Gentlemen:-

I am informed that the Town of Dartmouth has made application to the Charities Committee acting for the City to house some twenty inmates in the City Home. These inmates for several years were maintained in the County Home at a rate of 24,50 a week. I also understand that the Charities Committee is recommending that the Council approve charging the Town of Dartmouth at the rate of \$4.00 a week for each inmate.

If Cooncil decides that as a matter of finance it will reduce its rate and thus alter its policy it might first consider the eff ect on certain taxpayers who meet the maintenance costs for private cases. It would be unfair I submit to charge the local taxpayer \$4.50 for the same services that a Bartmouth ratepayer would pay \$4.00 for.

I am also drawing to the attention of Council the fact that the City is the party to designate the rate, and if the rate so designated by the City is not acceptable, then it. can be rejected.

The Town of Dartmouth has been for years maintaining their cases at an outside institution presumably because it was cheaper for the Town to deal with the matter in this manner. It could be suggested that as a result of the unfortunate circumstance which brings about this application that these additional cases now in the City Home will enjoy an improved living standard under better conditions. It is hardly fair to the City of Halifax that as the result of offering this service, it should do so at a cheaper rate , a rate which means a visible loss of \$500.00 in revenue annually. In addition it will also entail a further loss of revenue because in fairness to the local taxpayer the rate for private cases will probably be reduced to a \$4.00 weekly basis.

The matter of charging the County \$3.50 for their patients should not be associated with this case, as it is obviously a lot cheaper for the City to deal with a number of patients than with a comparative few.

Dear Sir:-

I am to advise you that at a meeting of the Dartmouth Town Council held on April 2nd, the following report was adopted:

> "Your Special Committee to whom was referred the matter of Mr. E.J.Butcher's protest against the poor being removed from the Home at Cole Harbor, beg to report that as a result of meetings held with the Warden of Halifax County, the City Charities Committee, and the Superintendent of the City Home, we have ascertained that in the event of the County Home at Cole Harbor being rented or leased to any individual, it will only be as a farm and not as an institution, and that the boarding of any poor there would not be sanctioned by the Inspector of Humane Institutions, also that Municipalities have no authority to board their poor privately.

The Town is now paying \$4.50 per week per patient to the County for its poor who are at the City Home and in view of the above, we would recommend that the Town enter into a Ten Year agreement with the City of Halifax similar to the agreement between the City and County, for the Board of our poor at \$4.00 per week, which is \$.59 less than what we were paying the County

The agreement may be cancelled by wither the City or Town upon two years notice being given. This, of course, is subject to final ratification by the City Council"
