### RE MONASTERY OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

Sir:-

The immediate point on which I am required to report is as to the construction to be placed on Sub-Section (3) of Section 336 of the City Charter taken along with Section (3) of Chapter 50 and Section 47 of Chapter 166, R.S.

Section 336 of the City Charter provides that in consideration of the grant of \$400.00 yearly, the Monastery of the Good Shepherd shall maintain allpersons committed to it for whose maintenance the City is responsible. Chapter 50 as amended by Chap. 30 of 1925, provides for the payment of \$150.00 to any reformatory institution recognized by the Governor in Council for each female person above the age of sixteen years, sentenced to confinement in it, by a judge or stipendiary Magistrate, such payment to be made by the Oity in which the persons sentenced have a settlement under the Poor Relief Act. Secti n 47 of Cap. 166 ( The Childrens! Protection Act ) provides for a similar payment in the case of boys and girls under the age of sixteen. Both of these enactments are sub-sequent to the City Charter which came into force in 1914, and must ther fore be considered as superseding its provisions, especially when it is evident that the Legislation had the provision of the Charter in mind and referred to it in Section 15 of Cap. 50 by providing that in no case should the contribution of the City of Halifax to the Salvation Army Rescue Home or the Good Shepherd Reformatory be less then \$400.00

I am, therefore, of opinion that the combined effect of these enactments is that the City shall in all cases pay to the institution in question \$400.00 yearly, and as much more as may be called for by the sub-sequent enactments referred to.

I am not oblivious of the fact that this interpretation may cause trouble when the estimates are being prepared and would respectfully suggest consideration before that time, and if need be a conference be had with representations of the reformatory institutions.

For your information I would advise you that I am making entries on the City's books writing off a defalcation of the Late Collector Theakston, amounting to \$10,901.00. This is one of the largest defalcations that has come to my notice, and for this reason I am calling same to your attention. This amount was received by the City in a number of cheques, received in 1913-1921 which were all paid into the City's bank account at the time, and presumably currency extracted in place thereof, and no credit given to N & M Smith in regard to same.

I enclose you herewith the evidence submitted by N & M. Smith which affords conclusive evidence that these are defalcations. I would further state that this conclusion is arrived at by the Collector's Department after days of careful investigation into past records in the endeavor to trace credits for these cheques, and will give you some idea of the time that it is necessary for the Collector's Staff to spend in adjusting these numerous defalcations.

#### RE: CLAIM OF SHERIFF HALL

Dear Sir:-

In the former opinion which I gave in the above, I gave it as my opinion that the point involved was whether or not the items of the Sheriff's account were "reasonable charges in preparing the lists" and suggested some grounds on which such reasonableness might be questioned. I have since given the matter careful study in the light of Mr.Lovett's communication, and can only say that my doubts are rather strengthened than removed.

The work of revising the lists is no part of the work of the Sheriff at all, but that of the The Sheriff only comes into the matter in Revisers. the avent of there being appeals as to individual names. By Section 30 of the Franchise Act he is required to sign the lists, even if no appeals have been asserted to him, and he is also by Section 31, required to compare and certify copies of the lists as prepared by the Municipal Clerk after the originals have been deposited with him by The reason or necessity for the Sheriff the Revisers. Acting in either of these respects is not readily apparent, nor does anything appear to me to justify the charge for "amalgamating the lists". There is no such expression in the Act, and if it only means "revision" then it is the duty of the reviser and not of the Sheriff.

After careful consideration I am still unable to see on what ground the chargefor printing, the lists can be said to be a "reasonable charge of the Sheriff in preparing the lists". The Sheriff is not

-226-

the custodian of the lists, and he is only entitled to receive a copy of them from the municipal clerk when he acts as returning Officer. He is bound ( Ohap. 4 Sec. 36 (c) to furnish each presiding Officer with a copy of the lists for the polling district for which such presiding Officer is appointed, but that would not necessarily involve a printed copy. Mr. Lovett has referred me to Section 133 of the Election Act which provides that "any person shall be entitled to receive a copy of the list of electors from the Sheriff, municipal Clerk or other person having the legal custody thereof- after the said list is completed, upon the payment to such legal custodian of the sum of Fifty cents per hundred names" I am unable on consideration, to see how this helps the claim very much for the reason that as I have pointed out the Sheriff is not the "legal custodian of the lists" Moreover, even if the Sheriff were called upon the furnish copies, he would not appear to be justified in going the heavy expense of printing, unless there was a reasonable prospect of so large a number being required as to make printing necessary. As at the rate of Fifty Cents per hundred names on a list of 22,214 names, the credit given of \$620.00 for lists sold would mean only about six copies, the necessity for printing is not very apparent.

For these reasons, I am still unable to see in what way the City can legally be called upon to pay this account.

### HIGHWAY TAX

Thanks very much for your favor of lOth inst., I carefully note what you say as to a claim which the City is making against the Government in respect to Betterment charges, and which claim, apparently, goes back for a number of years.

You will excuse me, I am sure, if I point out to you that the Highway Tax is an assessment levied under Chapter 75 R.S.N.S. 1923, and that this assessment cannot properly be co-ordinated with, or made dependent upon, the payment of outside claims by the City, whether these are disputed or otherwise. It is a specific Tax, levied upon specific authority, and therefore must be paid upon its own merits, solely. We cannot recognise that any extraneous matters have any bearing upon its payment. The Act already referred to lays down the whole law governing the assessment and payment of the Tax, and we have no authority to act otherwise than in accordance with the letter, spirit and intention of that Act. The full amount due as at this date, and which is now so long overdue, should therefore be paid without further delay: and I would be extremely obliged to you if you would kindly take the necessary steps to bring this about.

Incidentally, and in connection with the claims to which you refer, I understand that the Government has always taken the position that it is not liable. If the City considers that its claim is good, I am sure that if it was presented through the proper channel, supported by reference to the particular statutes uner which the claim is made , it would again be accorded a careful investigation. But, whatever its merits, it is far removed from other assessments due to the Government under independent Acts, and which must be honoured within their own compass.

I) beg to report on the attached petition for the extension of sewer and water on Highland Avenue, that at present these services extend to the south line of Rector Street on Agricola Street.

### RE TAX COLLECTIONS

I attach hereto my Monthly Statement of Tax Collections and outstandings as at 31st July last, and supplement same by the following additional information.

The collections on account of back years taxes during July, including those in respect of the year which ended 30th April last, amounted to \$ %51,668.18 as compared with \$49,887.08 for the month previous.

The following is a comparison of the collections on account of back years taxes this year with last year.

The collections on account of the taxes of the Current Civic Year during the month of July amounted to \$460,730.31.

The present indications are that the collections on account of the current years taxes are not so good as last year, a comparison, however, cannot be fairly made until the end of August.

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<u>Aug. 12th, 1926</u>

The total arrears of back years taxes at 31st July last will be seen to amount to \$1,902,715.56 of this amount \$1,401,454.43 represents arrears prior to 30th April, 1925 which you will remember were recently funded. I am glad to say that the Sinking Fund in respect of our recent Refunding Loan now amounts to \$60,000.00, which has already been invested in long term Securities to yield about 4.83 % per annum. We require a Sinking Fund of about \$486,000.00 by last July, 1931, to amortise the Refunding Loan of \$1,500,000.00 such Sinking Fund to be invested from that date to yield 4% per annum so that matters in this regard are at present progressing favourably.

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The question that calls for greatest concern is the fact of the large sum of \$501,261.13 still remaining outstanding for last year, which has been borrowed from the Bank. It must be borne in mind that whatever amount of same is not eventually collected, except for a small reserve, will have to be met by additional taxation at a later date. In this connection it will be seen that after the lapse of over a year since 30th April 1925, there still remains uncollected \$281,806.91 of the years taxes ending that date.

On the assumption of our experience of the last two years, unless general conditions change and there is a considerable improvement in tax collections, a year hence I estimate the City will owe its Bankers approximately the large sum of \$750,000.00 in respect of arrears of taxes for the two years 1925-1926 and 1926-1927 It must be remembered that the City cannot expect to again resort to a Refunding Loan to liquidate borrowings on account of tax arrears. This is a very serious outlook and one which should be dealt with now, before the lapse of time brings about such a situation, by using every possible means of augmenting collections.

late nurse at the City Home in reference to her dismissal:

Halifax, N.S. Aug. 12 1926

His Worship the Mayor, and City Council.

Gentlemen:-

I was employed as a nurse at the City Home from May 1925 to July 31st, 1926. I always thought

I was giving entire satisfaction to the Superintendent. I know the Matron was satisfied with my services as nurse and never had cause to complain of my work.

I did not know that there were any complaints against me until Mr. Buchanan requested me at 2.30'p.m. July 22nd, to be at the home at 4 p.m. as the Committee was meeting, and I may be required there. I may say that this was my day off. I returned to the City Home at 4 o'clock as requested and was waiting in my room to be called. I was not called before the Committee, but was informed by Mr. Buchanan, after the meeting, that the Committee's orders were for me to hand in my resignation. I asked Mr. Buchanan what I had done and the only answer was "that it was the orders of the Committee" I later found that the Superintendent had made charges against me in my absence and I was given no opportunity to hear them or defend myself. I was later requested by the Superintendent to hand in my keys as I was discharged.

I am appealing to you for fair play and justice, and request of you and hope that you will see that I have an opportunity to appear before your Committee and hear the charges made against me and given an opportunity to defend myself. I understand that my services were entirely satisfactory to the Matron and that she was greatly surprised when she found that I was dealt with in such a crael manner.

I am appealing to you to see that justice is done in my case.
