The Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs has expressed his concurrence with this method of issue.

The Director of Finance elaborated at some length on the need for the City to enter into this particular kind of money market.

MOVED by Alderman Abbott, seconded by Alderman Ivany that the Staff Report be approved. Motion passed.

Preliminary 1970 Capital Budget for Province of Nova Scotia Program Development Agency

A report was submitted from Staff indicating that the 1970 Capital Budget for the City of Halifax is now in the preparation stage, plus a five year forecast for 1971-1975. The report pointed out that the Department of Regional Economic Expansion of the Federal Government is anxious to obtain details of the City's 1970 capital requirements and a preliminary draft budget for the year 1970 was prepared and a copy attached to the Staff Report.

The report read in part:

It is fair to say that the City, despite its ever expanding needs for capital improvements, is in no better position than in the Spring of 1967, when the seriousness of the capital situation was made known to the Province of Nova Scotia. Events since that time have proven that the statements made by the City were accurate and in fact our situation is accentuated by (a) serious shortage of funds in the money market, (b) steadily increasing interest rates and (c) the inevitable pressure on the current budget and tax rates as the effects of abnormally heavy fundings are brought into play. Annexation, of course, has increased the burden, because the new citizens have a right, within a reasonable period of time, to the same standard of peninsula services, because they are paying the same rates of property tax.

If the feelings of staff that fundings should be kept within the \$5,000,000 to \$6,000,000 range are correct, then many essential projects will have to be deferred.

Should it be necessary, and I doubt that anyone can deny the necessity of many of the projects suggested for deferment, then it would be logical to assume that Federal Government assistance will be made available. One order of priorities may well be as stated below:

- 1. Kline Heights Urban Renewal
- 2. St. Patrick's School Complex - Brunswick Street Duc D'Anville Addition - Clayton Park
 - 3. 4. Clayton Park (Lacewood) Sewer
 - 5. Sewers general ex McLaren Report
 - Sewer for Industrial Park
 - 6.
 - 7. Transit
 - Harbour Drive north to Gerrish Street (ties in 8. with recent proposal on Barrington Street Housing Project)

9. Gorsebrook Addition

10. Bloomfield Junior High School

11. Recreation projects

Alderman McGuire contended that the order of priorities, as suggested by Staff, requires some additional discussion by members of City Council.

A meeting of City Council was held on the above date.

After the meeting was called to order, the members of Council attending, led by the City Clerk, joined in reciting the Lord's Prayer.

Present: His Worship the Mayor, Chairman; and Aldermen Abbott, Connolly, Hogan, Ivany, LeBlanc, McGuire, Meagher, and Allen.

Also Present: City Manager, City Solicitor, City Clerk, and other staff members.

MINUTES

Minutes of the meeting of February 12, 1970 were approved on motion of Alderman Ivany, seconed by Alderman McGuire.

APPROVAL OF ORDER OF BUSINESS, ADDITIONS & DELETIONS The City Clerk requested the addition of the following items:

20 (a) - Staff report - Private Crossing Agreement - Sherwood Point.

20 (b) - 1970 Legislation

His Worship the Mayor requested the addition of: 20 (c) - Release of Watershed

Alderman Ivany requested the addition of:

20 (d) - Developing Housing Need

Alderman Abbott requested the addition of: 20 (e) - Appointments

MOVED by Alderman Abbott, seconded by Alderman McGuire, that the agenda, as amended, be approved.

DEFERRED ITEMS

REZONING LAND - 6243-49 SHIRLEY STREET FROM R-2 ZONE TO C-2 ZONE

At the February 12th meeting of City Council, following a Public Hearing into the above-noted matter, a motion was passed to the effect that a decision be deferred for two weeks to allow an opportunity for Ben's Limited, the applicant for the rezoning, and the people of the area, to further discuss their differences.

The City Clerk advised that he had not received any further communication from the parties concerned.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Ivany, that the application for rezoning of the property at 6243-6249 Shirley Street from R-2 Residential to C-2 General Business, be refused.

Alderman Hogan said he had been in touch with several members of the West-end Baptist Church, who had expressed the feeling that Ben's were a very good neighbour and considerate of the Church's requirements, and also kept their Bakery in very good condition.

Alderman McGuire said that while he was sure every member of Council could sympathize with the residents, the fact was that the refusal for the application for rezoning would not eliminate most of the objections raised against the Bakery. He also referred to the fact that staff had not been able to suggest an alternative location for Ben's, and also thought Alderman Connolly's statement significant to the effect that if Ben's

were to relocate, an industry which would prove to be more of a nuisance might possibly locate on the property.

Alderman Connolly suggested as an alternative site for Ben's the race track area of the Forum complex.

The motion was put and lost.

MOVED by Alderman McGuire, seconded by Alderman Allen, that the application for rezoning of the property at 6243-6249 Shirley Street from R-2 Residential to C-2 General Business, be approved.

Alderman Connolly said he had received a letter from Ben's stating that if the rezoning were approved, they would be willing to erect signs on Shirley Street prohibiting trucks over 1/2-ton, and suggested that the motion be amended to include this provision.

His Worship the Mayor advised that because of the number of petitioners who had signed against granting the application, it would require a 2/3 majority of City Council to approve it.

The City Solicitor advised that seven members constituted two-thirds of the Council.

The motion was put and lost, only six voting for, and two against, as follows:

For

Against - Aldermen Connolly and Ivany 2 Alderman McGuire asked if a motion of Reconsideration could be given at this time.

His Worship the Mayor quoted from Section 47 of Ordinance 103 which stated that when a motion proposed adoption or rejection of a amendment to the Zoning By-law has been

resolved in the negative, the proposed amendment shall not again be considered by the Council until twelve months have elapsed. He also referred to Section 46 which dealt with a matter not being brought up again before two months had gone by, and asked the City Solicitor his opinion as to which Section applied in the present case.

The City Solicitor said he would have to study the matter, and His Worship the Mayor said that in any event nothing could be done within the next few weeks, and suggested that if any Alderman wished to pursue the matter he contact the City Solicitor.

REZONING - R-2 RESIDENTIAL ZONE TO R-4 RESIDENTIAL - 14 WILLIAMS LAKE ROAD

The Town Planning Board submitted a recommendation to the February 12th meeting of City Council that an application for the above-noted rezoning be refused. At that meeting, a decision in the matter was deferred for two weeks since the applicant was out of town and was not aware of the Board's recommendation.

Alderman Allen made a few comments in support of the application, and MOVED, seconded by Alderman Abbott, that:

- The application for rezoning from R-2 Residential to R-4 Residential at No. 14 Williams Lake Road to permit the conversion of a duplex dwelling to a three-unit apartment building, as shown on Plan No. P200/2808, be approved;

Alderman LeBlanc's Motion of Reconsideration was seconded by Alderman Meagher and passed, five voting for the same and four against it, as follows:

Council agreed to hear from Mr. F. Machan, who wished to speak in opposition to the rezoning. Mr. Machan raised the following points:

<u>Parking</u> - He referred to the problems facing residents of the area due to the closeness of the Forum and the fact that there were already several apartment buildings in the neighbourhood, and visitors of the apartment house tenants utilized the streets for parking.

Density - He said there were four apartment buildings within 200 feet of the land now under consideration for rezoning, and another was being tentatively planned for the corner of Cork and Windsor, which land adjoined land on Liverpool Street.

<u>Traffic</u> - Mr. Machan said there was already a heavy flow of traffic from Bayers Road, Connaught Avenue, Connolly, Windsor, West, and Young Street, and there would be more when the new Narrows Bridge is opened. He said there would be a fanning out of traffic through Cork, Liverpool, London and Dublin Streets.

<u>Nuisance</u> - Mr. Machan enumerated some of the following nuisance factors connected with apartment buildings: Parking by tenants and visitors across private driveways. Inability of a home-owner to park in front of his own home. Blowing of horns,

skidding of tires, slamming of car doors, noisy mufflers, etc. Paper, trash thrown off balconies on to street and adjoining properties. He related a personal experience when an empty liquor bottled was smashed on a garden table in his yard, from which he and his wife had just seconds previously left. Noise from radios, hi-fi sets, etc. Pollution from burning of garbage in incinerators, inability to sit out in one's yard in the evening, and so forth. Also, he said, because of the sunlight being cut off from his home, his heating costs had risen 40%.

. ...

In summary, Mr. Machan referred to the numerous occasions on which this rezoning had been discussed during the past five years, on which occasions it had been turned down. He said it was a predominantly single-family home district, and assurances had been given to the property owners at the time the Holden Apartments were constructed, that those 57 units would represent the district's fair share of high-rise. He said that developers were aware of the zoning restrictions at the time they gathered land, so that they entered into it with their eyes open to the risks involved. He concluded by referring to the lack of a Master Plan at the moment, from which developer and citizen alike could gather a clear course of action, and the dangers involved in "Spot Rezoning" until such a Plan was available.

His Worship the Mayor stated that the motion before the Council was the one moved by Alderman Abbott and seconded by Alderman Hogan at the February 12th meeting of Council.

Alderman McGuire said that he did not feel anything new had come up that would warrant reversing the Council decision of February 12th. He said much of the trouble had arisen because of the "For Sale" sign which had appeared on some of the property under discussion, but that this in itself was outside of the actual application for rezoning. He stated that it had been confirmed that the owners of 6311 Liverpool Street had agreed to have their property included in the rezoning application. He said he was not forgetting the fact that all such rezoning presented difficulties to the residents of the area involved, but to suggest a blanket condemnation of apartments buildings in general indicated a gross misunderstanding of their value. Council's duty, he said, was to make decisions for the whole of the City, and not be unduly influenced by the private considerations of individuals, even though such opinions had to be taken into account.

Alderman Ivany referred to Mr. Machan's remarks concerning pollution caused by apartment house incinerators, and stated that, even though it was not a requirement of the City, developers of new apartment houses were not installing incinerators because of the problems in pollution.

The motion was put and passed, five voting for the same, and four against it, as follows:

For - Aldermen Connolly, Ivany, LeBlanc, Meagher, and Allen 5 Against - Aldermen Abbott, MacKeen, Hogan, and McGuire 4

MOVED by Alderman LeBlanc, seconded by Alderman Connolly, that approval be given to alter the official street lines at the southwestern corner of MacKintosh Street and Lady Hammond Road; to confirm the eastern street line of MacKintosh Street north of Forrester Street and to confirm the street lines of Forrester Street as shown on Section 7M of the Official City Plan. He asked whether the alterations would take place in the near future, since the Church buildings in question required some immediate repairs, and they felt it would be useless to carry them out, if such were the case.

After listening to a few comments by the City Engineer, His Worship the Mayor advised Mr. Engram that the Church could seek permission to carry out the repairs as long as they did not involve any additions to the buildings, since it appeared the street alterations were to take place at some indefinite date in the future, at which time there would be expropriation of the properties involved.

Mr. Engram asked if the street lines would affect the parking lot now rented to Gordon B. Isnor, and the City Engineer replied they did encompass part of it, but that the City was not pressing for the widening at that point. It was suggested that Mr. Dodge supply the Church with a sketch of the new street lines.

PETITIONS & DELEGATIONS

Petition: Re - Protesting the Establishment of another Stone Crusher at Kearney Lake

Alderman Hogan read the following petition which

had been signed by approximately 300 signatures:

"February 12, 1970

- "We, the property owners and residents of Kearney Lake, Wedgewood Park, Grosvenor Park and surrounding areas in Ward 10 in the City of Halifax do hereby protest the establishment of another stone crusher at Kearney Lake, the existing stone crusher on the property of Standard Paving Maritime Limited and others in the area and also future stone crushers in our area.
 - "We the residents cannot tolerate the serious health hazard and degradation of the entire area caused by the extreme daily dust pollution, noise pollution and water pollution in Kearney Lake. The damage to our properties caused by continuous blasting, and this pollution, is resulting in serious devaluation of our properties.
 - "We, as residents of Ward 10 in Halifax City have been exposed to, too much of this same type of industry, namely all stone crushers, rock quarries, asphalt plants, concrete plants, gravel pits, and contractors equipment yards.
 - "There is also an increased risk on our roads and highway for the safety of the children who walk to and from school coming in daily contact with these added trucks.
 - "This type of industry is ruining the waters and shore lines of Kearney Lake for residential and recreational purposes.

"We the residents of Kearney Lake and surrounding areas in Ward 10 demand immediate action on this petition.

> "Submitted by property owners and residents of Kearney Lake and the surrounding areas in Ward 10 of the City of Halifax"

Alderman Hogan said he would like to move that

before any further permits for industrial development in Kearney Lake are granted, a Public Hearing into the matter be held.

The City Solicitor advised that if a property owner applied for a permit, and his application met the requirements of the law, the City would be unable to withhold the issuance of a permit.

Petition Re: Pigeon Nuisance caused by Homeowner putting Feed on the Roof of her House

The following petition addressed to His

Worship the Mayor and the City Council was received in the office of the City Clerk on February 24, 1970:

"As many of you know, we who live on Oxford Street and the vicinity north of Jubilee Road, have been plagued by Pigeon droppings. Our steps, verandahs, walks and drive-ways are splashed, not to mention the roofs of our houses.

"Mrs. Allen at 1749 Oxford Street is causing this problem by putting feed on the roof of her house, which attracts the pigeons in large numbers. She has been doing this for a long time.

"Anyone who causes a public nuisance of this kind should not be allowed to do so. Even passersby have been splashed by droppings. It is time the City did something to stop her.
