repair—\$300 if lessee did so, in the then state of repair, and Wm. Grant by letter March 13th offered \$42.00 per month provided City put the wharf and office in good repair. Under date March 25th, 1908, A. B. Crosby & Co. handed in an assignment of all interest to Wm. Grant. The purpose of this agreement not being clearly understood. and to prevent future misunderstanding, the Clerk was instructed to send a formal acceptance of letter Feb 29th, 1908. This was done. It was then decided to call for tenders for the premises occupied by Messrs. A. B. Crosby & Co. At meeting April 7th tenders were opened as follows :—Wm. Grant tendered \$75.00 and G. C. Cook \$65.00 per year. These were thought too low and were not finally considered At meeting April 24th, 1908, offers were read from G. C. Cook of \$180, Geo. B. Low \$100, and F. W. Bissett & Co. \$175 per year. It was decided to ask for new tenders from those who had already offered on the condition that the lessee make temporary repairs and keep the premises in such a condition as to prevent accident.

At meeting April 30th tenders were opened as follows := F. W. Bissett & Co., $$201 \text{ CO} ; \text{ G. C. ('ook, 186.00 ; Wm. Grant, $175.00, and were referred to ('ouncil with-out recommendation.$

May 11th. Minute-of-Council was read deferring action on these tenders.

May 14th. After reading City Solicitor's opinion re legality of leasing the property it was decided to request the City Engineer to report on the cost of such repairs as would make the property tenantable, and the Clerk to write the Dartmouth Ferry Commission asking if it were in a position to purchase property now or in the near future, for the amount the City paid, viz, \$13,000, failing which this Committee would recommend the Council to sell.

May 19th. Letters were read from F. W. Bissett & Co. and Wm. Grant, when it was resolved to let the property occupied by A. B. Crosby & Co. to Wm. Grant at a monthly rental of \$30.00 per month, subject to one month's notice for removal, the City Solicitor to draw up agreement and the City Engineer to fence off the bad part of said wharf, besides repairing the most dangerous part to prevent any liability by the City.

At meetings of June 4th and 11th a delegation from Dartmouth Ferry Commission was present, but pending a decision from them no result has yet been arrived at.

In reply to the various charges made by F. W. Bissett & Co., the attention of the Council is called to the Minute-of-Council under date May 7th by which the consideration of their tender was deferred by the Council itself and also to the fact that this Committee has only rented the place by the month. at a higher rental than offered by Messrs Bissett & Co for a year, and solely with the object of making the loss to the City as small as possible.

In the present condition of the high service system the water supply if this

extension is made cannot be satisfactory, as the higher portions of Merklesfield are almost the highest elevations in the City, and if the extension is made this should be clearly understood. The same statement was made in reference to the extension to Willow Park, and it was afterwards claimed that the residents of Willow Park had been deceived. For these reasons I hesitate to recommend the extension. It is almost certain that in the summer months and the cold winter months there would be great difficulty in getting water to Agricola Street.

His Worship the Mayor :

SIR,--The high service is in about the same condition as it was at the date of the last report, October 31st, 1907. The low service will not, in any condition, give a satisfactory fire supply, and while the high service will not give a satisfactory fire supply it will give a much better service than the low service main.

I would therefore recommend that the high service main be extended to supply the fire hydrants on the railway property. The 27° low service main is at present giving a better supply than it does in winter. It will not give the service that the Railway require, and I think it will be absolutely necessary for the Railway to put in a pump, whether the supply is taken from the high service or the low service, and for the present it will be better to pump from the low service main. The details of the supply can be arranged with the Railway Department.

His Worship the Mayor, Chairman Committee on Works :

SIR,—I understand from the Clerk of Works that the matter on which my opinion is required is as to whether the four contracts for the installation of water meters made by the late Committee on Works at the same time, but with four different plumbers, were legal and binding on the City.

Section 306 of the Charter, after providing that with certain exceptions therein expressed, no committee, board, etc., shall enter into any contract or authorize any expenditure without having first obtained the sanction of the Council, proceeds as follows:—" Provided that nothing in this paragraph contained shall prevent the Committee on Works from entering into any contract involving expenditure not exceeding five hundred dollars."

The language of this proviso is quite broad and ample to cover all the contracts in question. In order to render any of them invalid it would be necessary to read into it some words to the effect that when the Committee had entered into one contract under \$500 for a certain class of work, its powers to make another contract for a similar class of work were in abeyance until the first contract had beem completed. I know of no principle on which so extensive an addition could be made to the plain language of a statute. If the contracts had been all with the one person it might properly have been contended that in legal effect they constituted only one contract, and so have been *ultra vires*. But such a contention could not be made when they are with different persons. To give the section the suggested construction might easily be most inconvenient for the City. How the Committee exercises the power conferred on it is a question of policy, but of the power itself I think there can be no reasonable doubt.
