At the beginning of the civic year there were 113 prisoners in custody made up of 106 men and 7 women. During the succeeding twelve months there were admitted 683 men and 65 women, a total of 784 prisoners. There were discharged, 700 men and 65 women, a total of 765 prisoners. The number of prisoners in custody April 30th,1938, 89 men and 7 women, a total of 96 prisoners.

Dr. W. Bruce Almon, former City Medical Officer, assisted by Dr. W. D. Forrest, examined and treated 173 men and 6 women during the year, some of the cases being removed to hospital as follows:-

Provincial Legislature an amendment was made to the Municipal Affairs (Supervision) Act, providing for the approval of Ordinances passed by any municipality to be made by the Minister of Municipal Affairs, instead of the Governor-in-Council. At the time it was thought that this amendment was wide enough to include the City of Halifax, although the City does not come within the provisions of the Municipal Affairs (Supervision) This view was expressed by the authorities of Act. the Provincial Government, but since that time they have reconsidered the matter and are now of the opinion that the old order prevails, and that the City of Halifax should continue to send its Ordinances to the Governor-in-Council for approval and not to the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

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At the last meeting of the City Council I note that the amendments to Ordinance No. 17, respecting Junk Dealers, and the so-called Curfew Ordinance, were ordered referred to the Attorney General for approval. I would, therefore, suggest that at the next meeting of the Council the Minutes be corrected to read in the place of "Attorney General" the words "Governor-in-Council",

Every owner of a motor-drawn hack or vehicle used in the City of Halifax for transporting passengers for hire shall provide the said hack or vehicle with a taximeter of a model approved by the Committee on Cabs, and such taximeter shall be installed in a manner and location approved by the Committee or its inspector and shall be at all times in full view of the passengers, and shall be in such a condition as to show a maximum of not more than five percent (5%) in departure from correctness to the prejudice of any passenger. The cover and gear of such taximeter shall be kept sealed and intact. The taximeter shall be operated from one of the , front wheels of the hack or vehicle or from the transmission and shall be illuminated by a suitable light while in operation after sundown.

2. The Committee_or any person appointed by the Committee for that purpose may at any time inspect any taximeter which is installed in a hack or gehicle or is proposed to be installed and may apply such tests as may be necessary to ascertain the accuracy of such taximeter.

3. The owner of any motor-drawn hack of vehicle used for transporting passengers for hire who operates or permits the same to be operated for transporting passengers for hire, and which is not provided with an approved taximeter or in which a meter is installed which shows a variation in the correctness thereof of more than five percent (5%), shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and in default of payment of such penalty to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months.

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4. Any person who has used a motor-drawn hack or vehicle and who refused or fails to pay the tariff rates as shown on the taximeter shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) and not more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00), and in default of such penalty to imprisorment for not less than seven days or not more than twenty days.

5. Every owner or driver of a motordrawn vehicle who transports any passenger for hire without causing the taximeter in such vehicle to operate during the entire period of such transportation shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance; provided however, that nothing in this sub-section contained shall be deemed to require a taximeter to be operated while the motor-drawn vehicle is engaged on an hourly basis as provided in the Second Schedule.

6. Every person who contravenes or fails to comply with any provision of this Ordinance in respect of which no other penalty is provided shall for each such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) and in default of payment thereof to Imprisonment for a period not exceeding twenty days.

"20. These Regulations shall be known as Ordinance No. 14".

Read draft Ordinance respecting

transient traders.

1. Every transient trader, trader of goods, and other person who proposes to carry on business in the City of Halifax, and to occupy real property in the City for a temporary period for the purpose of gain, and who has not been assessed for business tax by the City at the time of the last assessment in respect of the occupancy of such real property, shall before commencing to carry on such business obtain a kicense therefor.

2. Every transient trader, trader of goods or other person who carries on business in the City and who occupies real property in the City for a temporary period and who has not been assessed

for business tax by the City at the time of the last assessment in respect of the occupancy of such real property shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

3. The fee for such license shall be One Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$150.00).

4. Such license shall be granted by the Mayor and signed by the Mayor and Clerk and issued by the Clerk, and shall be in force until the 30th day of April next succeeding the day on which it was issued and no longer, and no license shall be granted for any shorter period.

5. Any person who contraveness or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall for each offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment for a period not exceeding twenty days.

Read draft ordinance re pawn brokers.

1. (1) No person shall in the City of Halifax do business as a pawn broker, as hereinafter defined, without having first taken out a license therefor.

(2) In this Ordinance "pawn broker" means any person who exercises the trade of receiving or taking by way of pawn, pledge or exchange any goods for the repayment of money lent thereon.

(3) The Mayor and Clerk may without any resolution of the Council, issue a renewal of a license to any pawn broker to whom a license has been issued, unless the Council otherwise directs.

2. The fee for every such license so issued or renewed shall be One Hundred Dollars (\$100,00)

3. No pawn broker shall do business as a junk dealer without having taken out a separate license therefor.

4. Every pawn broker shall do business at some place within the City, and the place at which he proposes to do business shall be specified in the license.

5. A separate license shall be required for every place at which any person proposes to do husiness as a pawn broker,

6. No person licensed to do business as a pawn broker shall remove his place of business from the place designated in his license without having first obtained permission from Council, and such change shall be endorsed upon his license by the Clerk.

7. The name of such licensed pawn broker shall be painted in legible characters over the door of every place in which such person does business as a pawn broker, and upon both sides of every vessel, boat or vehicle used in connection with his business, with the words "Licensed Pawn Broker" added thereto. -224-

8. No pawn broker shall accept any goods in the way of his business at any place other than the place designated in his license.

9. No pawn broker shall accept in the way of his business any goods whatever from any person under the age of twenty-one years, whether such person be the agent of an adult person or not.

10. No pawn broker shall accept in the way of his business any goods whatever from any person whomsoever, between the hours of 5 o'clock in the afternoon and 8 o'clock in the forenoon, nor a any time on Sunday or on any statutory holiday.

11. Every pawn broker shall on demand by the Chief of Police or any Police Officer exhibit to him any article on his premises.

12. Every pawn broker shall keep at each place in which he does business a book in the form following, that is to say:

Date of Loan

Time goods received

No. of Transaction

Amount_advanced

Full description of goods pledged, and any identifying marks on Serial Numbers thereon

Name and address of person pledging goods

Description of Person Pledging

Age

Height Ft. In.

Complexion

Color of Beard or Other Identifying Characteristics

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If goods sold, to whom

Date of sale ,

in which shall be fairly written in the English language at the time of the acceptance of any goods in the way of business a description as near as may be of such goods, including any distinctive mark thereon, the amount lent upon the security thereof, the precise time of the acceptance of such goods, the name, residence and description of the person pledging the same, and of the disposition of such goods; and such book or books shall at all times be open to the inspection of any person wishing to inspect the same.

13. Immediately after the sale of any goods by any pawn broker, he shall make an entry in the book mentioned in the next proceeding paragraph opposite the entry therein of the pledge of such goods, showing the name, residence and description of the person to whom the same was sold and the price and date of sale.

14. Every pawn broker shall make out and deliver to the Chief of Police every day before the hour of 12 o'clock noon a legible and correct copy of the entries in the book hereinbefore mentioned, showing the entries therein of all goods pledged or sold during the twenty-four hours immediately preceding 16 o'clock in the forenoon of that day. If the report is made on the day following a holiday it shall cover the whole period subsequent to 10 o'clock in the forenoon of the day on which the last report was made.

15. Every person who wilfully makes any false entry in the book so required to be kept or any statement so furnished to the Chief of Police shall be guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

16. Every person licensed to do business as a pawn broker shall at the time of receiving his license enter into a bond to the City with two sufficient sureties in the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) conditioned upon the faithful observance by the licensee of the provisions of the City Charter in respect of pawn brokers, of this ordinance and of the Pawn Brokers Act of Canada.

17. Every person who contravenes or fails to comply with any provision of this ordinance shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and in default of payment to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month.
