After the meeting was called to order, the members of Council attending, led by the City Clerk, joined in reciting the Lord's Prayer.

MINUTES

The minutes of the meetings held on February 21, March 21 and March 30, 1967 were approved on motion of Alderman Abbott, seconded by Alderman Matheson.

MOTION OF RECONSIDERATION

Motion - Alderman Ivany Re: Rezoning of Land Southeastern Corner Harvard and Yale Streets from R-2 Zone to C-2 Zone

MOVED by Alderman Ivany, seconded by Alderman Fitzgerald that the matter of the rezoning of land at the southeastern corner Harvard and Yale Streets from R-2 zone to C-2 zone be reconsidered. He said he did this not because of his concern for Council's responsibility entirely to the Scotia Square project but for his concern for good planning. He challenged this project in any school of architecture, that a building should be wrapped round a gasoline station. Another reason was the receipt of Mr. Latham's report on the day of Council, March 30th, to which staff had no opportunity to make a reply.

Alderman Matheson stated that, it had been suggested to him, since he was out-of-town when the public hearing was held, he should not vote on the Motion to Reconsider, or take part in any debate, or vote on any subsequent motion. He asked

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the City Solicitor for a ruling on this matter.

The City Solicitor stated that if there was a second motion on the rezoning concerning the rights of citizens the Alderman would have had to hear the evidence in order to qualify to vote. He said since Alderman Matheson had missed the public hearing and the evidence he would rule he was not eligible to vote, and since he was not familiar with the evidence he would also rule the Alderman could not vote on the Motion to Reconsider.

Alderman Matheson disagreed with the City Solicitor's rulings on the rightness or wrongness of his voting on the issue, but stated surely he was permitted to express his views.

Alderman Ivany said he was concerned with the "spotty spot" rezoning in this area. He felt that if the City is going to be forced into enlarging the Quinpool Road area, then Council should consider the planning of the whole Yale Street area.

Alderman Meagher also was not present when the public hearing was held but felt he should be permitted to vote on the Motion of Reconsideration since he had read the reports and had been involved in discussion.

His Worship the Mayor, on the advice of the City Solicitor, ruled that any Aldermen not present at the public hearing could not vote on the Motion of Reconsideration or any subsequent motion.

Staff Establishment - Planning Division - Development Department

Alderman Ivany asked why the report to increase the staff establishment of the Development Department had not been before the Town Planning Board as he felt this Board should have had some say in the matter.

His Worship the Mayor replied that an increase in establishment was a legitimate item for the Finance and Executive Committee to consider but agreed that perhaps the matter should also have been discussed in the Town Planning Board.

Alderman Matheson referred to a press report appearing in the newspaper subsequent to the meeting of the Finance and Executive Committee meeting held on April 6, 1967, which reported remarks made by Alderman Ahern. He said he felt these remarks may have led the public to believe that they were the Committee's feelings in the matter, and he wished to refute the remarks since he felt the Committee agreed the City does not have too many planners and they are not overpaid.

Discussion ensued with respect to the need for additional planners and the qualifications such a person would require for a senior planner's position.

The Development Officer outlined the necessary qualifications for such a position.

MOVED by Alderman Matheson, seconded by Alderman Moir that, as recommended by the Finance and Executive Committee, the City Manager be authorized to engage the services of an additional Senior Planner in the Planning Division of the Development Department, supernumery to establishment on

a temporary basis.

The Motion was put and passed, with Aldermen Ahern, Connolly and Sullivan voting against.

At this time Council agreed to consider Item 15(c) from the report of the Town Planning Board.

Rezoning - R-2 Residential, R-3 Residential and C-1 Local Business to C-2 General - Land at Rear of Properties Fronting on Henry Street, Jubilee Road, Cedar Street and Robie Street

MOVED by Alderman Matheson, seconded by Alderman A. M. Butler that, as recommended by the Town Planning Board, the application to rezone land at the rear of property fronting on Henry Street, Jubilee Road, Cedar Street and Robie Street, from R-2 Zone, R-3 Zone, C-1 Zone to C-2 Zone for the purpose of establishing a retail shopping centre, be rejected, and that Staff be directed to look into the possible development of this land for some desirable purpose in keeping with the neighbourhood where it is located, and report such recommendations to the Town Planning Board. Amendment - Staff Establishment - Fire Department

MOVED by Alderman Fitzgerald, seconded by Alderman Moir that, as recommended by the Safety Committee, the staff establishment of the Fire Department be amended to provide for three additional men. Motion passed.

Bargaining Rights - Halifax Police Association

MOVED by Alderman Ivany, seconded by Alderman Meagher that, as recommended by the Safety Committee, in addition to bargaining rights for salaries and the matter of discrimination, the following items be included in future bargaining negotiations for Police Constables of the Halifax Police Association:

- 1. Overtime
- 2. Leave
- 3. Uniform and Clothing Issue
- 4. Grievance Procedure
- 5. Temporary Duty

The City Solicitor suggested that Item 4 respecting "Grievance Procedure" should read: "Grievance Procedure respecting negotiable matters only". Council agreed to the suggestion.

The motion was then put and passed.

Overtime Pay for Non-City Work - Fire Department Employees

MOVED by Alderman H. W. Butler, seconded by Alderman Abbott that, as recommended by the Safety Committee, the hourly rates of pay of \$3.50 per hour for Hosemen and \$4.00 per hour for Officers for fire prevention work performed for employers other than the City of Halifax, be approved. Motion passed.

Scale of Welfare Payments

MOVED by Alderman Moir, seconded by Alderman Meagher that, as recommended by the Public Health & Welfare Committee, the scale of Social Assistance payments contained in Regulations made by the Governor-in-Council pursuant to the Social Assistance Act be adopted as follows:

"For the purpose of these Regulations, the monthly budget deficit of a person shall be calculated as the difference between the total cost of the regularly recurring needs of the person at rates not exceeding the rates set out in this subsection and the income of the persons calculated in the manner set out in this sub-section, namely:

Elimination, Dust and Noise Nuisance - North Gottingen Street

MOVED by Alderman Sullivan, seconded by Alderman Abbott that, as recommended by the Public Health & Welfare Committee,

representatives of the firms of L. W. Allen Limited and Roy Judge Limited be invited to meet with the Town Planning Board to discuss ways and means of eliminating the dust and noise nuisance in the Gottingen Street area. Motion passed.

Alderman Fitzgerald said he had understood, at the last Council meeting, that action with respect to the petition presented, would also be referred to the Town Planning Board for report to Council. He said he was aware that the report of the Deputy City Solicitor had been forwarded to the first three named on the petition but he wondered if the report would be before Council at this time. He stated, at the appropriate time, he would give a Notice of Motion with regard to the lack of action or the City's inability to take action in this case due to legislation.

His Worship the Mayor replied that the Minutes of the Town Planning Board meeting indicated only the report of the Deputy City Solicitor would be sent to the three persons named on the petition.

Alderman Sullivan said he understood from the last Council Meeting there was no Statute in force nor anything that could be done concerning traffic on Gottingen Street as well as the operation of the dump.

His Worship the Mayor replied that there is no Ordinance governing the problem at hand but he understood this was the aim of Alderman Fitzgerald's proposed Motion.

Alderman Sullivan quoted from Section 164 of the Motor Vehicle Act.

His Worship the Mayor stated that this section of the

Motor Vehicle Act is applied in certain sections of the City at present where there seems to be no requirement for through traffic except for delivery trucks, and trucks under a certain size. He said the City Solicitor would have to advise where this Section could be applied in this case.

Alderman Fitzgerald stated there were two problems, one was the stockpiling of fill, and the other finding some suitable use for the area in question as well as other areas in the City.

It was agreed that Staff be directed to look into the most appropriate use for various land areas known as stockpiling sites and make recommendations to Council.

At this time Council agreed unanimously to consider item 20(f) - Appointment - Board of School Commissioners

MOVED by Alderman Ahern, seconded by Alderman Matheson that, Alderman Sullivan be appointed to the Board of School Commissioners for a term expiring December 31, 1969. Motion passed.

ORDINANCE #119 "POLL TAX" - SECOND READING

8:45 p.m. Council adjourned to meet as a Committee of the Whole.

Ordinance #119 "Poll Tax" which was read and passed a first time at the last regular meeting was again considered.

A report was submitted from the City Solicitor recommending that Ordinance #119 be amended by the inclusion of the following section:

Payment to 10. A person who has paid a poll tax for Other any year to any other city, town or municipality Municipalities in Nova Scotia, shall not be liable to pay a poll tax for the same year to the City of Halifax; but, if the amount of the poll tax so paid is less than the amount of the poll tax

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levied by the City of Halifax, he shall be liable to the City of Halifax in the amount by which the City of Halifax poll tax exceeds that poll tax which he has paid to the other city, town or municipality in Nova Scotia.

MOVED by Alderman Abbott, seconded by Alderman Ivany that Ordinance #119 be amended by adding thereto Section #10. Motion passed.

MOVED by Alderman A. M. Butler, seconded by Alderman H. W. Butler that, Ordinance #119, as amended, be read and passed a second time. Motion passed.

A further report was submitted from the City Solicitor suggesting several amendments to Ordinance #119 for 1968 and subsequent years.

MOVED by Alderman A. M. Butler, seconded by Alderman Abbott that, the suggested amendments be referred to the Finance & Executive Committee for consideration. Motion passed.

8:50 p.m. Council reconvened, the same members of Council being present.

MOVED by Alderman A. M. Butler, seconded by Alderman Abbott that, as recommended by the Committee of the Whole Council, Ordinance #119, as amended, be read and passed a second time. Motion passed.

REPORT - RECREATION AND PLAYGROUNDS COMMISSION RE: REPLACEMENT OF PAVILION & BATH HOUSE - CENTRAL COMMON

A report was submitted from the Recreation Commission requesting that the sum of \$90,000.00 be placed in the 1967 Capital Budget to replace the Pavilion Building and Bath House on the Central Common.

His Worship the Mayor asked the Acting City Manager if, in view of the fact that the City has not yet received approval

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
