Subject: Modification of Sideyard - Civic #12 Westmount Street.

An application has been received from the owners of a property at Civic No. 12 Westmount Street for modification of sideyard requirements to permit the conversion of a single-family dwelling at that address to a duplex dwelling. If approved, it is proposed to erect a single-storey addition at the rear measuring 14 feet 6 inches by 22 feet 5 inches. This property is located on the west side of Westmount Street between Flinn Street and Chebucto Road and is in an R2 Zone. The lot measures 33 by 100 feet which is 1,700 square feet less area than that currently required by the Zoning By-Law. Under Part V, Para 3, Note 3, this shortage can be waived by the Inspector of Buildings, subject to the other requirements of the By-Law.

There is a 9 foot driveway on the south side of the building leading to the rear yard. This yerd has not yet been developed for parking but could accommodate at least two vehicles. The sideyard on the north side, however, measures only 2 feet and there is only 4 feet between Civic No. 12 Westmount Street and Civic No. 14 Westmount Street. The sideyard on this side is therefore, 4 feet less than that required in the Zoning By-Law.

The proposal would further increase the site coverage on a lot and adjoining properties.

I RECOMMEND therefore, that this Board refer a report of refusal to City Council in accordance with Part XV, Para 1 (f) of the Zoning By-Law.

Moved by Alderman Trainor, seconded by Alderman Ferguson, that the matter be referred back to the Town Planning Board for further consideration.

Alderman Trainor: "I had a call from the owner of that property and he is not too happy about the situation. We may be perfectly right by refuging but he states that it was over two months before he had some inkling that he was going to be refused. I think two months is too long. He had no life that it was going to be heard at the Town Planning Board. He has yet to know the official verdict of the Board. I think it only fair that it be referred back to the Board."

His Worship the Mayor: "None of the matters referred to weigh upon the merits of the case. The matter of delay is not good and should not be telerated by the administration. I wonder if Council wants to refer it back to the Board unless it is for additional information."

His Worship the Mayor stated that the Board had unanimously recommended the report to Council.

Alderman Dunlop: "I would think that if we send it back in the face of a unanimous report, we would be expressing our non-confidence in the Town Planning Board". He said there were many lots with a 33 foot frontage and if this request were granted, it would set a precedent.

Alderman Trainor: "I understand the Building Inspector could have, under the Town Planning Act, granted a permit for this individual to extend this property under a certain section dealing with 33 foot lots".

At the request of Alderman Trainor, the City Solicitor read Part V, Note 3 of the Zoning By-Law for the information of Council as follows:

Section, situated upon a lot having a width of not less than 33 feet and an area less than 5000 sq. ft., but not less than 3300 sq. ft., may, with the approval of the Inspector of Buildings, and subject as hereinafter provided. be converted into a duplex dwelling. No such approval shall be given calleds separately accessible accommodation is provided upon the lot upon which such building is situated for the storage of motor passenger vehicles consisting of one parking space at least 9 x 20 feet of separately accessible storage space for each of the two dwelling units exclusive of the area of the front yard and entrance or driveway leading to such duplex dwelling.

Alderman Lloyd: "Sending the matter back to the Committee, is not a question of the competence of the Committee at all. It is purely a case of bending
over backwards to give the citizen an opportunity to be heard. In this instance, there is no loss to the City except the time of the Committee to hear
the applicant. We are merely responding to the applicant's request to have the
Committee review the application".

Alderman Fox: "I feel the same way about it".

Alderman O'Brien: "I have had calls from the owner. I am going to vote

have in the Town Planning Board. However, I would like to see the Town Planning Board find the answers to the other allegations about lack of information. It may be that our procedures aren't right. It may be that they are 100 per centright on this matter, but I would like to see those considered even though I don't support the referral back."

Alderman Trainor: "Whether this goes back to the Town Planning Board or not, I would first like the City Manager to bring in to the next Town Planning Board Meeting the exact date of application by this individual so that my information is correct. Secondly, I would like to know how many building permits have been issued under similar circumstances within the last two years, because I think there have been quite a few. Either this is a good law and we should not have to deal with it at the Town Planning Board and should be left to the discretion of the Building Inspector and the Town Planning Engineer, or maybe it is a bad law and we should remove it from the books and take it out of their hands. It is not for us to decide this evening."

His Worship the Mayor: "Consideration is given to the application only when the permit fee is paid. In this case, the permit fee was paid on September 15th of this year. I think if you refer this to the Town Planning Board and you ask for information on how many other similar circumstances there are, I don't think you can take a statistical report in this case at all because each one is treated individually on its merits. Your question would include all those in it and the assumption that would be gained by the people who read a report of it in the Press would think that here we are being unfair to one particular person while we grant permits to others all over the City. We can't just reduce this to a question of a mass of figures."

Alderman Trainor: "Not at all. I disagree with you there. I want it for my own information. I have one particular case in mind where I think a building permit was granted under this Section of the Town Planning Act.

Personally, in my way of thinking it was the most hideous development of a house that could possibly have taken place. It ruined a perfectly good building lot.

I think it was granted in an R-2 district, but the district it was constructed

in was basically R-1. For seven doors either side and across the street for possibly twenty doors I don't know of any duplex occupancies of those houses. Yet again, this one that I am referring to was granted a few years back. I think the number is 54 or 56 Dublin Street.

His Worship the Mayor: "With respect to this information you request, will you clarify it as the number of permits that were issued by the Building Inspector without reference to the Town Planning Board."

Alderman Trainor: "That is right; and, also, have a review of this Section of the Town Planning Act. I think we should have a hard look at it."

Alderman Greenwood: "I would like to see it go back to the Town Planning Board simply because I would like to investigate the charges that this individual did not have an opportunity to appear in person. Sometimes when a person appears or a solicitor appears for him, you find out things that aren't apparent otherwise. I think the Town Planning Board is wise in its decision, but there may be some evidence. I think we should make sure that our procedures are that people are notified that there is to be a hearing. If that wasn't done in this case, then we have done an injustice."

The motion was put and passed with Alderman O'Brien wishing to be recorded against.

Subject: Acquisition of land for Street Purposes - Pinewood Acres Subdivision Extension - Dutch Village Road.

Plan No. SS-4-14579 has been prepared and shows the land required by the City of Halifax for the eventual widening on the eastern side of Dutch Village Road adjoining the Pinewood Acres Subdivision Extension.

We offered the owner of the land required an amount of compensation of 10¢ per sq. ft., which is the same as agreed upon in the original Pinewood Acres Subdivision adjoining to the southward. They are prepared to accept this amount which would, at the rate of 10¢ per sq. ft., amount to \$2,727.50, made up of two parcels having respective areas of 17,750 and 9,525 sq. ft.

When preparing the plan we noted a very small triangular piece of land not required for street purposes and this in turn would be conveyed by the City to the Subdivider. The area of this land is only 350 sq. ft. and at the rate of 10¢ per sq. ft., would amount to \$35.00.

It is therefore recommended that authority be given to acquire the necessary land and to convey the land not needed for street purposes.

Alderman Greenwood: "When this was before the Committee on Works the matter of the problem of getting children from this area to the schools was discussed. I think you and Mr. DeBard agreed that you would look into the matter."

His Worship the Mayor said the report was not available, but would be presented at a future meeting of the Committee.

Moved by Alderman Trainor, seconded by Alderman Macdonald, that two parcels of land adjoining the Pinewood Acres Subdivision Extension having respective areas of 17,750 sq. ft. and 9,525 sq. ft. be purchased for the sum of \$2,727.50 for the purpose of widening Dutch Village Road.

Alderman Butler: "Was this not a subdivision that was quite recently subdivided and do I infer that we may have erred in not seeing that this was laid out in such a way that we would not have to acquire land?"

City Manager: "No. This is on the edge of the Dutch Village Road. We are trying to get on our side 50 feet from the centre line of the road. We are asking the Province to do the same so that the road may be straightened out."

Alderman Wyman said that in approving the subdivision in the first instance

there was a condition in the approval that this land would be made available.

The motion was then put and passed.

Moved by Alderman Macdonald, seconded by Alderman Lane, that a triangular piece of land measuring 350 sq. ft. be conveyed to the subdivider of the Pinewood Acres Subdivision Extension for the sum of \$35.00. Motion passed.

## SEWER EXTENSION - DUICH VILLAGE ROAD - PINEWOOD ACRES EXTENSION

Alderman Macdonald anked if the sanitary sewer and the storm sewer were installed in the same trench.

The City Engineer informed Council that it was contemplated to put the sewers in separate tranches because there is considerable difficulty in the constructing of the manhole and it is also cheaper to do it in this manner.

Alderman DeWolf: "How much db the abuttors pay?"

His Worship the Mayors . "They only pay the normal charge."

Alderman DeWolf: "I would like to mention that the 10¢ per sq.ft. is only about 15% of the real value of the land, maybe less."

Alderman Lloyd: "I am concerned about the two trenches and the fact that it is less costly to dig two trenches because of the location of the manhole." He asked for supporting justification to the statement.

The City Engineer said he questioned the engineers in connection with a recent installation on Ridgewood Drive because he felt the same as some of the manhers of Council, but they showed him by calculation of cost that for a feet

each side of the pipe, making a 3 foot trench, that it doesn's cost any mire to have two trenches.

Alderman bloyd: "You would go deeper if you had two pipes in the one trench. You have a certain cubic footage of exhaustion to make whether they go in one trench or two trenches."

The City Engineer: "That could be it, too."

Alderman Abbort asked if one pipe is laid deeper than the other or are they on the same level.

The City Engineer said the sanitary sewer is laid deeper than the storm sewer.

Alderman Macdonald asked if the estimate of \$1800,00 covers the cost of both sewers and was advised in the affirmative.

## TENDERS - ELECTRICAL SYSTEM - WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Committee on Works at a meeting held on the above date, considered a tabulation of tenders from the City Manager and Commissioner of Works for new electrical service and distribution at City Field. Acceptance of the following tender was recommended: Provincial Electric Ltd, Halifax -- \$6,000.00.

On Motion of Alderman Lane, seconded by Alderman Greenwood, the recommendation of the City Manager and Commissioner of Works was approved and recommended to City Council,

Moved by Alderman Greenwood, seconded by Alderman Lane that the report be approved.

Alderman Lloyd referred to a recent press report questioning the procedure of tenders for the City of Halifax and asked the City Manager to explain the present procedure in effect with respect to the preparing of tenders, specifications and supervision.

City Manager: "Texatring specifications are drawn by the people that we have on our staff who we feel can do the best job. When we get a job like wiring for a sound system, we are at a disadvantage and have to explain the situation. We have to lean rather heavily on the people who supply that and in some cases we say, 'give us your proposal, tell us what you can do'. That is what we had to do with this Council Chamber. We didn't draw the specifications but in the normal cases we draw up the tenders based on our past experience. For instance, take trucks, that is something I would like to talk about later on if Council is willing. It is a special situation. It is a truck body which will come up before Council regularly on October 15th.

Since it is a special situation, maybe I could cover your question because I was going to refer to it Alderman Lloyd."

Alderman Lloyd: "This has to do with the tender procedure, let's follow down the step by step routine. The tender specifications are drawn by the staff members who are best qualified to exercise judgment on the matter. Then do the specifications come to you, Mr. DeBard for a review?"

City Manager: "They come to me for review. In many cases I don't do too much about them because they are not within my own qualifications, but anywhere where I think there might be some question I do exercise my influence."

Alderman bloyd: "It is a feature of our present system of government that the specifications are drawn by the staff and to be supervised by you. The full responsibility for the issuance of fair specifications lies with the City Manager and the staff."

City Manager: "That is right and I will take full responsibility for those tenders."

Alderman Lloyd: "I don't want any allusion to be taken or inferences to be drawn. The only thing I wish to correct is a newspaper editorial which says." City Hall's duty now is to answer these questions; speaking about some correspondence we had on the tenders for equipment for the City Field. It goes on tif replies are unsatisfactory, a thorough investigation should be launched as a general subject of tender specifications. If any question is raised about

I think it should be the Mayor or if he wishes, a Committee of Council should then question the matter because we are not drafting these specifications. It leaves the position at the moment that the Council is responsible and yet it is not. I think it is only proper to point out that if there is any question of procedure; if the Manager and the staff are responsible, then I think the Mayor should make such an investigation under the provisions of the Charter provided for that purpose or if he wishes, he can ask the Council to appoint a Committee to look into the matter."

His Worship the Mayor stated he was talking to a reporter from the Halifax Herald on the matter of the specifications for equipment and he told him that it was not a matter for Council to become involved in. He also told him that he had referred the letter, challenging the Committee on its action, to the City Manager who is the proper person to examine the charges and report back to Council. The investigation referred to is an investigation by the City Manager in his own time. He referred to the editorial in that it used the word "City Hall" and not "City Council" was to answer certain questions. He then asked the City Manager the following question: "Did the firms interested in tendering on any of the equipment, challenge the specifications prior to the tender closing date?"

City Manager: "I can't answer your question for this reason — you will notice that the tenders were accepted by the Committee on Works and they were on the agenda, with the exception of the Lighting System and the Painting of the Tower, for October 15, 1959. We have had a number of items on which we have had questions about specifications. The first one came through Alderman Lloyd asking me a question on the truck chassis. Because there was that question, and knowing that Mr. West would not be here and Mr. Copp was also on holidays, we set it for October 15th."

Alderman Lloyd: "I am only concerned with procedure and to make sure that everybody knows where the responsibility lies in this matter. There are some letters containing complaints about the tender system. I do not state, at this stage, whether those complaints are justified until all the facts are presented to us. The letter received by us and forwarded to the Mayor, he has

probably received copies anyway, is then placed in the proper fashion before the City Manager. He examines the contents of the letter and with his staff makes appropriate inquiries and reports to us in answer to the letter. At that stage we then decide whether we feel the opposing views should be the subject of special investigation. That is the procedure."

Alderman Laner "I have before me copies of two letters from the firm who have made complaints. They were very definite in their contention that the specifications applied only to certain vehicles which could only be supplied by one tenderer and therefore it was unfair to all of them to ask for tenders when their machines could not comply." She then read a portion of the letter for the information of the Council and continued "Are specifications being drawn for definite machines; and, therefore, why call for tenders?"

His Worship the Mayor: "The proper procedure is certainly for the Manager to report back to us on the allegations in the letter and then we, in turn, will take action."

Alderman Lloyd: "As soon as these letters were received, I, for one, was in touch with the Mayor and he said he had received some letters. I said, "I suppose you are following the obvious procedure that you have given copies of these letters to Mr. DeBard"; and the Mayor answered that that was exactly what he was doing. In other words, City Council has immediately acted on its responsibility. It received letters and they were passed through the proper channels to see that these questions are answered."

City Manager: "I have no answer to the letters because they came after Mr. West left. I don't have the source of information, but on this truck business, I have."

Returning to the report pertaining to Tenders for Electrical Services and Distribution, the City Manager said that the lowest tender of \$6000.00 was recommended. The motion was then put and passed.

The matter pertaining to tenders for a truck chassis was then brought up for discussion.

Alderman Dunlop felt the matter should be discussed when it came before Council in the regular way.

The City Manager stated that the low bidder on the truck chassis had

called him and reminded him of a steel strike and that the firm had a call for this particular vehicle.

It was agreed that the Manager be heard on the matter of the truck.

City Manager: "There were five bids ranging from \$4,850.00 from Scotia Chevrolet-Oldsmobile Limited up to a high of \$8,466.00. The thing which came to my attention was this, that one of the bidders was complaining because we had specified 24,000 pounds gross vehicle weight, that is the weight of the vehicle and the load. His complaint was that the manufacturer of the body, and the man who attaches the body to the chassis when it gets here, said that 21,000 gross vehicle weight was enough. When that was reported to me I was a little concerned because we like to get as many bids as we can. My concern pretty well disappeared when I found that the bidder who was complaining could supply 24,000 gross vehicle weight, but the price was not the competitive price; and, therefore, he could not get it. In effect he was saying to us 'why don't you get 21,000 pounds gross vehicle weight? It's cheaper and I can compete better. t Let me read to you Mr. West's memorandum. It explains about the gross vehicle weight. The point brought out in the discussion was that 21,000 pounds gross vehicle weight would be less money; and, therefore, we would save a certain number of dollars. I don't know exactly how many dollars of tax payers money by having this other vehicle." (He then read the memorandum from Mr. West referred to above.) He then referred to the matter of specifications and stated, "When we write the specifications, we allow a rather generous time so that everybody can have plenty of time to work out a proposal, If there is something wrong with the specifications, and they come in and show Tus that we have made a mistake or that we have overlooked something, we send out an addendum, but to wait until the prices are in and then come and say that there is something wrong with the specifications, I don't think it is quite the thing to do. I think they had all the opportunity in the world. All we are interested in is getting the most we can for the money because, if we don't, you people can come right back onto us and say 'why don't you do a better for less money? I have a letter from another supplier who made a general statement you take the low bid, that is not necessarily the cheapest and

I grant that. I say to him, we have to go on our own experience. We are not going to take the statement of manufacturer 'A' that my equipment costs \$5,000.00 more than someone else, but in the long run it is cheaper!. If we knew on the other hand, that a certain type of equipment was the equipment we wanted and that the other equipment had not stood up, we would not hesitate for a minute to draw the specifications. I remember buying a certain accounting machine because it would just fit into our system and the rest of them would not. I told them they could not meet the specifications. Sometimes we have to do that, but if we don't know for sure that that is the situation, we make the specifications as wide as we can to give everybody a chance."

Alderman Dunlop: "They weren't too wide in respect to the front-end loader."

City Manager: "I don't know the answer to that because Mr. Copp and Mr. West have an explanation or maybe they haven't."

Alderman Lloyd: "The purpose of this is to give to everybody the feeling that if there is some dissatisfaction in the tender system; they have no remembers that if there is some dissatisfaction in the tender system; they have no remembers they have all in calling either an Alderman or the Mayor and immediately we will contact the Manager and ask for answers to their questions whether they write the letters, or ask us orally, or by phone or however they may do it. This was done in this case. The Manager drafts the specifications under our system, we think it is the best one. The Council has nothing to do with drawing specifications whatsoever. We hold our staff responsible for drafting specifications which will produce the best type of equipment for the particular job in hand at the most economical cost. Our job is to see that that is being done."

City Manager: "If you agree tonight that we should accept the lew tender for this truck, then I can call him tomorrow."

Alderman Abbott: "Has it been recommended?"

It was pointed out that the item was not on the agenda for this meeting.

Moved by Alderman Greenwood, seconded by Alderman Abbott that the idem be added to the agenda. Motion passed unanimously the following members of Council being present and voting therefor: Aldermen DeWolf, Abbott, Dunlop,

Lane, Macdonald, Butler, Fox, Ferguson, Trainor, Lloyd, Wyman, Connolly, O'Brien and Greenwood.

City Manager: "I would recommend the low bid of Scotia Chevrolet~ Oldsmobile Limited for a truck chassis, 24,000 pounds gross vehicle weight, at \$4,850.00."

Moved by Alderman Greenwood, seconded by Alderman Abbott, that the recommendation be approved. Motion passed unanimously, the following members of Council being present and voting therefor: Aldermen DeWolf, Abbott, Dunlop, Lane, Macdonald, Butler, Fox, Ferguson, Trainor, Lloyd, Wyman, Connolly, O'Prien and Greenwood.

Alderman Lane: "Do I understand there will be a report from the City Manager on October 15th?"

His Worship the Mayor: "Yes."

Alderman Ferguson: "I recall receiving three letters. I did receive a letter from the supplier questioning specifications. I answered it in quite a general way. I wondered if the Manager had received any letters on specifications. Did you (Mr. DeBard) receive a letter prior to the other two that we are talking about questioning specifications?"

City Manager: "I received no letter about any specifications until after the Committee on Works had passed them."

Alderman Ferguson: "I had received a letter prior to these two question-ing specifications, within the last two or three weeks."

His Worship the Mayor: "I did not get any letters until after the publication of the tender."

Alderman Ferguson: "It was strictly asking for information what the policy was and who set specifications. There was no mention of any tenders at that time."

Alderman Lloyd: "I think we should observe that we are all agreed that we received letters, and that the Manager is progressing an investigation and will be complete when Mr. West and Mr. Copp return and he (Mr. West) will have a report for you (His Worship the Mayor) and then you will pass it on to the Council or Committee, whichever is appropriate."

Alderman Fox: "I wonder if Mr. DeBard has any information that some of the dissatisfied bidders would appear before the next regular meeting of Council when this matter is discussed?"

His Worship the Mayor: "I think we should invite them to attend and hear the report discussed."

Alderman Lloyd: "I think the people who wrote letters of complaints should be here."

His Worship the Mayor: "Yes."

Alderman Fox: "Being experts they are the people we should hear."

His Worship the Mayor: "They are also vendors too. They are trying to sell."

Alderman Lane: "They may be trying to sell, but in all fairness, where is the point in sending out a tender when you want a vehicle of a special kind which the City Manager pointed out tonight. Through the experience of the City, they have decided that a vehicle is the one to do the job; why bother asking five or six other people to take the time to draw up tenders if they are going to buy a vehicle."

Alderman Lloyd: "On a point of order, Your Worship, I have confined my comments to the matter of procedure and we have dealt specifically with the truck matter. If we are going to get into a debate of the pros and cons of thit, I think it would be premature until we have given the staff an opportunity to answer the letter."

The next item of business was then called for consideration.

#### POLICY - ACQUISITION OF PROPERTIES

#### TRAFFIC LIGHTS .. KEMPT ROAD AND YOUNG STREET

October 1, 1959.

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council.

At a meeting of the Safety Committee held on September 22, 1959 a report was submitted from the Chief of Police recommending that fixed time traffic control signal lights be installed at the intersection of Kempt Road and Young Street as a result of a traffic count taken on August 26, 1959.

Your Committee concurs in this recommendation; funds to be provided by the current estimates.

Alderman Connolly: "Will the lights be operating from 8:00 A. M.? I notice that at 5:00 o'clock there is a tie up of traffic in front of Young. Street Fire Station. Sometimes proceeding north on Robie Street you can't get through. I think a policeman would be better there instead of lights, especially during rush hours. If there is a fire, the fire apparatus can't

get out of the station."

His Worship the Mayer: "I think the traffic count would be sufficient to warrant the installation of lights on a 24-hour basis. If you go primarily to a policeman, you can only get it when there is a man available. There is police work involved because no one is supposed to park or stop in front of the Fire Station driveway."

Alderman Connelly: "You will get lots of tickets up there because they have to stop. That is a short block between Robie Street and Kempt Road."

The City Manager suggested that Mr. Flynn could explore the possibility of having the lights controlled in the Fire Station itself so that when there is an alarm, depending upon which way the apparatus is going, the light could be thrown whichever way they wanted and it could be held.

City Electrician: "That can be arranged, but that won't clear the traffic that has already stopped there for a red light."

The Chief of Police referred to Alderman Connolly's observation about cars in front of the Fire Station and said that he included the suggestion of a remote control unit in his report.

His Worship the Mayor: "What about the problem of cars piling up in front of the Fire Station while wanting for the stop sign?"

Chief of Police: "I think that is something we have to live with."

Alderman Lloyd: "Are you satisfied that you have to have a stop sign?"

Chief of Police: "We have a stop sign. I am satisfied that we should have traffic control."

Alderman Connolly "The point I am making is the seriousness of stopping the traffic and not permitting the vehicles to get out of the Station freely in case there is a fire."

His Worship the Mayor. "The lights are on a fixed basis of about 50 seconds so in that time the ringing of the siren and the changing of the light would clear the area quickly enough."

Alderman Wyman: "Has any thought been given to using two sets of lights --- one at Robie Street and one at Kempt Road, the same as we have on Oxford Street, Chebucto Road and North Street with the two synchronized so as to keep

the block relatively free from traffic at any time?"

Chief of Police: "We could look into that."

City Electrician "With a centrol in the Fire Station when there is a fire alarm and the fireman presses the switch, by the time the apparatus is ready to move out the area would be cleared because the green light would come on the cars would clear."

Alderman Lloyd: "Are we creating any further difficulty for traffic coming south into the City where there is no left turn at North and Robie Streets?" He felt it was an involved procedure and yet it was possible to get onto North Street by going onto King Street and then turning left.

Alderman Greenwood: "The Safety Committee discussed this with the Chief and he had statistical figures and traffic count to justify this installation. Surely, a traffic light won't be any worse than a stop sign. However, I think the answer to the problem is the change of the location of the Fire Station which will probably be fairly soon."

His Worship the Mayor: "As far as Young Street traffic count is concerned, no consideration was made for the new liquor outlet to be supplied on that street, both mail order and ratakle. That will make even greater traffic."

Alderman Wyman. We have talked a little about the possibility of the effect of this light on the Fire Station. I think that the short block from Robie Street to Kempt Road is very apt to create a problem if we put lights at one corner without the other. I do think that should be given some thought before we abandon the idea of putting in the second set.

Moved by Alderman Greenwood, seconded by Alderman O'Brien that the report be approved. Motion passed.

Mr. Harrington: "Following the meeting with the Finance and Executive Committee and the recommendation that we brought to the Committee at that time, we have completed our study that requires rescheduling. If Council approves of the recommendation of the Committee, we are prepared to apply to the Public Utilities Board for approval of this first change. This report was prepared for the City. It was paid for by the City and it is your report. It contains recommendations that we have discussed with you and out of those recommendations, the Company's position is that we would not move seeking approval or disapproval of anything without the support of City Council. If we agree, and you agree, that we should do certain things, then we are prepared to go into them and get them done. We feel that it must be participation with the City. We feel that we must get together with you on this because it will affect a lot of people. Some people will be inconvenienced. Some people will receive better service than they presently have, but I think it is important from the start that we should outline our position that it is one that we want to co-operate with the City adopting as much as possible, as much as seems practical of this report as quickly as we can and with unanimous approach to the Public Utilities Board."

Alderman Lane arrived \$:15 P.M.

Alderman Lloyd: "The City legically would not appear before the Public Utilities Board in opposition."

His Worship the Mayor: "That is correct."

Alderman Lloyd: "So that if there is any citizen objections that we should take notice of, should that be the procedure, and we are not going to take any action, it seems we should have some hearing on the matter."

His Worship the Mayor: "In tonight's paper, you will notice on the front page that an invitation has been extended to all citizens to be here tonight."

Mr. Harrington: "We have contacted the Public Utilities Board and they have suggested, on a change such as this which does not require re-routing, that they would be prepared to hear the Company without public hearing and try it on an experimental basis. Therefore, if we have your approval tonight, we can approach them for the trial on an experimental basis, but we would not be able to put it into service until sometime around November 1st in order to get our schedules changed and to give our operators an opportunity to pick their runs."

His Worship the Mayor asked if there were any persons wishing to be heard on this matter, but no person appeared either for or against the proposal.

Alderman Lloyd: "Do I understand that this is to be on an experimental basis? Does the Board of Public Utilities then receive a further report and then have a final hearing?"

Mr. Harrington: "They will require us to advise them of the success of the experiment. If a petition is made under the Act, they will have to approve of the service either on their own action, our actions or the City's actions, or a group of citizens' action."

Alderman Lloyd: "If we found from the experience reported to the Board by the Company that there was some trouble with this service that we didn't take into account at that time, would we be prejudiced in any way to take action? Would you (Mr. Harrington) come here first with your report? I think that would be the better way. If we agree to go ahead with this experimental effort, before they report to the Board on it, they should report to us.

I think we should be informed of the result."

His Worship the Mayor. "I think the Company should undertake to tell us that if they go to the Board any time in the future after the experiment has proven either successful or otherwise, that they would notify us before they went to the Board and said they want to make this a permanent fixture."

Mr. Harrington: "Yes and we would come to you and ask you if you agree to it or not. We expect to bother you quite a little bit."

Alderman O'Brien asked if the Finance and Executive Committee was going to consider all the recommendations in the report.

His Worship the Mayor said more studies would be going on throughout the winter months and that consideration would be given to taxation, financial structure of the Company, the extension of lines and elimination of other lines.

Moved by Alderman Abbott, seconded by Alderman Ferguson that the report be approved. Motion passed.

#### ACCEPTANCE OF PLANS ... MULGRAVE PARK HOUSING PROJECT

City Manager: "The Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation addressed a letter to me and asked that Council approve the plans of the Housing Project. That was a very technical thing and the plans were turned over to our staff who looked them over and checked them individually." He said that they were then turned over to the Redevelopment Committee; and as far as they can see, they are in order. "I would recommend that Council approve them," he said.

Moved by Alderman Abbott, seconded by Alderman O'Brien, that the plans for the Mulgrave Park Housing Project be approved. Motion passed.

- 1. The City Prison shall be under the general supervision and management of the Committee on Public Health and Welfare, in this Ordinance referred to as The Committee.
- 2. The Commissioner of Public Health and Welfare shall himself visit or shall delegate a member of his staff to visit the prison at least once each week. In the case where the Commissioner of Public Health and Welfare delegates the duty of visiting the prison to a member of his staff, the Commissioner of Health shall be satisfied that such visit is octually made.
- 3. The accounts of receipts and expenses connected with the prison shall be kept under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Health and Welfare and if found correct, approved for payment by the City Manager.
- 4. The prison shall be placed and kept under the charge of a Governor. One or more of the City policemen shall attend at the prison when required by the Commissioner of Public Health and Welfare or by the Governor.
- 5. No prisoner shall be received by the Governor without a written warrant of commitment, specifying the term of imprisonment. No prisoner shall be discharged without a written order signed by the proper authority.
- 6. The Governor shall keep a proper record in which shall be entered the name, age and description of every prisoner, the date of his commitment and discharge, and the term of which he is sentenced, and a record of his conduct during his imprisonment.
- 7. There shall be kept in the prison in addition to any other record a special record divided into columns in which shall to kept a record of the daily conduct of each prisoner, noting his behaviour, industry, diligence and faithfulness, and the strictness with which he observes the prison regulations.

- 8. Male and female prisoners shall be kept in separate and distinct corridors as determined by the Committee.
- 9. The prisoners when not employed shall be locked in their respective cells unless otherwise decided by the Governor.
- 10. The Governor shall see that the whole interior of the prison is constantly kept clean and fully ventilated throughout all its apartments. It shall be kept thoroughly painted at all times.
- 11. Every prisoner shall keep himself clean and shall be furnished with proper facilities for doing so and shall be provided with clean garments. It shall be the duty of the Governor to see to it that the requirements of this section are complied with.
- 12. The prisoners shall wear a prison uniform prescribed by the Committee, so distinguished by color or other peculiar marks as to make the escape of prisoners more difficult.
- 13. The duties of the prisoners shall be such as shall from time to time be assigned to them by the Governor, and such duties so assigned shall be reported to the Committee for its approval or modification thereof.
- 14. The Governor may immediately secure any prisoner who has proved himself dangerous by threats or blows, or who has become turbulent, refractory or has misbehaved himself, or who has attempted to escape, in closer custody than the others or in solitary confinement and shall immediately report the matter to the Commissioner of Public Health and Welfare.
- 15. The Governor shall keep a book, known as "The Punishment Book", in which shall be entered all offences against the prison rules committed by any prisoner.
- 16. Suitable workrooms shall be provided for both male and female prisoners,
- 17. The Council shall by By-Law make rules and regulations for the visiting days and hours for the prison and may from time to time amend, alter and repeal such rules and Regulations.
- 18. The Council shall by By-Law make rules and regulations respecting guards and other officers of the prison and may from time to time amond, alter and repeal such rules and regulations.
- 19. The Council shall by By-Law make rules and regulations respecting prisoners and may from time to time amend, alter and repeal such rules and regulations.
- 20. Copies of so much of the City Charter as respects the City Prison, and of this Ordinance and of the tubes and regulations made by Council pursuant to Section 17, 18 and 19 of this Ordinance, shall be kept constantly posted up in two or more conspicuous places within the prison.

#### Ordinance No. 53

#### RESPECTING ENLARCEMENT OF CITY BOUNDARIES

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Halifax as follows:

1. That pursuant to Section 6B of the Halifax City Charter, the area of land of the City of Halifax is increased by adding thereto the following real property:

ALL that certain lot piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being on the southwestern side of the North West Arm in the County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia, as shown bordered in red on a plan entitled "Fleming Park." North West Arm, Halifax County, N. S.º, dated September 10th, 1959, and being on file in the office of the Commissioner of Works of the City of Halifax at City Hall as Plan #SS-4-14630, the said land being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the point where high water mark on the southwestern shore of the North West Arm is intersected by the southwestern boundary line of land conveyed to the City of Halifax by Themas J. Wallace and Ada C. Wailace by deed bearing date of June 4th, 1948, and recorded in the office of the Registrar of Deeds at Halifax, N. S., in Book 997, page 969, the said southwestern boundary line being the northeastern boundary line of land now or formerly owned by J. Boutilier;

Thence along the said southwestern boundary line of land conveyed to the City of Halifax by deed bearing date June 4, 1948, to a granite monument marked #2;

Thence northeastwardly parallel to and distant southeastwardly twenty feet (201) to the front of the St. Augustine's Church for a distance of thirty mine feet (391) more or less or to a point distant northeastwardly twenty feet (201) measured at a right angle to the prolongation southeastwardly of the northmeastern side of the main part of the said St. Augustine's Church;

Thence northwestwardly parallel to and distant northwardwardly to the said northeastern side of the said main part of St. Augustine's Church for a distance of thirty-six feet (16) more or less or to an angle in the said northern Church boundary;

Thence northeastwardly parallel to the aforesaid front of the St. Augustine's Church for a distance of Eight feet and one tenth of a feet (8.1) or to a point distant northeastwardly twenty feet (20) from the prolongation southwardly of the most northeastwardly side of the said St. Augustine's Church;

Thence northwestwardly parallel to and distant northeastwardly twenty feet (201) to the said most northeastwardly side of the St. Augustine's Church for a distance of fifty feet (501) more or less or to a point distant northwestwardly twenty feet (201) from the prolongation northeastwardly of the rear side of St. Augustine's Church;

Thence southwestwardly parallel to and distant northwestwardly twenty feet (20\*) from the said rear side of St. Augustine's Church for a distance of seventeen feet (17\*) or to a point distant northwestwardly eighty-five feet (85\*) from the southern boundary line of property of the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the Parish of Saint James, (St. Augustine's Church property);

Thence S 630 15' W for a distance of one hundred and eighteen feet (118');

Thence S 260 15' E for a distance of eighty-five feet (85');

Thence S 63° 15° W for a distance of two thousand six hundred and fifty four feet and forty-five hundredths of a foot (2654.45°) or to Granite Monument #1,

Thence N 27° 08! W for a distance of one thousand six hundred and eighty-two feet and sixty-six hundredths of a foot (1682.66!) to an iron pipe and pile of stones:

Thence N 62° 52' E for a distance of one thousand five hundred and fifty-three feet and fifty-eight hundredths of a foot (1553.58') to an iron pipe and stones;

Thence S 590 40° E for a distance of four hundred and ninety feet (490°) to an iron pipe and stones;

Thence N 62° 52' E for a distance of five hundred and twenty eight feet or to the eastern corner of Lot #1 of the Fleming Glen Subdivision;

Thence generally northwestwardly along the northeastern boundary line of the Fleming Glen Subdivision for a distance of fourteen hundred and eighty-seven feet and eight thenths of a foot (1487.8\*) or to the northeastern boundary line of land conveyed to Her Majesty the Queen by deed bearing date July 10th, 1954;

Thence generally northwestwardly along the said northeastern boundary line of the land conveyed to Her Majesty the Queen by deed dated July 10th, 1954, to the eastern boundary line of the Purcell's Cove Road;

Thence northwardly along the said eastern boundary line of the Purcell's Cove Road to the southeastern boundary line of land now or formerly owned by Borden Clark;

Thence northeastwardly along the said southeastern boundary line of land now or formerly owned by Borden Clark for a distance of ten hundred and seventy feet (1070) or to High Water Mark on the shore of the North West Arm;

Thence continuing northeastwardly for a distance of three hundred feet (3001);

Thence generally southwardly parallel to and distant eastwardly three hundred feet (300\*) from High Water Mark on the shore of the North West Arm to the prolongation southeastwardly of the first hereinbefore described course,

Thence northwestwardly along the prolongation southeastwardly of the first hereinbefore described course for a distance of three hundred feet (300) more or less or to the place of beginning.

EXCEPTING out of the above described land that portion of the Purcell's Cove Road lying between the southeastern boundary line of Fleming Park and the northwestern boundary line of Fleming Park as shown on the Province of Nova Scotia western boundary line of Fleming Park as shown on the Province of Nova Scotia Department of Highways and Public Works Plans #A.F.E.,1-906, Station 38+00 to Station 136+00. Station 89+00 and #A.F.E.,1-906. Station 88+00 to Station 136+00.

- 2. Such area of land added to the City of Halifax shall be included in Ward One.
- 3. This Ordinance shall be known as "Ordinance Number 53".

His Worship the Mayor: "We have agreed to give normal services. We get assistance from the Federal Government in the form of a fire boat for dock side fires."

Alderman DeWolf: "I think that has been the custom over a period of years, but at the same time, where the National Harbours Board doesn't pay any

thing it could be reasonable that a charge could be made."

His Worship the Mayor: "We get \$75,000.00 in lieu of taxes."

Alderman DeWolf: "That doesn't mean anything in comparison with their assessments." He suggested it would be reasonable to make a charge, the same as for fire apparatus going outside the City.

His Worship the Mayor: "We will explore that possibility."

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#### REPORT RENT CONTROL

His Worship the Mayor: "Unfortunately, there were only two copies of the Royal Commission delivered to me. After they were given to me, I contacted the Mayor of Dartmouth and the Warden of the Municipality of the County of Halifax with respect to the recommendations of the Commission which recommended that a Rental Authority be appointed to regulate rents as set out in the Commission Report. The recommendation is that there be a Metropolitan Area Rental Authority and in discussing this matter with two other Municipal leaders in the area, they have agreed to meet with me and our legal advisors to consider a common By-Law for recommendation to the three Municipal bodies for the adoption of the rental authority By-Law."

Alderman Lloyd: "You have to get the three bodies together for a discussion of the recommendations to see how they feel and what their reactions are. Those of us who do not have copies of the report, will have to ask the newspaper if there is a spare copy around. We should get copies of it."

His Worship the Mayor: "The Mayor of Dartmouth has authorized me to say this; that he is prepared to recommend acceptance of the Rental Authority on a Metropolitan basis. The Warden has not had a chance to study it yet, but he would be prepared to make some sort of recommendation."

Alderman Lloyd: "I would be quite happy to get a copy from the newspaper."

His Worship the Mayor: "I am going to do this; failing to secure copies

of the whole report, I will at least attempt to get the expectusions, as soon as

possible."

Moved by Alderman Lloyd, seconded by Alderman Abbott, that the action taken by His Worship the Mayor be approved. Motion passed.

## RECEPTION OF PETITIONS & DELEGATIONS

No petitions were submitted and no delegations were heard.

## PASSING - MR. A. I. LOMAS

Alderman Ferguson: "The Council is all aware of the death of the late Mr. A.I.Lomas. At the time of his death, he was Chairman of the Tourist Committee; and I would move that a letter be sent by Your Worship to the widow

and family expressing the sympathy of the Corporation of the City of Halifax in the loss of Mr. Lomas, pointing out the work he has done on the City's Committee as well as in general business and civic life."

His Worship the Mayor: "I certainly will do that; and I want to make this comment, that the City has lost a prominent citizen in the passing of Mr. Lomas. Not only was he active in the community affairs, generally, but also the Navy League and many others. He spent the last few years as Chairman of the Tourist Committee, and he brought a great deal of wisdom and energy to it. I will be happy to express the sympathy of this Council."

#### SERVICE STATION - WATER AND GEORGE STREETS

Alderman Lloyd: "Observing from some points in the press and comments from television about the action of the Committees in respect to the granting of a gasoline service station license at George and Water Streets, about a week ago I asked the City Manager just what was the authority of the two Committees. I am concerned about the principle of organization in this matter, but there may be merits in the conclusion of the Committees, but the ' is a matter of procedure which bothers me. It causes me some concern. Back in 1957 the Council minutes report a resolution which in effect takes the first step on the Stephenson Report and it recommends, 'that the Stephenson Report of the Redevelopment Study of Halifax be received and that the Housing Committee of Council', which now is the Redevelopment Committee, 'be requested to review the recommendations contained in the report, hold discussions with the officials of the Province and submit proposals to Council. Also that the Committee be empowered to engage a person for housing director. I understand an application was made for permission to construct a gasoline service station on the George and Water Street corner; and, apparently, the Committee, itself, at that time, was wondering just how it would affect the redevelopment plans of the City. I then go to the Redevelopment Committee meeting of August 19th where it was moved by Alderman Lane, seconded by Alderman Trainor, I that the Committee on Works be advised that the Redevelopment Committee has no proposals for future development of the Water Street and George Street area to be made to City Council at the present time! Then the matter went to the Committee on Works. They acted on it and there was a split vote on the matter

and Your Worship had the deciding vote in favour. I asked the City Manager why this didn't go to the City Council. I am not sure that it would be fair to say what the City Manager answered on that, but I think he quoted these minutes. What bothers me is this; the Works Committee has a Charter authority to grant licenses, but the Redevelopment Committee is only a Committee of the Council and can only report to the Council either negative or positive recommendations. As I see it, if the Works Committee were disposed to the view that they should get an opinion of the Redevelopment Committee, certainly they shouldn't have acted until the Council itself had expressed its opinion on the matter. The principle involved here is that City Council only gave an authority or power of recommendation to the Redevelopment Committee. If the Board of Works felt that an opinion should be obtained, they should have asked the Council for it. Certainly, the opinion of the Redevelopment Committee should have been forwarded to City Council and the Council expressed its views.

That wasn't done, was it?"

His Worship the Mayor: "No."

Alderman Lloyd: "The next question has to do with values. If the City decides on recommendation of the Redevelopment Committee, to adopt this scheme of redevelopment in this area as recommended by Professor Stephenson. including the George and Water Streets site, and the Federal and Provincial Governments were agreeable to enter into this scheme of redevelopment, then some of these properties we would acquire. We may acquire all of them. It depends upon our plan of redevelopment. Presumably all parties were agreed, 50% of the cost of acquisition would be paid by Federal powers. If the City now decides to permit the service station to be built, what position are we in if, at a later date, the Council that was not consulted, should by a majority vote, say that that particular land should form part of a redevelopment scheme. Their authority has been unwittingly, I think, blocked. They can't exercise their authority without some additional expenses. Wouldn't Ottawa say, 'you shouldn't have granted this permit. You are asking us to pay 50% of the cost of this acquisition.'?'Do you think they would or they wouldn't?"

His Worship the Mayor: "You are stating a hypothetical development which, while recommended by Professor Stephenson, is one of some 12 recommendations. In his report he states that the program he has outlined contains some 12 items which would take from 15 to 20 years to implement. We have proceeded to move on Mulgrave Park, which is one item; Westwood Park is now being planned; Jacob Street area is in process; we are acquiring properties where for the Maitland Street clearance; we are acquiring properties for Maitland Street; we are now planning the Clyde Street Parking Lot which is a recommendation of Professor Stephenson; surveys are under way and negotiations are being conducted for the acquiring of the School for the Deaf property. The Premier has delivered a letter to me indicating approval, indicating a price if this land is made available to the City for a housing project. before the Council. One-That means six out of 12 recommendations are half of a program that was suggested by Professor Stephenson to take 15 or 20 years has been started in a matter of two years. I think this includes speedy action. In fact Professor Stephenson on more than one occasion has stated publicly on radio and television that he was delighted with the progress being made. With respect to the Water Street development he envisages this primarily as a water front esplanade. He also envisages this as being a landing for ferry craft and so on. The matter went to the Works Committee and the Works Committee under no obligation whatsoever to refer the matter to the Redevelopment Committee did so as a matter of courtesy. The Parties in the dispute and I call it a dispute; the Franklin Service Corporation wanted to stop the permit from being granted and the Smilestone interests were seeking a permit. Both appeared before the Redevelopment Committee. We asked the owners of the land, from the people who had acquired land there recently; Franklin Service Corporation, and apart from persons who had already applied for other property, if they had any immediate plans for redevelopment and they said, 'No.' They were very vague on any proposed development there. It is my own considered opinion, that at the moment, considering the money market and considering the berrowing ability of the

City of Halifax, has six, possibly eight, if we add two more in the next year or two, projects out of twelve recommended by Professor Stephenson, are about all we can carry at the moment."

Alderman Lloyd: "I am not disputing what you have to say. It may very well be very solid argument which this Council would accept or rejert if the matter was before us. It is my contention that that kind of information which you are giving us now should have been before the Council before any action was taken by the Board of Works in view of their own apparent desire to clear it with those in authority on the matter of redevelopment. As Alderman Lane says in the minutes; I think we have striven to hew to the line pretty stiffly on the Stephenson Plan, and these plans must be tempered with common sense and other requirements of the City must be considered. I agree with the general principle as I think it is a sound observation. This one portion (Ferry Terminus and Plaza) is beyond us in our time. The essential thing is not to clutter it too much for those who follow us in twenty years time. I don't think a service station would clutter it too much at the present time. These are viewpoints that were expressed in the Redevelopment Committee like you have expressed some this evening, but it is my view that, in principle, any negative or postive action of the Redevelopment Committee with respect to any matters which may compel an alteration of objectives open for future Councils to consider, should be undertaken without the approval of City Council. I think, too, that when we adopted the Manager plan, we did so with one of the underlying principles, whether they were expressed or not; one of the basic principles of the Manager Plan was to equalize the power of the Council and to have by the numbers of the Council that safety valve, if you like, of a majority vote of fourteen members of Council. Now here is a decision that has been resolved by three members of the Committee under a power which they had the right to perform. There is no doubt about that. I can't dispute that because it is in the Charter, but that is the second principle that bothered me a little bit and I wondered if we shouldn't look again at the matter of this power residing in a Committee. Does it not go contrary to the basic prinicples in the Manager plan?

N)

His Worship the Mayor: "You are making a point new that the final authority rests with the Committee to grant or refuse a permit on any corner provided it is zoned correctly."

Alderman Lloyd: "I am making the point that I wonder since the adoption of the Manager plan whether that power should continue, but that is a matter which will come up when we deal with certain recommendations of the Manager with respect to re-organization. Those are the two things that bothered me and it was on the matter of principle only — no other reason. I think that in all fairness that if any matter by any Committee of Council acting under any authority that they may have, appears to be something that might interfere with the Council's wish with respect to redevelopment plans, and they wish an opinion, they should certainly come to the Council."

His Worship the Mayor: "One of our biggest difficulties in the redevelopment program is that we have no way of staying action in an area that may be a tentative proposal sometime in the future. The City of Vancouver does have a Redevelopment By-Law which enables a Municipality to hole development in the area. One of the weaknesses in the whole redevelopment plan in the City of Halifax is the lack of adequate legislation to assist us in future planning to provide a freezing of areas to prevent undesirable development pending redevelopment. That is one of the big faults in our redevelopment at the moment."

Alderman O'Brien: "While this topic is before us, I would like to ask whether the Traffic Authority or the Commissioner of Works could tell us whether there is any serious traffic problem which is to be worsened by this decision about the service station site and whether part of that service station site land is marked out on City plans for street widening or any traffic improvement at the present time?"

Chief of Police: "As my memory serves me, I believe we approved of that service station installation from a traffic point of view."

Commissioner of Works: "The existing street line does cut into that property. I think it is about 7 feet on George Street and goes out to

practically nothing. I might add that there are some plans under way to possibly alter the line down there."

City Manager: "I talked to Mr. Harris about that and pointed out to him that we have a so-called Bedford Square in front of that property. Mr. Harris laid out a tentative line which would not affect this particular property. In other words, it would not take that seven feet."

Alderman Lloyd: "Is the service station going to be built in back of the line?"

His Worship the Mayor: "Yes."

City Manager: "They would not build beyond that."

Alderman Lloyd: "Do we have a recommendation from the Town Planning Engineer?"

His Worship the Mayor: "The Town Planner opposed 25."

Commissioner of Works: "If we had a choice, I would rather see a development something other than a service station there."

Alderman Dunlop: "What is the situation now?"

His Worship the Mayor: "The situation is that the permit has been granted by the Board of Works and is good for a year."

Alderman Dunlop: "Can't we do something? I am certainly opposed to a service station on that corner; and if I had a chance to vote, I would certainly vote against it. I would go so far as to expropriate the land so the City could stop the building of a service station. I can think of nothing worse than a service station on the waterfront corner there. If we are looking forward to twenty, thirty or forty years, certainly that land has more of a potential value than a service station."

Alderman Ferguson: "Somebody had asked me about the size of the area. Can the Commissioner of Works answer that? Somebody said it was about a 6000 square foot area."

His Worship the Mayor: "It is an 'L' shaped lot and the plan is to put the building in the 'L' and the front area for the pump islands."

Committee the Stephenson Report. It brought forward proposals to study and make recommendations to Council which I think would be a positive action only. In no way did the Committee say that there was no intention never to carry out a project down on Water Street. At the moment, in view of many other demands on our money and our time and on the energies of our staff, there are many more porjects more deserving of our attention that the waterfront plaza. Now, unfortunately, we don't have the right to stay development. We couldn't buy that corner lot for redevelopment because it hasn't been declared a Redevelopment Area."

Alderman Lloyd: "I am not disputing your good judgment on this at all. I am just merely pointing out, don't you think this matter should have come to Council? If you decided in the Works Committee that you should examine it from the point of view of the City's future plans of redevelopment, shouldn't that recommendation have come to Council?"

His Worship the Mayor: "Not necessarily so. This idea of putting it to the Redevelopment Committee I think came from the Franklin Service Corporation representative through to the Committee on Works. They thought this was the redevelopment area and this was the reason why no permits should be granted. We said in the Committee on Works, 'Well, perhaps we should have the Redevelopment Committee look at it'; and the Redevelopment Committee, in view of its knowledge of what program it had ahead of it, and what was facing the City over a period of the next five or six years, were not justified in recommending any plans for the area as they said they couldn't see any redevelopment plans for that area for some time to come. Maybe we were wrong. Maybe there is some money available, but I just can't see it because in order to enable us to proceed with the redevelopment there must be certain elements present. One of the elements must be that the area must be substantially for housing."

Alderman Lloyd: "The point is this, if it is the Council which decides that, you can express your opinions to the Council. All I am arguing for is a matter of principle. You can express your opinions and so far your

judgment has been pretty good, but I am disagreeing with you right now on a matter of principle which I say, it was wrong in my opinion to have asked the Redevelopment Committee. It would have been better if you had not asked them at all."

His Worship the Mayor: "We would be happy to bring forth a recommendation from the Redevelopment Committee with respect to the Waterfront Plaza but I know what it would be. The question of whether the end result to the citizens at this time will be as beneficial as many other projects we undertake. Unfortunately, we don't have the legislative authority to stay development."

Alderman O'Brien: "You have accepted the ideas that positive proposals from the Redevelopment Committee must come to Council and surely a negative decision is just as important to the future development. I think, although this did not occur to me as I sat in the Committee at that time, that we should remember this and bring even negative decisions back to Council. I would like to ask if the Commissioner of Works could bring to an early meeting of the Works Committee some kind of a plan involving the street lines on Water Street in that neighbourhood since he indicates that there is to be some change.

These are matters that should be before the Committee. There is going to be widening on Water Street and which side is it going to be on? That affects this proposal and maybe we should be expropriating this property for street widening, but it depends upon where the street widening is to occur on the East or the West side of the street."

Alderman Macdonald: "I voted against it for the simple reason that I didn't think it was good planning where this area had been proposed for redevelopment by Professor Stephenson. The recommendation came from the Director of Planning against the service station and also the fact that the Commissioner of Works has frowned upon it for a service station. It was my thought that if the Redevelopment Committee had not undertaken to make a proposal to redevelop this area, there might be an opportunity for private enterprise to develop which might be along similar lines to what has been proposed by Professor Stephenson. It certainly may have developed perhaps to

present time, it is not and I think that in the establishment of the service station here it may be detrimental to any future development that might possible be undertaken in that area. I don't know whether there is anything that can be done about it now or not, but I was hoping that we could because I feel in my own mind we made a serious mistake."

have watched and I have secured from the C.B.C. a statement issued by the Corporation ever the year and I am quite prepared to say this, that despite from insinuations they wanted all the matter aired and they want to get all the circumstances surrounding it aired. Alderman Lloyd: "On a point of order, I was asking a question about procedure. I made no allusions at all."

His Worship the Mayor: "I know you did not Alderman, but allusions have been made."

Alderman Lloyd: "Not by me."

His Worship the Mayor: "No, but by a spokesman for a Company appearing over a Canadian Government medium supported by public funds, casting allemations and insinuations that all the circumstances should be aired. I would be happy to have them all aired."

Alderman Dunlop: "What I am concerned about is the statement made by Alderman Lloyd that three members of a Committee have a controlling vote. I think we should look into the mechanics of it as to whether or not the matter should come to Council." He said he was against the service station being located on the Water Street site.

Alderman Lane: "The application of common sense is the fact that we were faced by one interest who was assembling land in the area for no

definite purpose as they told us. There were no plans. They were just opposed to anyone else doing anything with land already owned by that person. Were we not also faced with the fact that since there were no immediate plans for redevelopment in the area, we were hardly in a position to refuse a permit to a man to build something on his land if there were no objection to it? So, as far as I am concerned, a tax producing property on that corner would be a much better proposition than a piece of land which is not improved and may not be improved for a good many years because the interested parties who are land assembling certainly had no immediate plans, and they so stated. If they are the ones who want it aired, they have had it aired. I most certainly resent the fact that as a member of the Redevelopment Committee, that patronage has even been suggested.

His Worship the Mayor stated that quite a bit of latitude had been permitted on this question and that the Rules of Order of Procedure should be adherred to.

Alderman Lloyd then gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he would move that the Rules of Order of Council with respect to the interpretation of the question period be re-defined.

He felt that members of Council should have the opportunity to express themselves, especially when they are not members of some Committees.

### ENFORCEMENT - CURFEW-LAW

Alderman Lane: "I had a telephone call following a night football game on the Wanderer's Grounds asking if it is the proper thing for children under the age of 16 to be wendors of various and sundry commodities on the City's own grounds when there is a Curfew Law. Since that time it has been focibly brought to my attention that the same situation is in existence at the Forum at all sporting events. I do say, and I would ask you to appoint the proper City officials to inquire of the Forum Commission as to whether or not they have no control over the man who has the concession so that he employs adults to do his selling and not school-age children on week nights."

A meeting of the City Council was held on the above date.

After the meeting was called to order by the Chairman, the members of Council attending led by the Deputy City Clerk joined in repeating the Lord's Prayer.

There were present His Worship the Mayor, Chairman; Aldermen DeWolf, Abbott, Dunlop, Lane, Fox, Ferguson, Lloyd, Connolly, O'Brien and Greenwood.

Also present were Dr. A.R. Morton and Messrs. T.C. Doyle, W.J. Clancey, L.M. Romkey, G.F. West, K. Munnich, W.A. Gray, J.L. Leitch and J.J. Napier and Mr. Homer Borland of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The meeting was called especially to consider the matter of the tenders for the construction of the Mulgrave Park Housing Project.

# TENDERS MULGRAVE PARK HOUSING PROJECT

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council.

At a meeting of the Redevelopment Committee held on October 22, 1959, the following letter was submitted from Mr. Homer Borland, Regional Supervisor of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation:-

File: 119-3-H1-2 Tender October 22, 1959.

Mayor C.A. Vaughan, City Hall, Halifax, N.S.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

Re: Mulgrave Park Halifax F/P 2/28\_

The Corporation has carefully examined the tenders received for the construction of the above project together with the recommendation of the tender opening committee. At the time of opening publicity was given to the amount quoted by the various bidders so I shall not list these here.

After careful consideration of the bids on the basic specifications together with the allowances for the two alternatives the Corporation is prepared to recommend to the Federal Minister that an award be made to Eastern Woodworkers Limited of New Glasgow in the amount of \$4,579,794.90. This amount is within the revised estimates approved by the City Council at last Thursday's meeting. It is understood that the window alternative proposed by Eastern Woodworkers if found to be satisfactory would be specified, which would reduce the above amount by \$67,500.00. The proposed window is presently under examination but a final decision as to its acceptability may not be ready for some little time.

Under the terms of the Agreement no award can be made without the concurrence of the City and the Province. The Province of Nova Scotia has expressed its willingness to make an award to Eastern Woodworkers Limited on this basis. It is therefore necessary that the City indicate its recommendation before the final decision is made by the Federal Minister.

Will you therefore present the matter for the consideration of City Council at the earliest opportunity and let me know the views of Council in order that I can pass them to the Corporation's head office for final consideration by the Minister. I trust that the City's reaction will be favourable to the award to Eastern Woodworkers Limited at the price and under the conditions mentioned above.

Your Committee concurs in the decision to recommend that the tender of Eastern Woodworkers Limited in the amount of \$4,579,794.90 be accepted.

Moved by Alderman Lane, seconded by Alderman Abbott, that the report be approved.

His Worship the Mayor briefly explained the history of events leading up to the tender call, explaining how the three levels of Government, Federal, Provincial and Civic, had signed an agreement to participate, om a 75, 12 1/2, 12 1/2 basis, in the provision of 350 housing units on the Mulgrave Park site on North Barrington Street.

In the division of responsibility it was decided that the City would acquire the property and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation would prepare the sketches, site plans, etc. and be responsible for the technical work associated with the calling of tenders.

"The Corporation is now prepared to recommend the tender of Eastern Wood-workers Limited to the Federal Minister, the Province has concurred in the recommendation and it now requires the approval of City Council, "he said

He then asked Mr. Borland, 'Regional Supervisor of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation to outline the reasons for the award.

Mr. Borland: "The tender of Eastern Woodworkers Limited is the lowest bid - \$4,579,794.09. The next one was Terminal Construction Company, a division of Henry J. Kaiser, at \$4,595,942.70. or \$16,000.00 difference."

Alderman Lloyd asked to have the matter of floor alternative explained.

Mr. Borland: "The base bid which I quoted here is for the slab floor
which is the one included in the design and the plans and specifications.

However, in consideration of the fact that some contractors might be able to
effect very substantial savings by pouring their floors instead of using a
precast concrete slab, we did put an alternative in the tender, so that
contractors could quote a reduction or an addition for the use of the poured
floor, which then would be considered in the light of all the other factors.

It so happened that Eastern Woodworkers Limited bid the low bid on the base
specifications. In the place of the poured floor they made an addition of
some \$36,000.00. Terminal Construction Company made a deduction for the use
of poured floor of \$20,000.00 across the board, which if poured floors were
used, would bring their poured floor bid some \$4,000.00 below that of Eastern

Alderman Lloyd contended that if the \$36,000.00 were added to Eastern Woodworkers tender of \$4,579,794.90; and the \$20,000.00 were deducted from the Terminal Construction Company tender of \$4,595,942.70, the difference between the two would be nearly \$40,000.00 with the Terminal Construction Company being the low bidder.

Woodworkers Limited."

Mr. Borland: "We don't want a poured floor --- we never did want a poured floor."

Alderman Lloyd: "The difference, on a comparative basis, for a poured floor is \$40,000.00."

Alderman O'Brien: "Yes, but for the 'low' floor in each case the difference is not so great."

Alderman Lloyd pointed out that in the case of both the tenders (Eastern Woodworkers and Terminal Construction) covering the slab floor specification, the difference between them is \$16,000.00 rather than \$4,000.00.

Mr. Borland: "The difference there is explained by the fact that we were attempting to get the cheapest possible job, and in the one case the cheapest job is \$4,579,794.90 (Eastern Woodworkers Ltd.). In the case of Terminal Construction Company, the cheapest job is \$4,575,942.70."

Alderman Lloyd: "If you were indifferent about the floors and they were equal, then you would have a difference of \$4,000.00."

Mr. Borland: "That's right. Our feeling is, after several considerations is that we prefer — in fact the base bid was based on the slab floor. This is what we really want. The other was the alternative and in spite of a difference of around \$4,000'.00 we still want to consider that the slab floor if preferable at the expense of \$4,000.00."

Alderman Lloyd: "But in the tendering, you did give the alternative."

Mr. Borland: "Oh, yes."

Alderman Lloyd: "And under the alternate tendering, to put the slab floor in to your specifications, compared with Eastern Woodworkers Limited, the Terminal Construction Company would have given you the job for \$4,000.00 less."

Alderman Dunlop: "Why did the Corporation ask for these two types of floors when Mr. Borland is so strong against the poured floor now?"

Mr. Borland: "If there had been some hundred thousand dollars difference we might have had some different views on it."

Alderman Dunlop: "That wouldn't be the test to me. You're saying, now, that you wouldn't want a poured floor under any consideration at all. You don't want it at a difference of \$4,000.00, but you have asked the tenderers for that."

Alderman Lloyd: "On the basis of the base specifications you are \$16,000.00 better off with the tender of Eastern Woodworkers Limited, whatever you may have done back and forth with these alternative bids." And he said it would be difficult for Council not to concur in the recommendation of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation to make the award to an established Nova Scotian firm, even if there was a small difference.

His Worship the Mayor then asked Mr. Borland if the \$67,500.00 reduction in the tender of Eastern Woodworkers Limited is for windows they have suggested as alternatives subject to acceptance by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

Mr. Borland: "That is right."

Alderman Ferguson asked what kind of window was proposed by Eastern Woodworkers as an alternative.

Mr. Borland said that the base window is a steel window and the bidders were given an opportunity to bid on an alternative provided it were acceptable and he said that the alternative proposed by Eastern Woodworkers Limited is an aluminum window made by a Montreal firm. "This is the window Eastern Woodworkers Limited have priced and they have indicated on their tender that if this window were used it would result in a reduction of \$67,500.00. If the window is acceptable or can be made acceptable it will be chosen and effect this reduction. If it is not acceptable, then it will not be chosen and we go back to the base bid."

His Worship the Mayor said there was another point he wished to bring to the attention of Council: "In this whole project there are certain roads and streets which had to be presented to Council for approval and Council agreed upon them some time ago. Because of the large size of the project some of them appear to be City Streets, and in accepting them as such, the City services, curb and gutter, paving sidewalks and so on, are in this contract price at \$100,000.00. Now, we must put in the general tax levy the City's portion of the services. So, the charges to the project will be reduced by some \$39,000.00."

Alderman Lloyd: "How is the funding of this \$4,500,000.00 to be done?"

His Worship the Mayor: "Our funding is to take place by the normal method of twenty year borrowings which we are permitted to Carry. The Federal Government's funding is on a 40-year term."

Alderman Lloyd: "In other words, we will go to the market for oneeighth or, roughly, \$600,000.00 for our portion. The Province goes for his money and Ottawa provides the balance." And he asked in what manner the City's share will be paid.

Mr. Borland: "The City will be billed quarterly as part of its payments are made by us. We act as bankers. We will bill you quarterly for the one-eighth."

Alderman Lloyd: "Then, we have to fund that payment when we go to the market for funding purposes."

Alderman O'Brien: "When will Eastern Woodworkers Limited be able to start?"

Mr. Borland: "I would think they would start right away. By right away I mean within the next few days."

Alderman DeWolf asked if the contractor would work on the project through the winter months and Mr. Borland answered in the affirmative.

Alderman Lane asked if there was any completion date to the centract, and she referred to other projects which had been started in the City but which had not been completed, and she contended that the important thing is to get people into these units as quickly as possible.

Mr. Borland: "The bidders were required to state their completion dates." He advised that Eastern Woodworkers Limited gave a completion date of two and one-half years for completion of the entire project, including landscaping, but that some units would be ready for occupancy within a year.

Alderman Dunlop asked what bond was required to be posted by the successful tenderer, and when advised by Mr. Borland that a bond of \$100,000. 00 was to be posted, he stated that the amount was too small for a contract of \$4,500.000.00.

Mr. Borland advised that there is also a hold back of 10% and it accumulates with progress payments until 15% is reached at which point it remains static; so that by the completion of the project there will be a total hold-back of approximately \$800,000.00.

Alderman Dunlop stated that the amount would be adequate on completion but contended that if the project was only partially completed and the contractor failed to complete some, the partnership would be in a difficult position.

Mr. Borland: "First of all, a hold-back of 10% of the value of the work put in place and materials on the site will be retained from all progress payments. This hold-back together with the security deposit where such is

submitted in accordance with the tender document will be released 45 days after the whole contract has been completed to the satisfaction of the Engineers.

MSo, at the half-way point of this Contract there would be \$2,250,000.00 worth of work done; \$225,000.00 hold-back, plus \$100,000.00 security deposit. So, at that point we would have \$325,000.00 of the contractor's money. Insofar as the stability of the firms is concerned, Eastern Woodworkers Limited is a reputable Maritime firm that has done a lot of work in this area -- not (we have had considerable experience with them) but only for the corporation they also have done other work for other organizations such as schools and that sort of thing and I don't think there is any question about their reliability. There certainly isn't any in our minds. As far as Terminal Construction Company is concerned, the same thing may be said. They have not done work recently for the Corporation but they did do some a few years ago. They have done work other places and they, too, are quite stable. So, I don't think there is any question. Mr. DeBard, I may say raised this in Committee at the time the tenders were opened, and consideration was being made. We have continual reports from Dun and Bradstreet on the Eastern Woodworkers Limited and we have no reason to be at all fearful that they will not complete the contract completely in accordance with the requirements.

"With respect to completion date, the central heating plant will be completed in November of 1960. The first building will be completed in December, 1960; and, then one building a month from then on throughout the winter, and the final completion is in October of 1961."

His Worship the Mayor said that he had asked the City Manager before he left for the City Manager's Convention whether he had any reservations concerning the tenders, and he had submitted the following memorandum: His Worship, C.A. Vaughan.

A.A. DeBard, Jr., City Manager.

October 21, 1959

Mulgrave Park Tender

I should really address this memorandum to the Aldermen but since it may not be necessary to use it I am giving it to you.

If the award of the Mulgrave Park Housing project tender is to be made at the Council meeting of October 22, 1959 it is being made without recommendation from me because I do not have the information to determine who is the low tenderer or to recommend which tender is in the best interest of the City of Halifax.

When the tenders were opened on October 8, 1959 the two lowest tenders were Eastern Woodworking \$4,579,804.09 (changed to \$4,579,794.09 -mathematical error) and Terminal Construction Company \$4,595,942.70. As we tabulated the tenders it was apparent that the alternate on windows and floors in certain combinations would affect the ultimate award.

One of the first things we discovered was that an ambiguity in a telegram from Eastern Woodworkers had led us to believe that exercise of the window option would reduce the price from a reduction of \$52,500.00 to \$27,500.00 whereas the telegram meant it would be increased to \$67,500.00 — a difference of \$30,000.00 — if we took Eastern's window alternate.

It was also discovered that if we stayed with the windows specified in the specifications that Terminal would be the low bidder if we used the alternative poured floor.

My immediate reaction, expressed to Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation officials and Mr. Lubby was that we secure a report from head office of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation who might have data on the alternate windows proposed. This came about because we were told that Central Mortgage and Housing Corporations Head office had many samples in Ottawa. In addition, I requested that a sample window be sent from New Glasgow and was informed they were in Montreal. It was my understanding that shipment of a sample was being requested.

With regard to the floor I was told that the net result was work of equal excellence but later on was informed that a poured floor would not result in a satisfactory ceiling on the underside and that a hung ceiling was necessary to hide laps. I then suggested that if a poured floor were decided upon that the bidder be given the option of placing a ceiling at his expense. In other words, a \$20,000.00 reduction would come to the City and we would end up with a poured floor which have a ceiling similar to a slab floor.

# The above tabulation does not add \$36,000.00 to the bid of Eastern Woodworking for a poured floor. If it did, Terminal would he low on the base bid with both window and floor alternate.

As of 3:00 P.M. on October 21, 1959 I have no report on window alternates nor have I seen sample windows. I am, therefore, unable to advise Council anything except — do not award until we have full information. We are all desirous of getting on with this project but I suppose we also desire a wise and fair decision before concurring in an award. I believe the following is necessary before a decision can be reached.

#### 1. General policy

There has been expressed to me over the telephone the idea that the bid must be awarded to Eastern as the lowest base bidder. Alternates are then to be selected. Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation should categorically state if this is their belief. If it is, I would point out that the purpose of alternates is to modify the award according to the amount to be deducted or added to the base bid for a cheaper or better job. Therefore a base bid is only a starting point and is of no significance if the alternates, applied result in a lower bid from another bidder.

#### 2. Windows.

I would like to inspect a window accompanied by Messrs. West and Napier to see.

- (a) Material of which made finish weight, etc with relation to climatic conditions.
- (b) Mechanical or operational and design features with relation to our climate.
- (c) The report of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation Head Office with an analysis of physical and cost features.

It was agreed that no action be taken on the memorandum but that it be filed since responsibility for technical matters in connection with the Project rests with Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, but at the suggestion of Alderman Dunlop, Mr. Borland was requested to prepare a statement covering the points raised in the City Manager's memorandum.

The motion was then put and passed.

AGREEMENT - CITY OF HALIFAX AND INDUSTRIAL ESTATES LTD. RE: PURITAN CANNERS
ATLANTIC LIMITED

A draft agreement between the City of Halifax and Industrial Estates
Limited covering sale of a parcel of land on Kempt Road to Industrial Estates
Ltd. who will construct a building thereon and lease same to Puritan Canners
Atlantic Limited, was submitted.

His Worship the Mayor advised that Clause 3.02 and 3.07 of the Draft Agreement had been amended as follows:

1. Clause 3.02 of the proposed agreement is amended by striking out all the words after  $A(a)^m$  and before  $A(b)^m$  and substituting therefor the following:

An easement reserved to the City along the line of the existing water pipes of the Public Service Commission, but permitting Industrial to erect buildings or other plant over such pipes after furnishing the City with six months written notice stating, inter alia, the location of the boundaries of the land proposed to be so constructed upon.

2. Clause 3.07 of the proposed agreement is amended by striking out the words the shell of in the second line at the top of page 4.

His Worship the Mayor referred to the plan of the area attached to the agreement and pointed out the proposed location of the principal plant. He said that the Company was negotiating with the Federal Government to enable them to erect their first addition to the south of the original building.

"On the north side of the proposed building, but not going over to the easement, they make reservation now for a second addition which is now being discussed with the Company. Anything beyond that is in the future, so the question of easement does not enter into the actual discussion except to reserve and protect the Company on this easement, and to protect the Public Service Commission as far as their interests are concerned." Alderman Dunlop contended that the amendment does not protect the City as it provides that the Company can build over the pipes.

His Worship the Mayor: "If they didn't get this in here, there would be no plant built."

Alderman lane: This was thoroughly gone into yesterday at the Public Service Commission and it is felt that a full discussion of it has gone on with the principals in this proposition and the Public Service Commission feels that until the second expansion is proceeded with, that they are reasonably well protected and arrangements are possible to further protect what they desire to have. They actually would like to have the land squared off in order to avoid certain trucking operations over the easement but at the moment they are fairly well content. As you are aware, they have the right of expropriation if it should come to that but it was felt that that would not be necessary because of the Commission, so, I feel that that is in hand.

His Worship the Mayore The Robert Simpson Eastern Limited had a similar situation and the Public Service Commission required the Company, in order to protect the easement, to bridge over that portion over which they put a building. They also protected themselves by getting an agreement from the Company that they would be liable for the cost of any necessary work for repair of the pipes."

Alderman Dunlop stated that that was not in the agreement.

His Worship the Mayor: Let us put it here then that an agreement whereby the City will accept any responsibility providing the work is necessary to protect the Public Service Commission's piges!;

Alderman Dunlop: "That would seem to be the reasonable thing to do."

Alderman Lleyd: Do we need it? What is the argument? He then read the amendment to the agreement and said. "Surely that means that they have to get our approval for what they are going to do and at that time we could lay down such regulations as we thought necessary."

Alderman Dunlop: "I would like to ask Mr. Mingo if that is what his draft means, as it doesn't mean that to me. It means that the Company would only have to give the City six months! notice and they could go ahead and build on it."

Alderman Lloyd: "Alderman Dunlop has made his point and I am not going to vie with his viewpoint, but in reading the total document is there anything else that offsets what he says?"

His Worship the Mayor: "No! The City of Halifax, when they sold the assets to the Public Service Commission, as a body corporate, conveyed to the Public Service Commission all the easements, rights-of-way and so on that the City water department held, including easements and rights-of-way and on other City lands where it appeared. Now, this is an easement. The Public Service Commission now hold the rasement. We are selling this land and the Public Service Commission is quite willing to go along with it only in so far as their operating system is protected. Now, I think probably to protect the City in this case and protect all parties — the Company particularly, that we can write in the last phrase that the City of Halifax will be responsible for any works or construction necessary to maintain the pipes!"

Alderman Lloyd: "I think that Alderman Dunlop's point was that not only should we be given notice, but I think there should be some agreement that any works would have to be constructed by the City are integrated with the planning of the building structure enclosed there; and I think that is what he is trying to point out."

Alderman Dunlop: "Someone should have the right to build a tunnel, for instance. As it stands now, the Company only has to give the City six months! notice; and they can go shead and build over the top."

Alderman Lloyd: "What do you mean when you say you give an easement?

Does that not convey some right? What is the right that you're holding here?"

His Worship the Mayor: "The right to use the land, or that portion underneath the ground." Alderman bloyd: "An easement reserved to the City along the line of the existing water pipes, but permitting industrial to erect a building or other over such pipes. Now, surely that structure over the pipes should not in any way interefere with the easement whatever the easement is. Does your definition of an easement, where a structure is put over it, mean access through a tunnel?"

His Worship the Mayor. "No. I think we should spell it to protect future Councils."

Alderman Lloyd: "Mr. Mingo is here. What does he have to say about this? Whom does he represent?"

City Solicitor. "Mr. Mingo, who represents Industrial Estates Limited drew this agreement after consulting with me, prior to the conversation His Worship the Mayor had with the Public Service Commission to the effect that after six months, if it were necessary to build a tunnel there, the Public Service Commission would do it, but we would pay the costs. That is why it is drafted along that line."

Alderman Lloyd asked if the City Solicitor had any objection to the clause being included in the Agreement to which the City Solicitor replied in the negative.

Alderman Dunlop: "I would think that if the Company wants to build and the original Agreement provided that that easement wasn't to be built on as that was free, now we are saying the Company can build on it, but you are saying that if the Company does want to build on it, the City has to do the tunneling. I think it should be the other way. I think that if the Company wants to build over the easement, they should protect the pipes."

His Worship the Mayor: "We can't do this or they will abandon the whole project."

Alderman Dunlop: "I suppose we have to go along with it."

His Worship the Mayor: "There is this case here that we have conveyed, you remember, the original draft in the June Connoil and the Council agreed to rough terms authorizing myself and Mr. Simpson to further negotiate with the Company. We have done so, and as a result of our meeting with our

Solicitors, Mr. Mingo and Mr. Doyle, we have this draft Agreement here. Now there are some changes in the outside boundaries of this to give them more land in view of the changed plans of the Company since June 9. When we were discussing this, the question of location of the easement was not brought up. It wasn't discussed before. Plans have been drawn for this building to start within a few days; and they are not building over the easement at this time, but I think they have to be clear on the easement. Otherwise, they won't make the best of their plans; because in any future planning they only get a corner of that and there is no point in us making a concrete tunnel from one end to the other if only 12 feet is needed."

Alderman Lloyd asked if the easements the City held were transferred to the Public Service Commission to which His Worship the Mayor replied in the affirmative. "Can we bind the Public Service Commission to this kind of a document?"

His Worship the Mayor: "No."

Alderman Lloyd: "Aren't they the ones who are responsible for protecting their rights under their easement? Therefore, before any lease is granted at that time, I presume they will come forward."

His Worship the Mayor: "Except that as it stands, if we can get this through Council tonight, it can go to the Industrial Estates tomorrow morning; and they can sign this document. Then we are on the way. I don't think it is fair to our Public Service Commission to pay any bridging or any tunnelling on something we convey to them. The Commission is being very co-operative in letting them build over the easement --- provided our rights are protected."

Alderman Lloyd: What you are in essence saying is that if there is any construction because of the easement which causes additional expense to the Company to protect the water pipe, that the City is prepared to pay for it and you are saying that this is one of the conditions of this Agreement which the Company is seeking as they want protection from any costs."

His Worship the Mayor: "Yes, so they can develop their Plant, north-wardly, on the next lot.

Alderman Lloyd: "The specification of the type and kind of structure will be detailed by the Public Service Commission under their right of easement. I think it should go in the agreement."

His Worship the Mayor: "Mr. Mingo will take it from this to draft it."

Mr. Mingo: "Mr. Doyle and myself considered and thought that the

addition of the following words to the amendment would achieve Your Worship's

purpose: after the word 'upon' insert 'all expense incurred to protect such

water pipes to be borne by the City and not be charged either to Industrial

or to the Public Service Commission."

Alderman O'Brien said that the Public Service Commussion is protected, but the City could be caught with a substantial cost and he asked. What does the Commissioner of Works say about the costs of the tunnel?

Dear Sirs:

As you are probably aware ownership of this Company recently changes hands and despite the fact that outside interests were endeavouring to acquire control, Maritime interests now own this Company one hundred percent.

In acquiring this Company the new owners, after due study realized that expansion was essential if the Company were to prosper, or in fact, circle. The first problem was to see if it were financially possible to expand the present facilities, or if it might be necessary to build a completely new and modern plant, probably outside the City. Estimates of the cost of expansion run to not exceeding \$125,000.00 and it would be the plan to proceed immediately with the necessary construction, provided some arrangements could be made regarding civic taxes.

We presently pay approximately \$19,000.00 per annum and we find that competitors of ours with plants having a larger square foot area or approximately the same square foot area and located in the Cities of Saint John. New Brunswick; Loudon. Ontario; Hamilton, Ontario; and Kitchener. Ontario, pay taxes of much less. For example, one plant with a larger area and over twice our production pays about \$9,800.00 per annum or half the taxes we pay. Another one with fifty percent more production and over ten percent more area pays only \$6.400.00 taxes. Another one with approximately the same area and the same production pays \$8,400.00 taxes and another one with ten percent less space and ten percent less production pays\$8,700.00 taxes. In other words, we pay from two or three times the taxes with the same or a lot less production and approximately the same area. Under the circumstances you will see that our clients do not want to build here and further increase their taxes.

Their reasoning is based as follows:

Let us take for example the plant with twice the production and which pays \$10,000.00 a year less taxes than we do. We could take the \$10,000.00, borrow \$125,000.00 and have \$2,300.00 a year left over for the payment of interest to reduce the loan. In other words, the difference in taxes enables us to borrow the money and gradually pay off the loan. In the case of the plant which has forty-five percent more production than we have, we could borrow the money and pay off over \$6,000.00 a year on the loan. You will thus see that the tax problem is a very important one. This all, in addition to the fact that if we went elsewhere we could build a modern plant and obtain more room for even further expansion in the future.

Our survey of the situation reveals that with this expansion we can expect over the next ten years to employ an additional fifty to sixty personnel which added to our present personnel of approximately ninety would mean a fairly substantial industry for the City.

Our request, in simple terms, is that over the next ten years, assuming the tax rate remains constant, that we pay no more dollars in taxes than we are currently paying.

There is one other small problem involving entrance from St. Albants Street; but this is of a minor nature and it would be our belief that with the comperation of the City Engineer that this minor difficulty can be overcome. It would be appreciated, therefore, if your Commission would give our problem your favourable consideration. If further information and details are required please be assured that they will be available at your request.

His Worship the Mayor: "This matter was considered by the Council in June of 1958 and the Council agreed in principle to the establishing of a parking lot in this area. However, we did not sign the agreement with the Federal Government and therefore it is not a project area as yet. I have held off the Liquor Commission for almost 18 months. They have been calling me at least once a month urging that I do something about it to make a decision. This was recommended by Professor Stephenson but the Council hasn't yet decided to sign a document with the Federal Government."

Alderman O'Brien: "Is the position different from Water Street?"

His Worship the Mayor: "I think so because Council agreed in principle to take action on this. The Liquor Commission have arranged to pur thase another lot across the street from Dresden Row at an amount greater than what we paid for this list. They are prepared to convey the lot to the City of Halifax at the sum they paid for the lot \$18,050.00. In order to let them go ahead with their development and to hold this property for our own development, the Redevelopment Committee has recommended and the Finance Committee has approved of the purchase of this property."

Alderman O'Brien: "Before this is passed, I would like to hear the Solicitor say for the record, at least, whether the price that is established by this purchase will, in his view, determine the price of the adjoining land for future purchase for the parking lot?"

City Solicitors "I would say in regard to that, in my view, where the Liquor Commission is purchasing it for a definite specific purpose, that that would not be the general market value of properties in that district. They have to have space. In that case, it is value to them and not to the person who is selling it."

## TRANSIT SYSTEM - NOVA SCOTIA LIGHT AND POWER COMPANY LIMITED

His Worship the Mayor: "Today I received a number of letters from people concerned about the relocation of the Number 7 and 8 tracking coaches." I replied that I don't own the trolley coaches and 1 am not making the move. I received one telephone call tonight at my home which indicated that the letters which came to me were signed by one person and the names were forged by one person."

Alderman Lloyd. "If you read the report and preliminary observations of the Company, it is quite obvious that financing presents a different problem than 40 years ago; and we may be faced with a different appoint on our relations with the Nova Scotia Light and Fower Company Limited.

There is a suggestion of it contained in the report. I thank that it is only proper to say that before there is any wholesale change in transit services, the City may have to become a real partner in this operation becomes we are finished. We do have related to the trolley coach system the problem of parking and the problem of traffic movement."

He suggested that some concession might be granted the Company to main; tain its operations at a fair and reasonable mate.

Alderman Lloyd: "It may be that some of the proposals now before us may lead us to the conclusion that a transit system in the City is part of a public service and we can't rely upon it to be operated solely as a print vate enterprise. I would like to see a partnership not necessarily between

ship under which a free enterprise can earn its just return on capital and the City take its responsibility for the kind of service that is required for public convenience, but which are not a revenue producing type of service."

He then referred to the practice carried out a few years ago pertaining to water extensions by the Public Service Commission in areas where it
would be uneconomical for them to do so where ten or twelve houses would
underwrite the carrying charges of the water line until a point of proper
return was arrived at. "It is something in that field that I think you may
be faced with."

The City Solicitor stated that as Council is bound by specific agree, ment and statutes at present, that general legislation be secured notwith. standing the present Act, Council may, by resolution, make changes in the present Agreement.

The suggestion of the City Solicitor was agreed to.

STREET LIGHTING SURVEY .. NOVA SCOTIA LIGHT AND POWER COMPANY LIMITED

Alderman Butler: "Some time ago the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company Limited undertook to make a survey of the Street lighting in the City and I was wondering if anything had been heard from them."

His Worship the Mayor? "Nothing as yet, May I bring up the matter of

street lighting as we have a problem from time to time with underground wiring. With improvements now being conducted on Windsor Street, Lady Hammond Road and Kempt Road, it was thought that we should go to underground wiring in the area. but underground wiring in the center of the boulevard down Windsor Street and to erect the standards, would cost about \$6,000,00 so there is no great problem there. By so doing, we would move all the unility lines to the south and east side of Windsor Street. Because of the curre in the street, it is necessary for the utility companies to put up what the call sub poles. A sub pole is a secondary supporting pole which goes across the street from the main line and down into the ground. It would mean for an expenditure of \$6,000.00 we would have no over-head wiring, but we would have these sub poles crossing the streets at every lamp post. Faced with that possibility, we then approached the Nova Scotia Light & Power Co. Ltd. for an estimate of the cost of gaing completely underground about 1000 feet for all utilities. The figure we have been given by the officials of the Company is \$100,000.00 or about \$100.00 per foot. However, we are exploring another possibility, and that is acquiring a right-of-way from the rear of the property on Windsor Street and putting poles up there and removing them from the street line by put having the right-of-way. I just wanted to tell you about underground wiring and this When it is suggested by letters to the Editor one figure we have asked for. and other public spirited citizens in the City, that we go underground with our street lighting, wiring and everything else, you can just readily imagine what it would cost to put the wiring underground at \$100,00 per foot. No only that, but don't forget that in our agreement with the NoSoL, & P. Co., Led. for permission to run their lines over the City streets for which they pay a special tax; any time we go underground, it is at the expense of the fity.

## PARKING ON TROLLEY COACH ROUTES

Alderman O'Briens When the rates were increased there was some discussion here, and as I recall it, a committee was appointed to consider parking and traffic on trolley routes particularly in down town Hallfax. I

of the transit system really dealt with this aspect of the problem satisfactorily. I think this is the place where the partnership needs to get busy a bit. I think the aspect of the efficiency of the transit system related to parking and traffic is a problem and I would like to get the records on that Committee. If there has been no report, I think that the whole subject matter along with the Cosgrove, Monti Report ought to be dealt with together at the Finance and Executive Committee.

Alderman Lloyd: "I think that what we should do is in the Finance and Executive Committee make a note of the Alderman's observations and see what plan of organization we can devise to deal with those two matters as they are connected with each other. I can forsee in the Finance and Executive Committee discussion on movement of traffic, traffic direction and parking in relation to whatever new agreement we may make with the N.S.L. & P. Co. Ltd."

His Worship the Mayor: "Our new man on our staff .. Mr. DeSilva has had experience in traffic planning and so has Mr. Munnich."

## ELECTION COMMITTEE REPORT

Alderman O'Brien: "It won't be too many months before we are deep in budget discussions and legislation. We postponed for a couple of years consideration of a report from the Election Committee because we haven't had one. I suggest to you, respectfully, that the work of that Committee not be poster poned until we are up to our necks in this other kind of work and therefore have a reason to postpone once again any decision on the matter that was referred to it."

His Worship the Mayor: "I just can't find enough hours in the day to call meetings of this type. I can't find anything glaringly wrong with our Election system and until such time as there is a clamour from the public demanding changes, I just can't see us devoting our time to that when there were more important things to do."

Alderman O'Brien: "I am going to suggest that if your view is the majority view of the members of the Committee or Council, the sensible way to deal with it is to pass a motion in a five minute meeting of the Committee that it is not important enough to deal with and so report to Council. If Council does not want it, it can let a vote turn it down."

## TWO-YEAR TERM FOR MAYOR

His Worship the Mayor: "I would like to see this Council recommend to the Legislature a two-year term for Mayor and bring it in line with the majority of the Cities across the Country and every other incorporated Itwn and City in Nova Scotia. If the Council wants to retain the limitation in so far as the number of years, you can make it two consecutive terms. In other words, make it a four-year term. We also must consider the impact of the change of taxation that we brought about recently on the voting."

Alderman Lloyd: "I am going to ask you to have these matters put on the agenda of the Finance and Executive Committee."

EXECUTION -- AGREEMENT -- INDUSTRIAL ESTATES LIMITED AND CITY OF HALIFAX

Your Committee recommends that the authority requested be granted.

## APPOINIMENT -- COMPENSATION OFFICER -- REDEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council.

At a meeting of the Redevelopment Committee held on November 6, 1959 a report was submitted from the City Manager relative to the appointment of a Compensation Officer for the redevelopment work in the City.

He recommended that Mr. Charles David Smith be appointed as Compensation Officer at a salary of \$6,000.00 with increments of \$500.00 per year until a maximum of \$8,000.00 is attained. This Officer would report directly to Council through the Redevelopment Committee.

Your Committee concurs in this recommendation.

Subject: Compensation Officer . Redevelopment Area.

We received only three applications for the position of Compensation Officer for the redevelopment work of the City.

I would like to recommend for appointment an applicant who was born in Nova Scotia. He is thirty—five years of age with two years of college and one year of law supplemented by special lectures at two Canadian universities in real estate appraising and expropriation.

He is married, the father of two children and served in World War II for one year as a seaman.

He worked for three years with a Montreal trust company in real estate administration and spent four years as a property negotiator for the City of Vancouver. Included in this work were negotiations settling compensation for

businesses such as a printing shop, laundry and dry cleaning, restaurant, tire retreaders, hotel, building supplies and hardware, electrical manufacturing, etc. He was also engaged for a year in real estate sales and spent two years as a right-of-way agent for the B. C. Electric Company.

I received a very commendatory reference from an official of the City of Vancouver (by telephone) and recommend the appointment at a salary of \$6,000.00 per year with yearly increases of \$500.00 per year to a maximum of \$8,000.00 a year.

There has been nothing decided concerning his place in the organization. I would recommend that he report directly to Council through the Redevelopment Committee so that recommendations for settlements would be his responsibility. For him to report through me would compel me to spend almost as much time considering settlements as he does, which would defeat the purpose of his appointment. Naturally all civic officials, including the writer, would be available for consultation. So far as administration is concerned, he would be responsible to the City Manager and would be subject to assignment to other duties if he had the time available.

Alderman Ferguson "Will this be a permanent appointment? There was considerable discussion in Council."

ent providing redevelopment work goes on. He realizes that it could come to an end. I told him that if it did come to an end and there was a place where we could fit him into our organization, he would certainly receive every consideration, but there is absolutely no promise. That was mentioned in discussion with the Mayor and was also to be confirmed in writing after tonight if Council approves the appointment.

Alderman Lane "Alderman Ferguson brought up a point which I think might well be included in the recommendation of the appointment of this officer, and that is that he be appointed Compensation Officer under the conditions as outlined by the Manager for such time as the services of a Compensation Officer are required by the City."

Alderman Ferguson: "I think it should be included."

Alderman Hoyd arraved 8:05 P. M.

Alderman Butler: "The word, 'compensation', does that mean that this person is a Land purchasing agent or will be be a person who will negotiate the leasing of City properties?"

His Worship the Mayor. \*No, he will be involved in settlement of expropriation. He is here to advise the Council and the City Solicitor when going ... 770 -

into Court. He is to be our expert witness in those cases. The work we want him to do, primarily, is the question of settlements. His principal strength lies in that field.

Alderman Butler: "If somebody comes to Halifax or somebody who is in Halifax, wishes to negotiate the purchase of some of the land within the redevelopment area, would they approach him or someone else?"

His Worship the Mayor. We could use him on that end of it, too."

Alderman Butler. "His function then is to establish value and carry it forth if necessary to Court on our behalf."

His Worship the Mayor: "That is right,"

Alderman Ferguson "As I understand it, he is going to be the expert witness on behalf of the City. Are his qualifications such that they will be recognized by the Court?"

His Worship the Mayor "I think so."

City Solicitor: "From what I have heard Mr. DeBard say, I think the Court would recognize him as a qualified expert."

Alderman DeWolf. "The experience that he seems to have gathered seems to be very good on paper, but it hasn't been in the City of Halifax. He is going to be working under a handicap when he starts, I suggest. It takes about six months or, perhaps, a year to get used to it. I understood this position was advertised in the Financial Post. If you want a man to fill a job of that kind, there should be somebody in this organization who could go out and put his finger on a man and say, 'will you come and work for us?'. I don't speak of anyone an particular, but I know there must be men in this case rather than advertises far and wide. I think it is a sign of weakness on our part to have it advertised in Toronto newspapers,"

His Worship the Mayor. "We had it advertised in the local newspapers."

Alderman Dewolf. "I suggest that it is the job of somebody in this organization to go out and get a man when you want a man in this special job."

His Worship the Mayor "I was quite happy with the results we got from our advertisement in the Financial Post. We got more results there than we did from our local advertisements."

City Manager: "There were only three applications from this recent advertisement. Back some time ago we advertised, but the Committee didn't think any applicants were favorable."

Alderman Ferguson: "Has this applicant taken any technical courses in appraisal?"

The City Manager answered in the affirmative and said he had taken special courses in that field at McGill University and the University of British Columbia.

Alderman lloyd asked if this employee would be permanent.

His Worship the Mayor "Alderman Lane has put it quite clear that this person be engaged so long as his services are required for this type of work. Suppose we have gone through a major program in two or three years, his services are no longer going to be required."

Alderman Lloyd: "Why not just make it simple, 'that he be retained at the pleasure of the Council'?"

His Worthip the Mayor: "I think nearly every member of the staff is at the pleasure of Council --- all the Commissioners and all the Officers."

Alderman Lloyd asked if it were Council or the City Manager who engaged the man.

His Worship the Mayors "Yes, we are engaging him because under the City Charter there is no provition made for him. Mr. DeBard felt because of the type of employment he is not a regular City employee, to fill a standing position in our erganization. We are taking him on for a special duty."

Alderman Lloyd . "He is being paid a salary."

His Worship the Mayor: "Yes,"

Alderman Lloyd: We have two ways of doing it, haven't we? One, he is appointed under a head of a department; and, two, he is appointed by the Manager.

City Manager "This man as not appointed by me."

Alderman Lloyd: "Does the Charter provide that he be appointed by you?"

City Manager. "It doesn't provide that I do it and the way he is coming
on, he is not a regular City employee. He really isn't working for the City

alone. He is working for us and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation as a partner.  $^{\rm h}$ 

Alderman Floyd "Is it a joint venture expenditure?"

City Manager. "The Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation pay half."

Alderman Lioyd. "Boes the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation have to express their approval of this selection?"

His Worship the Mayor "Yes, they have,"

Alderman Lloyd "It should be pointed out that it is a joint expenditure and your engaging the man for purposes of a joint activity so long as the City has such joint activities. It is presumed if his qualifications and work prove satisfactory, he should continue in service. Surely he is subject to dismissal by semebody."

His Worship the Mayor. "By this Council."

Aldermin Lipyd: "Without reference to Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation?"

City Managers "No.4

Alderman Lleyd. "In other words you are asking us for approval of the appointment of a certain person subject to the approval of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, and his dismissal is subject to Council and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation."

Alderman Ferguson: "Once Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation stops paying their portion of it, we know he is of no further value to us for redevelopment,"

Alderman Burler wasked of it were the practice of hiring a Compensation Officer in other Cities when they were doing redevelopment work.

His Worship the Mayor. "No, quite often City staff is used. For instance, the City of Toronto has a Real Estate Department, distinct from the Assessor's Department, and they manage the City-owned properties. We don't have a Real Estate Department because the size of our organization doesn't permit. We wouldn't have enough work to keep a man employed as a Real Estate Officer."

Moved by Alderman Abbott, seconded by Alderman O'Brien, that the report
