Gentlemen:-At a meeting of the City Council on March 10th, 1896, whortly after the reorganization of the Fire Department when it was changed from the volunteer system to a part paid and part "call" force the principle was laid down that no --- 40 ----

men mot then active firemen who were over 30 years of age should be appointed to membership.

Some years later, on February 12th, 1907, the City Council, on the unanimous recommendation of the Fire Wards for reasons given in their report, extended the age limit for appointments to 35 years.

Within recent years particularly during the War, because of conditions existing, several men over 35 years of age have been employed by the Department, without regular appointments, in order to maintain the numerical strength as nearly as possible, the excigencies of the time demanding the service of men at fires more seriously than the strict interpretation of regulations.

Because of the age limit set these men have been deprived of the privilege of complete membership in the Department and of particupation in the benefits of the Firemens Superannuation Fund. Their named are William J. Howe, Richard Connors, James Doherty, George W. Mann, Frank Hennessey, Harry Lomas, George P. Cody, Arthur Flinn, and Arthur Lynch.

It is recommended unanimously that the age limit rule in respect to the above named men be suspended from April 30th, 1920, that they be appointed as permanent members of the Fire Department from May 1st, 1920 and be permitted to contribute to the Firemens Superannuation Fund from that date.

These men have not having during their past periods of employment contributed to the Superannuation Fund this recommendation does not confer any rights on them as to the Fund insofaras past services are concerned. Any claims any of these men might have as to past services would have to be settled by the Council under authority of special legislation without reference to the Firemens Superannuation Fund.

In case the question may be raised as to the necessity of borrowing the total for sewers and Water construction, I am obliged to say that in 29 years experience I have never been handicapped and hampered as in the last year for funds to enable us to carry on the work. It is absolutely impossible for me to carry on the City work in an economical manner when I am threatened from Week to week or month to month with thenecessity of closing down the work and starting again later, because the Finance Department will not provide funds to pay the men or the contractor. It is an impossible situation from a labor standpoint and the Works Department whould not be at the mercy of a cold-blooded Finance Dept.

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who are not in touch with the men who expect their pay once a fortnight. If your Worship had not loaned the City one thousand dollars to satisfy the men on the last fortnight's pay, we whould have been face to face with a strike by City workmen which would further embarass a situation which was already strained to its breaking point.
