I reported to Council at its October meeting that I had recently had a meeting with the Housing Commission and was able to report certain progress. I also informed the Council that I expected to attend further meetings with the Housing Commission, with the end in view of working out some plan which would attempt to solve the situation arising out of the tax arrears due on a number of properties under the administration of the Commission.

It is true that I have met the Chairman of the Commission since I gave my verbal report, and we discussed the whole difficulty. At this conference I advanced certain views to which it would be necessary for the Housing Commission to agree if they were to adopt a sympathetic attitude to the peculiar position of the Corporation in its relationship with the Housing Commission. Unfortunately no other meetings of the Commission were arranged and of course the Chairman at the conference with me could not speak for the Commission as a whole. As a result I am unable to report any progress.

I realize the Housing Commission of the City of Halifax is an independant body and that its members have as their chief responsibility the administration of the properties which the Commission is financing, but I cannot dissociate from their duties the responsibility of supervising the tax situation on all Commission properties in arrears. It is difficult to conceive by what right some of these properties should claim the privilege of tax exemption; for the effect of exemption is obvious in some cases. The only function which the City assumed when the Housing Scheme was adopted was to guarantee repayment of the loan made by the Province which in turn had borrowed from the Federal Government for the purpose of Housing Relief.

The situation is somewhat as follows:

The Housing Commission administering certain properties owned by the Commission or being sold to purchasers under agreements of sale have permitted a large accumulation of tax arrears, certain water rates arrears, and betterment arrears, to develop. This condition is detrimental to the City's interests, especially from the standpoint of collecting its revenue. The City Collector if he should find occasion to sell a Commission property for taxes ,water rates, or betterment charges, or all of them , cannot sell for the debt of the purchaser to the Commission. It is true that if a sale takes place a surplus beyond the outstanding taxes may be secured, but experience proves thatany such surplus would be quite inadequate to meet the mortgage. Furthermore, if the City Collector sells a property for taxes, etc., the property then becomes city owned and it cannot be assessed for taxes; accordingly there is a loss of revenue. On the other hand , if the Housing Commission repossess a property for tax arrears etc., it is without funds to pay the tax arrears unless an initial payment sufficient to take care of the arrears is made bt the time. Another situation is this; in certain cases of repossession and resale under agreement of sale, the Commission has failed to pay the outstanding taxes., etc., to the City Collector and presumably has given the new purchaser the impression as to payment of all outstanding rates, taxes, etc., at the time of sale. It is well known to Council that it has had to appropriate large sums to enable the Hausing Commission to maintain its account with the Province of Nova Scotia on a current basis. These advances so far amount to \$27,000.00 and Council will in future be obliged to make provision for other advances all of which would indicate that the City is really the Banker of the Commission, and that the latter should cooperate to a full degree to protect the financial interests of the City.

All properties in arrears for taxes, water rates etc., may be divided in four groups:

- (a) Properties with arrears of taxes etc., with installments paid.
- (b) Properties with arrears of taxes, etc., with installments in arrears.
- (c) Properties with arrears of taxes etc., re-sold without arrangements of outstanding taxes etc.
- (d) Properties with arrears of taxes etc., Commission owned.

I am now suggesting certain regulations governing the Commission which of course, to become effective, will have to take the form of new legislation.

AS TO PROPERTIES IN GROUPS "A" AND "B"

(1)

(1) The Secretary of the Housing Commission of the City of Halifax shall from any monies received from a purchaser in any case where water rates, taxes and (or) betterment charges are owing to the Cityof Halifax or insurance premiums and other expenses owing to the Housing Commission shall appropriate from such monies, as and when received, to pay the City Collector such water rates, taxes and (or) betterment charges and reimburse itself for said insurance premiums and other expenses and the purchaser shall have no right to appropriate his payments. The Secretary of the Housing Commission of the City of Halifax shall make such appropriation whether the monthly installments payable under the agreement of sale are in arrears or not.

AS TO PROPERTIES IN GROUP "C"

(2) The Housing Commission of the City of Halifax shall in case of a property repossessed and subsequently re-sold under a new agreement of sale shall at the time of said sale arrange with the purchaser to pay a sum sufficient to pay all water rates, taxes and (or) betterment charges due the City of Halifax, and all insurance premiums and other expenses due the Housing Commission.

If the purchaseris financially unable to make such payment as aforesaid he may arrange to make such payment within one year under such terms and with such guarantees acceptable to the City Collector:

In cases where properties have been repossessed and subsequently resold up to the present time, without arrangement of tax arrears etc., the Collector of the City of Halifax be authorized to write off as uncollectible all water rates, taxes and (or) betterment charges, which were due and payable on the day of said sale, and which were not arranged by the Housing Commission.

AS TO PROPERTIES IN GROUP "D"

(3)

The Secretary of the Housing Commission of the City of Halifax shall in respect to properties owned by the Commission or the properties repossessed by the Commission during such time as they continue to be owned or repossessed pay by installments to the Collector of the City of Halifax, from any monies received as rentals all taxes levied since and in-cluding the civic year 1925-26, and all water rates and (or) betterment charges now outstanding, With respect to real estate taxes unpaid on said properties prior to and including the Civic Year 1924-25 the Collector of the City of Halifax be authorized to write the said Real Estate taxes off as uncollectible.

In all the above cases of course where interest is now ordinarily payable by any other taxpayer, it should be payable under these paragraphs.

I am bringing this matter before Council to acquaint members of the general situation. The present, I feel, is the time to deal with it, and while it may be true the Housing Commission will have to accept losses here and there, it will be recognized that the present Commission is in no way responsible for the loss in the case of a single property or for the final loss resulting from the Housing scheme. The main point is that the Collector must collect taxes on every property in the City except those exempt by law and Housing Commission properties are not so exempt.
