Council May 1, 1975

Alderman Shannon said she did not want to put the County in a bad position but questioned how else the City can force the Provincial Government to act responsibly in this matter saying that if the City announces its intention to withdraw services to the County, some other accommodation will have to be made.

Alderman Hanson said he could not support the Motion as is saying the best way to deal with the matter would be by way of discussions between the City, the County, and the Provincial Government.

Deputy Mayor Stanbury, with the agreement of the Seconder withdrew her Motion and then MOVED, seconded by Alderman Shannon that in view of the state of the Halifax Incinerator and the uncertainty of future solid waste disposal, the City of Halifax decline to accept any further refuse from the Municipality of the County of Halifax as of August 1, 1975.

His Worship said the real difficulty with the whole matter is that it is cast upon the City at a time when it is not prepared for it and questioned whether the smoke from the City dump would be less offensive because it is 5/6th rather than 6/6th.

Alderman Connolly noted the City was prepared to handle the County refuse for about 18 months until the land fill operation came into being and felt that some sort of commitment has been made. Alderman Connolly felt the City has no obligation beyond that time but said the City has indicated it will accommodate the County until such time, and felt the Provincial Government should be informed that the City has no intention of honouring any commitment beyond that date.

Alderman Connolly expressed the feeling that the City must again stress to the Province the difficulties which the situation is causing and until the Province is prepared to take action, it will be faced with two problems rather than one.

Alderman Walker referred to the matter of the City indicating it would handle refuse from the County for a period of approximately 18 months and felt this should not change, but said a meeting should be arranged with the Municipality and the Province on the matter.

Council May 1, 1975

MOVED in amendment by Alderman Walker, seconded by Alderman Meagher that the City of Halifax continue to deal with the present level of refuse from the County of Halifax until mid 1976, and that the City cause to be held at the appropriate moment, appropriate conversations with the City of Dartmouth, the County of Halifax, and the Province of Nova Scotia to try to impress upon the Provincial authorities the difficulties in which this matter has placed the City.

The <u>amendment was put and passed</u> with Alderman Shannon and Deputy Mayor Stanbury against.

His Worship suggested it was not necessary to put the amended Motion as the Amendment contains both time and Action.

Construction Agreement #16 Kearney Lake Road, Bicentennial Drive West to City Limits

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Walker that, as recommended by the Committee on Works, Council approve the Construction Cost Sharing Agreement #16 as outlined in the staff report of April 1, 1975, and authorize His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk to sign the proposed Agreement so the Minister of Highways may finalize legal documentation for construction.

Motion passed.

#### REPORT - COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE COUNCIL, BOARDS & COMMISSIONS

Amendment to Ordinance No. 12A Respecting The Care, Custody and Management of the Fairview Lawn Cemetery - SECOND READING

MOVED by Alderman Meagher, seconded by Alderman Walker that the amendment to Ordinance No. 12A respecting "The Care, Custody and Management of the Fairview Lawn Cemetery", as submitted, be read and passed a Second Time. Motion passed.

Amendments to Ordinance No. 147 Respecting The Licensing of Dogs - SECOND READING

MOVED by Alderman Lawrence, seconded by Alderman Moore that the amendments to Ordinance No. 147 respecting "The Licensing of Dogs", as submitted, be read and passed a Second Time. Motion passed.

#### REPORT - CITY PLANNING COMMITTEE

Council considered the report of the City Planning Committee from its meeting held on April 23, 1975, as follows:

Application for Consolidation of Lot R, Kent Street and Lot S Tobin Street, under the Ownership of Skyline Investments to Form Lot RS

Moved by Alderman Walker, seconded by Alderman Meagher that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee, the application to consolidate Lot R, Kent Street, and Lot S, Tobin Street, under the ownership of Skyline Investments to form Lot RS, as shown on Plan No. P200/6912 of Case No. 3157, be approved by City Council. Motion passed.

Application for Consolidation of Lots 56 & 57 to Form Lot B, Lands of Barrian Enterprises Ltd., Quinn Street

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Hanson that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee,

the application for the consolidation of Lots 56 and 57 to form Lot B, lands of Barrian Enterprises Limited, Quinn Street, as shown on Plan No. P200/6952 of Case No. 3166, be approved by City Council. Motion passed.

#### Modification of Lot Area and Lot Frontage - 5666 Cabot Street

MOVED by Alderman Downey, seconded by Alderman Walker that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee, the application for the modification of lot area and lot frontage requirement to permit the construction of a single family dwelling, as shown on Plan No. P200/6894 and P200/6929 of Case No. 3163, be approved by City Council. Motion passed.

#### REPORT - MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

#### Quinpool Road Lands

The City Manager advised that a proposal was received from the Neighbourhood Housing Association on Friday last and for this reason staff was unable to complete their report to Council for this meeting. She stated that the report would be available in the very near future.

The City Manager further stated that staff wish to have a Special Meeting on the question of Quinpool Road lands so that they can take time to deal with all the proposals and requested that Council indicate a date when such a meeting could be held.

Alderman Meagher advised that he would be out of the City from May 12 to May 24 inclusive and wished to be present at the meeting. He requested that this be considered when a date was set for the meeting.

It was agreed that a date would be set in the near future.

#### Continued Financing - Quinpool Road Lands

A staff report dated April 23, 1975, was submitted.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Meagher that the full \$ 5.3 million cost of the Quinpool Road lands continue to be carried as part of the short term basis where the cash requirements of the City dictate, until such time as Council has made a firm commitment to the use and/or method of disposition of the lands. Motion passed.

Construction of a roadway and installation of a 48-inch water main (Pockwock) on Kearney Lake Road from the City Boundary to the Bicentennial Drive. The Proposed lowering of the Lake by 10 ft.

A public meeting was held re this matter on April 24, 1975.

Mr. Dodge, Assistant Director of Development, responded to questions from Alderman Lawrence re the widening of Kearney Lake road and the removal of a portion of the beach area. Mr. Dodge advised, in response to a question re sidewalks, that there is no reason why sidewalks on the south side from Hamshaw Drive to Broadholme Lane could not be included in the 1976 Capital Budget for Council's decision. He stated that an up-to-date assessment indicates that there will be 2,000 feet of sidewalk construction at an approximate cost of \$50,000.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Lawrence, that City Council approve:

- the lowering of Kearney Lake by 10 feet;
- (2) the possible realignment of Kearney Lake Road within the City limits that abuts Kearney Lake;
- (3) the disruption and possible removal of a recreation facility (beach) in the area and that staff recommend a site for replacement.

Motion passed.

The Proposed Construction through a joint tender call for Dunbrack Street and the Pockwock Water Line from Main Avenue to Kearney Lake Road, along Kearney Lake Road to the Bicentennial Drive.

A Public Meeting was held re the above matter on April 24, 1975.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Lawrence that City Council approve Alternative 3, as set forth in the staff report dated April 4, 1975, and that a joint tender call be made in early May for the construction of Dunbrack Street as outlined in Alternative 3 along with the installation of the Pockwock Water Supply System. Motion passed.

Alderman Meagher commended Mr. Dodge for his work re the two foregoing items and also for his presentation at the Public Meeting held on April 24, 1975.

Resignation & Appointment - Board of Management - Halifax Civic Hospital

MOVED by Deputy Mayor Stanbury, seconded by Alderman Meagher that the resignation of Mr. F. B. Wickwire from the Board of Management, Halifax Civic Hospital, be accepted and that His Worship the Mayor be appointed to fill this particular vacancy. Motion passed.

#### Halifax-Dartmouth Bridge Commission Annual Report - 1974

Copies of the Annual Report 1974 were submitted and circulated to members of Council.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Walker, that the Halifax-Dartmouth Bridge Commission Annual Report 1974 be tabled. Motion passed.

Task Force on Housing - Proposed Amendments to the Residential Tenancies Act

A report dated April 30, 1975, re the above subject was submitted by the City Solicitor.

MOVED by Alderman Shannon, seconded by Alderman Downey that the Housing Task Force be authorized by City Council to take the recommendations, as set forth in their report to City Council dated April 22, 1975, to the Provincial Government and House of Assembly as appropriate.

Alderman Moore requested a further explanation of the investigative role of the administrative board. Alderman Shannon and the City Solicitor responded to questions in this regard.

The motion was put and passed.

#### QUESTIONS

#### Question Alderman Connolly Re: Sweeping of Streets

Alderman Connolly stated that sometime ago he had correspondence from Mr. Calda re sweeping of streets in the City of Halifax. He asked how many sweepers the City has, how many are now operating, and under ordinary circumstances, how long will it take to have a sweeper do all the City streets once.

Mr. Calda responded that the City has five sweepers and all are operating. He advised that hand sweeping started by the end of March, followed by mechanical sweeping on April 7, and by April 29 all the major routes were completed. On April 29 staff started on the regular residential routes following the signing. He stated that every night there are three sweepers out following the regular routes as well as six to eight labourers who are handsweeping the Rotary, the Willow Tree, etc. He advised that 900 tons of debris has been collected. He stated that there is a problem with illegally parked cars and requested the Police Department's assistance in removing these cars.

#### Question Alderman Walker Re: Tot Lot at Green Acres

Alderman Walker asked if the debris collected by the street sweeping could be dumped as fill for the tot lot at Green Acres. Mr. Calda stated that he would advise against using the debris for this purpose.

#### Question Alderman Meagher Re: Painting of Crosswalks

Alderman Meagher asked if the crosswalks at Quinpool Road and Beech Street, Chebucto Road at Elm Street, and Oxford Street, could be painted as soon as possible.
Mr. Calda stated that this would be done.

#### Question Alderman Downey Re: Parking at St. Pat's School

Alderman Downey asked if something could be done re cars parking at St. Pat's School. He stated these cars are parked there during the day and enter from Brunswick Street.

#### Question Alderman Walker Re: Parking by Staff at Schools

Alderman Walker asked if the City is providing a lot of parking area for staff at schools and not a play area for children. He stated that it seems to him that at every school half the playground area is taken up with cars that belong to staff and he suggested that this is an expensive proposition for the City to be providing parking while the children have to play on rocks, etc. and in other areas not as acceptable as where the cars are parked.

His Worship stated that the Board of School Commissioners will be asked for a report re the matters raised.

#### Question Alderman Downey Re: Construction at North Street

Alderman Downey stated that due to the construction at North Street, the traffic is being diverted through Charles Street and asked if the traffic could be rerouted.

Mr. Calda advised that by the time a workable rerouting could be accomplished, the construction itself will be completed and North Street reopened. Mr. Calda further advised that he would advise Council of the reopening date at a meeting to be held tomorrow.

## Question Alderman Hanson Re: Guard Rail at the Corner of Winchester Street and Herring Cove Road

Alderman Hanson stated that a guard rail has been placed at the corner of Winchester Street and Herring Cove Road and now when vehicles are going north on Herring Cove Road they cannot turn onto Winchester Street if a vehicle is at that intersection waiting to turn onto Herring Cove Road. He asked that the matter be investigated.

Mr. Calda advised that this matter would be investigated by staff and a report will be issued.

#### Question Alderman Hanson Re: Construction at MacDonald Street and Chebucto Road

Alderman Hanson asked how long construction would continue at MacDonald Street and Chebucto Road.

Mr. Calda advised that he would check with Maritime Tel. & Tel. Co. Ltd. and advise.

#### Question Alderman Walker Re: Hilden Heights Project

Alderman Walker asked for a staff report as soon as possible re the status of the Hilden Heights project. He stated that the site at present is a potential fire hazard and he understood the City had some interest in the development.

#### Question Alderman Walker Re: Fire Station at Spryfield

Alderman Walker stated that he had received a copy of the report from architects Dumaresq & Byrne and wondered

why the City did not hire an independent architect to check this building. He stated that he is not satisfied with the report and asked that a further investigation be done on this building.

#### Question Alderman Lawrence Re: Nancy Garapick's World Record

Alderman Lawrence noted that Nancy Garapick, a resident of the City, broke the world record this week re the 200-meter swimming free style. He asked that the Mayor, on behalf of City Council and the citizens of Halifax, send a letter of congratulations to Miss Garapick. He asked if there was an award the City could bestow upon Miss Garapick.

His Worship stated that a message has been, in fact, conveyed to Miss Garapick and suggested that perhaps consideration should be given to something more substantial. His Worship asked that Aldermen Hanson, Lawrence and Downey meet to discuss what action Council might take on such occasions as he noted there were other very note-worthy achievements in the way of sports accomplished by other residents of the City of Halifax as well. It was agreed that the Aldermen would meet and submit suggestions to Council in this regard.

Question Alderman Walker Re: Amendment to Cowie Hill Development Permit

Alderman Walker referred to an information report which refers to an amendment to the Cowie Hill Development Permit and asked that a report be submitted advising what the amendment entailed.

#### ADDED ITEMS

Amendments to Administrative Order #8, Respecting "Nursery Schools" -- SECOND READING

MOVED by Alderman Lawrence, seconded by Alderman Walker, that the amendments to Administrative Order #8, as submitted, be read and passed a Second Time. Motion passed. Deputy Mayor Stanbury abstained from voting on this matter.

#### Gottingen Street Community Centre

A staff report dated May 1, 1975, was submitted.

MOVED by Alderman Downey, seconded by Alderman
Meagher that staff be authorized to continue work towards
the planned improvements to the George Dixon Recreation Area
and that a complete report on the proposed Gottingen Street
Community Centre be prepared for the first Committee of the
Whole in the month of June. Motion passed.

#### Issuing Resolution - Freshwater Brook Sewer (71-11) \$675,526.63

The City Manager requested that this matter be deleted at this time as staff wish to recheck the figures.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Moore, that the matter be deleted as requested. Motion passed.

Meeting adjourned - 10:30 P.M.

A joint meeting of members of City Council and representatives of the Nova Scotia Power Corporation was held on the above date.

Present: His Worship the Mayor, Chairman.
Aldermen Stanbury, Shannon, Meagher,
Downey and Hanson.

Also Present: City Manager, City Clerk, and other staff members.

Mr. K. W. McGrail, Vice-President and Assistant General Manager; Mr. D.G.Brown, Manager of Systems Planning Division and other staff members of the Nova Scotia Power Corporation.

His Worship opened the meeting by welcoming staff members of the Nova Scotia Power Corporation, and advised that, as a result of the last regular meeting of Council, today's meeting was called to discuss:

"POWER SUBSTATION AND 138 KV TRANSMISSION LINE KEMPT ROAD".

His Worship said this was to be an informal meeting, no decisions would be made, and called upon Mr. McGrail to make the presentation for the Nova Scotia Power Corporation.

Mr. McGrail presented Mr. Daniel Brown to those present and said Mr. Brown would briefly touch on load forecast, present a segment illustrating transmission rights-of-way, and give a general picture of the overall supply of electricity to the peninsula of Halifax.

 $\mbox{\rm Mr.}$  Daniel Brown then made a presentation in film and dialogue.

Alderman Connolly joined the meeting at 2:30 p.m.

Mr. Brown said that he would endeavour to define the needs of the Nova Scotia Power Corporation, and would review what has happened to the power system of the city within the past 25 years. The chart shown demonstrated a compound growth rate of 7.6% during the years 1952-1972, and Mr. Brown agreed with His Worship that this rate was now accelerating.

The general breakdown of the class of load was illustrated.

Figures were given which showed that whilst in 1945 energy was received from St.Margaret's Bay and the Valley Hydro, by 1974 75% of the power was from Water Street, and 25% from Tufts Cove, the surplus from the other stations being absorbed by those areas.

Mr. Brown said that Water Street thermal generating station developed from a station with a total capability of 600kw in 1900 to one supplying 165000kw in 1959. As the Power Corporation own no more property on Water Street, expansion is unlikely and it is anticipated that its role in the future would be that of a subsidiary supply in case of breakdown. Mr. Brown then briefly reviewed the generating and transmission for the city of Halifax for the period 1950 - 1975, and explained that the distribution system has grown primarily through the introduction of new distribution sub-stations. is envisaged that the long-term situation will be a few major stations utilizing 138000 volts primary and 25000 distribution. In 1975 the estimated peak load will be 197mw for Halifax city. Mr. Brown went on to say that one of the responsibilities of the Power Corporation is to forecast future needs and design the facilities required. In 1985 the peninsula will require 300-320mw, and in 1990, 440mw will be needed. This would ensure that in the case of a breakdown, there would be no load shedding. In conjunction with consultants for the Tri-level Committee, a proposal had been put forward to erect a major sub-station in the Geizers Hill area.

major terminal station will be at Lakeside. In order to supply transmission to the city, the Power corporation will require rights-of-way through the watershed area to Lakeside, and in the vicinity of Kempt Road.

In reply to a question put by Alderman Connolly, vis-a-vis whether the cables were run underground or overhead, Mr.McGrail replied that the Nova Scotia Power Corporation is not responsible for the difference in cost between these types of installations; in this case it would amount to some 2.6 million dollars. Mr. McGrail agreed with his Worship that whilst aesthetically underground cables are preferable, the added financial cost normally precluded this type of installation. However, it may be possible in an instance of this type to pass on the extra cost to the citizens of Halifax by way of a surcharge.

Assurances were given to Alderman Stanbury that this installation would not affect the TV reception in Ward 6.

Fox (staff) then showed an alternative as envisaged by city staff. This would go over very little private property, and would entail moving the transmission line south. His Worship asked if the northernmost tower could be moved south from the position shown by the Power Corporation, and Mr.McGrail answered in the affirmative. In reply to a question as to what would be involved should the line be moved south, Mr. McGrail felt very little additional cost, if any, would occur, and said Mr. Fulton would be very happy to work as closely as possible with staff in discussing the location of the tower. Replying to a question on safety, Mr. Brown said it was highly unlikely the conductor would break, but if such an event occurred, the line clears in a matter of cycles, that is, less than a second. No power goes through a transmission line once it hits the ground.

In reply to a question from His Worship

whether the sub-station and the tower line were the Power Corporation's only aspirations, Mr.McGrail replied as the estimated load is 600mw, with Armdale producing 150mw, Water Street the same, and the new substation also producing 150mw, another one will be required before 1997 in the peninsula of Halifax. However, he added, such a forecast is difficult. It would appear however, that faster electric growth rates were a distinct possibility.

In reply to questions regarding the use of a steel pole as recommended by staff, instead of towers, Mr.McGrail said the pole is more expensive but not so strong. However, he agreed that aesthetically it is more pleasing and said that wherever such an installation is near a highway or residential area, investigations would be made to ensure that a pole would be used if practicable.

The matter of the new collection point for the trucks belonging to the Nova Scotia Power Corporation was touched on briefly.

His Worship asked if it would be possible for copies of the charts to be made available for the aldermen and received a reply in the affirmative.

His Worship asked if those present had any more questions, and on receiving a negative answer closed the meeting, receiving thanks from Mr.McGrail for the opportunity to address His Worship and members of City Council and staff.

The meeting adjourned at 3.35 p.m.

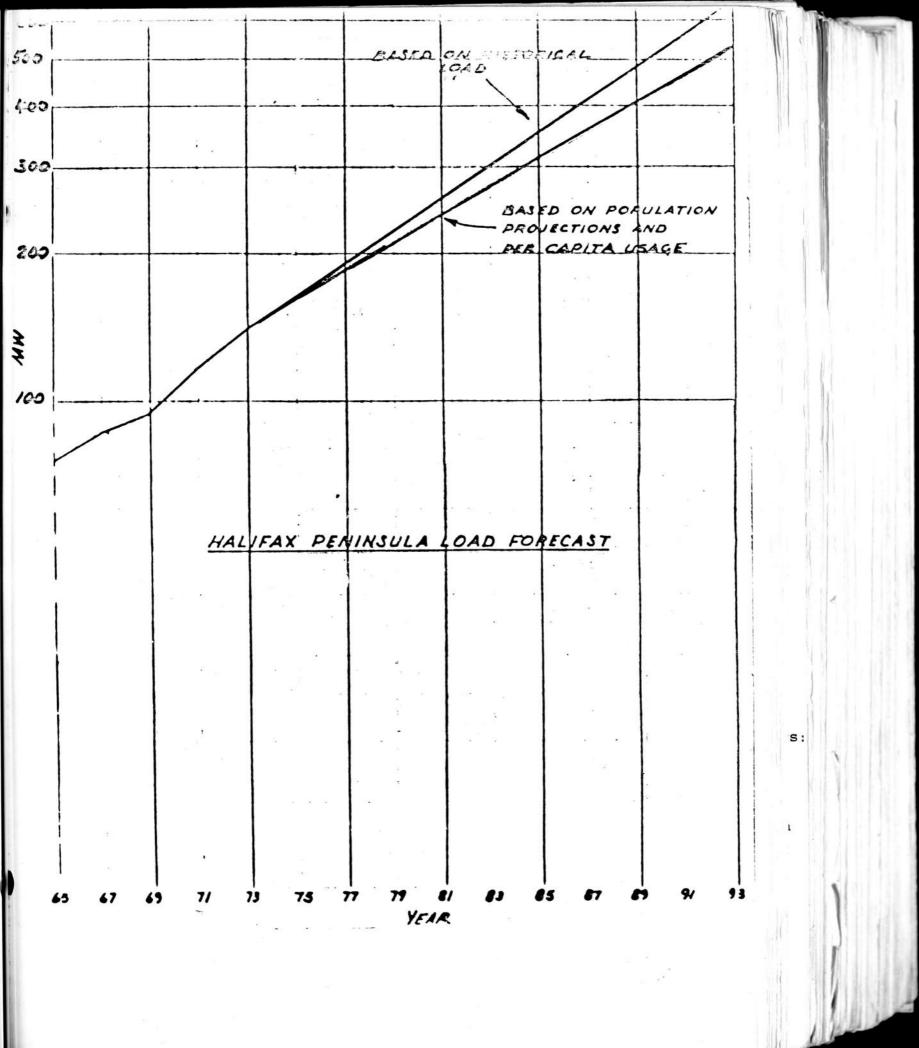

His Worship advised that the meeting was called as a Public Hearing with respect to an application for rezoning of properties known as Civic Nos. 1480, 1484, 1488, 1494 Carlton Street and 5950, 5954 Spring Garden Road from R-3, Multiple Dwelling Zone to C-2, General Business Zone.

The following correspondence opposing the rezoning application was received and circulated to members of City Council:

- Petition signed by approximately 222 people and covering letter dated May 7, 1975, from R. Douglas S. Macdonald, Carlton Street Neighbourhood Association;
- Letter dated May 1, 1975, from Constance Hubley;
- 3. Letter dated April 30, 1975, from M. Tregunno;
- 4. Letter dated May 1, 1975, from M. R. Pugsley;
- 5. Letter dated May 5, 1975, from V. H. Barnstead;

Special Council, May 7, 1975

6. Letter dated May 7, 1975, from M. J. Marentette, Executive Director, Catholic Social Services Commission, Archdiocese of Halifax.

Mr. B. Davidson, Development Department, stated that the application for rezoning is for the purpose of constructing an eight-storey building which will contain a restaurant with a capacity of serving 353 customers approximately and will entail an area of 4,235 sq. ft. He stated that there will be an additional 1800 sq. ft. of rental space area on the ground floor. The remaining seven storeys will provide approximately 58,100 square feet of office space. He stated the developer will also provide two underground levels of parking for 70 cars.

Mr. Davidson pointed out that Council's approval of a modification to the height setback requirement of 11'-4" will be necessary to permit the location of the top two floors to extend to the western face of the building. Mr. Davidson responded to questions from members of Council.

His Worship called for those persons wishing to speak in favor of the application.

Mr. G. Lambros, architect for the proposed project, stated he wished to explain to Council the positive and constructive aspects of this project. He stated that in working on the concept of this project, particularly on the property involved, he was very conscious of scale, shape and mass on that corner and he believed the result is sympathetic to the environment of the area. He stated that, to the best of his knowledge, this is the first commercial project in the City of Halifax that voluntarily provides 2200 sq. ft. of landscaped space on the two street frontages, and provides voluntarily parking for seventy cars.

3:

Mr. Lambros noted that the existing buildings on these properties are dilapidated, a fire hazard, and not feasible for occupancy beyond the present lease term as far as the owner is concerned. Mr. Lambros then responded to questions from members of Council. Special Council, May 7, 1975

Mr. Hopkins, the applicant, addressed Council stating that he wished to speak briefly on the CBD aspect of their application. He stated that the purpose of the building was to be primarily of a very local servicing nature, that is, its function would not be of use or convenience to the people in the area if it were located within the CBD. He advised that it is proposed that the building be erected with its frontage on Spring Garden Road in an area that already fosters commercial and professional high rise buildings. He advised that it is a development that, from the office aspect and particularly from the dining facility aspect, will be catering to the needs of people who live and work in that area. He stated that he could not imagine that this would challenge the concept of CBD.

Mr. Hopkins stated that the proposal for offices would be to serve the needs of people whose work is associated in some manner with the various institutions already built or being built in this area. He suggested that office space within the CBD area would not adequately serve these particular people. He further stated that the dining facility within the building is also primarily for the people who live or work within the area. Mr. Hopkins then responded to questions from members of Council.

Dr. R. Douglas S. Macdonald, representing the Carlton Street Neighbourhood Association, reviewed a brief which he submitted, copies of which were circulated to members of Council, indicating the Association's opposition to the proposal. Dr. Macdonald responded to questions from members of Council.

Mr. H. Jackson, appearing on behalf of the Carlton Street Neighbourhood Association, read a brief, copies of which were circulated to members of Council, indicating the citizens' opposition to the proposal. Mr. Jackson responded to questions from members of Council.

Mr. A. Sinclair, 6422 Jubilee Road, stated he wished to point out that this development is inconsistent with the boundary concept of Ward 2 as it is an intrusion into the boundary space, and therefore the Ward 2 Residents' Council oppose this type of spot rezoning.

1

Special Council, May 7, 1975 Reverend Gordon McDermid stated that he is the Minister of St. Andrew's Church which is a property owner in the area and has an interest in the values and concerns of the immediate environment. He advised that he is opposed to the rezoning application and is in favour of the retention of the policy re the development of the CBD. Reverend J. P. C. Fraser addressed Council and stated that he is a tenant-resident on Carlton Street for ten years and for a total of thirteen years in the immediate area. He stated that his main objection, apart from personal ones, is that when he was contemplating retirement, he always hoped that he could come to Halifax because Halifax had a quality that he did not find in any other City in which he had lived. He hoped that the residential streets would not be gradually spoiled by commercial interests as there is room within the City for both.

There being no further persons present wishing to speak, His Worship declared the matter to be before Council.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Lawrence, that the matter be referred to the next meeting of City Council without recommendation. Motion passed.

After the meeting was called to order, the members of Council attending, led by the City Clerk, joined in reciting the Lord's Prayer.

Present: His Worship the Mayor, Chairman; Deputy Mayor Stanbury, Aldermen Connolly, Shannon, Walker, Hanson, Moore and Lawrence.

#### MINUTES

Alderman Shannon stated that the residents of the area are very fearful of the lack of controls over rezoning the property to C-2 as Council has no control after the land is rezoned for a commercial use. She suggested that the large restaurant on the ground floor of the proposed development will obviously create much traffic in the area and should an application be made for a liquor license for the said restaurant, Council has no control over the issuing of such licenses. She noted that Council is rezoning housing land to commercial in a City where there is a severe housing shortage.

Alderman Shannon pointed out that the staff report speaks very strongly against a widely diversified City Centre and she suggested that to diversify and weaken the Central Business District so close to the boundaries of that district does not make any sense whatsoever. She stated that the Neighbourhood Association, in their brief, identified seven proposed policies of the Municipal Development Plan which would be violated should this rezoning be approved. She pointed out that responsible people and groups all over the City have been working towards the policies of the Municipal Development Plan and she felt that to allow this rezoning on the request of one individual which would violate many policies, and particularly the policy which calls for a strong Central Business District, is to make a mockery of the whole process that has been taking place.

Deputy Mayor Stanbury stated that she felt that by refusing this particular application for rezoning, Council would be striving for something that is already part of the past. She noted various commercial sites in the immediate vicinity of this particular proposal and stated that it seemed to her that this is already becoming an area in which there are many offices. She further stated that, in view of the fact that the owner can at present construct an apartment building of a much higher density, she felt it would serve a great community need in having a restaurant such as is proposed to service the professional people employed in the area.

Alderman Lawrence stated that he concurred with Alderman Shannon's remarks and suggested that spot rezoning in this instance is a very dangerous thing and he could foresee other developers in future making similar applications. He also expressed grave concern re the proposed restaurant and the undesirable alternatives that would be permitted by the rezoning if a restaurant is not established as proposed.

Alderman Connolly stated that he would almost have preferred if the application had been to C-4 Zone as he personally believes that this area is developing in a C-4 use. He stated he also had difficulty dealing with a thirteen storey building as opposed to an eight storey building. He asked the City Solicitor to advise whether caveats, etc., could be attached to the rezoning approval to control the ultimate use of the ground floor space.

The City Solicitor advised that he is aware of methods whereby the affects of such a caveat could be very easily overcome and he would not recommend that he could control the development proposed by the use of a caveat after rezoning.

Alderman Hanson stated that he visited the site and has come to the conclusion that an eight-storey building would be dwarfed by the other buildings in the area and he cannot agree with a possible thirteen-storey building as opposed to an eight-storey building. He noted that

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the Board of Trade, in a recent presentation, stated that they did not feel that the Central Business District should have exclusive rights for office development and some office buildings can and should be located in other areas of the City.

Alderman Walker stated that he felt the developer has given assurances that there will not be liquor sold in the restaurant and also felt that the developer is prepared to give such assurances in writing.

The motion was then put and passed, five voting for the same and two against as follows:

FOR: Deputy Mayor Stanbury, Aldermen Connolly, Walker, 5 Hanson, and Moore

AGAINST: Aldermen Shannon and Lawrence 2

His Worship noted that item 11 (d) - Sidewalks - Glenforest Drive relates to the same matter and suggested that item 11 (d) be also considered at this time and it was so agreed.

Mr. K. Greenlaw, resident of the North side of Glenforest Drive, addressed Council and pointed out that the residents of Glenforest Drive feel there are alternatives to constructing sidewalks which have not been given consideration. He stated that there is a strip of land behind Glenforest Drive on the south side which the residents understand is going to be re-landscaped with a sidewalk put on the said property. He suggested that such a sidewalk would serve the same purpose. He requested that more consideration be given to helping ease the traffic burden, i.e., reducing speed limits, one-way traffic patterns, etc.

Mr. D. Platt, 132 Glenforest Drive, joined Mr. Greenlaw in opposing the proposed construction and both responded to questions from members of Council.

Mr. Calda, Director of Engineering & Works, advised that this area is slated for a park in the distant future but noted that a walkway in the said area would not serve the same purpose as a sidewalk at Glenforest Drive.

Alderman Lawrence asked that staff consider the possibility of placing the sidewalk in the area of the watermain.

#### QUESTIONS

#### Question Deputy Mayor Stanbury re: Distribution of Unsolicited Literature.

Deputy Mayor Stanbury referred to a letter received from a member of the public, addressed to His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Halifax.

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Deputy Mayor Stanbury expressed her agreement with the sentiments expressed therein, that magazines and pamphlets left outside homes constituted not only a garbage nuisance, but also served as an indication (if these remained outside), of the possibility that the house was unattended.

His Worship asked the City Solicitor to investigate if it was within the competence of the present City Ordinance to prevent this nuisance.

## <u>Question Alderman Walker - Construction Canopy</u> - Welsford and Robie Street.

Alderman Walker drew Council's attention to the fact that a contractor had erected a canopy because of construction work in such a manner that he had caused an obstruction to pedestrians. He asked if this was permissible.

The City Solicitor replied that it was not, and that the matter would receive attention.

Present: His Worship the Mayor, Chairman; Aldermen Connolly, Shannon, Meagher, Walker, Hanson, Moore, Lawrence and Deputy Mayor Stanbury.

His Worship advised that the meeting was called to consider the following items:

- Solid Waste Disposal
- Quinpool Road Progress Report.

#### Solid Waste Disposal

Mr. L. Dursi, of the Engineering and Works
Department, with the aid of slides, reviewed the staff
report dated May 26, 1975, which was considered by
City Council, which outlined an alternate solid waste
disposal program for the City of Halifax should the
Province of Nova Scotia not allow the Municipally approved
Regional solid waste disposal program to proceed. Mr.
Dursi then responded to questions from members of Council.

Mr. Murphy, Acting City Manager, stated that staff does require the authorization of City Council to commence negotiations immediately with the Federal Department of Public Works for the acquisition of all excavated material from the proposed Postal Sorting Station Complex. He stated
