AIRPORT

Read report of the Committee on Works and City Engineer re Airport recommending that legislation be obtained to borrow a further sum of \$50,000 for the construction of an Airport:

Sir:

AIRPORT

At the December meeting of the City Council the City Engineer was instructed to make a further examination of the Highland Park Site, for an airfield. Before discussing this it is thought advisable in view of the conflicting statements being made in connection with the Airport situation to give a very brief summary of what has been done in the matter up to the present time.

When the proposal was first mooted ... no one connected with the City had a practical knowledge of the requirements of an Airfield and dependence had to be placed on a study of available literature and the advice of others with some experience. Such advice was sought from the officials of the Aviation branch of the Department of National Defence and was freely given.

Owing to the physical characteristics of the ground within the City limits it was difficult to findanatural site which could be developed at a reasonable price.

Preliminary surveys of various suggested sites were undertaken and reports on them were made at various times by three different members of the staff of the Department.

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The Blue Hill farm site was selected as being the best available and this selection was endorsed by the Department and by an engineer engaged by the Board of Trade to study the question.

Estimates were made of the cost of acquiring and developing this site to provide two runways, each one hundred and fifty feet wide, which it was understood would be satisfactory to the Department. The cost was estimated at \$150,000.00

Legislation was obtained authorizing the holding of a plebiscite and the borrowing of this amount if the decision of the ratepayers was in favour of carrying out the work. The plebiscite was held and resulted in an affirmative vote.

The City Council at its May meeting instructed the City Engineer to make detailed surveys

AND Plans and submit them to the Department of National Defence for approval. These were completed and sent to Ottawa early in June, On June 25th Major Tudhope on behalf of the Department made a thorough examination of the site. Before an answer was received from Ottawa, the City Engineer visited several Airports in the United States and Canada, including some in operation and others under construction, and obtained first hand information as to the practical design and construction of such ports! On his return a reply from the Department was received, which stated, among other things, that the plans as submitted were satisfactory provided that landing strips were levelled to a width of five hundred feet, (The letter is published in full, in the report of August 8th)

This was the first intimation given that the original scheme of having two runways each one hundred and fifty feet wide would not be approved. There is no question however of the recommendation being a proper and necessary one.

Specifications and plans were prepared embodying these requirements, and tenders were asked for four different schemes. The lowest bid submitted for the necessary drainage and grading work to provide two landing strips, each five hundred feet wide and two thousand feet long with runways one hundred and fifty feet wide through their centres was \$122,500.00

Alternative tenders were received for the work required for two runways one hundred and fifty feet wide and two thousand feet long and the lowest was \$48,447.40 which was subsequently withdrawn and the next lowest was \$75,000.00

There were some items such as, placing transmission line and other wires underground, concrete sewer pipe, fencing and others not included in the specification which were estimated to cost not over \$15,000.00

Omitting the purchase price of the site, the cost of the scheme with the landing strips

would approximate \$137,000 and the cost with the runways only \$90,000.

The owners of the properties required ask in the aggregate approximately \$112,000. for premises assessed for \$44,000. the amount that will have to be paid can only be in the nature of a guess, but is estimated at from \$60,000 to \$70,000

The specifications did not provide

for any so called permanent surfacing of the runways, only that they should be graded, raked and planted with grass seed.

As the cost ascertained through the

tenders was more than the amount authorized to be borrowed, the Committee on Works recommend that authority be sought from the Legislature to borrow an additional amount not to exceed \$75,000 to establish the Aidport. A resolution based on this recommendation endorsed by ten members of the Council but it was defeated through not receiving the two-thirds vote required under the Charter.

A resolution was passed at thissame meeting in December that the Engineer make a further examination of the Highland Park or other sites. contoured plan of this site is herewith submitted and an inspection of it will shew that there is a fairly level area near the centre of the property with the ground sloping away with grades varying from 5 to 7 per-cent. Rock outcrops in several places and is close to the surface throughout the rest of the site. The surroundings on three sides form a dangerous hazard in the event of a plane having difficulty in taking off. The site has been unfavourable commented on by the officials of the Aviation Branch and their criticisms are thought to be justified.

The City Dumphas been suggested as a possible site. Here a runway of sufficient length could only be obtained in one direction, besides it is situated in the hollow of a valley and would be subject to baffling air currents which would render it dangerous for landing purposes.

Another suggested site is the Round House property on Kempt Road. Again there is only room for one runway running north and south and in addition, it is felt that this property could be used to better advantage for manufacturing sites, for which it is very suitable.

It seems to be the unanimous opinion of all those who have investigated the matter, that the Blue Hill farm site is the best available and any further discussion of alternative sites only tends to becloud the issue and postpone action in providing an Airfield within the City limits.

In December further studies were made with a view to reducing the cost of constructing the Airfield at the Blue Hill farm site. It now appears from a communication received from Mr. Wilson, the Controller of Civil Aviation that in order to obtain a license from the Department the minimum basic requirements of the field are:

"(1) FIELD- A firm level field with suitable approaches, well drain ed, free of obstructions or depressions presenting hazards in taking off or landing, the minimum dimensions of such field to be 1800 in all directions, or, as an alternative, a field providing two landing strips 500' wide, crossing or converging at an angle of not less than 45 deg. These landing strips must provide safe landings under normal weather conditions and if the sod is not sufficiently tough, runways 100' wide by 1800' long should be constructed in the centre of each landing strip, making use of cinders, slag, gravel asphalt, or some other suitable material for this purpose"

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A revised plan has been made providing for runways 1800 feet long instead of 2000 feet, with the landing strips graded to a maximum lateral grade of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per-cent where the contour of the ground requires it instead of level as shown on the plans on which tenders were taken. The drains are also changed from metal perforated to crcrock pipes. The former were specified owing to the experience in two cities where the crock pipes had to be replaced due to breakage from the inpact of planes landing. However, the crock pipes are used in a large number of fields with good results and in order to cheapen the cost it is proposed to use them in the revised plans. This plan was submitted to the Department and a reply was received last month that it was entirely satisfactory.

The effect of these changes will be to reduce the cost considerably, although to what extent can only be estimated until tenders are taken The estimated saving will be in the vicinity of 20,000 which would reduce the lowest tender to 103,000 adding the 15,000 before referred to would make a total of wills,000 as the cost exclusive of the land. It must be remembered, however, that the next lowest tender was 7,000 higher than the one under discussion, which might increase the cost if the lowest tenderer did not tender again at the same rate.

Owing to the reduced length of the runways, it will not be absolutely necessary at present to take all the land that will be eventually required, and a saving of perhaps \$7,000 or more may be made in this respect. Taking all these various factors into account it would appear that an airport complying with the minimum requirements cannot be built for less than \$175,000. although as stated before the cost of the land is problematical.

In spending this amount of money, it must be pointed out and clearly understood, that a field will be had which will only obtain a license under the minimum requirements, and it must be anticipated that in the future further sums will have to be spent on grading. The acquisition of more land, lighting, office building hangars and improving the surfacing of the runways.

It is recommended that the Council be asked to borrow a further sum not to exceed 50,000., for the purpose of establishing the airport, which would allow some leeway in case the price of land or new tenders should be higher than anticipated.

Sir:

I beg to report on the application of the Imperial Oil Limited, a copy of which is attached for permission to erect a Filling Station on the property at the southwest corner of Robie Street and Quinpool Road, that the plans submitted show the proposed development.

T his location is within the boundaries of the residential district as fixed by the Acts of 1915. I have an objection from Mrs. Florence M! Theakston, the owner of the adjoining property on Robie Street, to the permit being granted.

The residential character of this immediate locality was, to a large extent, destroyed when the Council granted permission for the erection and use of shops at the northwest corner of the intersection. One of these now is used for a Filling S tation, at which cars have to park on the street to obtain gasolene and other services interfering with traffic at this point. It may also be pointed out that t house owned by the objector was built before the district vas made residential.

In view of the surrounding circumstances the main objection that could be urged against the granting of a permit would be the interference with the large volumne of traffic at this corner. A reference to the plan will show that the proposed western driveway is at the narrowest part of the street between the car tracks and curb, and the central drive is situated so far south that outgoing traffic from the S tation going north or east would cross the south bound traffic at the one-way western roadway of the Robie Street boulevarde. These objections would be met, to a certain extent, if the proposal as submitted was altered to include the property. No. 4. Quinpool Road, in which case the two driveways could be moved further west to the location shown in red on the plan. I have discussed this matter with the Company and I understand that they will agree to do this, if the Committee will not recommend the original scheme. -448-

The plans show a modern, up-to-date Station. If the Council decides to grant the permit it should, among other provisions, contain the following:-

T he Company should undertake to provide and maintain lavatory accommodation free to the public in such Station for both sexes; that the Station shall be used only for the original purpose of a Filling Station, and not a garage; and that the plans and specification of the building be approved by the Engineer, together with such other conditions as the Engineer may think necessary to safeguard the interests of the public:

We submit herewith four your perusal, in connection with our application for a building permit, a tentative layout plan of a service station we propose erecting at the corner of Quinpool Road and Robie Street, with your approval.

Up to date service stations are not only important assets but are very necessary in any community and particularly a city of this size. In the Province of Quebec and Ontario, up to date and attractive stations are encouraged and they occupy the most important and prominent corners.

A proper drive in service stations at this particular location would relieve congestion that exists there, if any, at the present time. Auto traffic is bound to increase in the future and the opening of this corner would help traffic matters considerably.

At the present time, cars are serviced at this corner from curb pumps. Cars are obliged to pull up at the curb for not only gasoline and oil service, but also tire, battery and other services pertaining to the automobile, all of which creates congestion and would eventually be eliminated by the establishing at this corner of a proper service station, which would take cars away from the curb for such services.

The type of service station that will be designed for this corner will be similar in appearance to the attached photo. This, you will note shows a bay on both sides of the office. We would probably design a double front building, facing both Robie St., and Quinpool Road, with double bays running to the rear of the property. This station will be modern and up to date in every respect.

A proper service station of this kind is necessary at this corner in order to properly service the surrounding community. It will be well lighted and prove a decided advantage to the City and motoring public.
