Oity Solicitor: "The draft that was before the Council was a draft that was prepared for consideration and study and it contained a number of references to statutory sections that had a bearing on Town Planning. Those sections are statutory enactments and have no place in the Zoning By-Law itself. I would suggest to you that what you are approving is this draft that I hold in my hand which has eliminated those particular statutory sections that are in the By-Law. There are several parts that should be deleted because they are merely a statement of existing legislation. It should only be enacted in one place. For example, "fences" is dealt with in Part 12.

In cases where the Section numbers of the Charter have been taken out it will mean a re-numbering of the sub-paragraphs in the By-Law. There will be a few changes in phraseologies. The changes which I have made are as follows:



I enclose herewith a final statement of liquidation of the Provincial Exhibition Commission. The final meeting of the Board of Trustees for the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition Commission was recently held in the office of the Chairman, the Honorable A. W. MacKenzie. Those in attendance in addition to the Chairman were His Worship Mayor Kinley, Deputy Provincial Treasurer H. E. Potter and myself. Mr. A. M. Butler was present as Secretary.

Chapter 27 of the Acts of 1941, Section 7, authorizes the Commission, appointed under the Act, to sell buildings, lands belonging to the Commission to His Majesty The King in the right of the Dominion of Canada represented by the Honorable Minister of National Defence.

Section 8 of the Act appointed a Board of Trustees to receive a purchase price and to deal with the same in the manner herein provided.

The Act also authorized the Board to do all other things necessary to the winding up of the Affairs of the Commission and the retirement of its bonds. All these things have been done and meetings have been held from time to time of which minutes have been kept.

Since the Board's first meeting in 1941 the serial bonds falling due up to and including January 1st, 1949 were paid as they fell due. The remaining bonds were located and purchased at various prices and at the meeting \$99,000.00 par value were exhibited and it was decided at that meeting to have them cancelled.

The Board accepted the final statement on liquidation presented by the Secretary and approved issuance of two cheques of \$25,770.56 and \$11,867.09 respectively to the Province of Nova Scotia and the City of Halifax representing distribution of the final balance.

These amounts are unequal due to an adjustment agreed on whereby the Province was refunded its share of amounts paid by the former Commission over a period of years to the City of Halifax for Sinking Fund installments and interest on Bonds, \$17,500. issued by the City for it's share of the Capital cost of the Forum Ice Plant, no similar amount having been paid to the Province by the Commission with respect to its share of the Capital cost.

Since then I have received a cheque for \$11,867.09 which has been deposited with the City Treasurer.

#### RATE BASE TRANSIT SYSTEM

Rate Base Transit System was submitted to the Finance and Executive Cormittee at a meeting held on the above date and it was agreed to forward same to Council for its information and filing.

Dear Sirs:-

As you have probably noticed in the Press the Public Utilities Board has filed its decision establishing a rate base for the new Transit System for the City. I appeared at the hearings and made certain submissions which I think are familiar to members of the Council, having been fully reported in the Press.

- (1) The Board disallowed the item "Organizational Expenses" as part of the rate base.
- (2) After a submission was made objecting to the inclusion of the Francklyn Park property in the rate base, the Company requested that the same be withdrawn.

The rate base was therefore fixed at \$2,649,495.45.

- (3) The next item before the Board was the fixing of the rates of depreciation on tangible assets. The Company asked for a flat over-all rate of five percent, except on trolley coaches. The Board, however, expressed its opinion that the rates should be fixed for the various classifications of assets and the total depreciation determined in this manner.
  - (a) Terminal Building. The Board allowed a rate of depreci-ation of 3% with a salvage value of approximately 40%.
  - (b) Ditching, draining and paving the front yard of the Terminal Building. Rate of depreciation 5%.
  - (c) Poles and fixtures. Depreciation 5%.
  - (d) Feeder system. Depreciation 45%.
  - (e) Distribution system. Depreciation 415.
  - (f) Trolley Coaches. Depreciation 10% except for first year of operation which was fixed at 15%, due to excessive wear and tear caused by condition of the streets, and final year in which the rate is to be 5%.

The Board ordered that the rates of depreciation so fixed be reviewed within a period of two years from the date of the Order.

- (4) Amortization of intangibles. The only intangible asset in question was that of organization value and the Board fixed a rate of 5%, thus amortizing this cost over 20 years.
- (5) Rate of Initial Return. This matter was the subject to sharp disagreement and the Company contended that this rate should be 5.82%. However, the Board was pleased to accept my submission and fixed this rate at 32%.

The total amount, therefore, of capital employed within

the meaning of section 8 (e) of the agreement between the City and the Company is the amount of the rate base above referred to, namely \$2,649,495.45, plus organizational value \$65,000.00, or a total of \$2,714,495.45.

If there is any further information you desire in this connection I will be pleased to endeavour to supply the same.

WHEREAS by section 64 of Chapter 66 of the Acts of the Province of Hova Scotia 1950 the City of Halifax was authorized to purchase from Central Mortgage and nousing Corporation seven hundred and eighty-seven prefabricated houses eracted in the City of Halifax together wit the land upon which the same are erected and appurtenant thereto for a sum not exceeding Seven hundred and Eighty-seven Thousand Pollars (5787,000.00).

AND WHEREAS by said section 64 of Chapter 66 of the Acts of 1950 the City of Halifax was further authorized to expend such sums as it may determine for the purpose of repairing and rehabilitating such of the said houses as the Council may from time to time determine in order to cause the same to comply with the law in effect in the City respecting the construction, alteration and repair of dwelling houses.

AND WHELEAS by said section 64 of Chapter 66 of the Acts of 1950 any sums required by the City for the purposes of purchasing the said houses and for the repair and rehabilitation of the same are declared to be sums required for a City purpose within the meaning of Section 8 of the sumicipal Affairs Act and such sums may be from time to time borrowed by the City under the authority and in accordance with the provisions of the said Act.

AND WHEREAR by section 8 of Chapter 6 of the Acts of the Province of Nova Scotia 1985, The Municipal Arrains Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that notwithstanding my of the provinces of any general or special Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, the City of Halifax shall have full power and authority to borrow or raise by way of loan from time to time on the credit of the said City such sum or some of money as the Council thereof deems necessary for the purpose of erecting, acquiring, pur-

enasing, altering, adding to, improving, furnishing or equipping buildings for public schools, hospitals, public libraries, fire department, police office, lockups, prisons, city hall, city home, asylums for the harmless insane or other city purpose and acquiring or purchasing or improving land for such buildings or for any city purpose.

AND WHEREAS by said section 8 of said The Municipal Affairs Act it is enacted among other things, in effect, that no money shall be so borrowed until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

AND WHEREAS by said The Municipal Affairs Act the said sum shall in the discretion of the City Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time or in instalments at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to such an amount as such Council deems necessary to raise such sum.

AND WHEREAB it is deemed necessary by the City Council of the City of Halifax to borrow a sum not exceeding One Million Dollars (81,000,000.00) for such purposes, namely -

rurchase of 787 prefabricated houses and the land appurtenant thereto \$ 787,000.00

Repairs and rehabilitation of the same 213,000.00

AND WHEREAS the said Council deems that the issue and sale of debentures of the City to an amount not exceeding One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) will be necessary to raise that sum.

AND WHEREAS it is desired expedient to postpone the issue of such debentures and to borrow from any bank,
fund, person or account available such sums not exceeding
One William Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) as may be necessary for
the purposes sforesaid, the said sums to be repaid from the

PE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that under and by virtue of said The Municipal Affairs Agt the said City do, subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the City the said sum of One Million Bollars (\$1,000,000.00) for the purposes aforesaid.

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act the said sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to the said amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00).

THAT the insue of said debentures be postponed and that the said City do under and by virtue of the
provisions of section 318B of the Halifax City Charter of
1931 borrow from the General Current Assount a sum or sums
of money not exceeding One Million Pollars (\$2,000,000.00).

#### ORDINANCE

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Halifax as follows:

- 1. Section 6 of Ordinance Number 1 of the Ordinances of the City of Halifax respecting "City Seal and Arms" is repealed and the following substituted therefor:
  - 6. (1) The arms of the City of Halifax shall be as follows:

\*Azure a crested kingfisher or. Crest: Out of a mural coronet or a sprig of mayflowers in bloom proper.

Supporters: dexter, a deep sea fisherman with a codfish dependent from his exterior hand; sinister, a naval seaman, all proper.

Motto: E MARI MERCES.

(2) The foregoing heraldic description shall be interpreted as follows:

"A gold kingfisher on a blue shield surmounted by a golden mural crown issuing from which is a natural sprig of mayflowers in bloom. The shield is supported on its right
(on the left as one faces it) by a deep sea fisherman with a codfish hanging from his right hand and on its left by a naval seaman of the period of adoption (circa 1860).

The motto is to be shown below on a ribbon or scroll as
"E MARI NERCES," which may be freely translated as "Wealth from the Sea."

(3) The following directions shall be followed by any person rendering the arms of the City of Halifax: While a certain degree of artistic latitude may be permitted by any person in rendering the arms, strict adherence shall be given to placement and colouring where designated. The kingfisher shall be the crested kingfisher (Ceryle Aloyon) and shall be readily recognizable as the North American Kingfisher common to this locality. The supporters shall be shown in the natural dress of the period of the original adoption of these Arms by the City of Halifax - about 1860. The supporters shall be shown standing (not walking) on a "mount" or hilleck. The mural coronet or crown shall be shown resting upon the shield without any wreath and shall be shown with three courses of masonry surmounted by five battlements. The mayflower shall be shown as the trailing arbutus (Epigaea repens, Linn). The Kingfisher shall occupy

as much of the space within the shield as possible. The supporters shall be shown as manly and vigorous.

(4) In any case in which the Arms of the City are not rendered in colours, the colours hereinbefore defined shall be indicated as follows:

For blue: by fine lateral lines on the background of the shield;

For gold: by fine dots upon the kingfisher and the mural crown.

When colours are used yellow may be substituted for gold and any suitable shade of blue may be used where that colour is to be shown.

- (5) The Arms alone may be used, and the crest may be used alone. Where the complete armorial achievement is shown the crest and both supporters shall be used.
- (6) The Arms shall be used on official City notices, City stationery, City buildings, vehicles and other City property, badges and uniforms of officers in the employ of the City and in any other manner determined by the Council for the purpose of indicating the authority, property or officials of the Corporation of the City of Halifax.
- (7) There shall be an official flag of the City. The flag shall be blue charged with a gold or yellow kingfisher as defined in the Arms of the City. The kingfisher shall be shown facing the mast both on the obverse and reverse sides.
- (8) The flag may be flown on all civic buildings, including public school buildings. The Mayor only shall have the right to fly the flag on a vehicle.
- (9) The flag and the Arms of the City as above defined are primarily a mark of the City.
- (10) The Arms and the flag may be used decoratively by any corporation or individual but shall not be reproduced for sale on any material without the license of the City.

As you are aware for some time past a great deal of difficulty has been experienced in connection with building on the watershed by reason of the fact that accurate plans of the watershed have not been available. For some time we have been considering it and trying to make arrangements to have an aerial survey made of this area but the original quotations for the work were such that we did not feel justified in recommending it. The original tenders we received were about \$20,000.

At the present time Pulsifer Bros, have equipped themselves to do aerial photography for survey purposes and are doing
this work for the provincial government. At the same time the
provincial Department of Mines has put in the necessary equipment

found that I can have a plan of the watershed prepared to a scale
of 400 feet to the inch with 5 foot contours for a price of

Use of Temporary Buildings

Dear Sir:

In May, 1945, two buildings, which had been erected on our Campus during the war for use by Navy personnel, were turned over to us by the Federal Government, and application was made to the City at that time for permission to use them for academic and associated purposes. At a meeting of the City Council held on June 14, 1945, the Council agreed to our use of these buildings for a period of five years. We were advised at that time that the University would have the privilege of renewing the request when these five years had expired. This expiry will take place on June 1 next.

During the summer of 1945, the University spent approximately \$30,000.00 in remodelling the interiors of these buildings for our purpose, and since then, they have been maintained on a par comparable with the rest of the University property. The first of these, situated west of the Gymnasium, is used as a dormitory for thirty-five students; a kitchen and Dining Hall for from two hundred to two hundred and fifty students; offices of the Registrar and certain of the Arts Faculty teaching staff, and a large Common Room for the use of our students. The second building, located at the corner of Oxford Street and Coburg Road, is used by the Department of Engineering and the Department of Geology for offices, class rooms, laboratories, and associated work.

As stated above, these buildings have been well maintained, are structurally sound, and have many years of useful life ahead of them.

The University, therefore, makes formal application to the City for permission to use the two buildings referred to above for an additional period of five years, with the right to make application for their further use when that period has expired.

The estimated cost of this sewer is about \$4200.00, and the estimated cost of the catchpits about \$800.00 for a total of \$5000.00, for which the City will receive no assessment.

It will be necessary to construct about 4094 feet of ourb and gutter for the balance of this work. The estimated cost for the construction of the concrete curb and gutter is about \$10,235.00, and the estimated assessment \$5076.00, and the section of Windsor Street between Duffus Street and Bayers Road is also petitioned for pavement. The estimated cost of the paving is about \$11,682.00, and the estimated assessment about \$2020.00.

Grant, Richardson, Hurst and Abbott met with me the 22nd, March making their choice as above, and Colonel Ahern has written on behalf of Monsignor Burns expressing the same choice. The total estimated cost for a stoning and oiling job here is \$39,820.00 about \$6,000.00 more than a street not having a Boulevard. Plans are not to pave this street this year but the reason a decision re width is necessary is because walk is ordered on the west side and curb and gutter on the east side, thus for our Engineers to get on with their work a definite width must be chosen. Further, a decision will make it possible for the residents affected to get on with their landscaping. Due to the fact that a Boulevard in the centre of the Street, as in Scheme \*B\*, although narrower than north of Inglis Street, is in keeping with the general design of Robie Street, and due to the fact that this area is residential I favour Scheme \*B\*, that chosen by the residents, and recommend that we - 392 -

protection. We all know just what position Halifax Harbour occupies as a National Port. There is always a danger that these ships may suffer a mishap the same as in 1917. It could happen today. It could happen off Point Pleasant Park or in the heart of the City. I do say that this Council should approach the responsible authorities to see to it that no more munition ships are loaded in Halifax Harbour. I question whether it is necessary to bring these munitions to the Maritime Provinces by train. There are other ports created during wartime that could be used. We are not asking for these things to be brought in here. We are asking for goods to be brought here. I went down and looked it over. She was loading T. N. T.

Alderman Hosterman: "There were two cargoes. Ammonium Nitrate and T. N. T. Nitrate foreign is not allowed in here but Canadian manufacture is. I agree that a T. N. T. ship should not come in here. The responsibility is on the National Harbours Board."

Alderman Vaughans "I am pleased to accept Alderman Hosterman's explanation. He is well qualified to speak on this. I think you Your Worship should use your good offices to see that munitions are loaded at the proper place."

His Worship the Mayor: "We have a very good Fire Chief and the Safety Regulations were all followed. I pay him tribute. He waited on the Police Department and the Navy. I received a call that a ship was loading Ammonium Nitrate and we had a meeting of the Safety Committee. We found that if the Port Regulations were carried out there would be nothing to worry about. The Port Authorities have very stringent regulations. The Safety Committee, in camera, went over it. The Fire and Police Chiefs covered it. The Port Authorities are obligated to notify the Fire Chief immediately a ship enters the Harbour."

Alderman Vaughan: "I think the citizens will accept your opinion regarding the regulations. In 1917 there were regulations in effect. There was an accident and we have suffered in Ward 6 all of these years because of that explosion. People in that area were killed and maimed. People lost their homes. These regulations may exist. I have all the confidence in the world in our Fire and Police Chiefs. The risk is too great to allow these ships to be loaded here."

His Worship the Mayor: "Your Safety Department of this City is giving every attention to these matters. Certain duties devolve on the Port Authorities which if they are carried out we assure you that we will protect the citizens of this City."

### RINOUSKI FIRE AND WINNIPEG FLOOD VICTIMS

His Worship the Mayor stated it was his recommendation that a fund be started for each of the above Cities to help out in their time of need and the City's gift to be \$1,000.00 and that we ask for the co-operation of the Press.

Moved by Alderman Vaughan, seconded by Alderman DeWolf that \$1,000.00 be appropriated to start a fund for the relief of the Rimouski Fire victims and the Winnipeg Flood. Motion passed.

### RENT INCREASES EMERGENCY SHELTERS

Alderman Duffy: "I had 22 calls regarding the raising of the rents 15% and 20%. I would like to have an explanation as to why this is taking place. I have not made a personal inspection of the houses. On Brunswick Street there is a case where 4 tenants are using the same toilet and their rent is to be raised 15%."

City Assessor: "The Housing Accommodation Committee had a Special Committee appointed to inspect and report on the rents in connection with these Emergency Shelters. In a large number of instances the Committee supplies such services as heat, light, janitor and domestic cold water and as you all realize our ex-

penses have been going up and the report of the Committee was
that in view of the increased costs of these services the tenant
should bear a reasonable portion of that cost. The increase
will not commence to carry the actual cost of these shelters but
it will assist in the matter. We were never under the Rental
Control Board as Municipalities are exempt. A lot of properties
today are released from rental control. The special committee
reported back to the Housing Accommodation Committee recommending these increases.

Alderman Vaughans "I would hate to think that this City was following the lead of landlords who through their greed and avarice are charging their tenants. We are trying to pay off a Capital Account. I think the amount stands now as \$205,000.00. That does not include the cost of the buildings. I felt in Committee that we should have all these facts what it is costing us and then fix the rents. It was felt that we should not subsidize housing. That is not of this Council's making. That situation was caused by the war. I don't think we can solve the problem if we are going to charge subsidization against these Shelters. I also would charge subsidization against parking lots, recreation and health programs. Are we going to liquidate this Capital Account charged against Emergency Shelters? If we are, let us lop something off. No item appears that certain units were removed. There is one property that has a bathroom for 4 tenants. The increase cannot be applied to that building. I do submit this that the 15% and 20% increase is not the actual increased cost of operating these shelters. When we speak of all the services we provide for these people, it is true. If we did not provide it these people would be living in hovels and attics with increased costs in our health bill. Nost are clean. They are also crowded. Two rooms 22' x 11' with a sink and a water closet rents for \$25.00 per month. With the increase it would be \$30.00 for two rooms. That would be O. K. for someone renting

property who could get away with it. Can you imagine living in a room ? x 11' putting the children to bet and being asked to pay \$32.00 for it?

City Assessor: "Alderman Vaughan is quite correct with regard to the Capital Account. We started out with \$350,000.00 and it is now down to \$205,000.00 with the exception of \$123,000. 00 contributed by the Central Mortgage & Housing Corporation. All of that has been made up by the collection of rents. I agree with Alderman Vaughan that we should get the picture. We lost the South Barracks, Churchfield Barracks, Leaman Street and Chebucto Barracks. We have been losing these assets which would have produced rents which would have enabled us to reduce the capital expenditure originally made. Certain of these lands were sold by the City and no credit was given to the investment which the Emergency Shelters had in those. We should be given some credit even by way of book entry. In connection with the rentals I think Alderman Vaughan will agree with me that it was my suggestion that these two men who had not been connected with 'housing' should make the inspection and report which they did. I could only do as the Committee asked to do as Chairman. As far as I am concerned I am perfectly agreeable that there should be possibly a review of that schedule. While there are some apartments that could stand the increase there are others that could not. "

Alderman DeWolf: "I think it was a mistake to make a general increase of 15% and 20% all around. I would suggest that before these increases go into effect that the Housing Accommodation Committee again go into the matter to see just what properties should be increased rather than a general increase."

Moved by Alderman Vaughan, seconded by Alderman Duffy that this Council request the Housing Accommodation Committee to reconsider the matter of rent increases on the Emergency Shelters. Motion passed.

### CITY MANAGER FLAN

His Worship the Mayor: "Mr. Barrow is here to appear before the Council. It was the intention that Council should meet as a Committee of the Whole to discuss the matter with them. Charter, as that Hection is enacted by Section 42 of Chapter 77 of the Acts of 1948, it is enacted that the City shall have full power and authority to borrow and raise by way of loan from time to time on the credit of the City such sum or sums as the City Council, at the request of the Directors of Joint Pleasant Park, deems necessary for defraying any capital expenditures in Point Pleasant Park and any sums required for such purpose shall be deemed to be sums required for a City purpose within the meaning of the Municipal Affairs Act.

AND WHEREAS the Directors of Point Pleasant Park have requested the City Council to provide a sum not exceeding Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) for the purpose of an addition to the Park-keeper's Lodge.

AND WHEREAS the City Council has agreed to provide the necessary capital expenditure, subject to the approval of the Hinister of Municipal Affairs.

AND WHENEAS by said section 8 of Chapter 6 of the Acts of the Province of Nova Scotia, 1945, The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that no money shall be borrowed until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

AND WHEREAS by said The Municipal Affairs Act the said sum shall in the discretion of the City Council be

at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to such an amount as such Council deems necessary to raise such sum.

NOW BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that under and by virtue of Section 671A of the Halifax City Charter and the said The Hunicipal Affairs Act the said City do, subject to the approval of the Hinister of Hunicipal Affairs, borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the City the said sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) for the purpose aforesaid.

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act the said sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to the said amount of Nine Thousand Dollars (29,000.00).

WHEREAS the action of the authorities of the Government of Canada in promititing the use of the Airport at Eastern Passage, Nova Scotia, for large modern airplanes of the type used on truns-Atlantic Foutes and on trunk lines in Canada as well as large air-planes of the Department of National Defence and those of other Atlantic Nations, is viewed with much apprehension and concern by the City Council of the City of Halifax as well as by many well-informed citizens of this City and Province.

AND WHEREAS the effect of this action is to remove this City and Province from the International air routes, with the resultant adverse effect upon the trade of this portion of Canada and the creation of economic hardships for the citizens of this City and Province.

abandonment of the said airport as a first-class defence base will obviously weaken the protection required by the port facilities of Halifax Harbour which has unquestionably proved to be a most valuable asset in times of war for the embarking of troops, assembling of convoys, nandling essential trans-Atlantic air traffic and ocean air patrols.

AND WHEREAS it is essential for the protection of Canada that these Eastern Gates of Canada should be at all times open for use and not be left undefended.

AND WHEREAS it is urged that if the present airport is inadequate to accommodate all types of air planes at all times, it is the duty of the Government of Canada for the protection not only of its citizens in this City and Province but of the rest of Canada without delay to so improve the said airport that it will be adequate for all purposes of national defence and to make such improvements as quickly as possible in order that the same will be properly completed before any sudden emergency arises.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this City Council of the City of Halifax do protest the action of the Government of Canada in reducing the use of the said airport and demand that immediate action be taken to so improve the said airport in order to make the same completely adequate for all purposes of national defence.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED if, as a matter of policy, the use of the said airport should be restricted solely to aircraft of the Department of National Defence and be used exclusively for purposes of National Defence, that in order to enable this portion of Canada to participate in world trade and aerial communications and to prevent great economic loss and hardship to the citizens of this City and Province, this Council of the City of Halifax demands that the Government of Canada without delay proceed to establish an additional airport to serve this area, of sufficient size and with adequate facilities to service airplanes of every type, and to make such arrangements as may be necessary for the clearance here of airplanes on International routes.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to -

- (1) The Prime Minister of Canada and to each Member of the Government of Canada.
- (2) To each Member of Parliament representing Nova Scotia.

- (3) To the Premier of the Province of Nova Scotia and to each Nember of the Government of Nova Scotia.
- (4) To each Member of the Legislature of Nova Scotia.
- (5) To the Board of Trade of the City of Halifax.

A meeting of the City Council was held on the above date.

After the meeting was called to order by the Chairman and before considering the regular order of business, the members of Council attending led by the City Clerk joined in repeating the Lord's Prayer.

There were present His Worship the Mayor Chairman; Aldermen DeWolf, Moriarty, Hosterman, Abbott, MacDonald, Fox, Duffy and Vaugnan.

The meeting was called specially to consider the City Manager Plan.

#### RESOLUTION

The following resolution was submitted and read by Alderman Hosterman:

WHEREAS this Council at a Meeting thereof held on the 16th day of February, 1950, approved of the holding of a plebescite of the electors of the City under the City of Halifax Plebescite Act in the month of October, 1950, upon the adoption of the City-Manager plan of government for the City;

AND WHEREAS in order to comply with the provisions of the City of Halifax Plebescite Act which requires an affirmative Vote of the Council on any question to be submitted to a plebescite, before such matter can be so submitted, it is necessary for the Council to approve of the adoption by the City of such Plan;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Council, in order to comply with the said Statutory requirement and in order to give the electors the opportunity of expressing their views in the matter by plebescite, hereby approves and authorizes the adoption by the City of the Council-Manager form of government for the City.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that legislation be submitted to the next session of the Legislature to authorize the adoption by the City of such plan.

Moved by Alderman Hosterman, seconded by Alderman MacDonald that the resolution be approved.

Alderman Vaughan: "This matter of a resolution comes somewhat as a surprise. I do read in it that the City of Halifax, upon the adoption of this resolution, will accept and put into use the Council Manager form of government. That expression is one that has been thrown about Halifax the last few years. It is a term to which I object. A City Manager would be appointed to work under the direction of Council, to be a co-ordinator of City Hall activities under the direction of the Mayor. The Council Manager form of government in the United States is an entirely different proposition. We have had some literature given to us and I have read them. In many places, shown to us as examples of City Manager form of government, I find these places are only 20,000 in population. In some cases he is the only official. He looks after the lock-up, issues licenses, etc. Lethbridge is listed as having a City Manager. It has 23,000 population, but they also own and operate water utility, transportation and the telephone. Under those conditions it would be wise to have a manager to operate those utilities. In appointing a City Manager we are merely adding to our list of officials another person who is going to be an added burden upon the taxpayers. I do object to the way this thing has been brought about. It has been used in some cases as an election appeal to catch votes for certain persons. It has not been accepted by the people. A certain section of the press in this province is urging upon us that this type of official be used. I don't find any clamor among the people for it. I would like to see just exactly what his duties are going to be before I vote on it. If we accept this resolution here tonight, we are accepting the pure form as advocated by the

National Municipal League. I would oppose that. They have elected a large number of officials in the United States. It is the practice to run elections on party lines. They also have candidates for various offices from Mayor to Dogoatcher on the ballot. They have Assessor on it too. If he were a weak character he would be swayed by the fact that in order to retain his office he might go easy on the assessment. To my mind there is more to be said about this matter of City Manager. I would not like to see this matter finalized tonight. If I have to vote in order to get this to a plebescite, it shows I am in favor of a City Manager.

Alderman Hosterman: "I would be very happy to move this resolution, having in mind the submission made to us by the Civic Affairs Committee. It is very fair to my mind. I cannot see how there can be any conflict in any way, shape or form with the present Council and Office of Mayor. I would like to advise Alderman Vaugnan that the matter that was before Council was one that was submitted by a former Mayor and Alderman, and it was an entirely different proposition from this. I can't see a thing in this at all but benefit for the Corporation. For that reason and that reason only, I moved the resolution."

Alderman DeWolf: "Is this to be a final meeting to decide whether or not the plebescite is to be held? I understood that there would be a series of meetings on which the taxpayers might want to speak on City Manager. I would like to know the specific duties of the City "anager. I am not ready tonight to vote for this resolution. I would like to know what is to be done by the City Manager. I would not like to see a Manager appointed who is going to carry on all the duties, because no one man can do it. It is going to take a staff of 3,4 or 5. I can see a great value in a co-ordinator. It is of immence importance that we have a co-ordinator of Departments. I am not ready tonight to vote for this. If this is unanimous, I don't see the necessity of holding a plebescite."

Alderman Moriarty: "I very much agree with the remarks of my collegue Alderman Dewolf. A co-ordinator would be along the lines of an Assistant to the Mayor. If the Mayor is unable to cope with the situation due to the volume which he would be called upon to handle, and if he were given assistance in the form of a co-ordinator, it would be much more economical and perhaps would show better results and still maintain the Council status of administration."

Alderman Fox: "This resolution looks like a good one. It is giving the citizens of Halifax a right to choose what form of government they want."

Alderman MacDonald: "The submission made by the Committee is a very fair one indeed. I think the matter should come before the citizens of Halifax for final decision on it. I do think it needs a considerable amount of study by the Council and the Citizens of Halifax before a final decision is made."

Alderman Abbott: "In February I went along with the rest of the Council to hold a plebescite on this matter, but I was under the impression that the onus would be on the general public. If we accept this tonight, the Council is goint on record as supporting the City Manager form of government. I don't feel that I should be asked to vote on this particular resolution tongith as Alderman DeWolf has already pointed out, if we vote on this I don't see much need in holding a plebescite. I understood when this came before the Council the plebescite would be neld and the people decide. I would not want to go on record tonight as voting for or against the City Manager."

7:50 P. M. Alderman Moriarty assumes the Chair while His Worship the Mayor addresses the Council as follows:

"I think the Civic Government tonight is in a very unique situation. As you know before the end of the last Government year we were approached by a delegation from the

Halifax Civic Committee of the Board of Trade to fall in with their wishes that we would test public opinion in respect to a change in the form of Civic Government. I quite agree with you that the term they used, and what we expected to gain, was very vague even though we have books on it. Council supported me in the idea that we would hold a plebescite if and when certain matters were arranged. Rather than throw it into the Civic Elections, it was deferred until October this year presuming it would come to Council and that we would have something to tell the people. We are in a peculiar situation because this plebescite is to be held under a special act of this City written into the Charter called the Halifax Plebescite Act. It developed upon this Council to affirm it before it can go on the ballot. I would be safe if I were an Alderman to vote 'yes' tonight, to get it on the ballot. I think that is the issue we have here tonight. If you want to, you can take the buttons off and attack it any way you wish. If they have something for the betterment of this City, then I will give the citizens the benefit of what they have to offer. You are being asked to affirm a question that may be put on a ballot. We are going to ask the citizens of Halifax to say 'yes' or 'no'. You are not bound until the time the plebescite is taken. You can go out individually or in a body and vote against it. Let the citizens place thier approval or disapproval on what is being asked here tonight. \*

8 P. M. His Worship the Mayor resumes the Chair.

Alderman Duffy: "I haven't had time to study this brief. I don't think it outlines the duties of the City Manager clear enough to vote on it. The City I visited in the West has a City Manager. They have lights, buses, water and phone. The Mayor is only a part time man. It would require a man to give full time for all those utilities, therefore, I feel as though I could not vote for it tonight until I get further study."

Alderman Vaughan: "I am a little fearful if the people vote 'yes' believing they are going to get a co-ordinator. I am just wondering if someone cannot carry the matter to the Court because I believe it is in the Charter that the Council must act on the plebescite results and give the people what they voted for."

City Solicitor: "That is the affect of it. The legislation will authorize the Council to appoint this individual and define his duties. It will come tack to the Council. There will be some other amendments in the Charter necessary to integrate his authority with the other officials of the City. The duties of this official will be laid down by Ordinance. Comes back under the legislation to enact the details that are not here. That is the way I would view it. The Council will have the final say as to the duties and powers."

Alderman Vaugnan: "I believe the legislation should be drafted now so we can have a chance to discuss it. Why have a question submitted to the people and pick it to pieces after. Cleveland after ten years threw it out and returned to the Council and Committee administration. In Cleveland, the newspaper was responsible for bringing this form of Government into effect in that City. It was the press that exposed the corruption in the Council under the Manager-form of government. If you think you are going to do away with corruption, if it exists in the city, you will be sadly mistaken.

Reading on the life of Abraham Lincoln, he is quoted as having made a speech in which there is a phrase which is suitable for all occasions and it reads, 'This too shall pass away'. I am thinking perhaps in some future day this Council and form of Government shall pass away because of the indolence and lack of interest by the people. I wonder if this form of Government shall pass away because the people will vote on a matter that is not clearly defined and that is the thing I am most fearful of tonight.

I am not opposed to some matters proposed by the Civic Affairs Committee of the Board of Trade. I am opposed to the pure form as laid down by the National Municipal League.

His Worship the Edyor: "I had this resolution framed and drawn by the Solicitor to cover a situation which I would expect you all who occupy the same position as I do that the soundness of our Government today is such to give us courage, to allow any question to be put to the people. That is the Democratic principle. I would like to see Council clear it, then we will have open forum discussions on it. The quicker it is developed, the longer the time you will have to work for or against it. On a discussion for and against, this Government has nothing to fear, but at the same time the citizens will have a chance to have their say and to tell us if they are satisfied. Surely if they are not satisfied with what we are doing, we should not be here. Either leave the resolution stand open and have the open forums, or the Council adopt the resolution and throw that into the open forum and let the people come in and have their say."

Alderman Vauphan: "From your remarks one would be led to believe that some Alderman are opposed to this going to the public. I for one will stand benind them in any move they make. This question should be worded in such a manner that they can exercise their franchise in a good manner. If this is adopted here tonight, we can only say we are going to accept the pure form of Government in the United States."

City Bolicitor: \*Inere are many varieties of the Council-Manager form of Government as you can think of depending upon the municipality after it has power to appoint one.\*

The City Solicitor quoted sections from the City of Victoria Act.

City Solicitor: 'That is called a Municipal Manager or a City Manager; that is one type. I am quite sure there are other types that go to a greater extreme where the Manager will

act on his own without consultation of Council. I believe you can get almost as many varieties as Mr. Heinz uses in his products.\*

Alderman Hosterman: "If the plecescite goes to the people, the Council has the power to set the duties of this particular official."

City Solicitor: "That is right."

His Worship the Mayor: "My first concern is to get a resolution into Council that could be debated. I thought this debate could be confined to Council and then it would be thrown out to the public. If the Council desires we will allow the resolution to stand and we will consider this the first of a public forum, and after several forums it will be put to the Council for a vote."

Alderman DeWolf: "May I ask how long ago did the City of Victoria pass their's?"

City Bolicitor: #1948 Statute. #

Alderman DeWolf: "They have not been able to get a Manager as yet."

His Worship the Mayor: "I don't know. "

Alderman DeWolf: "I think Chatham had three managers in two years or two managers in three years. That is bad. If you strike the right man, I think it would be wonderful, but if you strike the wrong man, it would be terrible."

His Worship the Mayor: "I would rather that we ride along and have open discussions on it and leave the resolution stand, and after hearing the submissions then if the Council votes against it, it will be finished."

Mr. A. I. Barrow: \*Due to the peculiar wording of the Plebescite Act, it is necessary to get the consent of Council before this matter can be put before the public by plebescites. It was not our intention to embarrass the Aldermen at all. You are now suggesting that the matter be thrown open for public forums. It would appear that you want to know what the public thinks before

the Aldermen make up their minds. I think that is the wrong way to go about it. The Aldermen have neard enough about the Manager form of Government and I don't think the matter of details is our discussion tonight. We are concerned more with principles and the principles were outlined in that brief. The principles definitely were that the Manager was concerned with the Administrative work of the City of Halifax and not with policy making. The council is the policy maker for the City and the Manager would be the person who would co-ordinate the various departments of the City and so affect a more economical and efficient administration of the City as a whole.

It was then decided that the first public hearing will be held at this time.

Mr. A. C. Campbell addressed the Council on the proposed resolution and stated that he was opposed to the substitution of the Mayor Council form of Government for the Council Manager system. He said he did not see anything new in the brief submitted by the Civic Affairs Committee of the Board of Trade. It was only a rehash and the phamphlets were merely propaganda put out on behalf of the City Manager form of Government. He said he saw the same old arguments and references. In Winnipeg 25 years ago there was the same agitation for a City Manager. He could not find anything wrong with the present form of Government unless it was administration. He stressed the fact that the City Manager Plan originated in the United States because of corruption. If there were any place in the Pominion where corruption might be found, it probably would be in Quetec. He referred to some Cities that compared to Halifax in population and mentioned \*indsor. London, Calgary and Edmonton and said he had done business with them all and that he had not seen any corruption or any necessity to depart from the Mayor Council form of Government. We should be proud of our Department Heads. The proposed Manager would be a financier, engineer, accountant, assessor and possibly a solicitor. If such

s man were available it was his gues: that he would be paid \$20,000.00 a year. A suite of offices would also be necessary and employees. He hoped he would have an opportunity to prepare a brief when hearings are being held.

Mr. McVittle also addressed Council and asked if the prief as submitted by the Civic Affairs Committee, presented nothing but propaganda from an American organization. He referred to a reference made by Ar. Campbell that there was corruption in Quebec; surely not because 33 in Quebec have the City Manager plan that there is corruption. There were far sighted cities in Quebec that want to get rid of the corruption. He said he strongly disapproved of the word "corruption", and that the Civic Affairs Committee did not augrest, hint or imply that there is coruption in the City of Halifax. What the Civic Affairs Committee proposes is that certain principles be applied to the operation of Government in this City adapted to this City's circumstances. The Manager would operate under the direction of the entire Council and would be responsible to Council. The details and duties of the Manager would be discussed and settled upon when Charter revisions are being considered. The Council would set the duties by Charter or Ordinance. Chatham has had 3 Managers in 27 years replying to Alderman DeWolf's question. long as Council is burdened with duties of administrative detail adequate time and attention cannot be devoted to matters of long term policy, and that the resolution before Council does not say that Council approves the adoption of the City Manager Plan. He said the Civic Affairs Committee was not bringing any pressure to bear on the Aldermen.

Moved by Alderman Fox, seconded by Alderman MacDonald that the motion be now put.

Moved in amendment by Alderman DeWolf, seconded by Alderman Vaughan that the matter be deferred and public hearings held for those who wish to discuss it with whatever data for or against.

The amendment was put and passed, 5 voting for the same and 3 against it as follows:

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the official street lines of the said Lane between Connaught Avenue and Westmount

Subdivision, opposite the west terminus of London Street so laid down be so indicated on the Official Plan of the City and on the copy thereof filed in the office of the Registrar of Deeds at Halifax, Nova Scotia;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in accordance with the provisions of Section 549 of the City Charter the Commissioner of Works do forthwith set up adequate bounds or monuments to mark the said official street lines and make a record of the date of the setting up of such bounds or monuments and the location and nature of the same.

Mr. L. W. Fraser appeared before Council on behalf of his client Mr. Gordon Gladwin and stated that the request was to exclude this property from the Residential Area as Mr. Gladwin intended to put up a modern automobile showroom and service station. While this lot is presently residential it has been

substantially used for Commercial purposes for years. There are old buildings on the lot of inferior construction and appearance and there is a retail fish store there. At this corner there are no residences in front of this lot on Chebucto Road and to the westward there is a large boulevard and the houses are to the north of this lot. Chebucto Road has already become a business street. A block away we have another service station and garage. The assessments on this lot will naturally be increased. What Mr. Gladwin would like is to remove this lot from the residential zone and that he be given a permit to build as legislative authority has already been approved.

address the Council was Mr. R. W. Deal: "I am living right in the back of that and the gentleman behind me is building a new home" and we will be completely hemmed in. There is a petition there from the people in that area. We would not want it to turn out like the one at the corner of Elm and Quinpool Road where you look at cars all day. It increases the hazard to children. When the man was going to build his new home he did not know about this. Several other names that appear on the petition, if they were here, would side in with me and oppose it very strongly."

Alderman Dewolf: "While this is a residential area I don't know whether this gentleman understands that this fish store can stay there for 50 years if the present owner wants to leave it there. I would like to ask him if he would rather have a new modern building there or this old one. If it is there for another 50 years it is not going to enhance the neighborhood. We cannot dictate to the owner. The City can't do anything about it. If it is so dilapidated the Building Inspector can order that it be torn down. I would say to myself if I were living there, would I sooner see a modern building or would I sooner see this building there."

Mr. Deal: "It would look worse living behind a stone wall."

Mr. Ford: "I live on Connaught Avenue being the first house on the West side. I am not sure whether this property under discussion is the strip this fish store is occupying or whether it is the land to the south or both. You have a service station about 12 blocks to the east and this new one of the Halifax Motors a couple blocks to the west. Is it necessary to put another one in? I would consider it a bit of overcrowding. That would increase the amount of traffic around that corner. My boy was involved in an accident on that corner but I would not say it was due to the amount of traffic. In that area there are a great number of children and in the Westmount also. I feel the value of the property will remain up just as well with the fish store there. I think the time will come when that corner will be built up with nice homes rather than a service station. I would like to see that property within the residential area so that someone could build there. I think you need a lot of property for housing. I think you are limited in that respect. There are enough service stations in the City now. #

Mr. Nash: "I have a building under construction which is in the back of that lot. Had I known a brick wall was going to be put up there I would not have bought it. I am putting up a modern six room home right in the back."

Alderman Vaughan: "Would Mr. Fraser give us the size of the lot to be used."

Mr. Fraser: \*On Connaught Avenue the frontage is 120 feet and on Chebucto Road 151 feet.\*

Alderman DeWolf to Mr. Fraser: \*Do you know if it is the intention of the owner to put the building back of the line of the old building?\*

Mr. Fraser: "The proposed distance of the new garage

from Chebucto Road is 50 feet back and 30 feet in from Connaught Avenue."

Alderman Moriarty: "I would like to ask the Engineer if it is the intention to carry the plan of the proposed boulevard that would start about at this spot as Mr. Dumaresq had it set up?"

Mr. Woods: "There is nothing planned this year."

Alderman Breen: "If there is an anticipated boulevard,
I think we should assure ourselves that after something is built
there that we will not have to buy some land for street widening."

Alderman MacDonald: "There seems to be a lot of opposition from residents in that area; Connaught Avenue east and west. I think the wishes of the residents in that area should be recognized. They built their homes in good faith not expecting to see a service station there."

Alderman Breen: "Would it inconvenience Mr. Fraser's client if this were deferred for a week or so as I would like to find out about street lines. In the past we have paid quite dearly for mistakes. We should know what the plans are respecting the official street lines."

Mr. Fraser: "Sidewalks are now being put on Connaught Avenue up to Chebucto Road. The only disadvantage that my client may have is that the property is under option and it will expire."

Moved by Alderman Breen, seconded by Alderman DeWolf that this matter be referred to the Committee on Works for a public hearing and the settling of the official street lines. Motion passed.

Mr. Jacobson: "If a service station went in they would have to tear the new sidewalk up. The Halifax Motors garage was mentioned by Mr. Fraser. I would say that they were included in the Master Plan."

Alderman DeWolf to Mr. Jacobson: "Would the owners prefer the service station or the fish store?"

Mr. Jacobson: "We would rather see the fish store. The traffic will be many times heavier if the station goes up. It is going against the City Zoning By-Law."

The notice advised that persons wishing to be heard in connection with this application, will be given an opportunity to express their views.

A petition was submitted containing the names of 25 persons who consented to the erection of this store.

A petition was also submitted containing the names of 21 persons who objected to the erection of this store.

Messrs. Seeley and Butler expressed themselves as being against the proposed store as the area had been zoned as residential.

Mr. Black representing the proposed store owner addressed the Council as follows: "An attempt was made to get an extension of the option but it was not successful. My client went ahead and purchased the property in the hope that the application to erect a building which will be a dwelling house with apartments upstairs and a soda fountain and confectionery store below."

Mr. Black submitted a copy of a map showing the area and the location of the proposed store for the information of the members of Council.

Mr. Black continued: "There was a petition on file at the previous meeting to oppose the granting of this permit. Since the last meeting I myself and others have gone around to the various residents of Chebucto Road in that vicinity and the reaction was not at all unfavourable. There was some talk that this person was going to erect a bakery and quite naturally the residents would be opposed to that. The value of this building will be \$15,000.00. The plan shows the site. The lot is surrounded by Commercial property. You have immediately opposite Simpson's, Helis Service Station and a proposed warehouse is going to be erected. Chebucto Road is becoming Commercial. The petition in favor has more than 20 names on it. A great many people said it did not matter to them. In other words they are not opposed. If the property is put up there will be considerable revenue accruing to the City. I would ask the Council to take account of these reasons for granting this permit. There is one person who is going to suffer no matter what is put there. That is Mr. Butler. He tried to obtain this lot for years. "

Mr. O'Toole: "I am one of the persons who has built on Roosevelt Drive. We are given to understand that that is a residential district out there. We have plenty of shops on Chebucto Road. This man states it is to be a soda fountain. That opens it up to the restaurant class. That means garbage cans at the back doors. We want to retain it as a residential district. Our property will go down in value. The petition we presented was signed by tax payers. We want it retained as a residential district."

Mr. Butler: "The petition we presented are property owners on Chebucto Road and Roosevelt Drive."

Alderman Moriarty: "I have before me the petition for and against it. The strongest objection are the people living on Chebucto Road. 90% of those in favor are on Joseph Street. In fairness to the residents some consideration should be given to

the people there. I have no objection to the erection of this proposed store but I have consideration for the people that live in the immediate vicinity.

Alderman MacDonald: "There is no other commercial property in this block on Chebucto Road. I still think the wishes of the residents should be respected."

Moved by Alderman Vaughan, seconded by Alderman HacDonald that the lot at the Corner of Roosevelt Drive and Chebucto Road remain in the Residential Area and that the request for a store at that site be denied.

Mr. Macnab: "This matter came up by resolution passed last November appointing Mr. Egan and myself a committee to inventigate certain matters. We did make a study of the proposal to transfer the assets and after investigating the figures we came to the conclusion that the Public Service Commission could pay to the City a total of \$4,501,000.00 in round figures. At the present time there is outstanding against the plant of the water system a total or \$3,905,692.00 against which there are Pinking Funds and Interest Earnings of \$912,039.00 leaving a net debt of \$2,993,000.00. It is proposed out of the \$4,501,000.00 issue that the amount of \$2,889,500.00 can be set aside which will provide for all the cutstanding issues of the City approximately \$1,611,500.00 in cash. All of these figures would be subject to final audit at the date of the transfer as to interest earnings, etc. Briefly that is the picture. It will be understood of course that even if the transfer takes place, the water system will still be a corporate entity of which the City is the sole owner. Whatever profits accrue annually will still come to the City. The principle advantage in doing this is that financing as a public utility on a water system you can finance over a much longer period of time than you can under municipal financing."

Alderman Breen: "Would you explain about the replacements of the water mains and how they will be handled and the

anticipated borrowings over the next five years?\*

Mr. Machab: "Up until the present time all the improvements have been paid for out of earnings. There are no conds in connection with deferred maintenance. The \$403,000.00 has all been paid out of earnings. We do not plan to capitalize except where we plan to put in larger mains. We capitalize only improvements and betterments."

Our idea in acquiring this property is that it be operated by the Park with the same tone as Point Pleasant. I think I can guarantee that with this area under the control of the Park Commission, you would have a place that would be a joy to thousands of Haligonians as you see on a summer day now. It would give them a place in the sun and in the water. I know it will be suggested that the area is needed for building purposes. You can build I suppose 20 or 30 houses there. As a park it would provide a joy for thousands of people not only in summer but in winter.

The resolution merely suggests that a Committee be appointed and I imagine the procedure would be to interview the owner and secure an option and come back to Council for approval. This Committee should be appointed as early as possible to get it underway.

Alderman Vaughan: "I spoke on this matter many times in the past and I think my views are well known by now. By my remarks I might be accused of secularism and not wanting the people in one section of the City to benefit by additional park area. I assure you that is not the case. I do feel that at the present time our park areas that we have are not being developed as well as they could be if we had the funds. I know of one park and that is the McDonald and Flynn Park. I don't think \$1,000.00 was spent on it in the last ten years.

I do feel that we should know what price is going on the property.

I am willing to go along and have the Committee appointed to get a price."

#### ORDINANCE

Respecting the control of public address systems, gramophones, radios or other amplifying apparatus.

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Halifax as follows:

- cause or permit to be operated any public address system, gramophone, radio or other device or apparatus for reproducing or amplifying sound, the sounds reproduced or amplified by which are
  capable of being heard on any street or public place in the City,
  without having first received a permit therefor from the Chief
  of Police of the City of Halifax or from the City Council of
  the said City as hereinafter provided.
- 2. Such permit may be granted upon such terms and conditions as may be imposed by the Chief of Police and may regulate

the hours of operation of such apparatus or devices and the volume of sound to be produced by the same and may be refused if the Chief of Police shall be of the opinion that the operation of such apparatus or device unduly disturbs the peace and tranquility of the neighborhood in which the same is proposed to be operated.

- 3. Any permit so granted may be cancelled by the Chief of Police at any time if he shall be of the opinion that the operation of the apparatus or device covered by the said permit violates the terms and conditions attached to such permit or unduly disturbs the peace and tranquility of the portion of the City in which the same is operated.
- cause or permit to be operated any public address system, gramophone, radio or other apparatus or device for reproducing or
  amplifying sound, the sounds reproduced or amplified by which are
  capable of being heard on any street or public place in the City,
  between the hours of 10 c'clock in the evening and 10 o'clock in
  the morning; provided however, that this section shall not apply
  to Police of the City of Hallfax when using any such apparatus or
  device in the execution of their duties.
- 5. (a) Any person who has been refused a permit under this Ordinance by the Chief of Police, or whose permit has been cancelled by the Chief of Police, may appeal to the Council from such refusal or cancellation and the Council may grant or restore such permit or may confirm the action of the Chief of Police.
- (b) If the Council shall decide to grant or restore any such permit, it may provide such terms and conditions in respect thereto as it may determine.
- 6. For the purpose of this Ordinance a public address system means any system of loudspeakers, amplifiers, microphones or reproducers or combination of such equipment, used in the reproducting or amplification of music, speech or other sounds, when used for communications to or otherwise addressing or enter-

taining groups of people, whether the same is mounted upon a vehicle or upon a building or other structure or upon the ground.

Any person who in the City of Halifax operates or causes or permits to be operated any public address system, gramo-phone, radio or other device or apparatus for reproducing or amplifying sound as herein set out without having a permit therefor which is in force or who violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment for a period not exceeding sixty days.

Hoved by Alderman Breen, seconded by Alderman Adams that the Ordinance as set out above be read and passed a first time and referred to the Finance and Executive Committee. Motion passed.

## AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE #26 "COMMON LOTS" FIRST READING

Halifax, N. S., June 13, 1950.

## ORDINANCE 10 A

## RESPECTING THE GRAND PARADE

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor and City Council as follows:-

1. No person shall put or leave standing in the Grand Parade in the City of Halifax, any vehicle whether attended or unattended, unless such person has first obtained permission in writing therefor from the Committee on Works.

- 2. The Committee on Works may grant permission to any person or persons to place vehicles in the Grand Parade aforesaid, upon such terms and conditions and at such time as the Committee shall from time to time determine.
- 3. Any person who parks or leaves standing in the Grand Parade aforesaid, any vehicle whether the same is attended or unattended in violation of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment for a period not exceeding ten days.

Moved by Alderman Breen, seconded by Alderman Adams that the report be approved and the Ordinance as set out above read and passed a first time.

Alderman Fox: "I am definitely opposed to it. It is definitely class legislation. The Mayor has had the privilege for the past 40 years."

His Worship the Mayor: "It has been used as a parking place."

Alderman Fox: "I don't consider it reasonable where a Committee can allow who they like to park there. It is class."

Moved in amendment by Alderman Fox that this Ordinance be set aside.

There was no seconder to this amendment.
