### A TERNOON SESSION SPECIAL MEETING

Council Chamber, City Hall, Halifax, N. S., September 10/1945, 4.35 P. M.

A meeting of the City Council was held on the above date.

After the meeting was called to order by the Chairman and before considering the regular order of business, the members of Council attending, led by the City Clerk, joined. in repeating the Lord's Prayer.

There were present His Worship the Mayor, Cheirman; Aldermen Batson. Moriarty, Breen, Hosterman, Coffin, Adams, DeWolf, Doyle, Welker, Burgess and Ahern. Also Mr. Gray of Wartime Housing Ltd.

The meeting was called specially to consider the Housing Situation.

### HOUSING

His Worship the Mayor stated that the City Solicitor had gone into this matter and there were certain suggestions that he would suggest to Council for its guidance.

The Solicitor then remarked as follows: "There are. three ways that the City might acquire the sites, viz., (1) Lend bought in at a tax sale (2) Acquisition of land requiring legislation and (3) Land which might be acquired by the City from private owners. The solution seems to be with the Wartime Housing Limited, Provincial Government and the City of Halifax. Wartime Housing are prepared to assist us by acquiring the sites. I believe that we need

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have no fear that the Premier will co-operate with us and they will not stand in the way of us securing legislation in this respect. <sup>T</sup>he Halifax Relief Commission could turn over certain land to the Crown on our account. We are in a position to carry this through provided the lands are selected by the Council. The agreement could be entered into subject to terms satisfactory to someone designated by you."

His Worship the Mayor stated that we have three categories to choose from, viz., (1) City owned Land (2) Halifax Relief Commission Property and (3) Privately owned Property.

He then informed the Council that the following lands were available, ~

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### SECTION "C"

City of Halifax, Bayers Road - 40 lots.

Mr. Bates stated that Wartime Housing Limited require four things from the City. (1) Land (2) Serviced by sewer and water (3) Rough grading of streets, and (4) Sewer and Water laterals be laid. These to be done at the expense of the City.

His Worship the Mayor stated that in Section "A" the total lots are 75.

Moved by Alderman Ahern, seconded by Alderman Batson that an agreement be entered into with Wartime Housing Ltd. to build on the lots as specified in Section "A" and also to make an agreement with the Halifax Relief Commission to build on their lots.

The motion was put and passed unanimously, the following Aldermen being present and voting therefor:

Alderman Batson Moriarty Breen Hosterman Coffin Adams DeWolf Doyle Walker Burgess Ahern

The City Solicitor stated that Mr. Gray's Company have

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said that where necessary they will acquire the land on our account by exporpriation.

Alderman Burgess again asked about the Walker Property

on Bayers Road, and stated that there are 100 lots there that might be used.

Alderman Walker, speaking through His Worship the Mayor asked Mr. Gray if he thought the rentals were too high to which Mr. Gray replied that he didn't think so and advised Alderman Walker what the rentals were.

Mr. Gray stated that if the houses were not needed here they would be given to some other City.

There was considerable discussion whether the lands should be expropriated as submitted, or that other lands be considered.

Moved by Alderman DeWolf, seconded by Alderman Adams that 169 lots limited to 180 would be selected by City Council on Thursday, September 13, 1945, and acquired either by purchase or expropriation proceedings by Wartime Housing Limited acting for the City.

The motion was then put and passed unanimously.

# AGREEMENT WARTIME HOUSING LTD.

The City Solicitor stated that the legal disabilities which were contained in the Agreement between Wartime Housing Limited and the City were remedied and suggested that no sales be made without giving the City the first chance. "I would suggest that a letter be written to Wartime Housing Limited to get an undertaking from them giving the City the first chance to purchase."

The Solicitor stated that the agreement as submitted subject to these changes could be approved by the Council. He then submitted and read the following resolution:

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BE IT RESOLVED that the City request Wartime Housing Limited to erect in the City 255 houses to provide homes for War Veterans, and that the City enter into an agreement with His Majesty the King in the right of the Dominion of Canada and Wartime Housing Limited for the purpose of implementing this request.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that the City submit to the next session of the Legislature of Nova Scotia legislation to enable it to sell and to acquire and sell to His Majesty aforesaid such land for the purpose of providing sites for such homes as may be selected by the Council and approved by Wartime Housing Limited.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that the City request Wartime Housing Limited and/or His Majesty as aforesaid to acquire on the City's account for the aforesaid purposes by expropriation such land as the City Council may from time to time designate.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that the agreement to be entered into between the City, Wartime Housing Limited and His Majesty as aforesaid for the above mentioned purposes follow generally the terms of the contract now before Council submitted by Wartime Housing Limited with such changes, alterations or variations therein as the City Solicitor may require and approve.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that the Meyor and City Clerk be authorized to execute the said agreement when the same has been approved by the City Solicitor.

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September 10-1945.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that the Government of the Province of Nova Scotia be requested to give an assurance that it will not oppose any legislation submitted by the <sup>C</sup>ity to enable it to enter into and carry out the terms of any agreement made by the <sup>C</sup>ity with His Majesty as aforesaid and Wartime Housing Limited for the purposes above set forth.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that any agreement so made shall obligate the City to submit to the Legislature of Nova Scotia at its next session such legislation as may be necessary to give it power to carry out the terms thereof.

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Moved by Alderman Batson, seconded by Alderman DeWolf that the resolution as submitted be approved. Motion passed unanimously.

His Worship the Mayor stated that should we be prepared to do business with the present owners of land that the maximum price should not exceed what they now ask if we expropriate the land.

Alderman Hosterman stated that he felt the prices for these lots were excessive.

Alderman Coffin stated that the owners might agree to put a ceiling price on these lots.

Alderman DeWolf stated that we should get an agreement before Thursday, September 13, 1945.

The Council was agreed to this procedure.

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His Worship the Mayor stated that the contractors are anxious to know if Wartime Housing Limited will allot the contracts so that all will have their share of business.

Mr. Gray stated that his Company always ask for tenders but they want a firm they can depend upon.

Moved by Alderman Hosterman, seconded by Alderman Ahern that this meeting do now adjourn. Motion passed.

Boiler House were received. They are as follows:

It is recommended that tender No. 2 of the Foundation Maritime Limited be accepted, being the lowest of the three bids received, providing permission is received for the necessary borrowing.

The estimated cost for the construction of this Boiler House was \$60,000 and from quotations received which included the Automatic Stokers, and also the Architect's fees, application must be made for an additional \$25,000. This matter was taken up with Mr. Beazley and he requests that the formal resolution be placed before the Council.

The other matters discussed at the Committee meeting relative to the contract for the Boiler House were brought up with Mr. Fowler.

- 1. With regard to the quotation for additional excavation and concrete in place, this will not materially affect the contract tenders, as the possibility is that the quantity used will be less according to the nature of the material to be excavated.
- 2. When designing the chimney, Mr. Fowler had the smoke nuisance in mind, and extended the new one 30 feet higher than the old one. This, with the installation of the Automatic Stokers should show a marked improvement over existing conditions.

The borrowing for the Boiler House was included in the \$150,000.00 for the Tuberculosis Hospital, etc.

### RESOLUTION

W H E R E A S by Section 8 of Chapter 6 of the Acts of 1945, The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that notwithstanding any of the Provisions of any general or special Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, the City of Halifax shall have full power and authority to borrow or raise by way of loan from time to time on the credit of the said City such sum or sums as the Council thereof deems necessary for the purpose of erecting, acquiring, purchasing, altering, adding to, improving, furnishing or equipping buildings for City purposes.

AND WHEREAS by said Section § of said The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that no money shall be so borrowed until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

AND WHEREAS by said The Municipal Affairs Act, the said sum shall in the discretion of the City Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time or in instalments at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to such an amount as such Council deems necessary to raise such sum.

AND WHEREAS the City Council by resolution dated March 15th, A. D., 1945, deemed it necessary to borrow the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$450,000.00) for the purpose of erecting, improving,

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furnishing, and equipping a hospital for tubercular prtients.

AND WHEREAS the said amount of Four Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$450,000.00) has been found to be insufficient according to the tenders submitted.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary by the City Council of the City of Helifax to borrow an additional sum not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars(\$25,000.00) for the purpose of completing the erecting, improving, furnishing and equipping a hospital for tubercular patients.

AND WHEREAS the said Council deems th<sub>p</sub>t the issue and sale of debentures of the City to an amount not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) as hereinafter mentioned will be necessary to raise that sum.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to postpone the issue of such debentures and to borrow from any bank, fund, person, or account available such sums not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) as may be necessary for the purposes aforesaid; the seld sums to be repaid from the proceeds of the debentures when sold.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that under and by virtue of said The Municipal Affairs Act the said City do, subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the City the said sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purposes aforesaid.

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act, the said sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to the said amount of Twenty-five Thousand Pollars (\$25,000.00)

THAT the issue of said debentures be postponed and that the said City do under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 318A of the Halifax City Charter of 1931 borrow from General Current Account a sum or sums of money not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars -(\$25,000.00)

THAT the said sum or sums be so borrowed for a period not exceeding nine months, with interest thereon to be paid at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum, and that the amount so borrowed together with the amount of any interest which may have accrued thereon be repaid the said General Current Account from the proceeds of the said debentures when sold.

Moved by Alderman Hosterman, seconded by Alderman Coffin that the resolution as set out above be approved. Motion passed unanimously, the Alderman listed as being present at this meeting were in their seats and voted.

### DISCOUNT ON SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS

Gentlemen: At a meeting of the Finance and Executive Committee held on the above date, the attached letter from the City Solicitor respecting the allowing of discounts on special assessments for taxes was considered.

His Worship the Mayor and Members of the Finance and Executive Committee,

Gentlemen:

My attention has been called to a situation respecting the allowing of discounts on Special Assessments for taxes. I believe that the difficulty has arisen because of the commencement of the civic year preceding by some four months the date on which rates and taxes become due, namely Mey 1st. Under the method now being followed a person who becomes liable for a Special Assessment between January 1st and April 30th is required to pay the tax in full within 30 days if he wishes to aveil himself of the discount of 12%. Otherwise the tax proceeds to draw interest at 6%. In the case of a person who was assessed at the regular assessment, his tax does not become due until May 1st and he has the option of paying the entire tax within the month of May and receiving the 21% discount, or he may divide his tex into two portions, paying one-half in May and receiving the 21% discount, and paying the balance before the 31st August end receiving thereon the discount of 15%.

It is quite reasonable to allow the discount of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  on Special texes if they are assessed subsequent to May 1st, and are paid within 30 days, but I would suggest that there is some discrimination against the person who happens to become liable for a tax after January 1st and before Nay 1st, in requiring such tax to be paid, first of all, within a period of 30 days, and secondly for allowing only a discount of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ .

I would suggest that you consider a provision to the effect that any person who has been assessed a Special Assessment prior to May 1st may avail himself of the same privileges as to payment and discount as are provided for persons on the regular roll, namely the right to divide the tax into two portions and pay the first instelment before May 31st and receive 21% discount, and to pay the second instalment before August 31st, and receive 11% discount. This would put both classes of texpayers on the same basis.

I beg to report that we visited the various sites suggested for the wartime houses and find that the following are unsuitable:

The majority of these lots are too low to be built upon and the few that are suitable are not enough to justify the cost of sever and water extension.

### B-7 - G. DONALD HOGAN - DUFFUS ST. EXTENSION & KEMPT RD. -24 LOTS:

These lots are too near the City Dump and the Wartime Housing representative advises us that they would not be suitable to his Company.

### C-1 - CITY OF HALIFAX - BAYERS RD. WEST SIDE - HO LOTS:

Most of these lots are on the southern slope and the remaining lots would not warrant the high cost of extending the sever and water to serve same.

# C-2 ST. PAULS GLEBE LANDS - BAYERS RD. EAST SIDE SOUTH OF RLY. CUT:

50 lots - These lots are too low to be built upon.

D-4 CITY OF HALIFAX - VINDSOR ST. AND KEMPT RD. - 18 lots:

His Worship the Mayor advised the Council that there was a delegation present representing the builders of the City of whom Mr. Cowen was their representative.

Mr. Cowan then addressed the Council as follows: "Your Worship and Gentlemen, I am here on behalf of the builders who are engaged in building homes in this area. The number I represent is 25 or 30. They have forwarded a letter to the Minister of Finance dated Sentember 8/45, and they wish me to state that they are not opposed to the erection of these houses by Wartime Housing Limited.

They have erected approximately 90% of the houses in this

eres. For the next year or so building meteriels will not

be evailable for any house in this area except Wartime

Housing Limited houses. In the past the development was

done by a single company; If that is followed in this case, these men believe and are afraid that they will not be allowed to participate in the building of these houses and for the houses that will need to be built in this area. There are veterans who will want to build on lots they have purchased. They feel there will be an injustice done to these citizens. These builders have kept their men on during the war when materials were very scarce. If this scheme goes through they will be put out of business and also that an injustice will be done to people who are interested in building other houses. They are asking that some assurance be given to them that they will be given an opportunity to tender as a group or singly either in block or sections. They are prepared to form an Association for the purpose of tendering and undertaking the construction of these houses and dividing the work among the contractors. There should be some effort made to release to this area materials other than those for Wartime Housing Limited Houses. They suggest that if the City makes an agreement with Wartime Housing Limited, that a clause be inserted in the agreement that these contractors be given an opportunity to tender on these houses, that at least the Council support any representations they make to the Government for the release of materials for building other then these houses. Thank you gentlemen."

His Worship the Mayor submitted and read the following letter:

Hon. J. L. Ilsley, Minister of Finance, Ottawa, Ontario.

Dear Mr. Minister:

You will have received a few days ago a petition signed by some 25 house building contractors of Halifax, and their request is that they be permitted to participate by submitting tenders or otherwise being allowed a share of the business of building some 255 homes under an agreement which the city of Halifax is about to enter into with Wartime Housing Ltd. I am attaching copy of the petition above referred to.

The signers of the petition are apprehensive that if they are not able to share in this business, and find themselves confronted with lack of materials with which to proceed with other work, their situation will become acute due to their inactivity.

It is my understanding that Wartime Housing Ltd. on previous occasions did business exclusively with one large contractor, and it might be that it would be the wish of the company to proceed in like manner again. However, I know you will be conscious of my responsibility to do all I can to meintain an even prosperity with many tax payers who are eager and able to participate in this business, and it would be my hope that I can enlist your support so that the business will be shared by all.

In order to make it convenient for Wartime Housing Ltd. to deal with the petitioners as a group they are planning to form themselves into an association and if given a share of the business, could then arrange for its equitable division in accordance with the regulations of the association.

I hope you will do all in your power to arrange for the division of the pending business along lines which will be fair to all interested parties.

# \* BEER PLEBISCITE

Sentember 10/1945.

To His Worship the Meyor and Members of the City Council.

Gentlemen:

At a meeting of the Finance and Executive Committee held on the above date, the matter of taking a vote of the electors under the provisions of subsection (3) of Section 30 of Chapter 2 of the Statutes of 1930 "The Nova Scotia Liquor Control Act," was considered.

Your Committee recommends that City Council approve of the holding of a plebiscite in order that the citizens of Halifax may decide whether or not an application shall be made to the Nova Scotia Liquor Commission for the establishment of stores in the City of Halifax where beer and wine may be sold by the glass or open bottle.

Your Committee further recommends that the date for the holding of the said plebiscite be deferred until such time as new Provincial Electoral List are available and a greater number of residents of Halifax presently serving in His Majesty's Service Overseas, have returned home.

BE IT RESOLVED that the City Clerk do take a vote upon such day as this Council shall designate at a later day, whether the electors of the City of Halifax are in favour of or opposed to the sale of beer and wine by the glass or open bottle within the said City under the provisions of "The Nova Scotia Liquor Control Act."

Moved by Alderman Breen, seconded by Alderman Hosterman that the report and resolution as submitted be approved.

Alderman Burgess remarked that if the City stands all the expense in this connection, he will vote against it, as he felt the Provincial Government should pay for it.

His Worship the Mayor stated that he didn't think there ever would be a plebiscite unless the City paid for it.

Alderman Walker requested information on this matter and the Solicitor read a portion of the Nova Scotia Liquor Control Act.

Alderman Walker then stated that this is up to the Provincial Government. "We should not have to pay for this, the Government should pay the bills."

Alderman Batson remarked as follows?

Fellow Members of the City Gouncil:

While my temperance, or rether total abstinence principles, in connection with alcoholic beverages are well known to you, I feel I must put myself on record at this time as to my opposition to the opening of beer parlors in our city. Further, I believe that this Council should make it perfectly clear that while we may vote for a plebiscite, that does not mean we believe that beer parlors are a means for the promotion of a temperate use of alcoholic beverages, rather the reverse as is shown by other cities where the sale of alcoholic liquors has increased rapidly on the opening of beer parlors. This fact has been corroborated by court officials, enforcement officers, leading social workers and temperance leaders.

Personally, I am convinced that the beverage use of intoxicating liquors is the greatest cause of misery, want and destitution in the lives of our people and the greatest destroyer of health, happiness, comfort and all those Christian principles which are the safe guard of our national life. THEREFORE, for these and many other reasons, I believe this Council - "The City Fathers" should put itself on record as opnosed to beer parlors and FURTHER, that we should take an active part in a campaign of education as to the folly of the beverage use of intoxicating liquors, so that the people may vote on the question intelligently, with ample knowledge of what they are voting for or against. I believe we have a great responsibility in this regard.

I would like to place before you some statistics regarding the Government sale of liquor in our province, under an act which it was supposed would CONTROL the sale, but has proved to be a means of INCREASING the sale with the results altogether OUT OF CONTROL. These figures are taken from the reports of the Nova Scotia Liquor Commission.

### TOTAL SALES:

1930-31 - The 2nd year of Govt. Sale but first for which I could obtain figures - \$4,958,232.20 1938-39 - The last year before war population (Increase \$525,200.33) -5,483,432.56 1943-44 - Last report, (Increase \$12,841,089.30) -17,799,322.03

From this last report shows a surplus of \$6,546,855.27 These figures certainly contain "Food for Thought."

Now as to the gallonage consumed. In the first year for which we have figures :-

1930-31 - 503,114 gallons sold through 44 stores. 1943-44 - 4,565,519 gallons sold through 44 stores.

An increase of 3,062,405 gellons.

How many headaches and heartaches are wrapped in those figures. How many ruined lives, broken homes and broken bodies have resulted from this flood of intoxicating liquors?

Surely gentlemen, you and I cannot let the granting of this plebiscite pass, (for I take it that you feel as I do, that in a democracy the people must be given an opportunity to express their views, ) without recognizing that this Council has a responsibility in the matter, not as citizens only, but as the elected representatives of the rate payers, to so act, that we shall collectively point the way in which they should go and the proper action to be taken in connection with the effort to establish beer parlours in the City.

For myself, I am entirely opposed to any further extension of the sale of that which degrades and pauperizes our citizens financially and physically and blunts the conscience of its victims till they eventually lose all regard for the finer impulses of their spiritual life.

His Worship the Mayor addresses the Council from the floor as follows:



"We were to have a meeting of a Committee of the Whole Council to discuss this matter but at my request it was taken up by the Finance and Executive Committee. If a plebiscite is decided upon by vote I don't think it would be well to becloud the issue by asking the Provincial Government to pay for it because they might not do it. The Act states that if a Municipality wants a plebiscite held, the Municipality must pay for it. The Aldermen are only voting for the plebiscite so that the people may vote for or against the sale of beer and wine in decent surroundings which we haven't got at the present time. I would certainly vote for it."

#### MOUNTED SQUAD

September 6/1945.

Gentlemen:

At the last regular meeting of the City Council a report from the Safety Committee recommending that the Mounted Squad of the Police Department be abandoned was referred back to the Safety Committee for further information.

This matter was again considered by the Safety Committee at a meeting held on the above date, at which time all members of the Committee were present.

After receiving a report from Deputy Chief of Police Fox giving perticulars as to the cost of the Mounted Squad since its inception, the Committee decided to re-affirm its previous recommendation viz., that the Mounted Squad be abandoned.

Alderman Adams asked if Deputy Chief Fox had recommended for or against the Mounted Squad.

Moved in amendment by Alderman Breen, seconded by Alderman Moriarty that this matter be referred back to the Safety Committee with the request that Deputy Chief of Police Fox be instructed to prepare a full and detailed account of the development, administration of the mounted division; also the duties allocated to them and the results obtained. His opinion also as to the value of such a unit not by comparison with cars but as a squad trained, developed and administered as a mounted unit should be; also a clear and properly prepared financial report showing the true picture of the yearly maintenance and operating cost.

Aldermen Wølker stated that we don't need this Mounted Squad. "It is ridiculous."

Alderman Coffin stated that he thought we were in a hurry tonight on this matter. "I do remember that Alderman Breen brought a report to this Council and it was on the basis of that report that I voted for it. Mr. Barnes of Montreal also recommended it. As to the \$25,000.00, my impression is that a fair proportion of it was for the salaries of the men themselves. I am arguing in favor of giving an investment of this City a proper trial."

Alderman Adams stated that Mr. Barnes recommended for six cars and also that one man mounted was as good as six men on the street.

His Worship the Mayor stated that Mounted Horses are absolutely worthless except in friendly crowds, they are ornamental and regimental. They are no good for mobs such as V-E Day.

Alderman Breen stated that the breakdown in the money does not show the true picture. "The ex-Chief of Police accepted them against his will because he did not have the courage. I made many trips to the Chief's office getting equipment for the horses. The men were given no support. I have talked with the men and they have worked without direction. I would like to know if there were any complimentary letters received by the Clerk or the Chief of Police."

His Worship the Mayor replied that he had received one from Mr. Martin at Fleming Park but the Safety Committee thinks a car would be better.

Alderman Breen continued as follows: "I would like you to make inquiries from the Superintendent of Point Pleasant Park if there has been decided improvement. For years there were many sections of this City that never saw a policeman. The fact that they patrol these section gives the people some service by the Police. One Mounted Policeman properly treined and properly directed would be very valuable. There are many things I could say tonight but I don't want to. I hope that eventually the Squad will be brought up to strength."

His Worship the Mayor stated that you don't need a report to know what the Safety Committee thinks. "The \$13,000.00 could be used for extra Police and cars. Their

- 665 -

opinion is that you can cover more than 10 times the area in a day with a car."

Alderman Walker stated that a car can be out and over the City before the Mounted man is ready.

Alderman Burgess stated that the Safety Committee discussed the costs and maintenance thoroughly and they felt that the money could be used to better advantage by putting extra men on the street. "It was pointed out that some nights there are only three men on the streets. I think it was unanimous that the Mounted Squad was not worth what it cost the City of Halifax."

Alderman Adams retires at 10.10 P. M.

### EXPLOSION....SEPTEMBER 12/45

Alderman Ahern asked if a report had been submitted by the Navel Authorities in connection with the explosion which occurred at the Bedford Magazine on the above date.

His Worship the Mayor replied that he had written a letter to Mr. Taylor asking if precautions had been taken to safeguard the situation, and he was informed that a Court of Inquiry is in progress.

Aldermon Burgess asked that the following information be obtained from the Public Service Commission and that same be forwarded to all members of the Council:

- (1) Momes of employees of the Commission.
- (2) The position they hold.
- (3) Their seleries.
- (4) If a pensioner of the City of Halifax is employed by the Public Service Commission and if so, the salary paid to him.

Alderman Burgess referred to the hearing being held before the Public Utilities Board respecting the valuation of the assets of the water utility and asked if the City hed a representative at the hearing.

The City Solicitor stated that the hearing is being held to arrive at a valuation of the City's assets. "There is no saying that this may affect the rates. The Utility

can earn certain profits as the Public Utility Board permits it to make. There has been no valuation of the utility for almost 20 years. The Board thought it would be wise to have this valuation brought up to date. The valuation of the utility will settle the rates. I represent the Public Service Commission to have a proper valuation established and also to the City so it will know what value it has in the Water Department.

Alderman Eurgess remarked that the Public Utility Board makes the valuation and the Public Service Commission has a witness but the City has none.

The Solicitor stated that the interest of the City and the Public Service Commission are identical.

Alderman Burgess stated that if the City had no representative, it would have to take what it got.

The City Solicitor stated that he thought he was representing both parties.

Alderman Ahern wanted to know by whom it was being held, and if Mr. Kaye was still retained by the City to which the Solicitor replied in the negative.

### MANE OF THE CITY ON ALL CITY CARS

Alderman Malker wanted to know if the name "City of Helifax" was on all City owned cars and if there were an order on the books to that effect. "I would like to know if there are any cars without that name on them."

His Worship the Mayor strted that he would look after the matter.

#### TIME CLOCK

Alderman Welker stated that he was giving Notice of Motion that at the next regular meeting he would move that a Time Clock be placed in the City Hall.

His Worship the Mayor stated that the report from the Heads of Departments with respect to holidays, sick leave, etc., should come at the same time.

Gallager who had been employed by the City of Halifax since prior to May 1, 1923, be granted three months leave of absence, with full salary as from the date of Council approval; also that the City Council be asked to approve in principle that Mr. G. A. Gallager be granted a pension based on the pension formula which is now being considered, and subject to its approval by the Finance and Executive Committee. The Committee further recommended that Mr. J. R. Hall who had been employed by the City of Helifax for approximately ten years, begranted in lieu of notice of termination of employment, half pay for a period of three months, payable half monthly and commencing from the date of expiration of his vacation on September 15th, 1945.

M. L. Doane, Mgr. of the Public Service Commission reported that the Commission has been paying Mr. Slauenwhite, but that Mr. Walsh who had been considered a valued employee of the Water Department, had ceased working before the Utility had been transferred to the Commission, and consequently was not on the Commission pay-roll. He reported also that the Commission is considering the establishment of a pension plan for its employees, and at the Committee's request he agreed to notify the City as to whether or not the Commission would include Mr. Walsh as a beneficiary of the pension plan if it is established by the Commission.

The Clerk of Works reported verbally that the City had granted to Mr. Walsh extensions of leave of absence with half pay until May 31st, 1945, and that City Council had subsequently referred the cases of both Mr. Walsh and Mr. Slauenwhite to the Superannuation Committee.

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## PERMIT J. A. BEED BUILDING RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

Attached hereto is a report of the Commissioner of Works dated July 24th, 1945, on an application from Mr. John Beed for a permit to erect an auditorium or a hall at the North West Corner of Cunard and Hunter Streets. This report was considered by the Committee on Works at meetings held on August 5th and August 16th, 1945.

Attached also is a report from the Commissioner of Works dated September 1st, 1945, concerning the said application which was considered by the Committee on Works at a meeting held on the 4th instant.

The Committee has been informed that the proposed building would be used as an athletic hall for basket-ball, indoor baseball, badminton, roller skating, public meeting, Union Meetings, Society meetings, etc., including general auditorium use; also that the building would contain a canteen for use by the general public.

At the meeting held on the 4th instant, Mr. J. E. Rutledge, K. C., addressed the Committee on behalf of Mr. J. A. Beed, and advised that in his opinion, the said application could be granted under Section S15 of the City Charter, as the proposed building for which Mr. Beed has requested permission to erect, could be considered a public hall within the meaning of the said Section.

The City Solicitor reported verbally that in his opinion it is questionable as to whether or not the proposed building ould be a public hall within the meaning of Section 815 of the City Charter, but that it would not be unreasonable to consider it as such, and that if the Committee on Works consider it as a public hall, he would not think it was defying the law.

In reply to the Chairman, the City Solicitor egreed to write a letter to that effect, and suggested that if the permit for the erection of the proposed building is granted, Legislation be sought to ratify that action.

On motion of Alderman Breen, seconded by Alderman Walker, the Committee recommended to Council

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that the said permission applied for by Mr. J. A. Beed be granted.

Dear Sir:

At a meeting of the Committee on Works held September 4th I was requested to include in a letter certain opinions which I expressed verbally at this meeting.

The matter under discussion was whether or not a building proposed by Mr. Beed to be erected on the northern limit of the residential district could be permitted within the terms of section 215 of the Charter. It appears that the type of buildings described in subsection (6) of section 215 which most closely resembles Mr. Beed's proposed building is that of "Public Hell." From the description given by Mr. Beed I think it is open to some question as to whether this building would be a public hell within the meaning of section 215 of the Charter but I find it very difficult to define the difference and therefore it would in my opinion not be deemed an unreasonable decision if this Committee were to consider the building as a public hell.

In view of the doubt which exists I would suggest that if vermission is granted that legislation be sought at the next session of the Legislature to ratify the use of the building as a public hall.

Your Committee concurs in the recommendation of the Public Service Commission of Halifax, viz., that it be permitted to proceed with the construction of the pumping station and carry on with temporary arrangements at the chlorinating station until a more favorable time at a total expenditure of \$246,000.00.

Dear Sir:

About July, 1944, we were authorized to proceed with the construction of an addition to the pumping station at Dutch Village Road, interconnection between the 24" and 27" low service supply mains crossing Dutch Village Road, and additions to the chlorinating station at Chain Lakes. The sum voted was \$250,000.00.

The interconnecting pipe lines have been laid right up to the pumping station.

The excavation for the building is practically completed.

Excavation for the chlorinating station, meters, drains, etc., is almost completed.

All of the equipment including electric motors, pumps, chlorinating equipment, etc., has been purchased, and is either on hand or will be shortly.

The work has cost to date including our commitments, \$205,700.00. This is somewhat more than we estimated due principally to the large emount of rock encountered at the entrance to the pumping station, extra excavation required in order to lower the 15" main not anticipated at all, and cost of drainage ditch at Chain Lakes where bog was encountered as much as twenty feet deep.

Even taking these into account we would be within our estimates were it not that tenders for the building are nearly double what was estimated fourteen months ago, but of course prices have risen very fast during the last year, and it now means winter work.

Lowest tenders for the buildings were received from Fundy Construction Company as follows:

September 26/1945.

Chain Lake Chlorinator Building ..... \$34,575.85 Dutch Village Rd. Pumping Station .... 32,914.50

If we construct both these buildings we shall require authority for another \$40,000.00. As an alternative we can construct the pumping station which is urgently needed, and carry on with temporary arrangements at the Chlorinating Station until a more favorable time, at a total expenditure of \$246,000.00, which keeps us within the amount available.

With this alternative we can install the new meters and essential chlorinating equipment to effect the desired improvement in operation and we recommend that this be done.

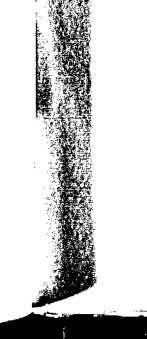

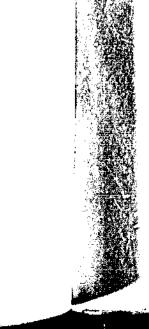

#### DELEGATION RE HOUSING ETC.

It was agreed to hear Mrs. W. J. Murphy of the Maple Leaf Club and Mr. G. A. Smith of the Trades and Labor Council re Housing.

Mrs. Murphy submitted and read the following letter:



These matters which we have the privilege of presenting to the Mayor of the City and the Halifex City Council is of utmost importance, and as citizens we feel it is our duty to acquaint the Civic Government of these conditions

in the interests of the working people, as we know the strength of the entire nation is only measured by the standard of its citizens, and the homes, as the center of family life is the source of this strength.

While citizens are worrying over where a home can be found and where their children will attend school, there is still no assurance that low cost housing will be made available.

In the cases where city evictions have taken place, some homes have been broken up entirely, and as many as seven children and father and mother have been crowded into one room --- Rest and sleep are impossible under these conditions and health is being undermined to such an alarming degree in many cases that sickness is a constant visitor.

The welfare of these citizens is the responsibility of the City of Helifax, Nova Scotia, and we feel an immediate survey should be made of the families without homes so that permanent homes can be arranged for, so that no child will be homeless or lack schooling.

(1) We suggest that in order to make homes possible, the City of Halifax be enlarged by taking in suburban territory as 90% of the residents of the local suburbs earn their living in Halifax City.

(2) The Halifax civic government call for a special session of the Nova Scotia Legislature to discuss this serious housing shortage, that the representatives of the people may be able to obtain all the combined support in accordance with Dominion - Provincial relations, as released in the speech from the throne September 5, 1945 at Ottawa.

Immediate emergency shelter for evicted families, and all others who are in need of temporary shelter, we ask that the Womens' Barracks R.C.A.F., at Gorsebrook Golf Course, and the Cathedral Womens' Barracks, C.W.A.C., be taken over by the City for this purpose.

At an executive meeting of the Maritime Maple Leaf Women's Club held September 20, 1945, the Cluney case was brought up for discussion, and the facts given were:-

That the city police officers had taken these four children of school age to the Halifax City Home, where they were lodged for a month without being able to attend



#### school.

The father was in jail when the eviction took place, and the mother refused to go to the City Home, she secured a job and went to room with her two elder daughters who were also working.



Repeated calls to all welfare agencies in the City of Halifax for three weeks before the eviction took place were unable to solve the question of a home for this family.

We ask, that in the future, any normal children of school age who are taken to the City Home, be allowed to attend the City schools.

We would like to know why the furniture of the evicted families is not put out with them, as the police officers now put a padlock on the door, and just put the family out on the street, and in different cases, it has been very difficult to make arrangements to get the furniture, and in one case of more than a month ago, the woman does not know yet where her belongings are.

We also would like to know if evictions will continue to take place during the winter months.

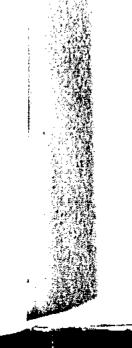
Mr. G. A. Smith of the Halifax Trades and Labor Council addressed the Council as follows: "I want to thank you gentlemen for the opportunity to say a few words with regard to the housing situation. You are all familiar with the situation as well as I am. The only reason I am here is to try to emphasize the fact that this is a real serious affair. We should bring pressure to bear on

Ottawa to correct this matter. Hen are returning from

overseas, bringing wives and children and there is no

place for them. We want this Council to do everything

possible to help in the matter of the housing situation. I thank you."

It was also agreed to hear Mr. N. M. Rolfe and he addressed the Council as follows:

"I want to thank you for the opportunity of saying a few words. I might say that six months ago a Committee appeared before you and presented the situation regarding the housing conditions. The men overseas are under the impression that when they arrive home in Canada that there are good homes - waiting for them. We receive 100 letters a month from these men. Some people are living today in what you might say chicken coops all over this town. I would like to ask if the sod has been turned yet to building the 255 houses. A man returned after five years overseas and he has two children and his wire is expecting another one and they had to go to the Dartmouth Jail to find a place to sleep. The new Chief of Police here tonight knows these conditions exist. We would like to know when the Administrator is going to be appointed to take cere of these vacant houses. There are plenty of houses in Halifax that could have rooms rented but the Tax System stops them from renting these rooms. It is only the N.C.O.'s that are in a bad situation. Ine higher ranks are well looked after because they have the money. The Administrator has the nower to take over these vacant

buildings. The Airport was contemplated to be used for

200 permanent homes. Those people with children suffer

the most. There are barrocks that are vacant and also

buildings in the old "Y". We are told by Vortime Housing

that it is costly to convert these buildings but it will

be more costly if we have an epidemic this winter. Those buildings can be taken over at very little cost. The men will be glad to change them themselves just to get a place to live in. Let us not forget those who served. Thank you."

His Worship the Mayor asked Mr. Rolfe and Mr. Smith to submit their remarks in writing the same as Mrs. Murphy and then the matter could be given study by the Finance and Executive Committee.

The Board of School Commissioners has agreed to rent St. Joseph's Hall, Gottingen St., for use

of overflow classes. One of the conditions of the lease is that the property be exempt from taxation.

By Section 9, Chapter 187, Acts 1889 this property was exempt from taxation while it was being used for the purpose of St. Joseph's Society. In 1940 the property was rented to H.M. the King and consequently became taxable and has been so taxed since that time. The leasing of the property to the Board of School Commissioners would not exempt the property from taxation and in order to comply with the Board's request it will be necessary to obtain legislation.

The assessment on this property is \$10,000. Inasmuch as it was rented to the Grown the assessment was in the business classification and the taxes payable thereon for 1945 amount to \$475.00.

There may be other properties of a like character which the Board would be renting from time to time and it might be advisable to consider a general policy and hence general legislation in matters of this kind rather than obtain legislation for one specific property.

Another way the matter could of course be handled would be for the Board to assume payment of the taxes.

The letter came in and was referred to the Commissioner of Finance who discussed the matter further with the Company which had been doing the business all along. Further discussion finally produced a rate the same as the firm who tried to enter the picture this year.

Alderman Breen wanted to know if the old rate was only lowered to meet the new tenderer.

His Worship the Mayor stated that if the bids when they come in are equal the only thing to do would be to give the business to the firm who was going to reduce the rate.

The motion was then put and passed with Alderman Breen wishing to be recorded against.

Alderman Batson wanted to know if there were any defalcations in the past that have not been paid by the Bonding Company to which His Worship the Mayor stated that in the old regime prior to 1924 there was a bond of \$10,000.00 on one of the officials but he did now know whether it was paid or not.

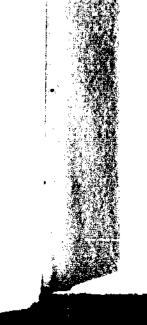

Re: Moirs Limited

In 1927 Moirs Limited contemplated the enlarging of their factory on Argyle Street, and in order to assist, the city apparently agreed to make certain tax concessions. These are set out in Chapter 57 of the Acts of 1927 and are as follows:



#### -- -----

- 1. A fixed voluation on real property.
- 2. Exemption from business tax.
- 3. Five million gallons of water free
  - in each year for twenty years.

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Due to the transfer of the management of the Water Department from the City to the Public Service Commission, the city, no longer being the party supplying water, must secure the same from the Public Service Commission in order to carry out the terms of the statute.

I would suggest that the city arrange with the Public Service Commission to supply Moirs Limited with five million gallons of water at the expense of the city, and when the water bills are sent out, one would come to the City for five million gallons of water at the 6 cent rate supplied to Moirs Ltd., which bill the City would pay directly. The total annual amount involved, if the present rates are continued and Moirs Ltd., continue to consume the amount it now uses, is \$300.00. The concessions granted by the above statute cease and determine in 1952.

#### Re: Moirs Limited

We have been advised by Moirs Limited that payment of our bills for water consumption for the period 1st November, 1944, to 30th June, 1945, is being with-held as our bills do not show a credit for 5,000,000 gallons of water previously allowed by the City of Halifax, supported by an Act of the Provincial Legislature.

It is our understanding that this concession was granted Moirs Limited by the City of Halifax to ensure the location of their plant in this City. If this is correct, you will appreciate that the matter of the continuance of such an allowance in the Company's consumption is one to be dealt with by the City of Halifax and not by this Commission.

We believe that we are entitled to payment for the full consumption used by the company, either from Moirs Limited, direct, or in part from the City of Halifax.

The water accounts referred to above are now in arrears and we hesitate to take any further steps for their collection until we have been advised of the course to be followed by the City of Halifax in connection with the consumption allowance.

We shall greatly appreciate, therefore, your advice, at your earliest convenience.

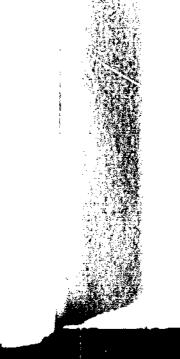

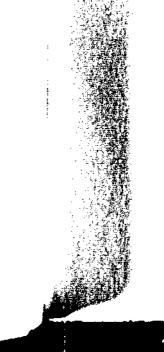

Sir:

An application has been received from Mr. Wm. Mac-Donald, 105 Cabot Street, for the rental of a portion of the Reservoir Property, Robie Street, which is adjacent to the rear of his property facing on Cabot Street.

As some of the Committee may recall, when Mr. Bernard Vaughan submitted a plan of his Subdivision, which includes Mr. MacDonald's lot, it was recommended by the Town Planning Board that the City trade a strip of land to the rear of the Cabot Street lots which are only 55 feet in depth, for an equal area of land in the rear of the Reservoir along the eastern side of Prescott Street,

which strip of land is useless to the Vaughan Subdivision.

In order to convey this land, it will be necessary to have legislation to do so; In the meantime, Mr. MacDonald wishes to lease the land, and on obtaining the required legislation, to buy.

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I may also state that Mr. Vaughan will convey his land to the City, the price to be agreed upon.

I would recommend that this application be granted, and that in accordance with the recommendation of the Town Planning Board, that we seek legislation for the sale of a strip of land on the south side of the Reservoir property, and further that we negotiate for a strip\_of land on the east side of Prescott Street, owned by B. J. Vaughan.

These proposals meet with the approval of Mr. H.W.L. Doane, Manager of the Public Service Commission.
