1. The attached report of the Chief of the Fire Department in re converting horse-drawn chemicals into motor drawn vehicles was read.

Board of Fire Wards. Gentlemen:-

I beg to report on the cost of equipping the two horsedrawn chemical engines into motor driven apparatus as follows;

Tow Ford chassis could be purchased and firted out complete by the La France or some other company who manufacture fir apparatus for about \$4000.00 this would include painting, siren horn, side and rear steps, fenders etc., practically the same as new pieces of apparatus leaving their factory, then there are other trucks such as the Reo, Grant, and Defiance which could be fitted up in the same manner as the Ford for the sum of \$4100.00 each. The Federal, Stewart or trucks of that class would cost in the vicinity of \$5300.00 each. The White truck which is largely used in fire departments today would run up in the vicinity of \$7500.00 each, complete as stated in the instance of the Ford and others.

I am not particularly impressed with the

services the Ford car might give us for fire department purposes. Any of the other trucks might, I think be suitable, all of which are largely used for commercial purposes and have stood up satisfactorily.

In conclusion I would recommend that legislative be sought for \$10,000.00 for the purpose of fitting up two chassis as stated above. This, I think would fully cover and would give us an opportunity of having a larger field of standard trucks to select from.

# Re Debenture Interest.

As I understand the point on which you wish my opinion, it is as follows:

The holders of certain City depentures issued in 1913, are asking that the interest payableto them shall, in addition to the amounts salled for by the coupons, included the amount required to pay the difference on exchange between Canada and the United States.

The answer to this depends of course entirely on what the City's contract is. That contract is contained in the depentures and the coupons. I have not seen the depentures but am informed that they are in the form of the Schedule to the City Consolidated Fund Act 1905, which obligates the City to pay in "lawful money of Canada" and the coupons, (which I have seen), express the same obligation by calling for payment of the specified amount "in Dominion Currency".

It is true that by arrangemen at the time the debentures were issued, the interest is made payable either in Halifax or in Boston and I am willing to assume, without prejudice, that the right to select the place of payment belongs to the creditor, but I cannot see that this makes any difference in the extent of the obligation. If the dreditor elected to take his money in Halifax, the City would clearly have the right to tender Dominion Uurrency in discharge of the debt. If Canadian Currency were at a premium instead of a discount, there is no doubt that the creditor would elect to receive his interest in that currency and to make a profit by transmitting it to the United States. It seems to me that the converse must equally be true, and that the City has the right to transfer Canadian Currency to Boston and tender it there in discharge of its obligations. What the debenture holders are asking is practically that the City shall purchase American Currency ealte in Boston and pay its debt with that in place of the currency called for by the debenture and coupons. This, it appears to me, is not what the City has contracted to do and consequently the request of the debenture holders is not justified.

received an official communication from the City Clerk containing a copy of the Estimates passed by the City Council together with the resolution on same instructing me to strike the rate of taxation for the Civic Year 1920-1921 on the Estimates so furnished.

So far as I know the resolution and Estimates are in order according to the City Charter. I am informed that at the last meeting

of the City Council a resolution was passed that certain amounts as set forth in schedule attached were to be added to this year's estimate and that Legislation was to be obtained to do so. If the passing of this Resolution is adhered to, it means a tie up in our Office for six

weeks or more and we will be unable to get through in the time set out in the City Charter. However, the point that I desire to make is this - What resolution am I to act on ?

His Worship the Mayor.

Sir:-I am in receipt of a copy of letter of Assessor in the above, and your request for a report on the same.

The Charter Sec. 338 requires the estimates to be made up by the Council and delivered to the Assessor on or before the 31st day of December. This was done by resolution of the Council passed on 22nd. December 1919. Section 369 requires the rate to be struck and the books containing the annual rating and taxation to be made up and delivered to the Collector before the first day of April Section 418 requires the Assessor to make out and deliver the tax bills to the Collector on or before the 1st of May. The duty of the Assessor is clear, namely to strike the rate, make up the books and deliver the bills before the specified dates.

The resolution of the Council referred to by the Assessor does not in express terms direct the Assessor not to carry out the law by not striking the rate, making up the books and delivering the bills to the Collector on the appointed dates. If would be clearly illegal if it did so. In terms the resolution only directs that legislation be sought to add certain items to the estimates. As there is no prospect of any such legislation being obtained before the lat of April and little more of it being produred by the lst of May, the only whay in which the resolution could literally be complied with would be for the Assessor to strike the rate and make up the books and bills, only to discard them and do the work over again in the event of a direction to that effect being obtained from the legislature. As that would be bothe an absurdity and a practical impossibility, the only way in which the Assessor could deal with the resolution is to consider it as directing him to disregard the Charter and refrain from striking th a rate. Such a resolution in express terms the Council has no legal right to pass, nor would the Assessor be justified in obeying it if it were passed. Consequently in my opinion the only course open to the Assessor is to follow the directions of the Charter, and await what action the legislature may take.

There is no difficulty in obtaining legislative sanction for the payment by the City of the items set out in the resolution of the Council. Up to 1917 the regular practice of the City had been to obtain authority from the legislature to borrow from a bank or any fund available the amounts required and include them in the next year's estimate. It has been suggested that since that year a different **p** practice has prevailed, which furnishes precedents for the resolution under discussion. An examination, however, of the legislation shows that in each case there were special circumstances which made the course pursued necessary.

In 1917 authority was desired to include in the estimates \$30,000.00 part of the total amount received from the Dominion Government in respect to the City's claims arising out of the Ocean Terminals, and also various items not authorized by law. The estimates were made up complete on this basis and all that was asked of the legislature was to ratify them, not to alter them. In 1918 the estimates were not submitted to the Council until the 25th of February, and again inculded a number of unauthorized items, and consequently required ratification. In 1919 there was no City Council and the estimates prepared by the Board of Control required to be legalized, In all these cases the situation was abnormal. In all of them I may add the postponing of the striking of the rate badly disarranged the City's business.

At present the situation has become normal. The estimates have been prepared in proper time, and the rate can be struck at the regular date. If the intervention of the legislature is required this year there seems no reason why it should not be similarly asked in any year to mullity the provisions of the Charter.

My opinion therefore is that the Assessor should follow the resolution of 22nd December and the provi-

sions of the Charter.
