His Worship The Mayor. Sir,

There was, at the beginning of the Civic Year a balance of approximately \$2,500. in the Common Improvement account, which was authorized to be spent for the improvement of the Central Common Playground. A plan was made for the improvement of this part of the Common and was adopted by the Gardens Commission and the Board of Works.

Last year a certain amount of rough grading was done with material that could be spared from the paving operations on Quinpool Road and South Park Street and during the winter by the use of ashes, and a large part of the area has been graded to finished grade and requires now to be smoothed off and covered with a layer of sweepings or loam and sown in grass. In the adopted design a wading pool was shown. It was proposed to construct this last year but owing to lack of funds nothing was done.

I have a letter from Mr. E. J. Kelly, stating that the Halifax Rotary Club have offered to raise \$1,000. towards the completion of this wading pool, provided the work is begun immediately. This amount, together with the sum in hand, will be sufficient to construct this pool.

I need not dwell on the advantages and the necessity of this accessory to all modern playgrounds; a trip to the playground at Fort Needham will convince anyone how much this is appreciated by the children.

The Egg Pond is utilized during the day time to a large extent by slightly older children with punts and water games and in the evenings by grown-ups for model yacht racing, so that at present the kiddies have no available water to paddle in.

The offer of the Halifax Rotary Club is a most generous one, especially in view of the fact that they have already provided the pool at Fort Needham, and I would strongly recommend that it be accepted, and that the City Engineer be authorized to immediately call for tenders for the wading pool.

Dear Sir,

The fortnightly pay-roll has been submitted to me for signature as required by the Auditor. This is the first pay-roll since the first of May, on which date the reduction ordered by the City Council at their meeting held on the 26th. of February, 1924, came into force. The resolution passed by the Council reads as follows:-

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"RESOLVED that the salaries of all officials and employees in the employ of the City of Halifax who are in receipt of yearly salaries, including all teachers in the Public Schools of the City of Halifax and all the officials and employees of the School Board, be reduced as under:-

All salaries under \$1500.00 by a reduction of five (5) percent;

All salaries of \$1500.00 and over by a reduction of ten (10) percent;"

The resolution as it stands appears to apply to all employees of the City whose salary is woted as a yearly salary and not to persons employed at hourly, daily or weekly wages and whose employment is temporary.

I have consulted with the City Solicitor, who also takes this view of the matter.

The Pay-roll was made up without reference to this office and reductions in the wages have been made in some cases and not in others, of men employed under similar conditions.

I do not understand it to be the intention of the Gouncil to discriminate between different employees in the same class, hired by the day or week, and who are liable to be laid off at any time.

In order to avoid holding up the pay of the men, I have certified the pay-roll, subject to revision, and beg to ask for further instructions in this matter, as to whether the reduction shall apply only to those in receipt of a yearly salary, or to all on the pay-robl.

Alderman Daw asks for the City SolicStor's opinion on the authority of His Worship the Mayor to veto this appointment. -51-

To Members of the City Council.

Gentlemen,

At a meeting of the City Council held on the evening of May 22nd. the Council appointed or purported to appoint Mr. F. A. Nightingale as City Auditor, with a salary of \$4,000. a year. Acting under the power conferred on me by Section 342 of the City Charter of 1914, I have vetoed this proceeding.

Stated briefly, my action in this matter is based on the conviction that Mr. Nightingale's services are not worth \$4,000. a year to this City. I do not question Mr. Nightingale's qualifications for the work in which he is at present and has for some time been engaged, but I do say the position of City Auditor for Halifax calls for a man not only of outstanding ability, but of the widest experience, and at no time in our history was it more essential that such a man be appointed to this office than at the present state.

By virtue of Legislation relating to the City of Halifax, passed at the last Session, the City Council is authorized by resolution from time to time to fix the salary of the person to be appointed City Auditor, no maximum or minimum amount is fixed by Statute.

It is my opinion, therefore, that this brings the Council*s action clearly within the provisions of Sub-section (b) of Section 342 of the City Charter of 1914, which Section I here invoke in exercising my power of veto.

It also appears clear to me that the salary of \$4,000. is an expenditure that is the permissive one given by Section 4 of sill 65 passed at the recent Session of the Legishature and therefore comes within the provisions of Clause (c) of Section 342 of the City Charter of 1914, under which Section 1 further justify my veto of the expenditure.

The above in brief, are the grounds on which I base my veto.

I desire also to bring to the attention of Council the manner in which the balloting for this position was carried out at your meeting of May 22nd. It is my opinion that this Election should have been conducted in accordance with Section 142 of the City Charter of 1914, and that balloting should have continued at least until the choice rested between two applicants, instead of declaring the result on the first ballot.

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In Sub-Section (4) of Section 342, you may by a twothirds vote of the whole Council over-ride my veto and confirm your action of May 22nd.

I now ask the Members of Council to take this message into consideration. Having dealt with this matter in what I consider, the best interests of our ratepayers, I leave it with you to decide.

He SUPERANNUATION - LAIDLAW AND DOANE.

Dear Sir,

In response to the request of the Council for my opinion as to whether the sums required in the above in addition to the amounts payable out of the Superannuation Fund can be taken out of the City's current account, I beg to say as follows.

The Section of the Charter (Section 12 of Chap. 74, 1914) provides that the retiring official "shall be "entitled to receive" am allowance of thirty-fiftieths of the average of his yearly salaries for his last three years of office, and the difference between that amount and the amount which he is entitled to receive from the Superannuation Fund "shall be included in the yearly est-"imates." This enactment clearly constitutes an obligation on the City which could be enforced by law. It is also clear that if the resignations come after the estimates have been adopted, some provision must be made for payment until the next yearly estimates.

The resolution of the Finance Committee provides that the Treasurer shall provide for payment of the

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City's portion out of any fund available. The only fund immediately available is the City's current account, and the report of the Committee recommends payment out of that. The question for me is whether or not there is any legal objection to doing so. The only clause of the Charter bearing on the matter is Section 339 which provides that it shall not be "lawful to charge against the "revenues of any civic year any sum of mone which has "not been authorized by the estimate for that year.". I am of opinion and have previously so expressed myself that the "charge" contemplated is a permanent charge when the account for the year is finally closed and dees not preclude the use of current funds for payment of any lawful obligation of the City, so long as such use is temporary only and the money borrowed is replaced from a proper source, which in this case will be the estimate for 1925-26.

For these reasons I am of opinion that the recommendation of the Committee can legally be complied with. I may add that I am informed by the Treasurer that this has been the invariable practice for years past. The City can if it wishes avail itself of the provisions of the Section numbered 976 in the Act recently passed (Bill No. 64) which authorizes a borrowing to meet an expenditure not otherwise provided for, but for the reasons given I do not think it necessary to do so.

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"authority, the Council may, by a twothirds maj-"ority, resolve that the money required for "such purpose (specifying the same) and not in "any one case exceeding \$5000.00 and not in any "one case amounting in all to more than \$10,000.00 "shall be borrowed under the authority of this en-"actment from any bank or fund available".

FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Treasurer be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the said City of Halifax to negotiate the said loan as required and to pledge the credit of the City therefor.

Sir, RE: CANADIAN BITUMINOUS PAVING CORPN. VS CITY OF HALIFAX.

The Writ in the above action was issued on the 6th. of January 1921, and the Statement of Claim served 15th. February 1921. The particulars of damage claimed amounted to \$113,998.10. The defence was filed on 9th. April 1921. In July I endeavoured to have the Nova Scotia Tramways & Power Co. Ltd. added as a third party. The application was resisted by that Company and was refused by the Judge. I append a copy of his Judgment which in my opinion is correct for the reasons briefly given by him. The failure of this application, I may say in no way prejudices any claim or right of action the City has against that Company.

The action was by consent of all parties referred for trial to Mr. R. T. MacIlreith, K. C., as referee. Mr. Stewart who was associated in the defence of the action approved of this course, and the course of the trial in which many delays and interruptions were inevitable, and when it was frequently most desirable to study lengthy evidence in order to make a satisfactory cross examination

convinces me that it would have been almost impossible to have tried the action in any other way, and that if it had been attempted the result would have been much worse for the City.

The case was tried before Mr. MacIlreith in the summer and fall of 1921, and on 29th. February, 1924, he gave a decision finding the City liable for the sum of \$60,920.00 a reduction from the amount claimed of \$53,068.00. I have read the judgment of the referee very carefully and am of opinion that the City would have no prospect of success on an appeal. There can be no doubt that the City committed a breach of its contract, nor any doubt that the Paving Company suffered heavy loss in consequence. The question, therefore, resolves itself into a pure assessment of damages. In such matter a court is always reluctant to interfere with the findings of a referee, unless manifestly wrong. In this case they have evidently been made with great care and reasons are given in support of the various findings, and I can consequently hold out no hope of a successful appeal. I may add that an appeal by the City would very possibly be followed by a cross appeal by the Plaintiff for the increase of certain items and allowance of others disallowed by the referee.

LYDIARD PROPERTY, CORNER JUBILEE ROAD AND BEECH STREET.

Read report of Laws and Privileges Committee in re the disputed claim for taxes on a lot corner of Jubilee Road and Beech Street owned by Mr. Lydiard, covering opinion of the City Solicitor on the matter.

To His Worship the Mayor and City Council.

Gentlemen,

At a meeting of the Laws and Privileges Committee, held this day, the attached Minute of Council of meeting held May 1st. instant referring to this Committee for consideration and report the disputed claim of taxes on the property of Mr. Lydiard at the corner of Jubilee Road and Beech Street, was read.

The City Solicitor submitted the following opinion on the matter:-

Office of City Solicitor, May 23, 1984.

The Chairman, Laws & Privileges Committee, City.

Dear Sir, <u>Re Lydiard Property.</u>

The question in this case is whether or not the property of Mr. Lydiard on the west side of Beech Street, immediately north of Jubilee Road is liable for any taxes previous to May 1922. The claim for exemption arises from the fact that the certificate was given by Mr. Theakston as Collector of Taxes that the property of Mr. Oland who was Mr. Lydiard's predecessor in title, situated at the corner of Jubilee Road and Beech Street, a vacant lot, was free from taxes to May 1922. The question turns upon the point of whether Mr. Lydiard's property was covered by this vague description.

The property in 1922 was a vacant field. Mr. Oland had purchased it in two lots, one fronting on Jubilee Road, and a smaller portion now owned by Mr. Lydiard to the north of the other property and fronting on Beech Street. The two properties had been assessed separately, the one first purchased as fronting on Jubilee Road, and the second as fronting on Beech Street. Mr. Machum, representing the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation through whom the sale by Oland was negotiated inquired

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as to the taxes on the property and was prepared to pay them and claims that he gave a description of the property to Mr. Theakston. We have not of course any statement of Mr. Theakston, but I have no reason to doubt the correctness of the statement made by Mr. Machum.

It should, however, be borne in mind that there was nothing on the Assessment Roll to indicate to Mr. Theakston that the two properties one on Jubilee Road and one on Beech Street formed practically the one property. They do not appear in the same part of the Assessment roll and as there were no measurements given on the Assessment roll, Mr. Theakston not unnaturally, assumed that the Jubilee Road property was the whole of the property in respect to which the taxes were payable and on receipt of that amount gave the certificate in question leaving the taxes on the Lydiard property outstanding. The small sketch which I attach herewith will make this point clearer.

Under these circumstances, I do not see how the City can enforce payment against Mr. Lydiard for taxes previous to 1922 in the face of Mr. Theakston's certificate. It is clear that a mistake was made by Mr. Theakston, but one quite excusable from the way the tax roll is made up. I do not see that he was in any way to blame, but the City must be responsible for the mistakes of its officials.

As a matter of fact the amount involved is only trifling, less than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, as the City could not in any event have enforced payment against Mr. Lydiard for any taxes further back than for the year 1921-22. The taxes previous to that are of course recoverable from Mr. Oland, but with that Mr. Lydiard has nothing to do.

I take this opportunity of again pointing out, as I pointed out in connection with the Blois shit, that these certificates should contain a more definite description of the properties in respect to which they are given. It is suggested to me by the Collector and Assessor that they should be checked by the Assessor before being given and in this way mistakes such as the one under discussion would be less liable to happen.
