F.W.W. Doane, Esq., City Engineer, City. Sir:-

I beg to report on the attached water bill supplied to the premises #17 Rottenburg Street and complained of as being excessive, that the period complained of is from September 1921 to March 1922 and the amount of the bill ins \$32.50. The comsumption for this period was as follows: 1921 Dec.....No reading. 1922 11 Ħ Ħ Apr..... 900 The meter was tested in June last and found to register accurately. There was a slight waste in the closet at that time. From the monthly readings it would appear that there was a very bad leak during the months of January, February and March. The consumption for these months being 23, 300, 75,100 and 61,500 gals., respectively.

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I have no doubt the water went through the meter and I am unable to recommend any reduction in the bill.

During the last year there has been a good deal of negotiation and correspondence respecting land owned by E.L. Fenerty on the watershed of the water supply lakes. Sir:-The Nova Scotia Fertilizer Company have asked to have that part of Barrington Street (formerly Campbell Road) running through a portion of their property, at their factory, diverted and that they be given a deed of the existing street when the diversion is made. Plan #5508 submitted herewith has been prepared, showing the existing conditions of the proposed diversion. It will be seen that the Company own the water front which has a very narrow width between the shore of Bedford

Basin and the existing road. Their property on the opposite side of the road between it and the railway is of a triangular shape varying in width from nothing to a maximum of about ninety feet. Barrington Street from the Cotton Factory Siding to Fairview, with the exception of those parts at the Nova Scotia Fertilizer's property and at Africville settlement adjoins the railway property. The properties on this portion of the street will probably be used entirely for manufacturing, storage or transportation purposes, and the street will in all likelihood develop into a service road for the industries built up along it.

Through traffic to the City limits at Fairview originating south of Russell Street will naturally take the diagonal street to Duffus Street, and thence out Lady Hammond Road. Pleasure traffic will take a higher level street, such as Albert Street, and its proposed extension, which circling around the hill above the Cotton Factory Siding, will give a magnificent view of the whole of Bedford Basin and the northern end of the Harbor, in both cases avoiding the grade railway crossings near Africville.

It should be the policy of the City, wherever possible and when not against the public interest, to give every inducement to further the development of this shore of Bedford Basin, especially where it can be done at no expense to the City.

With regard to the present application, it is recommended that the request of the Nova Scotia Fertilizer Co., be granted and that the Street be diverted as shown by red lines on the plan, and that, that portion of the existing street not required when the diversion is made, be deeded to the Company on condition that the Company give the City a deed of the land and land covered with water, lying between the red lines on the plan and that the Company grade the proposed diversion from the present railway siding north-eastwardly to the existing street to the satisfaction of the City Engineer.

#### DEPUTY MAYOR WHITMAN'S VETO

Also read Deputy Mayor Whitman's report covering his reasons for his disapproval of the action of the City

Council.

Halifax, N.S. January 6th, 1923.

The Members of the City Council. Halifax, N.S. Gentlemen:-

Acting under the powers given by Sections 2, 11 and 342 of the City Charter 1914, and in line with the Notice verbally given at the meeting of the Council held on January 4th, 1923, I hereby confirm my disapproval and veto the Council's resolution to submit to arbitration the claim of Mr. W.W. Foster, City Auditor, made against the City, for the value of land etc. for North Street and Oxford Street widening, and for referring the matter to arbitration, and for the appointment by the City of an Arbitrator for fixing the value of the same, etc. His Worship the Mayor on the Evening of the

4th inst., requested me, as Deputy Mayor, to act in his behalf as Mayor at the meeting of the Council to be held on that evening, and I so acted at said meeting of the Council.

After the resolutions in regard to these matters had passed the Council, I stated that if I had power I would veto the resolutions.

Mr. Foster first asked for payment by a letter dated 12th April 1922, to His Worship the Mayor and Committee of Works.

"Halifax, N.S. April 12th, 22.

To His Worship the Mayor, and Committee on Works. Gentlemen:-

In regard to my property, situated at the corner of North and Oxford Streets, over which the City has laid down a street line, I have to say that if the City will furnish an undertaking that the trees at present growing on the strip of land required for street widening purposes will never be removed, and will further agree to move my barn from the said strip to the rear of lots on Clive Street, I will agree to accept Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for the land. Without the undertaking as to the trees I will require the sum of three thousand (\$3,000.00) dollars as compensation for the same land and trees. .W.W. Foster". The City Engineer in his report, dated the 21st April 1922, on the said letter of Mr. Foster, said; "I estimate that the area of the land at the official street line would reduce the property 3.613 feet (square). The City Assessor in the attached communication, placed the market value at 8¢ per foot. \$500.00 would be about  $14\frac{1}{2}$  per "Mr. Foster asked that the undertaking be foot. given, that the trees at present growing on the strip of land in question would never be removed.

I do not think it is within the power of the City to give such an undertaking, but I see no objection to declaring that that is the policy of the City. The only change in the site which the trees would effect, is the laying of the a sidewalk and when that work is to be carried out the sidewalk can be laid between the trees and the curb, without disturbing them".

"Mr. Foster also makes a provision that the barn shall be moved by the City to the rear of his lot on Clive Street. As the City is in no urgent need for the land for this widening at once I would suggest that the barn might remain where it is on a lease at a rental of  $25\phi$  a year, until it be found absolutely necessary to remove it, that may not be in Mr. Foster's lifetime".

If Mr. Foster will not agree to dispose of the land except on the terms which he has named, then I can suggest no other alternative but to leave the matter as it has stood since the plan was made .....

At a meeting of the Council held on the 25th April, 1922, Alderman Ritchie, seconded by Alderman Godwin, moved the adoption of the report of the Works Committee adopting the said report of the City Engineer.

Aldermen Power and Colwell moved in amendment that the City buy the portion of the Foster property required for street widening on North and Oxford Streets, and that the matter of compensation be left to arbitration.

This amendment was carried in the Council.

Then Alderman Power, seconded by Alderman Colwell, moved that the arbitration to fix the compensation for the Foster property, be E.J. Kelly. Motion passed.

Mr. E.J. Kelly, by report dated the 31st July 1922, for a total award, allowed Mr. Foster for compensation for the land required for said street widening and the removal of barn the sum of \$938.56, and further reported that Mr. Foster submitted an expert appraisal of the trees at \$2270.00 which would be in addition to the award of \$938.56. Mr. Kelly refused to make our award for the trees. The City Engineer reported on the 19th September, 1922, "I have had a careful survey made to locate the trees and find the City can construct a concrete sidewalk when it is required without disturbing the trees, and I can see no objection to the Council declaring that it is the policy of the City not to disturb the trees, and give such an undertaking as they have power to give to Mr. Foster to preserve the trees and to have it confirmed by Legislation". At the Council meeting of the 7th December 1922, the City Solicitor submitted two bonds for arbitration, one a flat agreement taking the land and the trees, the other an agreement taking the land and not to take into account the trees, and further agreeing to seem legislation, authorizing and requiring the City to retain the trees on the land after the land had been made into a street. The Council on motion of Alderman Power seconded by Alderman Hubley, accepted the agreement for arbitration,

first above mentioned taking both the land and the trees on a vote for the resolution of Aldermen Ackhurst, Finlay, Sanford, Schaffner, McDonald, Power, Mason, Hubley and Burgess, and Aldermen Bissett, Cameron, Guildford and Daw against, and subsequently the Council appointed Alderman E.J. Kelly, City Arbitrator.

These resolutions I veto, and for the following reasons:

The Building line was established for the benefit of the citizens, and to increase the value of their property. In many instances the Building line has been established at the special request of the citizens immediately concerned. The Building line has been laid down on very many streets both in the new and old parts of the City, many of our oldest streets (some of these now are most important streets) are very narrow and are now fast becoming too narrow to accommodate the traffic on them. The Building line legislation did not provide that the City should take over the property covered by the building line, but provide that no damage or compensation should be allowed in respect to any building placed over the building line after the Building line was laid down.

Mr. Foster asks first that we take the land within the Building line and pay him for it. He has now the full use of this land and building line has in my opinion increased the value of his property very considerable, as by the establishing of the line on North Street that Street is now of full width and finely built up, and again if Mr. Foster wishes to sell any of his lots the Building line now prevents the purchasers of the lots to build so near the street, as to injure the value of the two fine houses he now has on his property and which are set back some 15 feet or so from the street.

If Mr. Foster gets his way the Council will thereby establish a precedent, so that any other person on whose land is a building line can come and demand the value of the land so set off. This will mean many hundreds of thousands of dollars of increased taxation to the citizens. Second, Mr. Foster asks that his barn be moved back. If the Council does this more than half of the property owners on Water Street, for instance, can come to Council with a dimilar demand. This would probably mean an expenditure of much over \$500,000.00 on Water Street alone. For instance Wm. Robertson and Sons' Warehouse on Water

Street is over the building line by over twenty feet. Mr. Robertson asked the City to move back his building we would, if we treated him as we have treated Mr. Foster, be compelled to do so at a cost of probably not less than \$40,000.00. I have only given a few of the very many reasons why

these resolutions should be vetoed. For the last three years I have tried to impress on the public the absolute need of economy in City Government, and I hope the members of the Council will at the next meeting of the Council indorse what I have done in what I consider the best interests of the Citizens.

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HIS WORSHIP THE MAYOR'S VETO

Also read His Worship the Mayor's message covering

To Members of City Council:

Acting under Section 342 of City Charter 1914, and in accordance with notice already filed on Minutes of meeting of City Council, held January 4th, 1923, I hereby confirm my disapproval and veto of Council's Resolution to submit the matter of land claim of W.W. Foster, involved in the widening of Oxford and North Streets, to arbitration.

In my absence from this meeting, of January 4th, Deputy Mayor Whitman, who presided, notified Council of his intention to veto this Resolution and has filed a report, which is before you to-night, setting out his reasons for so doing.

To avoid any question as to his powers of exervising this veto, the City Solicitor gave an opinion, under date of January 6th, which is also submitted and acting under this opinion, I herein notify Council of my concurrence in the action taken and my approval of veto. A careful perusal of the corres-

pondence and Minutes, bearing on this matter, shows that Council's action taken at meeting, held on the 25th of April last, was based on a written proposal from Mr. Foster, and that after discussion it was agreed to name an Arbitrator to fix a value of this land. Ex-Alderman E.J. Kelly was selected and accepted by both the City and owner of the land.

In a report, bearing date of

July 31st 1922, Mr. Kelly brought in his award for an amount of Nine Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars and Fifty-Six Cents (\$938.56). Mr. Foster declined to accept this award, notwithstanding his agreement to arbitrate. The City consented to preserve the trees, on this strip of land, and the Engineer reported that it would be possible, when so decided, to lay sidewalks without removing them. I am satisfied that the City has honorably carried out its part of this undertaking and feel no injustice in being done the owner and that public interest is being best served by declining to proceed further

in this matter.

Dear Sir:-In reply to your request for my opinion in the above, I beg to say as follows:-Two points are involved. First, is this a matter properly coming within the scope of the powers to veto vested in the Mayor? I am of opinion that it is. The Resolution is one involving the expenditure of money for the purchase of a lot of land and the fact that the Resolution goes on to provide for a way of fixing the price

by arbitration, does not alter its essential character. Two. I am of opinion that the power to vote cannot be exercised by you, merely because you were presiding as Deputy Mayor at the meeting at which the Resolution was passed. If the veto had to be exercised there and then, or not at all, the matter might have been different, but it is not. The Mayor has the right within one week after the passage of the Resolution to signify his disapproval. He can do this although the Resolution had passed without any dissent from the Chairman of the Meeting of even from himself if he had been personally presiding. I, therefore, do not think that he is precluded from exercising his e right to veto merely by the fact that he was absent from the Chair when the Resolution was passed.

If, however, there is any doubt in the matter, the Mayor can, if he so desires, either make a separate veto, or concur in the joint veto by himself and yourself.

Burchell, K.C., representing Messrs Hamilton and Johnson, Milk Dealers, with permission, addressed the Board, with reference to the decision handed down by the Supreme Court restraining his clients from maintaining a milk plant at #59 Duncan Street as required by the new Milk Regulations passed by the City Health Board. He asked that as his clients had complied with all the requirements of the Board in that behalf approved be given to a Bill entitled an Act to amend section 18 of Chapter 46 of the Acts of the legislature of Nova Spotia for the year 1915, entitled an Act to amend the law in relation to the City of Halifax. Mr. Burchell also submitted a petition from a number of residents in favor of the proposal.

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After discussion, it was moved by Alderman Mason seconded by Mr. Muldowney, that this Board recommend to the City Council that section 18 of Chapter 46 of the Acts of 1915 be amended as follows:

(1) "Section 18 of Chapter 46 of the Acts of the Legislature of Nova Scotia for the year 1915, entitled an Act to amend the Law in relation to the City of Halifax, is hereby amended by inserting between Sub-section 6 and Sub-section 7 the following Sub-section:-

6. (a) Buildings may be erected, enlarged and used within said district by milk-dealers for the purposes of their business, provided that such milk-dealers comply with the Regulations of the City Health Board, and in the case of buildings erected or enlarged since the 23rd day of April 1915, that permission has been or is obtained from the Board of Works to erect, enlarge or alter the building or buildings in which said business is conducted, and further provided that such buildings are not used for the purpose of stabling cows".

the present. You will note that we will require further funds to cover this month's bills. I consider the City's funds have been used most economically and the relief situation well taken care of from an economical point of view. None of us thought that the \$10,000 provided by the City last summer would have carried the situation up to present time. Expenditures for February and March will probably be fairly heavy, and I would think it advisable for the City to provide a further \$10,000 until say the first of May.

So far this winter we have not paid out anything to the Poor's Association or St. Vincent DePaul Society. We have been told, however, by the societies that they will run short of funds - the understanding being that they are to continue to take care of distress and that their actual requirements over and above their own funds that are available will be provided by the Unemployment Relief Committee.

<u>STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE AND DEPUTY</u>

Read report Finance Committee in connection with

the Office of Stipendiary Magistrate and Deputy

At a meeting of the Finance Committee held

this day the Chairman brought to the attention of the

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Committee the situation with respect to the Office of Stipendiary Magistrate.

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the accompanying resolution dealing with the matter.

The following resolution referred to in the report

is submitted by Alderman Whitman.

WHEREAS by Section 161 of the City Charter of 1914 provision is made for the appointment of a Deputy Stipendiary Magistrate, who shall act temporarily for the Stipendiary Magistrate and without any renumeration to be paid by the City,

AND WHEREAS in August 1918 Walter J. O'Hearn, Esq., a Barrister of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, was appointed under said section, Deputy Stipendiary Magistrate for the City of Halifax,

AND WHEREAS on December 4th, 1919, George H. Fielding Esq., Stipendiary Magistrate for the City of Halifax, wrote a letter to the City Council stating that he had such a present and prospective volume of business before the court, especially since the passing of the Nova Scotia Temperance Act, as would warrant the continuance of the services of a Deputy and his payment by the City of Halifax.

AND WHEREAS it appears that the said Walter J. O'Hearn was reappointed under said section in 1919, Deputy Stipendiary Magistrate, as aforesaid, such appointment only enduring for one year.

AND WHEREAS by Chapter 86 of the Provincial Act of 1920 the City was authorized to borrow the sum of \$1,500.00 for the payment of such Deputy Stipendiary Magistrate and the City of Halifax has since said time to the present paid the said sum yearly to the said Deputy Stipendiary Magistrate, who subsequently was appointed by the Governor-in-Council, an additional Stipendiary Magistrate in and for the City of Halifax.

AND WHEREAS the said Walter J. O'Hearn has been appointed Attorney General of Nova Scotia and it is intimated that thereby the Office of Deputy and additional Stipendiary Magistrate, for the City of Halifax, which he filled has now become vacant. AND WHEREAS the said Deputy and Additional Stipendiary Magistrate sat in the Police and City Court at Halifax usually on Monday, Wednesday and Fridays in each and every week when he was present, in order to assist the Stipendiary Magistrate and within the last year and a half on at least two occasions he was presented, as the press reports show, with a traditional pair of white gloves, owing to no criminal business being brought before him. AND WHEREAS the volume of work in the Police Court has very much ceased within the last two years. AND WHEREAS by Section 6 of Chapter 86 of the Provincial Act of 1920 a retired allowance of \$3,000. yearly upon the retirement of George H. Fielding, Esq.,

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Stipendiary Magistrate, to be paid annually is provided for and it is there also provided that \$1,500. a year is to be paid to the Deputy Stipendiary Magistrate while he assists Mr. Fielding.

AND WHEREAS it is grafitying to learn that Mr. Fielding has by reason or restoration to health not taken advantage of his retiring allowance but is satisfactorily performing his during and it is not in the public interest to continue the payment of \$1500. to a Deputy or Additional Stipendiary Magistrate.

YOUR COMMITTEE therefore recommend that the Governorin-Council be requested not to appoint a successor as Deputy Stipendiary Magistrate to the said Mr. O'Hearn as such an officer is now unnecessary and it is desirable in the interest of the City to save the taxpayers money as far as possible and your Committee further recommend that the City procure legislation at the approaching session of the Provincial Legislature to repeal subsection 2 of Section 6 of the Provincial Acts of 1920 providing for the payment of \$1,500. a year to a Deputy and Additional Stipendiary Magistrate.

YOUR COMMITTEE further recommend that the City Clerk be instructed by this Council to send a copy of this resolution and recommendation to the Honorable Provincial Secretary and the five members of the City and County of Halifax representing this City and County in the Provin-Multiple a regard to the wishes of the Council in this respect. Multiple The report and resolution are referred back to the Finance Committee for further cial Legislature and to ask their cooperation in bringing about a regard to the wishes of the Council in this

report.
