AVON RIVER POWER COMPANY CONTRACT

Read report of the City

Engineer addressed to His Worship the Mayor on the application for approval of a contract between the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company, Limited and the Avon River Power Company:

His Worship the Mayor.

Sir:-

In accordance with your request, I beg to submit the following brief summary in connection with the hearing before the Public Utility Commission, on the application for approval of a contract between the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company, Limited and the Avon River Power Company.

From the evidence submitted to the Board, it is apparent that in a very short time additional power and energy will be required for use in the City of Halifax and Dartmouth, and it would appear that for the moment there are three available sources, namely, from the new development of the Avon River Power Company; an addition to the capacity of the Margaret Bay Plant from the introduction of the Ingram River into it -311and generating by steam,

The Tramway Company claim for various measons, including economy, that the proposed contract would be the best solution, and that the contract submitted is in its interest and consequently in the interest of the citizens. The evidence of the Chief Engineer of the Nova Scotia Power Commission would seem to show that the cheapest source would be the further increase in the Margaret Bay system by developing Ingram River. During the course of the proceedings, it was brought out that agreements had been entered into between the Government of the Province and the Mersey Pulp and Paper Company, which may have the effect of increasing the cost of the development of the Ingram River.

The development of the water powers on St.Margaret Bay was undertaken primarily to furnish electric energy at low cost to the City of Halifax, and the City Council should make a strong protest against rights being given to other companies which will interfere with a supply of energy to the citizens at such low cost. In connection with this matter it is suggested that the attached resolution be passed and the Council go on record as formally objecting to and protesting against any agreement which may prevent or hamper the full development of the St.Margaret Bay water powers for the benefit of the people.

Generating by steam will probably be the most expensive method of the three. However the matter is still before the Utility Board and will be argued at the hearing set down for next week.

Regarding the proposed contract, your representatives objected to some of its clauses in their original form, especially 3,4 and 14. Clause 3 appeared to provide that the Nova Scotia Company should if necessary to carry out the demands of the Avon River Company, operate a steam plant at full capacity and make available all its surplus power and resources. The Solicitor of the Company has agreed to amend this clause to the satisfaction of the City. Your representatives are pressing for an amendment to Clause 4, which would give the Commissioners of Public Utilities power to vary from time to time rates which may be Clause 14 provided the agreement decided upon. should be for at least twenty years. This is being objected to as being too long a period.

It is proposed to urge upon the Commissioners that no approval should be given to any contract which will make the rates for energy higher than they would be if said energy was obtained from some other than the proposed source, whichever it might be. In other words, that the Company should obtain the a**td**itional power required at the cheapest possible rate so that the citizens would reap the benefit.

AND WHEREAS the partial development of those powers has been of benefit to this City, but the development so far made is inadequate to supply the requirements of the City which requirements are rapidly increasing.

AND WHEREAS this Council has learned with alarm from the evidence given in an enquiry now being held by the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities on an application by the N.S.Light and Power Company for leave to purchase additional power from the Avon River Power Company, that agreements have been entered into between the Government of the Province and the Mersey River Pulp and Paper Company which may have the effect of seriously increasing the cost of the further development of the said powers on the Ingram River, in possibly preventing that river from being used for such development.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Council desires to go on record as objecting to any contract or agreement so entered into which may have the effect of preventing, or hampering the full development of the said water powers for the benefit of the people of this City.

HALIFAX AIRPORT

Pursuant to a resolution of the Committee on Works the accompanying plan No. 6264 dated 22nd of October 1929, and description of the lands and interests therein required for the purposes of an Airport at the Blue Hill Farm site, so called, have been prepared as required by Sec. 681 of the City Charter as amended by Chapter 66 of the Acts of 1929. Negotiations have been entered into with the owners of the properties, and the names of the said owners are set out in the accompanying schedule, Marked "A". The prices asked for the properties by the said owners are also set forth in the schedule.

It will be seen that in nearly all cases the lowest price which the owners are prepared to accept is greatly in excess of the assessment and appear to be excessive. In view of this it will be advisable to expropriate the lands and rights required.

A reference to the plan willshew that while all that portion of the St.Patrick's Home property enclosed within the lines shaded green should, and probably in the near future will be acquired, yet for present purposes and in order to cut down the initial expense it will be sufficient to take only that portion lying to the eastward of the dotted line, provided an agreement can be entered into with the owner that no building will be erected on the remainder of the lot.

Under the provisions of the Charter, it will be necessary for the Committee to recommend to the City Council that the properties be expropriated and also the amount of compensation to be paid for the lands and interests taken. The Council may adopt such recommendation or may send it back to the Committee for further consideration, together with such recommendation as it sees fit to make, or may resolve not to make such expropriation.

In view of the great discrepancy between the prices asked and the values fixed by the City Assessor, it is difficult to decide on the amount of compan'sation to be offered to the various owners. It is thought that the amounts set out in the last column of the schedule are reasonable and are recommended.

The total assessed value of the property proposed to be taken is \$39,600.00, and the amount asked by the owners is \$94,328.67 excluding the St.Patrick's Home property, from the owners of which no reply has yet been received.

5 Referring to the report on the expropriation of properties for the Halifax Airport submitted to the Committee on Works at yesterdays meeting, I have -314just received a reply from the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation, the owner of the St. Patrick's Home property in which it is stated that, without prejudice, the Corporation would accept the sum of \$17,600, for the value of the land 7.6 acres, and injurious effection of the remaining property of the Corporation. It is impossible to foretell what damages may be awarded for this latter cause. No price is given for the smaller quantity of land.29 acres which is included in the description of land to be expropriated. The City Solicitor advises that if any portion of the property at all is taken, there is the chance that damages may be awarded for this injurious effection of the remaining property. This will alter the schedule submitted as follows: Acres 84.34; Assessed valuation \$40,900. Prices asked by owners, approximately \$112,000. Compansation recommended \$62,819.67.

On January 1st 1930 a 6% debenture issue amounting to \$501,000,00 will mature. This was reborrowed in 1920 under authority of Chapter 51 of the Acts 1905 for a ten year period.

There is no special sinking fund available to retire this issue in full. There is, however, an amount available in the General Sinking Fund to make a substantial payment thereon.

ATthe end of the last civic year the amount in the General Sinking Fund which is ear-marked for the purpose of retiring the City's refunding loans, all of which amount to \$1,385,835.85 was \$378,789.28.

I would suggest that \$301,000.00 be withdrawn from the General Sinking Fund and paid on account of this maturing loan, and the balance be renewed on a long term basis, that is to say for whatever term is recommended for the issuance of our long term loan to include our school and other borrowings.

As we will not have sufficient funds on January first to meet this loan in full we should by formal resolution arrange withour bankers for a temporary loan for \$200,000.00-

It will also be necessary to notify the Trustees of the Sinking Funds to have \$301,000,00 available in cash on Januaryl, 1930.

I am attaching hereto a statement of Taxes outstanding against Messrs.Sullivan and O'Connell for the years 1922, 1923, 1924 and The Majestic Theatre for the years 1925, 1926, 1927, 1928 and 1929.

The Academy of Music was originally

incorporated by Act of Parliament, and was given exemption from taxation of any kind, unless profits were made. This condition has never existed, therefore it has been non-taxable ever since the incorporation.

Messrs.Sullivan and O'Connell operated the Theatre for the Academy of Music from the year 1922 to 1925, inclusive, but were not lessees, therefore, they were not personally liable for taxation. The same circumstances apply to the Majestic Theatre Company, who only operated the Company on behalf of the Academy of Music, and were not lessees.

I have taken this matter up with Mr. Bell, City Solicitor, who advises me that these taxes are uncollectible and should, therefore, be written off our books.
