CITY AUDITOR'S REPORT FOR APRIL

OF TAXES COLLECTED

Read report City Auditor re Taxes collected in April 1925.

City Auditor's Office, Halifax, N.S.May 7th, 1925

His Worship the Mayor, and Members of Council, City of Halifax.

Sirs:-

I enclose herewith monthly statement as to the collection of Taxes for the month of April 1925 and supplement same with the following remarks.

The collections during April on account of Tax Arrears, other than those for the Civic Year just ended, amounted to \$34,793.72, which is an improvement over the months of February and March which totalled \$25,576.41 and \$28,614.16 respectively. The total cash collections on account of back years taxes during the 12 months ending 30th April 1925, amounted to \$26,315.33 or 24% of the amount outstanding at 30th April 1924.

The cash Collections during the month of April 1925, on accunt of Taxes for the year ending 30th ult., amounted to \$33,939.86 as compared with \$47,400.73 for the previous month being a falling off of \$13,460.87. It will be seen that in spite of the special effort made to collect taxes that there is the large sum of \$505,189.67 or 27½% still outstanding in respect of the taxes for the Civic Year just completed. This, however, is the smallest amount remaining outstanding at the end of the Civic Year that has been experienced for many years.

That there is an improvement in the Tax situation is evidenced by the fact that at the close of the previous Civic Year there were faxes outstanding of \$779,734.55 as compared with \$505,189.67 at 30th ult., being an improvement of \$274,544.88 and this in spite of the fact that \$526,315.33 was collected on back years taxes.

Although it is pleasing to note the improvement in the tax situation, I am compelled to call attention to another phase of the situation that must not be lost sight of i.e. the total tax arrears at the 30th April 1924, amounted to \$2205,273.87 and at 30th April last \$1,664,540.27 in respect of back years taxes and \$505,189.67 for the year just ended or a total of \$2,169,729.94, so that the total Taxes outstanding due to the addition of a further years arrears are only \$35543.93 less than a year ago. It is therefore evident that it will take some considerable time and effort for the City to recover from the difficult situation in regard to Tax Arrears handed over from the past.

FINDINGS, BOARD OF UTILITIES_TRAM FARES

For information of Council and purpose of record, I am submitting herewith copy of the decision filed by the Board of Utilities on recent application of Nova Scotia Tramway and Power to smend its schedule of Tram fares.

At the time of this hearing, the Writer personally appeared before the Board and asked the Company to introduce a straight- 5 cent Fare on their Tram service, and that the City would be prepared to consent to its going into operation for a period of one year, when, if at the finish results did not justify its continuance, we would agree to withdraw.

I stated at that time, and am satisfied that the increased traffic under such a change would be found to fully justify our demand.

The decision of the Board states that it is open to our Council - or to any five persons, to present an application for such a change. My own feeling is that unless the Company would agree to try the experiment we would not get for by following the suggestion made, as the City has no funds with which to press such an application and the ground on which it would succeed could only be proven by experimenting over the period of one year as suggested by me.

I plan to discuss this matter further with the Management of the Company before going out of Office. Should anything result from this conference I will be vary glad to report it to Council.

NOVA SCOTIA BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF PUBLIC UTILITIES

IN THE WATTER OF THE APPLICATION OF THE NOVA SCOTIA TRAHWAYS & POWER COMPANY LTD. FOR APPROVAL OF AN AMENDMENT TO ITS SCHEDULE OF FARES FOR TRAHWAY SERVICE.

This is an application on behalf of the Nova Scotia Teamways & Power Company, Limited for approval of amendments to its schedule of tramway fares and came on for hearing this day after the required public notice. The appearances were: W.R. Covert, K.C., in support of the application and John Murphy, Mayor of Halifax, and F.H. Zwicker also of Halifax.

The proposals of the Company are as follows:-

- 1. That three regular tickets be sold for twenty-five cents.
- 2. That the five cent permits be sold on the cars and at the offices of the company instead of at various shops as at present and that the limited permit be sold only at the office of the Company.
- That in addition to the School Childrens! tickets good only during certain specified hours on school days, children between the age of five and sixteen years have the option of being carried at any time at a five cent cash fare.

Mayor Murphy urged that instead of approving of the proposals of the company, an order should be made putting a general five cent fare into effect while at the same time "preserving the privileges "enjoyed under workingmen's and school children's tickets".

It was argued that the public should be given the benefit of the saving made by the retirement of the operating company from the active management of this Company. As to this it should be said that the reduction in operating cost applied to each of the departments of the undertaking according to the gross earnings of each and not alone to the tramway department. Further, in arriving at what the reasonable operating costs should be, provision was not made by this Board for the continuance of operating company management as a comparision of the costs as submitted and as approved will show. Hence the rates as approved carried no provision for such form of management.

While the proposal of Mayor Murphy cannot be given effect to on this application, it is, of course, open to the corporation (Civic) of any five persons to present it as a sutstantive application. It raises a question which almost all companies operating tramways and many regulatory commissions have had to consider over since the higher costs of operating have made increased revenue necessary.

The viewpoint expressed and the representations made by the Mayor will, no doubt, be considered by the new management of the Company in conjunction with its study of the financial problems presented by the Tramway Department.

As there was no objection raised to the proposals in themselves, covered by this petition, it would not appear wise to delay approval of them until
