## MAXWELL PROPERTY-FOREOLOSURE SALE

You will remember that at a meeting some time ago, I informed the Committee of the contention raised by the purchaser at a foreclosure sale of one of the Maxwell Properties that our lien had been lost by a merger, of our claim in the judgment taken against Maxwell. The Committee requested my opinion, and suggestion. I now beg to hand you herewith copy of a letter which I have today handed to the Collector.

# RE: MAXWELL MORTGAGE

Sir:-

I should have replied to yours of the 19th March sooner if I had not been prevented by illness.

The point for my consideration as I understand is the following. The City took a judgment against Edward Maxwell for the amount due by him for taxes. Subsequently, one of the properties owned by Maxwell was foreclosed and bid in at the sale by the Mortgagee. The Canadian Investment Company. There was then due the City in respect to the property taxes in respect to part of which the City had a lien under Section 447 of the Charter, and the property was sold on the usual terms of being subject to the Claim of the City.

The purchaser now claims that the effect of the Judgment was to operate as a merger of the Oity's Olaim and to wipe out all the taxes previous to their acquisition of the property, and that this contention is supported by the opinion of their solicitors.

I beg to say that in my opinion this contention is based on a misapprehension of the law, both as to merger and lien. The doctrine of merger is simply that if a creditor with a claim of what the law considers a lower or simpler nature, such as an ordinary debt of contract, converts it into what the law considers a debt of a higher nature, such a judgment or a bond the law will consider the debt of the lower nature merged in that of the higher, for the obvious reason that the debtor cannot be considered liable on both.But that has nothing

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whatever to do with a lien securing the debt. A lien is merely a collateral security, which continues in force so long as the debt in any form continues to exist. If the contention of the mortgagee is correct, it would follow that a creditor who had taken a bill of sale or pledge of goods as security for an ordinary debt would lose his security if he took judgment against his debtor.

So much for the matter on principle. As to authority there is of course no English authority, the system of taxation being entirely different. But the American authorities are clear that taking a judgment does not affect the lien.

If the mortgagee holds to its contention, I would suggest that the quickest and cheapest way to settle the question would be to prepare a stated case for a court, raising the one question only, namely is the property still subject to the lien of the City?

### RE: TAX COLLECTIONS

I enclose herewith the usual monthly statement as to Tax Collections and outstanding Taxes as at the end of the last Civic Year i.e. 30th April 1926, and have the following remarks to make in regard thereto.

The Collections during April on

account of back years taxes i.e. excluding the Oivic Year just ended, amounted to \$45,055.42 as compared with \$53,165.24 for the previous month.

The following is a comparison of the collections on account of back years taxes this year as compared with last year:-

May -March Collections \$491,677.04 \$547,334.15 April Collections. 34,439.92 48,058.42 Total Collections of back years taxes for

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\$526,116.96 \$595,392.57

It will therefore be seen that there is an increase of \$69,275.61 in the collection of back years taxes during the Civic Year just completed as compared with the previous year.

The collections on account of Current Year's Taxes during April last, amounted to \$31,292.38 which is practically the same total as for March.

The collections on account of Current Year's Taxes this year compare with last year as follows:-

It will be seen, therefore, that there is a falling off in the Current Years Collections this year as compared with last year of \$47,767.47. This is due partly to the increase in the collections of back years taxes and also Water Rates.

The outstanding General Taxes at the end of the Civic Year just completed total:-

as compared with a total at 30th April 1925 of \$2,172.924.88 or a decrease of \$51,337.95. I would point out, however that to some extent this decrease id due to adjustments made in respect to defalcations and incorrect assessments and uncollectible taxes written off.

It will be seen that at the end of another Oivic Year the Collections on back years taxes are off-set by the arrears accumulated on the Current Year.

As you are aware the recent Funding Operation will in all probability cure the situation regarding the back years taxes of \$1,537,731.80 as it is fully expected that in the next five years sufficient will be collected from back years taxes to form the required Sinking Fund to redeem the whole of the new Bond issue of \$1,500,000.00 raised to pay off the Bank borrowings in connection with such arrears. The City is to be congratulated on the successful placing of this large Bond issue at such a high figure i.e. \$99.60.

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I have again to point out the unfortunate position the City finds itself in, having outstanding at the end of its Civic Year the large sum of \$583,855.13 in respect of the Current Year's levy.

It would be counting disaster for the City to expect to again resort to a Tax Arrears Funding Issue to meet accumulations of Tax Arrears, therefore it is essential that the accumulation of Current Years Taxes cease other wise the City will never recover its financial equilibrium. There is no doubt that it will take several years to do this, but every pressure must be made upon the Collection Department to improve collections towards this end.

You will note that the pressure brought to bear to enforce the collection of Water Rates by turning off the supply where users are in arrears has had a beneficial effect, as the collections of Water Rates during April amounted to the increased figure of \$55,407.21. This method of collecting delinquent accounts must be continued from time to time in the same way as is found necessary by other Public Utilities.

I would report that there will be a shortage of about \$53.00 in the estimate for rents of Oity properties, due to the fact of the non-payment of rent in connection with the fire station on Spring Garden Road. This matter is having the attention of the Works Department.

I would also report that the estimates for Market Revenue will be short about \$530.00. As you know in this Department expenditure has to be incurred before revenue is received to offset same. The expenditure on maintenance this year has been heavier than previous years, but unfortunately the revenue has not been forthcoming to offset same consequently there will be a shortage.

There will also be,asfar as I can judge a shortage in the appropriation for the for the maintenance of Truants and Delinquent Children, which will necessitate holding up the accounts until authority is obtained to pay same. There are certain outstanding accounts that I have not received, so, I cannot state what the actual figure of shortage will be.

As the Official responsible for the work of this Department I feel it my duty not only to myself but to the City to urge upon the Council the necessity

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of appointing a competent man to perform the duties of Assistant Building Inspector. When the estimates for the Current year were before the Finance Committee, a motion was made to strike out the salary attached to this position. I was asked for an opinion as to the advisability of this step and gave a verbal statement of the work done by him. The motion was defeated only one Alderman voting for it. Subsequently it was renewed in Council and passed.

In order that the members of the Council may have the information before them, I am summarizing roughly some of the work performed by the Assistant Building Inspector during the past year.

He also has the immediate supervision of the maintenance and upkeep of the City buildings controlled by this Department and is also frequently called upon by other Committees in connection with alterations, repairs, etc., of their property. It will be seen that there is ample work to keep one man busy.

The necessity for a properly organized building department need not be stressed, as it must be apparent. Proper inspection is a safe-guard to the individual owner and the public at large, both as regards safety and fire protection.

The result of allowing the good work that this Department is doing to lapse may result in an increase in insurance rates in addition to depriving the owners and the public of proper inspection of buildings under construction and repair, as without the services of an official in this position, it will be impossible to do the work as effectively as heretofore.
