I find it will be necessary in order to expedite the collection of poll tax arrears, to request the appointment of two temporary street collectors on a commission basis of 15%.

As you will note from my quarterly report ending April 30th last, poll tax collections increased 63% over the corresponding quarter of the previous year, and you will also note that 66% of all collections were brought in by the street collectors,

The present staff of two street collectors, one on salary and one on commission, is inadequate to deal with the arrears of poll taxes. There is a substantial sum still outstanding which I should estimate to be well in excess of \$50,000.00, and it is desirable to begin work on these arrears at once. This can be done by the employment of temporary men, as it is out of the question for the present collectors to take on any more duties.

I would recommend therefore, that permission be granted to me to employ two temporary street collectors on a 15% commission basis for a

period not exceeding the present civic year. If it is necessary to ask for an extension of time this can be done before April 30th, 1933, but if the work of collecting the arrears is brought well in hand before that time, I should like to be in a position to release this temporary staff without further reference to the committee.

MEMBERS PRESENT - The Chairman, Aldermen Probert, O'Malley, Shields, Miller and Logan, SUPT'S REPORT CITY HOME MAY 1932, NUMBER OF INMATES 424.

The Superintendent's report shows that during the month of May 1932 there were 16 persons admitted into the City Home, 19 were discharged and 5 died. Of the number admitted 14 were chargeable to the City, 1 to the County of Halifax and 1 to the Province of Nova Scotia.

The classification of the inmates May 31st, 1932 was as follows.
