His Worship the Mayor, Sir:-

I beg to report on a communication from The Westmount Land Company attached hereto, in reference to a strip of land on Chebucto Road, between Phillips Street and Mumford Road, and on Mumford Road between Chebucto Road and Leppert Street.

The subdivision of this property was approved by the Town Planning Board and was laid out so that space would be left to make Chebucto Road the proper width for a main thoroughfare. It is quite possible that the fence at the front of this property encroached on the road, but if so the encroachment had existed for so long a period it would be impossible now to prove that it was an encroachment. We have no records which would help us at all and therefore we have to assume that the property belongs to the present owners. There is no question that the road is too narrow, in fact, it has been dangerous owing to the fact that all the water from Leahyville had to do down ditches on Chebucto Road necessitating a deep gutter to keep the water off the road.

The Company offer to dispose of the land at the same price as that placed on the adjoining property by the City Assessors. The law does not permit us to pay the present value of land adjoining, but provides that the City shall pay only the value of the land at the time the restriction was placed bn it. The restriction was made in 1909 at which time the land was worth about five cents per square foot. There are 13,028 square feet in the two strips and I would recommend that the Company be offered \$651.40, or five cents per square foot, for a deed of the land required.

In accordance with our conversation of this morning, I am sending you a memo of the help that I require in the Office. I am also sending you several documents marked Nos. 1,2,3,4 and 5.

What I want in the Office is what I asked for in No. 1, namely a typist and two Sub-Collectors to take the place of the two that are now doing inside work. In addition to that I would like that a vote of \$500.00 or \$600.00 should be made for any extra help required at times of rush, say June, July and August, that money to be paid out on the recommendation of the Mayor. I want to call your attention to the fact of the rapid increase in the work of the office, and in Nos. 3 and 4 you will see how the work has increased from \$444,000. to \$1,849,000. or three times as much, and yet I have practically the same staff to do that work. To His Worship the Mayor, and City Council. Gentlemen:-

At a meeting of the Laws and Privileges Committee held this day the attached letter of W.L. Weston, Esq., Manager Nova Scotia Tramways & Power Co. Ltd. with reference to bringing into force Bill No. 24 with respect to the Rule of the Road now before the Legislature was read. Your Committee recommend that the City Council request that the bringing into force of this Act be delayed until the 30th April next. Alfred Whitman, CHAIRMAN. Nova Scotia Tramways & Power Co.Ltd Halifax, N.S. March 13th, 1923. His Worship the Mayor, Halifax, N.S. Dear Sir:-Bill No. 24 has been introduced into the Provincial Legislature to bring about a change in the Rule of -- 480 --

Road to become effective on the 2nd of April next. We understand that the Committee has passed on the Bill and revised it so that the change will become effective April 15th next.

We have felt it desirable to draw your attention to this situation as curtailed tram service will result for a period after the 15th of April. All the new cars, generally spoken of as Birney Cars, will have to be changed by closing in the door which is now on the left hand side, cutting the opening on the right hand side and putting the door in that position. It will also be necessary to change the position of the controller and the air brake apparatus which you will readily understand is a rather large undertaking. In addition we **bhall** have to substitute two man cars for one man cars and will not have available a sufficient number of skilled operators for this work.

Out best estimate is that on April 15th we will be able to operate about thirty cars throughout the day where thirty-three are normally used. In addition the seven or eight cars ordinarily run during the evening rush cannot be operated. Fourteen skilled mechanics are engaged in changing the cars and the Company is endeavoring in every way possible to overhaul the equipment with the least possible delay.

We feel that as Mayor of the City you will be interested in knowing the exact stateof affairs as a great number of people are certain to be inconvenienced.

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1. In this Act the expression "City" means the City of Halifax, the expression "Council" means the City Council of that City, and any committee or official herein mentioned by name means the committee or official of that name of the said Council or City, The expression "City Charter" means the Halifax City Charter of 1907, or the Halifax City Charter of 1914, according to the sections of those Charters respectively as defined and now in force under and by virtue of Chapter (80) of the Acts of 1919, and sections referred to by number without other reference are the sections of the said Charters now in force under the said Chapter, and this Act shall relate exclusively to the City of Halifax and the said Charters thereon.

2. The City may sell the property known as the Grafton Street Engine House for the best price obtainable therefor, and apply the proceeds to the purchase of a site to replace the one disposed of and the contstruction of another engine house thereon.

3. Section 540 is repealed and the following Section substituted therefor:-

540. (1) Every person, firm or company not residing or having its head office or chief place of business in the Province of Nova Scotia, who enters into any contract for the construction or alteration of any building within the City shall except as hereinafter provided, be liable to pay the City a tax equal to one-half of one per cent of the total sum payable under such contract;

(2) Such tax shall be due and payable immediately after work under such contract has begun. (3)Both the person, firm or company entering into such contract and the agent, foreman or other person in charge of the work under such contract, shall be liable for the payment of such tax, and the same may be enforced either or both by warrant or by action in the same way as other rates and taxes of the City, and service of process against such persons, firm or company, may be made upon any such agent, foreman or person in charge of the work; (4) The provisions of this section shall not apply to any person, firm or company, who for the civic year next preceding that in which such contract was entered into was assessed for taxation in the City in nearbor to was assessed for taxation in the

City, in respect to real property of a value not less than Five Thousand Dollars.

4. Section 400 is amended by adding after the word "Charter" in the third line, the words "or under any special /Act of the Legislature unless expressly stated to the contrary".

5. Sub-section (1) of Section 703 is repealed and the following Sub-section submitted:-

703. (1) In respect to any portion of the Cemetery which has at any time been set apart for the members of any religious congregation, the Board shall not sell any lot in such portion to any person not a member of the denomination to which such congregation belongs, but the price for any lot shall be such as is from time to time determined by the Council, not however exceeding Fifty dollars per lot. 6. Section 380 is amended by adding thereto the following Sub-section:-

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(2) The charges payable in respect to the taking, keeping and selling any distress under any such warrant, shall be those provided by law upon a distress for rent, and for making any arrest, those provided by law for Constables under the "Summary Convictions Act".

7. The City shall not be liable for any injury or Camages occasioned by any failure to remove snow or ice from a street.

8. The Council may, by ordinance, regulate the use of any public landing as a landing place for a ferry, including the granting of a license for such use, and limiting the number of licenses so granted, the conduct of persons embarking or disembarking from the ferry at such landing place, and all other matters requisite for the due control and regulation of such ferry at such landing place.

9. Every female person, who is qualified to vote at an Election for Mayor or Aldermen shall be qualified to be elected a Mayor or Alderman or to be appointed to any office in the City, in the like manner and subject to the like qualifications and disabilities as if such person had been a male.

10. Section 358 is amended by adding thereto the following Sub-Section:-

(2) The securities of the funds shall be deposited in some secure place of deposit in the names of the Trustees and the Treasurer and shall only be removed from such place on the joint order of one or more of the Trustees and the Treasurer.

11. The following Section is added to immediately follow Section 93:-

(93 A). The Mayor may suspend, without salary, any official of the City for neglect of duty, insubordination, or other conduct incompatible with the due performance of his duties. Any such suspension with the cause thereof shall be reported by the Mayor in writing to each member of the Council, and a meeting of the Council shall be called within ten days of such suspension at which the Council may confirm or annul such suspension.

12. In any case in which it is proposed to pave any street or to lay a permanent sidewalk and as part of such Sheets and Sidewalks work a curb or gutter is laid before the remainder of the work is completed, the City shall assess against the owners of abutting properties, in the manner directed in respect to assessment in respect to paving and sidewalks, one-half of the cost of laying such curb or gutter. Such assessment shall be due on the First day of May next succeeding the date on which such curb and gutter is laid, and the amount thereof shall be payable forthwith, and shall be deemed part of the assessment in respect to the whole assessment in respect to such paving or sidewalk when the same is completed. Roods and struto ang Right 2W 13. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary a sprinkling cart, a steam roller or a motor sweeper we may travel in any direction of either side of the street, or in the centre thereof, and shall have the right of way against any vehicle except a tram-car or a vehicle of the Fire Department when proceeding to a fire. 14. The following Section is added to immediately follow Section 901:-

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(901 A), The Board shall not enter upon any contemplated expenditure of money on capital account, such as the preparation of plans for a building, the payment of money for an option on any land or other proposed expenditure without first submitting the proposal to the City Council for approval, and if the Council does not approve an appeal shall lie to the Governorin-Gouncil, as in the next preceding Section and the Governor-in-Council may sanction such proposal or modify the same as is deemed best.

15. WHEREAS the City has borrowed certain sums of money or has authority to borrow money for the purposes and under the authorities following, that is to say:-Bine Delpt

For the Construction of an Engine House on Campbell For the purchase of Fire Equipment 1920 c 86..... 40,000. For the Conversion of two horse-drawn chemical

Engine 1921 c 77..... 17,000. For the Purchase of an Aerial Ladder 1922 c 54.... 19,000.

AND WHEREAS the money so borrowed has not been expended. for the said respective purposes and is no longer required for the same.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED that the said sums so borrowed be not applied to any of the said respective purposes, but be forthwith paid by the Treasurer to the Trustees of the /City's Sinking Funds, to be applied and invested as is by law directed.

No further moneys shall be borrowed by the City under any of the above recited enactments, and the same, except so far as relates to any moneys heretofore borrowed thereunder, are hereby repealed.

16. Clause (c) of Sub-Section (2) of Section 541 is repealed and the following substitutes therefor:-

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323. He may at any time receive payment of any sum due the City by instalments, and he alone shall have the right to apportion any payment and apply the same to such indebtedness as he deems best, and in the

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absence of any such apportionment by him any payment shall be deemed to be made on the debt to the City of the longest standing.

Section 18 of Chapter 46 of the Acts of 1915 is 21. amended by adding thereto the following Sub-section:-

(8) A building may be erected, enlarged or used witnin the said district by a Milk dealer for the purpose of his trade, provided;

(a) that such dealer comply with the regulations of the Halifax City Health Board;

(b) that in the case of any building erected, enlarged or altered since the 23rd day of April, 1915, permission for such erection, enlargement or alteration has been duly obtained from the Board of Control or Committee On Works, and

(c) that no cow is stabled in such building.
