His Worship the Mayor, and Members of the City Council. Gentlemen: -The Charities Committee met this day and beg to submit the following report. Members present: Aldermen Gastonguay, Sanford, MacDonald, O'Toole and Burgess. Alderman Sanford acted as Chairman. Superintendent's Report City Home October 1922. No. of Inmates 307. During the month of October 1922 there were 24 persons admitted into the City Home, 3 born, 12 discharged, and 2 died. Of the number admitted 4 were chargeable to the Province and 20 to the City. The total number of inmates at this date is 307, made up of 168 men, 132 women, and 7 children. On the same date last year there were 178 men, 121 women and 15 children, a total of 314.

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Superintendent's Report T.B. Hospital, October 1922,

No. of Patients 36. During the month of October 1922 there were 5 patients admitted into the City Tuberculosis Hospital, 2 men and 3 women, 1 man and 2 women were discharged, and 2 men and 1 woman died. The total number of patients October 31st 1922 was 36, made up of 21 men, 14 women and 1 child. On the same date last year there were 11 men, 11 women and 2 children, a total of 24.

I beg to report on the attached petition of G.B. Goodwin & Co. Ltd., for permission to extend the coal siding, (which at present stops at McKenzie Coal Depot), across Livingstone Street to the Goodwin Company property at the north-east corner of Kempt Road and Livingstone Street.

The City has legislation under which it can grant such a permit. If it is decided to grant permission it would be on the same conditions as are included in the agreement with the Imperial Oil Co. Ltd., covering location and operation of the crossing, also that it shall be laid to the grade of the street and paved by the Company where it crosses the roadway and for two feet on each side of the rails, laid and maintained and kept in good repair by the Company, free passage of water at the gutters to be provided, to be used only for the business of the Company, cars not to be permitted to stand on Livingstone Street, precautions taken to protect the public, a license subject to cancellation on one years notice and a license fee of \$1.00 yearly, payable in advance, and such other conditions as may be suggested by the Works Committee or the City Council. It should be provided that the siding should be constructed so that it could be extended farther north if required and that it must not be monopolized so as to prevent through traffic. Some time ago the City endeavoured to get the railway authorities to extend this siding north along the east side of Kempt Road, but without success. It is one of the few sites left where industries could get railway service.

I beg to report on the question of railway siding
accommodation for properties on the east side of Kempt
Road, that a plan #5454 has been prepared, showing the
properties on Kempt Road from Young Street to the Subway.
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At present a branch from the Cotton Factory Siding is brought across Kempt Road in the location as shown on the plan and runs through City property and crosses Young St. into the Imperial Oil Company's station, with a spur running northwardly into the property now or formerly owned by H.D. MacKenzie & Co., to the South line of Livingston Street. G.B. Goodwin & Co., have applied for an extension of this spur line across Livingston Street, to their property in a location as approximately shown by the dotted black line.

This district is laid out by the Town Planning Board as a manufacturing district, and in order to develop it for such use, it is essential that proper railway facilities be afforded the properties.

In order to provide these facilities for the needs of the district and also for the public at large, it is advisable that any proposed extension of the railway should be in such a location as to give east access to it for the public and also so that the line could be kept reasonably free from delays, and for these reasons it would appear advisable to lay the extension down within the street boundaries. From this line spurs could be run into individual proporties and cars stored thereon, instead of on the main line. Portions of the main line could be used for unloading cars for persons, other than the immediate property owners.

The extension of this siding from the main Cotton Factory branch line near the Subway, would do away with the present grade crossing on Kempt Road, which street is the main artery to the City limits at Fairview. At present there are four dwellings fronting on Kempt Road in this district, two between Livingston and Stairs St., and two near Cabot Street, these would all be adversely affected as residential properties by the extension of the siding, the value of the other properties, if developed on the lines laid down by the Town Planning Board would be enhanced by the construction of this siding in the location shown.

At a meeting of the City Council of the City of Quebec, held on Friday, the 17th of November, instant, 1922, it has been moved by Alderman Dr. P.H. Bédard, Leader of the said City Council, seconded by all the present members of the said City Council, and unanimously

RESOLVED:

WHEREAS it has been publicly stated to be the intention of the new Board of Directors of the Canadian National Railways to make the City of Montreal the operating Headquarters of the Government Railway System, and furthermore, to divide that System into zones or divisions, making Winnipeg the Headquarters of the Western division, Moncton the Headquarters of the Maritime division, and Toronto the Headquarters of the Central division, the latter with control over all the Government Railwaus in the Province of Quebec, as well as those in the Province of Ontario;

WHEREAS the Toronto management of the Railway Mileage of the Province of Quebec during the last few years has been very prejudicial to the interests of the City of Quebec, inasmuch as it has imposed very heavy freight rates upon the new industries which have come into operation on the Railways to the North-west of this City, and has thus checked the progress of colonization, and also by prohibitive freight rates, in spite of the repeated protests of our people, has prevented the grain traffic to the Prairies Provinces from coming over the Transcontinental Railway to Quebec, Montreal, Halifax and St-John for export and has thereby diverted that shipping Trade to New-York; WHEREAS the Quebec and Lake St-John and the Great Northern Railways were built by the merchants of this City, with substantial money help from the City of Quebec's Treasury, and the Transcontinental Railway has also been generously assisted by the City of Quebec by the grant of valuable properties and other concessions, Quebec being the only City in Canada which has contributed to the cost of building this Railway;

BE IT RESOLVED:

That the City Council of the City of Quebec is of opinion that this City is entitled to some measure of control in the management of Railways which we have aided and which terminate here, and that Quebec, Halifax and St-John have the said right to a direct connection with Winnipeg and the Western grain fields by the Transcontinental Railway, which was built for that purpose, as Montreal already enjoys through the Canadian Pacific and Toronto through the Canadian Northern.

That for all these reasons, His Worship the Mayor of the City of Quebec is hereby requested respectfully to suggest to the Right Honourable the Prime Minister and to Sir Henry Thornton, the President of the Conadian National Railways, the desirability of establishing another Railway division, with Headquarters in the City of Quebec, to be composed of the Transcontinental, from Quebec to Winnipeg, and the Quebec and Lake St-John and Great Northern Roads, all of which terminate in this City.

UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEM

NRead letter Unemployed Workmens Association relating to the Unemployment problem.

Unemployed Workmens Association, Halifax, H.S. Dec. 7th, 1922.

From: The Unemployed Association. To: His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen City of Halifax, N.S. Gentlemen:-At the regular meeting of our Association, held November 30th, 1920, at 54 Argyle Street, City, it was regularly voted that, we forward to you for your consideration and action, the following letter -We the members of the Unemployed Association of this City, wish to draw to your attention the serious sit-

uation of affairs that is being caused thru the increase of unemployment thruout the City and outside points, and also to the seeming lack of attention of the City Council and governments in trying to cope with the situation. We, therefore, feel it is our duty as law abiding of this City to ask your Council to take some immediate steps and definite action in this very serious matter, which we consider is of great importance to the City and port of Halifax, as we are of the opinion that the City Council has had plenth of time during the summer and fall months to have devised some definite ways and means of dealing with the question, and up to the present, we cannot get any satisfactory answer of anything that has been done. We would also ask your Worship and Hembers of

the City Council how do you think it is possible for a han and his family to exist on the sum of \$2.50 - Two dollars and fifty cents, (this amount we are given to understand as being the weekly allowance paid out by the Civic Velfare Eureau) when the Dominion Government Eureau states definitely that it costs \$20.80 to keep a man and family?

Such being the case, we consider it to be the bounden duty of your Council to take such action as will cause this weekly allowance to be substantially increased, and that every man, woman, and child in need in this City be provided with adequate food, clothing, and firing (that is fuel) or the equivalent thereof, and in support of same we ask the Council to appeal to the Provincial Government for Financial support and failing to get same then to the Federal Government as today gentlemen, there are numbers of men unemployed, mothers hungry, and children barefooted and only partly nourished in this land of plenty.

Therefore your Worship and Gentlemen, we deem it to be your imperative duty to at once take some definite action whereby each and all unemployed in this City, together with their dependents, Mothers, Wives and Children may be fed, clothed and sheltered as becomes human beings and members of a Christian community.

In conclusion, Your Worship and Gentlemen, we may state that we at present are able to produce substantial evidence of several special cases which so far as we can ascertain are worthy of attention, together with the manner in which they have been dealt with by some of the Workers to whose attention they have been brought. Copies of this letter are being sent to His Honor Lieutenant Governor Grant, the Public Press, the Trades & Labor Council, and the Clergy, asking their co-operation with you for action in this matter.

AND WHEREAS it was only deemed necessary to borrow on that date \$75,000. and it is now desirable to borrow the balance ot \$54,574.50 under the same authority. THEREFORE RESOLVED that the City Treasurer be hereby authorized to complete the loan for the balance of \$54,574.50 as ordered by the original resolution.

by Alderman Bissett and passed.

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WATER MAINTENANCE \$75,000.00

The following resolution is submitted:-

WHEREAS the City of Halifax has authority under Sec. 27, Chap. 77, Acts 1921, to borrow from time to time on Resolution of Council and amount not exceeding One Hundred Thousand Dollars in anticipation of the collection of the Water Rates for any year and to apply the same to the maintenance of the Water Service. The amount so borrowed with interest, shall be repaid out of the water rates as the same are collected.

AND WHEREAS under such authority the City has already borrowed \$25,000. and it is necessary to further borrow the remaining sum of \$75,000.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Halifax do

Route with interest at the rate of Six per cent per annum. FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to do and perform all such matters and things as shall be reasonably required by the said Royal Bank of Canada in connection with the said loan.

by Alderman Bissett and passed.

LOAN \$33,000.00 FOR SEWER CONSTRUCTION.

(Read report Finance Committee recommending the borrowing of \$33,000.00 for Sewer Construction during the present winter season.

The Committee on Finance beg to report that the sum of \$33,000. required for sewer construction during the

winter, offer was received as follows:-Johnston & Ward and Royal Securities Corp. @ 93.32 It is recommended that the tender of Johnston & Ward and Royal Securities Corporation being the highest offer received, together with the formal resolution instruoting the City Treasurer to issue the necessary Stock or Debentures are attached hereto.

Moved by Alderman Whitman seconded by Alderman Schaffner that the report be adopted. (Alderman Whitman whilst submitting the motion as Chairman of the Finance Committee reserved the right to vote against it). The

The following resolution is submitted:-

WHEREAS the City of Halifax by Chapter 52 of the Acts of 1922 was authorized to borrow the sums set out in the schedule thereto for the purposes specified for each amount respectively and no other. Provided, however that the sums authorized to be borrowed in said schedule shall be subject to have deducted therefrom, and there shall be first deducted therefrom, respectively, any available unexpended balances in the various services as of the 6th day of April 1922.

AND WHEREAS on the 6th day of April, 1922, there was a balance in favor of Sewer Construction of \$66,303.38, to which must be added the transfers from Water Construction for work done in connection with trenching, viz:- August 30th, 1922 - \$35,592.88 and on December 13th, 1922 -\$3,500.00, a total of \$105,396.26.

AND WHEREAS under Sections 1 and 2, Chapter 52, Acts 1922, the City of Halifax is authorized to borrow \$150,000. less \$105,396.26 a balance of \$44,603.74/

THEREFORE RESOLVED that for the purposes aforesaid, there shall be borrowed on the credit of the City of Halifax at large and as part of the Halifax Consolidated Fund 1905, the sum of \$33,000.00, and Debentures or Stock sufficient to yield the required amount shall be issued therefor, dated as of the 1st day of January 1923, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent, per annum, payable half yearly on the first days of January and July in each year. The said Debentures or Stock shall be payable in thirty years from the date thereof.

The said Debentures or Stock shall be in the form set out in the Halifax City Consolidated Fund Act of 1905, Chapter 51, shall be sealed with the corporate seal of the City and shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the said City and countersigned by the Clerk of the said City. The interest coupons attached to the said Debentures shall be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and their signatures thereon may be printed, stamped, lithographed or engraved.

The said Debentures as to both principal and interest

shall be payable at the option of the holder at Royal Bank of Canada in Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg or Vancouver.

The resolution is moved by Alderman Whitman and

seconded by Alderman Schaffner.

Moved in amendment by Alderman Bissett seconded by Alderman Whitman that the consideration of this matter be deferred until the next meeting of this Council. The amendment is put and lost 2 voting for the same and 11 against it as follows:-

UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEM--MEETING PLACE

Read letter President of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty, requesting the City to provide a meeting place for the Unemployed Workmen's Association during the winter months.

His Worship the Mayor, and City Council. City Hall, Halifax, N.S. Gentlemen:-

I have been in touch from time to time with the Unemployed Workmen's Association and have found them good law-abiding citizens, but unfortunately out of work. Many or them have families dependent upon them and they are frequently housed in one room. During the day these men are looking for work and have no place where they can seek rest while they are in the City other than small quarters which have been kindly loaned to them once a week by another organization. As I have found these men to be loyal citizens in unfortunate circumstances, I think it is a duty of the City and the community to provide them some room at least where they can meet during the day with comparative comfort. I would therefore respectfully ask whether the City would not provide some room for this Association during the winter and I am sure citizens will be glad to cooperate in making this room attractive and in other ways aasist the men in getting employment. While comfort may be found in a great majority of the homes of our City, there is very little appreciation of the worries and troubles of many of these men who are trying to do their best to secure work and to support themselves and their families in decency. I may add that the Unemployed Association enroll no one as a member unless he is a bona fide citizen of Halifax and in the majority of cases, such a man has dependents.

Asking that you and your Council may take in hand the question of providing suitable quarters for these men during the winter and assuring you of the cooperation on the part of many citizens, I remain,

CHEBUCTO ROAD SEWER AND WATER

Read reports Committee on Works and City Engineer re Sewer and Water services Chebucto Road.

Office of Clerk of Works,

Halifax, N.S. December 21st, 1922

To the City Council. Gentlemen: -At a meeting of the Works Department held on the 13th December, the attached report of the City Engineer re Sewer and Water Extension, Chebucto Road was approved and recommended to Council for adoption, and it was further directed that the Finance Committee be requested to use their good offices in securing the passage of a resolution authorizing the borrowing of the sum of \$33,000.00 being the balance of appropriation for Sewer Work not yet borrowed. A.F. Messervey, Clerk of Works. * * * * City Engineer's Office, Halifax, N.S. Dec. 11th, 1922. His Worship the Mayor, Sir: There are a large number of houses on the western

slope of the City on Chebucto Road and neighboring street s which have a water supply service but are not provided with a sewer system. The drainage from all these houses and their domestic waste is being taken care of by the shallow soil lying over rock, and the consequence is that the soil is becoming sewage sick and the necessity for a sewer very urgent.

When we were making the water extension from Phillips Street to Westmount Street we constructed the sewer at the same time to save the cost in trenching; there is a missing link however, between Phillips Street and the end of the trunk sewer at the head of the Arm which must be constructed before the sewer already laid, can be put in service and sewerage service given to the streets connecting with Chebucto Road.

If the work were carried on now it would give employment to more men, and construction can be completed by the time the spring weather opens.

I would recommend that a sewer be constructed on Chebucto Road, from Quinpool Road to Phillips Street, the estimated cost is \$12,750.00; also that the water pipe be laid at the same time at an estimated cost of \$7678.00.

It will be necessary to borrow the remainder of the appropriation available in order to carry on sewer work, which I understand the City Treasurer states is \$33,000.00.

NORWOOD STREET SEWER AND WATER

Read reports Committee on Works and City Engineer re Sewer and Water Services Norwood Street.

To the City Council. Gentlemen:-At a meeting of the Works Department held on the 13th December, the attached report of the City Engineer re Sewer and Water Extension in Norwood Street, was approved and recommended to Council for adoption. A.F. Messervey, Clerk of Works. xk × City Engineer 's Office, Halifax, N.S. Dec. 13th, 1922. His Worship the Mayor, Sir:-I beg to report on the attached petition from Fraser & Co. Ltd., for the construction of a sewer and the extension of the water service in Norwood Street between Bloomingdale Terrace and Connaught Avenue. The estimated cost of extending the sewer is \$2,700.00 and the estimated cost of the water service is \$1,302.90.

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There are six lots to be accommodated. I would recommend that a sewer be extended when there are two houses under construction and that a water pipe be laid in the same trench provided the petitioners will agree to pay a special rate of \$39.09 for each house opposite the proposed extension, to be reduced as additional houses are erected.
